SEVERAL TRADES JOIN WITH THE VANCOUVER STRIKERS; POSTAL QUESTION TO FORE

EDMONTON IN SERIOUS STRAITS FROM SHORTAGE OF
FUEL—STRIKERS DRIVE JITNEYS IN VANCOUVER
WHEN STREET CARS STOP

(Special to The News via G.T.P. Telegraphs.)

Vancouver, June 7.—The postal crisis is now the bone of contention at Vancouver. Collective bargaining is no longer the main issue. The postal service is badly disorganized.

Mayor Gale has asserted that the strikers are driving jitneys, thus temporarily relieving the inconvenience caused by the temporary stoppage of the street cars.

In Serious Straits.

Edmonton, June 7.—It is not at all impossible that the city will be in serious straits before long with the street railway and all users of power in the city affected. The reason is the shortage of coal and the fact that the supply at the power house is practically at an end and that avenues of securing a further supply appear to be closed.

Many Walked Out.

Vancouver, June 6.—The ranks of the strikers swelled when the metal trades workers, carpenters, sugar refinery employees and several small local unions walked out. Coastwise shipping is almost completely tied up. As rapidly as the coast steamers arrive the union men walk off and join the strikers.

The Canadian Pacific Railway announced today they intended to continue running passenger boats to Victoria, arrangements being made by the Company to employ girls to do the work of the striking stewards aboard coastwise steamships.

Refused to Strike.

Calgary, June 6.—Union railwaymen employed by the C. P. R. voted against joining the general strike. The striking painters returned to work.

JUDGMENT FOR MEN IS GIVEN IN LIEN CASE

Sum of \$34,000 Involved in Suit
Against T. A. Kelley Logging
& Lumber Co.

Judgment has been given by Judge Young in the County Court against the T. A. Kelley Logging & Lumber Co., Ltd., of Atli Inlet, Queen Charlotte Islands, for the sum of \$34,000 wages due to employees. There are 98 claimants and if the amount of the judgment is not paid immediately logs to that amount will be sold to satisfy the claims.

The logs were got out for the Whalen Pulp & Paper Co. and checks were issued to the men by the logging company which were dishonored. Should it be necessary to hold a sale it will take place here.

CALM FOLLOWS WINNIPEG STORM

Increase of Police Force by En-
rolling of Returned Soldiers
Was Effective.

(Special via G.T.P. Telegraphs.)

Winnipeg, Friday evening.—Comparative calm spread through the city this evening after three of the most vivid days in the city's history. The city has been in a ferment, but the strengthening of the police force has had a good effect.

Today 1,300 returned soldiers were enrolled as constables and a cavalry unit was formed of over one hundred war veterans. The result was seen at once. Citizens who had been thronging the streets went quietly home and perfect order prevails.

JITNEYS RUNNING OPPOSED BY LABOR

Vancouver, June 7.—The citizens approve of the action of the City Council in permitting jitneys to run again despite the objection of labor.

The Empress of Russia is being unloaded by volunteers and the same is likely to be the case with the Makura, which is arriving with 1,000 tons of mutton aboard.

TYPOGRAPHICAL UNION HAS NO CENSORSHIP

Vancouver, June 7.—The stand taken by local newspapers refusing to recognize the censorship established by the Typographical Union has resulted in the union receding from its position and conceding to the papers' editorial rights.

MAYOR OLE HANSON REFUSES MOONEY TAG

Seattle, June 7.—Charging that the Seattle Labor Council is in the hands of Bolsheviks and that the move is designed to stir up more unrest, Mayor Ole Hanson today denied the petition of the Mooney Defence Committee to hold a tag day.

CITIZENS' COMMITTEE APPROPRIATES \$150,000 FOR POLICE WORK

Bread Being Sold at Winnipeg
Stores and Milk From the

Winnipeg today will see on its streets the first mounted patrols of special police organized to secure protection for citizens desiring to go about their lawful business.

