Winnipeg Strike Leaders Arrested; Charged with Seditious Conspiracy

Homes and Labor Temple Raided Under Authority of Dominion Government and Nearly Dozen Persons Taken into Custody. Incarcerated in Stony Mountain Pen- itentiary Until Hearing

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Winnipeg, June 17.—Ten men connected with the strike, and several others were arrested during the night, under the authority received from the Dominion Government. The men arrested were charged with seditious conspiracy and were rushed to Stony Mountain Penitentiary awaiting a hearing. Simultaneously with this action a raid on the Labor Temple was pulled off and literature of a Bolshevik nature was seized. It is stated that proceedings for the deportation of the guilty will follow.
The men taken into custody are among those who have been prominently involved in the Red element of the strikers. Although an official list of the men taken into custody is not available so far, it is believed that the following were among those arrested: R. E. Bray, a returned soldier and the leader of the soldier strikers' parade; R. B. Russell, secretary of the Metal Trades Council, said to be the real leader of the strike movement in Winnipeg; Rev. Wm. Evans, editor of the Western Labor News and pastor of the Labor Church and a former minister in the Methodist Church; Alderman John Queen, labor representative to the City Council; Alderman A. A. Heaps; George Armstrong, a street car motor man and member of the Trades and Labor Council; four Russian agitators, amongst whom is Moses Chartinoff, who gained an unenviable notoriety in 1918 when arrested for seditious, convicted and sent to prison and then released on a technicality.
The other three Russians are foreigners unknown outside of Winnipeg. The authorities here announce that further arrests are taking place at Calgary and other points in Western Canada today. The Winnipeg arrests were made between the hours of 2 and 4 this morning.

NEWSPAPERS IN VANCOUVER HAVE HARD TIME

Not Published Since Friday and Province Turned Out on Job Presses—Men Refuse to Return.
(Special via U. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Vancouver, June 17.—The Sun did not publish again today and the Province yesterday was turned out on small job presses and was published in a very modified form. The men so far have not obeyed the order of their international to go back to work. The telephones are working well and the mayor says that the situation generally is almost normal. Except for the street cars not running, the average citizen hardly knows that there is a general strike on.
Victoria Stands Pat.
Victoria, June 17.—The electricians here refuse to take a strike vote and the postal workers will take no action. The street car men and the retail clerks who meet tonight will probably not vote on the strike question at all either, judging by the feeling which exists. The men are protesting that they will not be governed by the strike committee.

Indications of Collapse.
Winnipeg, June 17.—The general strike here is showing indications of an early collapse. The statement made regarding collective bargaining is widening the breach among the strike leaders. Seventy-five of the old freedom have returned to their jobs. It is expected that the street railway company's conductors may decide today to resume operating the cars.
Trains Still Running.
Winnipeg, June 17.—The strikers are ignoring the proposal of the Hon. Gideon Robertson, which has been endorsed by the International Brotherhood officials, which called for the adoption of a plan of collective bargaining. The opinion prevalent is that this scheme would eliminate the Metal Trades Council. The trains are still leaving here on time, and freight is being handled promptly.

**U. S. TELEPHONES
WILL NOT STOP**
Strike of Electrical Workers Called Off by Postmaster Meeting Demands of the Workers.

Chicago, June 17.—The proposed strike of the 130,000 electrical workers has been called off upon the granting of the principle of collective bargaining and the adjustment of the wage scales by Postmaster-General Burleson. This means that the threatened tie up of all the telephone systems throughout the United States will not take place as was threatened.

KRONSTADT IN FLAMES

**Bolshevik Warships Surrender to
British Squadron—Forts Also
Hoist White Flag.**
(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
London, June 17.—The North Russian General Staff, which is directing the operations against Petrograd reports the fortress of Kronstadt in the Gulf of Kronstadt, to the northwest of Petrograd to be on fire. Under proper military conditions the fortress was said to be impregnable, but the Bolshevik forces containing it have been under bombardment from a British squadron operating in the Gulf of Finland.
Seven of the Bolshevik warships have hoisted the white flag and have signified their intention of surrendering to the British admiral. Several of the forts protecting the fortress of Kronstadt have also hoisted the white flag.

