OFFICIAL STATEMENT OF THE CANADIAN RAILWAY BOARD RE THREATENED SHOP STRIKE

WILL CONCLUDE NEGOTIATIONS WHEN SAME POINTS AT
ISSUE AT PRESENT UNDER NEGOTIATION WITH
U. S. WAR BOARD, WHICH AFFECTS 90
PER CENT. OF MEMBERSHIP,
ARE SETTLED

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Montreal, June 14.—An official statement regarding the threatened strike of the railway shop employees, issued by the Canadian Railway Board, says that the one point involved is that which is gravely affecting not only the solving of the problem of the Canadian railways, but the ability of Canadian business concerns to meet foreign competition.

The board has declined to conclude negotiations or to give definite assurances except and until the same points at present in negotiation are the main branch of the same labor organization, and constituting some 99 per cent of the membership of the men's unions, with the United States Railway Administration in Washington have been announced.

Carmen's Wages

Ottawa, June 14.—President Beatty, of the C. P. R., President Kelley of the Grand Trunk, and the high officials of the Government Railways, were in consultation here this morning. The Carmen are maintaining their refusal to re-open negotiations with the Railway War Board unless the matter of wages is discussed.

LUMBER MILL STRIKERS TIRE DOING NOTHING

Strikers Request Re-opening of
Mills—Distribution of Mail
in Vancouver is un-
interrupted.

POSTAL WORKERS RIDE IN JITNEYS MARKED O. H. M. S.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Vancouver, June 14.—The employees of three lumber mills again took up their accustomed tasks today, according to a statement issued by the Mill Owners and Managers Association. In all the three cases the mills were reopened at the request of the striking workmen who stated that they had grown tired of doing nothing.

The postal workers who formerly used the street cars in going to and from their work are now being carried by automobiles which display a card bearing the letters O. H. M. S. So far the distribution of mail has been in no wise hampered in Vancouver. The telephone department is a little bit disorganized through several of the operators going out on the sympathetic strike. Service, however, is being maintained, although delays are common.

SCRATCH CREW ON THE RUPERT

Strike of Deckhands Made Volun-
teer Sailors—Large Passen-
ger List for Opening of
Cannery Season.

The G. T. P. steamer Prince Rupert was heard whistling for the wharf shortly after nine this morning. She was able to get away from Vancouver on Thursday night and brought with her supplies of foodstuffs for Swanson Bay, Ocean Falls and Anyox. She brought mail, express and moving picture films for Prince Rupert but no freight.

There were several hundred steerage passengers, mostly cannery workers going to up-river points for the opening of the cannery season. The sockeye fishing opens next week, and the cannery hands came up from Vancouver while they had the chance.

The ship was handled by a composite crew, among which were the officers of the "John," "Albert" and "George," which are tied up in Vancouver. The place of the man with the big muscle and the sure eye who usually throws the ropes, was taken by another, but considering everything, the vessel made a good trip and in good time. Capt. McKenzie is as cheerful as ever, notwithstanding all the little things extra which he has had to supervise this trip.

The Rupert will leave for Anyox tonight and will make the return trip to Vancouver at midnight tomorrow as usual.