While bread was obtained at the stores yesterday, milk distribution continued at the school houses.

RESIGNATION OF CRERAR ACCEPTED

Ottawa, June 7.—The resignation of T. A. Crerar, Minister of Agriculture, has been accepted by Sir Robert Borden. It is understood that he takes issue with the Government on the budget.

The general comment of eastern papers on the budget speech says that the tariff reductions are more than the east expected, but not enough to satisfy the west.

TELEGRAPHERS OUT, NATION-WIDE STRIKE

Washington, June 7.—The telegraphers are to go out on a nation-wide strike today. The old issues between the men and the employing companies have been revived.

GROUNDHOG COAL FIELDS VERY RICH

Proposal Will Soon be Made to
Have Them Developed by
the Owners.

That the owners of some of the Groundhog coal fields will soon be asking for aid to build a railway to the coast in order to develop the coal areas there was a statement made to the Board of Trade last night by C. F. Law who represents the owners, chief among whom was the late Lord Rhonda. They were formulating plans for their development and would probably ask the government to give them a certain area of coal lands to aid in building the railway.

Mr. Law told of the wonderful coal deposits, the development of which would make of this a great port. If bunkers were built here and the coal shipped at this point it would have a wonderful effect on the business of the place.

There were 200 square miles of known coal fields but he was sure it was much larger than that. The coal held 80 to 90 per cent fixed carbon and would place this part of the country in the front rank as coal producers. It would not only encourage shipping but industries also.

Mr. Law said that the California oil fields were on the decline and coal would probably take its place. They might market 10,000 tons a day at this port.

CAR SHORTAGE CAUSED BY LACK OF FUNDS

At the meeting of the Board of Trade last night letters were read from W. P. Hinton, the Deputy Minister of Railways, and the Canadian Express Company in reply to telegrams of protest which had been sent by the board. The Deputy Minister said that the matter was being looked into by the department; W. P. Hinton, general manager of the road, said that the trouble was occasioned by lack of funds and the high cost of building new cars, but that they were doing everything possible to relieve the situation; the Canadian Express Co. said that the provision of cars here was having their constant attention.

FISH ARRIVALS

The Andrew Kelly owned and operated by the Canadian Fish & Cold Storage Co., Ltd., arrived in port last night with a catch of 90,000 pounds of halibut which will be discharged today.
The G. E. Foster arrived yesterday with 65,000 pounds of ground fish.
The N. & S. arrived in last night with a catch of 12,000 pounds.

INCOME TAX INCREASE IS DOMINION PLAN

Duties on Farm Machinery Have
Been Reduced Considerably
and Special British
Tax Removed.

CANADA'S DEBT NOW \$220 ON EVERY PERSON

(Special via G.T.P. Telegraphs.)

Ottawa, June 7.—In order to meet the obligations of the Dominion Government there is to be a large increase in the income tax. That was one of the features of the budget speech of Sir Thomas White, Minister of Finance in the Dominion Government.

Free Importations.

Sir Thomas further said that there would be free importations of wheat, flour and potatoes from those countries which extended a like courtesy to Canada; in other words, there would be a system of reciprocity. There are to be substantial reductions on agricultural implements and the special war tax on British goods is to be entirely repealed in case of foodstuffs, linen and cotton clothing, woollens, boots and shoes, fur caps and fur clothing, hats, harness, saddlery, agricultural implements, oils, mining machinery and bituminous coal.

Reductions.

On cultivators, harrows, horse rakes, seed drills, manure spreaders and weedeaters the duty is reduced from 27½ per cent to 15 per cent. Hay loaders, potato diggers, fodder and food cutters, grain crushers, fanning mills, hay tedders, farm rollers, post-hole diggers, and farm wagons from 32½ per cent to 20 per cent.

The Debt.

Canada's debt when the expenditures authorized for the current year are made will aggregate \$1,950,000,000, or \$220 per capita Sir Thomas announced.

