Synopsis of Land Act Amendments

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land. Partnership pre-emptions abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emptions with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective

Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clear-ing and cultivation of at least 5 acres, before receiving Crown Grant.

Where pre-emptor in occupation not less than 8 years, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, be cause of ill-health, or other cause, b granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim

Records without permanent resi dence may be issued, provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$300 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained in less than 5 years, and improvements of \$10,00 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence

of at least 2 years are required. Pre-emptor holding Crown grant may record another pre-emption, if he requires land in conjunction with his farm, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.

Mill, factory or industrial sites on timber land not exceeding 40 acres may be purchased; conditions include payment of stumpage. Natural hay meadows inaccessible by existing roads may be purchased conditional upon construction of a road to them. Rebate of one-half of cost of

road, not exceeding half of purchase price, is made. PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS

The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land. Partnership pre-emptions abolished but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emptions, with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.

Two or more persons holding such Agreements may group their interests and apply for a proportionate allotment jointly.