GERMANS MUST ALLOW POLES PASS THROUGH

COMMISSION TO CONTROL LEFT BANK OF THE RHINE

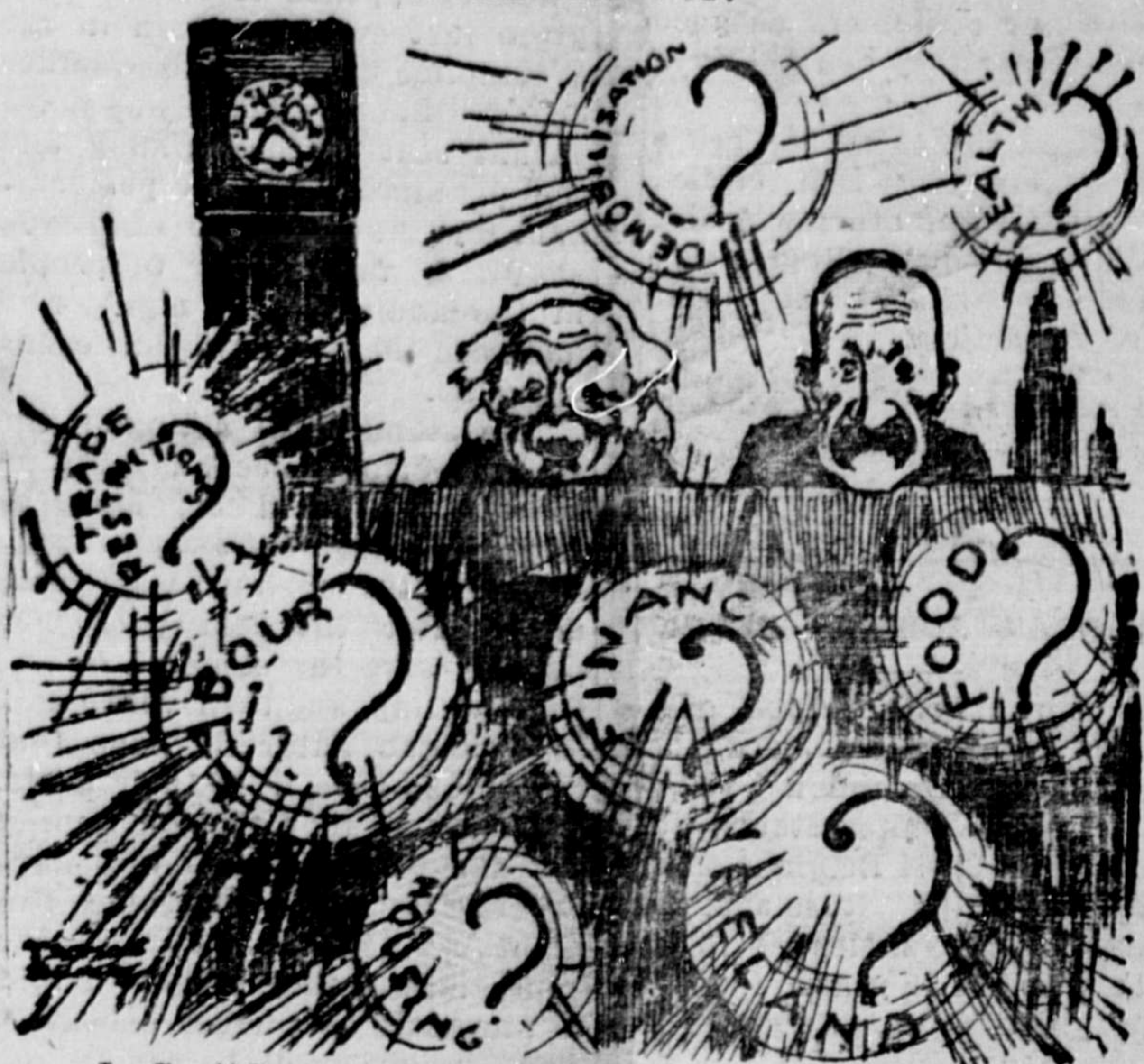
(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Paris, June 14.—The final settlement of the question of the left bank of the Rhine provides for an allied commission for the control of the military occupation of the region.

There are only a few fishing boats in the harbor this morning and their total catch amounts to 27,000 lbs. The Rosesport brought in 9,000 lbs.; The Atli, 8,000, and the Clara N., 10,000 lbs. The catches which were bought yesterday were taken to Ketchikan and Wark Island to be discharged there. It is expected that the fish in today will have to do the same as there seems to be nothing definite yet as regards the settlement of the strike which affects local conditions.

RED FLAG RUN UP ON FRENCH BATTLESHIP

Socialist Deputy in French Cham-
ber Tells of Incident at Odessa
Where Sailors Went
"Bolshevik."

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Paris, June 14.—An account of a mutiny of seamen belonging to the French Black Sea fleet stationed at Odessa during April was given in the Chamber of Deputies last night by Emile Goude, a Socialist deputy. During the trouble there the red flag was run up to the masthead of the battleship France on April 20. The trouble is supposed to have been caused by an officer ordering a machine gun to be fired against French soldiers and sailors fraternizing with the Russians, when several persons were killed and wounded. After negotiations, the demands of the sailors were met, and it was agreed that they should not be punished.