The interest burden will be \$115 million a year, exclusive of pensions, amounting to \$35,000,000 to \$45,000,000 annually.

FIRST BASEBALL GAME OF SEASON

Sons of Canada Defeat Colts Last
Night by Score of 6 to 4.

Baseball was given a start last evening, when the Sons of Canada hooked up with the Colts and a good ten-inning battle was pulled off.

Day was on the mound for the Sons of Canada and Matheson for the Colts. Both pitched good ball, allowing very few hits and walks. The final score was 6 to 4 with the Sons of Canada on the long end. A fair crowd of fans turned out to witness the initial game.

With a few fine days the three teams of the Prince Rupert Baseball Association will be able to get in shape and start playing their scheduled games. President Ben Self issues a challenge to any team north of Vancouver.

STRIKE VOTE TO BE TAKEN TOMORROW P.M.

If Workers Decide in Favor, All
Union Men Will Be Called
Out at Once.

Are you in favor of a general strike? That is the question which every union man is to be asked tomorrow and which most of them will answer. If they vote in favor of a strike, the few men who are still working in the city will be called out and a good many of them will respond. It is understood that a few will remain at work no matter what happens.

At a very lengthy meeting of the Trades and Labor Council held in Carpenters' Hall last night the whole situation was again canvassed and the views were expressed that those opposed to the strike did not represent the rank and file. For that reason it was agreed that they would again take a vote, this time on a definite proposal to strike or not to strike. The vote will be taken between the hours of 4 and 8 p.m. tomorrow. If the vote is in favor, the strike will be called at once; if against, work will continue as at present.

COMMITTEE WILL TRY TO SETTLE STRIKE

Three Appointed by the Trades
and Labor Council to Try to
Adjust Differences.

At the meeting of the Trades and Labor Council held last night a committee was appointed to interview the management of the J. R. Morgan Co. and the Prince Rupert Drydock & Engineering Co. in regard to a request of the laborers for more money. The committee appointed was George Casey, W. E. Thompson and Mr. Myers.

Strike Vote to Be Taken Tomorrow.

A strike vote is to be taken tomorrow by the organized workers of this city. Everyone is interested in the result, but none so much as the union men themselves. They have more at stake than anyone else for when the work stops the income stops.

To tie up the city absolutely tight would cause some inconvenience to everyone. Some of the luxuries of life would be cut off very soon, but already a good many of them are removed. The mails from the south are stopped and that is one of the luxuries. Fresh fruit and vegetables will soon be all used up, but there is plenty of good food, good enough for anybody for the next month or two. By that time it is possible that everything will be settled.

There are a good many people who still think that it would be a good thing to tie everything up with a general strike and it might not be a bad idea to give it a trial. A month of inactivity would not hurt anyone much just now during the good weather and it would perhaps be a satisfaction to those who are so keen for the strike. The worst feature would be that there may be some children who would suffer, the youngsters who do not understand what it is all about, but who are always the first to feel the pinch. The News is strong for a general strike if that will clear the air and give us a chance to get back to work after it is over. In the meantime trout fishing is said to be good.

Public Health Business of Nation.

For many years the trend of our activities along health lines has been for the governments and municipalities to relegate their responsibilities to various organizations, and merely assist them by charitable grants, thereby treating the most important features of health work as of an eleemosynary character, says "Conservation of Life."

In this matter these authorities have been wrong, both in principle and in action, for in no one particular can the health of a citizen of Canada be considered as an act of charity.

The nation and the body corporate have a duty to perform towards each citizen, be he rich or poor, in so far as his or her health is concerned and they cannot avoid the responsibility by simply giving financial assistance to the many excellent associations and institutions which have sprung up over the length and breadth of the country and are now carried on by an army of devoted and philanthropic citizens. If government and municipal authorities had but risen to their high responsibilities in regard to health, in a manner equal to those organizations now voluntarily working in such spheres as child welfare, motherhood, mental defectives, and social welfare, they would simply have been discharging what is clearly their duty and for which they are responsible. They cannot avoid or shirk what are clearly health problems, in the manner they have in the past, and public opinion must be so directed to claim from the state and the municipal authorities public action in place of charitable assistance. We have today a better understanding of what the word health means, and, what is more, we realize, better than we ever did, that each citizen, even the poorest and the youngest amongst us, has the right to claim from these authorities that preservation of health should be the first concern of the state.