**RETURNED SOLDIERS
GO SALMON FISHING**
Nearly Three Hundred Veterans Have Taken Out Licences this Season Already.
J. T. C. Williams, inspector of fisheries for this district, returned to the city on Sunday evening from Rivers Inlet. There preparations are well ahead for the opening of the sockeye season. Some two hundred and ten returned soldiers have already taken out licences this summer, and are busily engaged with their preparations. Some have never fished before and are getting all the practice they can before the real fishing begins. Captain Reid of the Soldiers Civil Re-establishment Bureau is on the Inlet and proposes to remain there during the fishing season to look after the men's interests. They have an instructor for their practice and all are in high expectations of making good this season.
Rivers Inlet is one place where the big year does not follow after three small years. In most of the rivers every fourth year is the year of the big salmon run, but this does not apply there, for some obscure reason, and there is nothing known at present whereby the prospects for the coming season might be forecasted. Some years which are expected to be poor ones turn out big, and vice versa. It is expected that more of the returned men will be taking out licences at Rivers Inlet. There are already some forty returned men licenced on the Skeena and thirty at Bella Coola, and three on the Naas River.

In practically every case the nets and boats have been supplied by the cannerymen and no returned soldier has had any difficulty in being outfitted for the season's business.

The Nautilus was in port this morning with 5,000 lbs. halibut which was bought by the Atlin Fisheries, Ltd., for delivery at Ketchikan at 10c and 5c. The Saturna with 12,000, the Agnes B. with 13,000, the Eastern Point with 10,000 and the Norman with 10,000 lbs of halibut are also in port, but up till noon could find no buyers, as the packing houses cannot handle the fish handled, as the Fish Packers Union is out on strike. These boats are undecided what course to pursue, whether to sail all the way to Seattle where at present the price is 13c, or whether to go to Ketchikan, where the price is 9c and 5c.

MORE ACCOMMODATION AT THE SALT LAKES

**Many Improvements Made Across
Harbor for Convenience
of Visitors.**
Yesterday another party of volunteer workers went across the harbor to the Salt Lakes where considerable work was accomplished towards the end of making the conditions at the city's swimming pool more attractive. The concrete dam has been finished and the lock gates are about ready to be put into position. When this is done the water level of the lake will be raised about two and a half feet, which will cover all the large space at the foot of the lake, which has been recently lying exposed in order to have the sand placed in position where it was wanted.
The plank road to the foot of the lake will be relaid. It had to be taken up in order to construct the rock barrier. It is also proposed to build a polo course which will measure 75 by 35 feet. The main float will also be extended up the lake some further thirty feet, while the interior of the ladies' dressing rooms will be fixed up also.
The hope has been expressed that with the funds now in hand it will be possible to roof over the men's dressing room, which would be an improvement long needed. Even as it is the improvements accomplished have done a great deal to add to the attractiveness of the Salt Lake as an outing resort for the Prince Rupert people.

GERMANS GET ALLIED REPLY FROM BIG FOUR

**Must Either Sign or Refuse Peace
Terms by Saturday—Allied
Armies Ready to March
On Berlin.**
(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Paris, June 15.—The Council of Four has finished its labors on the reply to the Germans, which will go to Count von Brockdorff Rantzau on Monday. The last day permitted them for a compliance or rejection of the treaty is June 21.
If the German reply is in the negative, the allied armies will start to march into Germany the following day, and a new blockade will be effective. If, on the other hand, the Germans express their willingness to sign the document, the ceremony will probably take place on Monday in the Hall of Mirrors at Versailles.