Deputy Goude asked M. Leygues, minister of marine, whether he intended to respect the pledged word of the admiral, but the minister did not answer. Deputy Goude continued: "The sailors will not abandon their vessels. Four hundred sailors met at Toulon recently and there told Admiral LaCaze that their comrades must not be touched or they would strike."

VENTURE EXPECTED TOMORROW NIGHT

The Union Steamship Company vessel Venture was able to sail from Vancouver on Thursday night and it is expected that she will arrive in Prince Rupert tomorrow (Sunday) night. No word has been received so far as to whether she will bring much or any freight from Vancouver for this port.

Duncan Kennedy, one of the old timers of Prince Rupert, returned to town this morning from Scotland, where he has been located for the last three or four years. He was formerly a carpenter here.

TAR MACADAM CROWN FOR THIRD AVENUE

Board of Works Make Decision at
Meeting Last Night—Plans
for Section Two Bridge
Ready Soon.

There was a meeting of the Board of Works last night, at which it was decided to crown Third Avenue in the centre to a width of eighteen or twenty feet with tar macadam. The approaches to the wharf on Second Street and on Manson Way will be similarly treated. It is expected that this material will prevent these roads getting into bad order so soon through weather conditions and the heavy traffic which passes over them.

At present during wet weather the wagons passing to and from the wharf when heavily laden experience considerable difficulty, owing to the soft state of the roads, which can hardly be prevented with ordinary road material.

The matter of the Section Two bridge was also discussed, for which plans are nearly completed. It is expected that construction work on this much-needed improvement will be commenced before very long.

The Sons of Canada were the winners of the ball game last evening, when they beat the Colts by a score of 7 to 6. Many of the regular Prince Rupert team members were playing for the Colts, which enabled them to obtain a good lead early in the game. The score was 6 to 1, when the Sons went to bat in the fifth innings. Clementson hit the pill for four bases, with one on, making the score 6 to 3. In the seventh, two more runners reached the home plate. A walk, an error, and another long hit by Clementson gave the Sons two more runs, ending the game 7 to 6.

There will be a workout on Sunday to get the team ready in shape for the Ketchikan game. Clementson will be in charge of the local team and promises to put the boys through some grueling practices in the next couple of weeks.

LIEUT.-COL. M'MORDIE RETURNS TO RUPERT

A hearty welcome was accorded to Lieut.-Col. S. P. McMordie, D. S. O., by many of his friends when he stepped off the Prince Rupert this morning. One of Prince Rupert's real old timers, Colonel McMordie came here when it was but a very little place, and when he saw his old home town again this morning, "nothing looked so good to me," he said.

Colonel McMordie is very glad to be back again among his old friends, and hopes to remain here permanently now. Mrs. McMordie did not accompany him at this time, but will spend the summer with her people in the east, coming west in the fall.

After his four years' of war conditions, Canada has looked particularly good to the Colonel since his return from overseas. He says that Prince Rupert is being talked of very much in the east, where the terminus of the G. T. P. is taking a very much greater importance in the eyes of the business people there. From what he has been able to judge he expects that there will be a considerable movement west to the country of which Prince Rupert is the centre, and that the city is just about on the threshold of its real development.

WAR VETERANS OPPOSE STRIKE

10,000 Returned Men Hold Great
Mass Meeting Last Night in
Vancouver and Pass
Resolution.

Vancouver, June 14.—A great mass meeting of the War Veterans last night was attended by 10,000 returned soldiers. A resolution was enthusiastically passed opposing the sympathetic strike as a sympathetic strike and without any other reasonable or valid excuse for the stoppage of work. The meeting lined up the Great War Veterans Association behind the citizens protective league and the Returned Citizens Law and Order League for the preservation and maintenance of constituted authority.

The greatest distrust of the labor leaders was expressed by many of the speakers.

MIDDLE CLASS FORM A UNION

Hitherto Unorganized Classes in
Great Britain Take Steps for
Collective Action for
Protection.

In the various cities in Great Britain a representative organization of the middle classes has been recently formed, according to the last British newspapers arriving here. It is called "The Middle Class Union" and has been brought into being for the purpose of organizing the middle classes to actively co-operate in protecting their interests.