LAND ACT AMENDMENT

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land.

Partnership pre-emption is abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emptions, with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.

Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres, before receiving Crown Grant.

Where a pre-emptor in occupation not less than 3 years, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, because of ill-health or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence may be issued provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$100 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained on these claims in less than 5 years, with improvements of \$10 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years.

Pre-emptor holding Crown Grant may record another pre-emption, if he requires land in conjunction with his farm, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesteads; title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes, areas exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or company.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT.
The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retroactive.

TOWNSITE PROPERTY ALLOTMENT ACT.
Provision is made for the grant to persons holding uncompleted Agreements to Purchase from the Crown of such proportion of the land, if divisible, as the payments already made will cover in proportion to the sale price of the whole parcel. Two or more persons holding such Agreements may apply for their interests and apply for a proportionate allotment jointly. If it is not considered advisable to divide the land covered by an application for a proportionate allotment, an allotment of land of equal value selected from available Crown land in the locality may be made. Those allotments are conditional upon payment of all taxes due the Crown or to any municipality. The rights of persons to whom the purchaser from the Crown has agreed to sell are also protected. The decision of the Minister of Lands in respect to the adjustment of a proportionate allotment is final. The time for making application for these allotments is limited to the 1st day of May, 1919. Any application made after this date will not be considered. These allotments apply to town lots and lands of the Crown sold at public auction.

Where pre-emptor in occupation not less than 3 years, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, because of ill-health, or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence may be issued, provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$300 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained in less than 5 years, and improvements of \$10.00 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years are required.

Pre-emptor holding Crown grant may record another pre-emption, if he requires land in conjunction with his farm, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesteads; title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes areas exceeding 500 acres may be leased by one person or company.

Mill, factory or industrial sites on timber land not exceeding 40 acres may be purchased on conditions include payment of stumpage.

Natural hay meadows inaccessible by existing roads may be purchased conditional upon construction of a road to them. Rebate of one-half of cost of road, not exceeding half of purchase price, is made.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT.

The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retroactive.

No fees relating to pre-emptions are due or payable by soldiers on pre-emptions recorded after June 26, 1918. Taxes are remitted for five years.

Provision for return of moneys accrued, due and been paid since August 4, 1914, on account of payments, fees or taxes on soldiers' pre-emptions.

Interest on agreements to purchase town or city lots held by members of Allied Forces, or dependents, acquired direct or indirect, remitted from enlistment to March 21, 1920.

SUB-PURCHASERS OF CROWN LANDS.

Provision made for issuance of Crown grants to sub-purchasers of Crown Lands, acquiring rights from purchasers who failed to complete purchase, involving forfeiture, on fulfilment of conditions of purchase, interest and taxes. Where sub-purchasers do not claim whole of original parcel, purchase price due and taxes may be distributed proportionately over whole area. Applications must be made by May 1, 1920.

GRAZING.

Grazing Act, 1919, for systematic development of livestock industry provides for grazing districts and range administration under Commissioner. Annual grazing permits issued based on numbers ranged; priority for established owners. Stock-owners may form Associations for range management. Free, or partially free, permits for settlers, campers or travellers, up to ten head.

FARM LOANS for SOLDIERS



Agricultural Training For Soldier Settlers

A SOLDIER is entitled to the benefits of the Soldier Settlement Act if he can satisfy the Agricultural Qualification Committee in his district that—

- He has performed the required military service;
- He is sincere in his intention to make farming his permanent occupation;
- He is physically capable and is fitted in general to make a success of the farming business.