The objects of this new union are set out as follows:

1. To promote mutual understanding between all sections of the middle classes, and to secure an equitable distribution of the national taxation.
2. To obtain the removal of unfair burdens on the middle classes and to enable them by collective action to protect their interests from legislative or industrial oppression.
3. To scrutinize and watch all legislation and administration and to secure suitable amendments of the law, where the interests of the middle classes are unfairly prejudiced.
4. To support by political, municipal or educational action, or by such other means as may be deemed necessary, the interests of the middle classes generally.

Great interest is being taken in this new union, as is evidenced by the representative names mentioned in many of the cities as already interesting themselves in this new movement. Membership is restricted to people born of parents of British birth, and very great success has already been obtained in securing membership.

REVOLUTION, OR LAW AND ORDER?

Commenting on the strike from its inception to its culmination, The Citizen, published by the Winnipeg League of Citizens, says:—

"Make no mistake about it; this is not a strike at all. It is a conspiracy to subvert the ordered government of this country and put in its place a revolutionary dictatorship."

"Probably not two per cent of the English-speaking strikers had the slightest idea of the road down which the plotters hoped to lead them; but they are beginning to understand. The signs are too plain to be ignored."

"The Red element, which planned to bring about anarchy in this country and on the ruins build a tyranny is made up of a little junta of avowed Bolsheviks who have succeeded by persistent scheming in taking the places of the sane leaders, with an almost solid foreign-born following."

"There's not a born Canadian in the 'Red' element from head to tail. All these trouble-makers and strike-breeders came here from other lands which probably in most cases they found it convenient to escape from."

"The conspiracy to bring about a Revolution under the guise of a general strike was not a sudden inspiration. It has long been planned. There were those among the anarchists who wanted to try it out last summer on the occasion of the trouble in the metal trades, but the time was not deemed ripe."

"Plans for the revolution were laid at the gathering of the revolutionaries in Calgary in March. It was at this meeting that Lenin, Trotsky and the German Spartacists were acclaimed as the idols and heroes of the Red movement. The trouble in the metal trade shops was merely a pretext. It had as much to do with bringing about this 'strike' as the murders at Serajevo had to do with bringing on the great war—that is to say, nothing at all."

Revolution Staged for May.

"The revolution was staged for May because the rebel leaders felt that it would be dangerous to wait longer. There were already too many returned soldiers in the country to suit them."

"No wonder Premier Norris and Mayor Gray found that they were up against a stone wall when they tried to avert the strike."

"The match had already been applied to the fuse and the explosion was due. The anarchists at the head and their Red Guards of Germans, Austrians and Russians, were ready to apply the torch to the fabric of our civilization."

"Evidence grows from day to day of the widespread nature of this treasonable plot. There are at least a hundred well-authenticated cases of warnings which were given to individuals. There was, for instance, the extraordinary case of a Winnipeg merchant being warned—by a policeman of all men—to get out of town if a general strike was called."

BODY OF SIR SAM STEELE ARRIVED IN MONTREAL

WILL CONSIDER COST OF ALL COMMODITIES

Parliamentary Enquiry Into High Cost of Living Will be Made By Newly Appointed Commission.

Ottawa, June 13.—The cost of Living Committee of the House of Commons, which for the past week has been taking evidence in connection with the rise in prices in Canada, will recommend the appointment of a commission to be known as the Dominion Trade Commission to investigate and consider the whole question of commodities and their cost in the Dominion.

WHY WINNIPEG POLICE WERE RE-ORGANIZED

The Winnipeg Free Press, criticising the police force there, says in one of its recent issues: "So far as records go, there has not been a single case of an arrest of an offender. A man was beaten on Portage Avenue in the middle of the day for wearing a British flag in his buttonhole. Nothing is done."

"A mob attacked a delivery van in Market square and cut its tires to ribbons. There were no arrests."

"Men driving trucks are hauled from their seats and beaten. There is no redress."

"Threatening groups surround places of business and prevent employees from returning to their work. No protection is afforded to either business or employees. Meanwhile, the Strike Bulletin comments on how peaceable the strike is, and plumes itself upon the complete absence of cases of violence from the police court docket. As a matter of fact, the police station ought to be filled from cellar to garret with offenders against the peace awaiting hearing this morning. The fact that there does not appear to have been a single arrest proves nothing."

SAYS O.B.U. I.W.W. AND BOLSHEVISM ARE ALL THE SAME THING

Member for New Westminster Puts Public Safety Before Tariff Reform.