If he is otherwise qualified, but has not had sufficient practical agricultural experience, the Committee may recommend that he be given agricultural training. A generous scale of allowances for soldiers in training has been adopted.

Training Centres For Soldier Settlers

The applicant who is recommended for instruction in agriculture may first be sent to a Training Centre, specially operated for the purpose, where he will learn, by practical experience, how to handle and feed horses and other live stock; milking; the operation of farm machinery, ploughing, etc.; general farm building work; farm blacksmithing; the different kinds of soil and rotation of crops; the selection and judging of live stock and the marketing of farm products. Short lectures on the business management of a farm will be given.

With A Selected Farmer

After the course at the Training Centre, the length of which depends on the progress of the individual but

will not exceed three months, the man is placed with a carefully selected farmer in the district in which he intends to settle, to complete his training. During this period (not exceeding one year), the soldier is visited from time to time by representatives of the Soldier Settlement Board, who check his progress and recommend when he is considered qualified to take up a farm of his own.

It will be evident that by this system of preliminary training the soldier settler will gain a thorough practical knowledge of farming without expense; will learn to appreciate the responsibility involved in the venture, and at the same time gain a clear conception of just what farm life means.

On His Own Farm

When a settler is deemed qualified by the Agricultural Qualification Committee, the Board will assist him to become established on a farm of his own, and will, through its Agricultural Advisers, continue to co-operate with him in his work, thereby ensuring his success and consequent ability to discharge his obligations and become permanently established.

Fair To Both

The procedure outlined not only gives the soldier an opportunity of first becoming familiar with his environment and of acquiring the experience requisite to success, but ensures adding to the nation's fundamental industry only competent and satisfied producers.

CONCESSION IS ASKED BY BIG COMPANY

Would Cost Fifteen Million Dollars to Build Pipe-line to Sea at Kitimaat.

The Board of Trade was asked last night to endorse an application from the D'Arcy Exploration Company for a concession in the Peace River Company to prospect for oil. The matter was referred to the mining committee of the board for report.

Chas. F. Law, who did some original exploratory work in that region, addressed the board in regard to the matter. He explained that the D'Arcy Exploration Co. was the prospecting end of the Anglo-Persian Oil Company, two-thirds of the stock of which was held by the British Government. The company did a great deal in supplying fuel oil to the British navy during the war and they have almost unlimited money behind them.

The Proposal.
It is estimated that it will cost an immense sum to thoroughly prospect over sixty square miles of territory and if a good flow of oil is found it will cost nearly fifteen million dollars to build a pipe line to the sea, probably at Kitimaat Arm. They were willing to pay the Government 12½ per cent of the gross output.

Mr. Law said that he did some prospecting in that part of the country 22 years ago and put down a well 980 feet deep at a point on the river bank where there was considerable oil seepage. At 280 feet they found a small quantity of oil, at 480 feet more was struck but at 850 feet they struck a flow of salt water that destroyed the well.

A similar thing happened at seven other wells that have been put down in that country. At each of these there is a flowing salt well and at one the gusher was so strong that it destroyed the derrick.

Gas Springs.
There are two gas springs in the Peace River country which indicate that oil is there if it can be found.

The speaker explained that the chances of finding a well in a country like that was about one in fifty. The provincial government had twenty million acres of land besides the land that was held by the Dominion government. What they wanted was one per cent of the territory, to examine for two years and to test by drilling for two more years.

President McCaffery explained that the provincial government had set aside \$50,000 for exploratory work in that country, but the proposal was worthy of consideration as the amount of money involved was so large.

ASK THAT BOATS GO SLOW IN THE HARBOR

Board of Trade Refers Matter to the Harbor Committee for Report.

The Board of Trade were last night asked by the harbor master, Capt. McCroskie, to endorse his action in regard to the restriction of the speed of vessels passing through Prince Rupert harbor. The matter was referred to the harbor committee for report.