STRIKE ORDER FOR SHOPMEN

**Another Strike Involving Forty
Thousand Workers Through-
out the Dominion: Called
for Tomorrow.**
(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Montreal, June 17.—The strike order was issued on Monday afternoon by the executive committee of division four of the Railway Shopmen for a strike commencing on Wednesday morning. Forty thousand men will be involved in this walkout, as it is intimated that all the federated trades of the railway workers will be included in the call.
The difficulty in this case has arisen between the Canadian unions and the Canada Railway Board. The latter will not come to any adjustment of the points at issue until similar points under discussion between the United States Railway Commission and the American unions are settled, as the American unions comprise ninety per cent of the total union members.

The General Strike In Prince Rupert.

Although it has affected only the waterfront practically so far, a so-called general strike exists in the city. This strike is not for any particular disability under which the strikers have labored. They have not requested—and been refused—more money. They have not either asked for—and been refused—shorter hours. Neither is the high cost of living—which the whole community suffers from—given as the reason. The organized wage earners who are on strike have no dispute—no expressed grievance with local conditions. Yet they are on strike. When asked why, those who have a reason have said they are out for the principle of collective bargaining, in sympathy with the metal workers of Winnipeg. While it is good to have a reason, still no striker can truthfully state that the strike in Prince Rupert is going to hasten a settlement in Winnipeg; neither would staying at work in Prince Rupert have prolonged the strike in Winnipeg. All it has done for the strikers here is to decrease their spending capacity by just as much as the wages they have not earned.

In the Interests of Three-fourths of the People.

Three days after the strike started in Winnipeg, The Winnipeg Citizen appeared—a publication "not issued on behalf of the workers, nor on behalf of the employers, nor in opposition to either of them as such, but simply and solely in the interests of the hundred and fifty thousand or more non-participants in the issues which served as the cause of the strike, issued only on behalf of the great mass of the public which is suffering from the strike's effects." More than three-quarters of the workers do not belong to any union, so that the "Citizen" represents the majority of the community. And right on the ground, it is able to get at the facts which form the reason for the sympathetic strike in Prince Rupert.

Principle of Collective Bargaining Never Questioned.

"The Citizen" tells the story of the beginning of the strike as follows: "In the month of April of this year trades union officials presented employers of the metal trades with proposed new schedules of hours and wages demanded by the metal trades workers for the ensuing year.

"The metal trades employers immediately took up these schedules with shop committees of their own employees—committees nominated by the workers themselves in each respective shop, thus recognizing the principle of collective bargaining on the part of their employees. In at least one case the workmen negotiated an agreement satisfactory to themselves, and in other cases the committee process was still under way when the Metal Trades Council, a combination of unions, including several not affected by the three large ironworks in the least, asserted itself and insisted on being recognized as the official negotiating body for all metal trades workers. The three employers insisted on dealing with their own men direct, declining to deal with organizations other than their own employees. Having declined to recognize an extraneous body, preferring to deal with their own men, the Trades and Labor Council leaders distorted the non-recognition of the Metal Trades Council into a non-recognition of the principle of collective bargaining. Collective bargaining being a fundamental of the trades union movement, it was easy for the extremists who were in control of Trades Council officialdom to trick trades unions into supporting them, by setting up the misrepresentation that the principle of collective bargaining was challenged and at stake. Collective bargaining never was challenged; the only dispute as to that was as to whether employers should bargain with an outside organization not composed of employees and who claimed the right to control all the employees in all shops. Premier Norris, recognizing the point of deadlock, offered to name an arbitration board selected independently by himself. The three ironmasters agreed. The workers refused to arbitrate."

PRICES FOR SALMON AT CANNERIES ARE SAME AS LAST YEAR

The prices of this year's salmon pack were decided at a meeting of the British Columbia Cannermen's Association held in Vancouver last week. The prices remain the same as last year and the following applies to district No. 2, or from Quathiasi, Cortez Island, north:

Sockeyes, cohoes and steelheads, when caught in gill nets and with cannery gear, 30c per head. The same when caught with independent gear: will be paid for at the rate of 45c per head. The fishermen will receive 4 1/2 cts. per pound for all red springs caught with spring nets and cannery gear, and 7c per pound when caught with their own gear.

The prices of humpbacks or pinks are to be 5c per fish when caught with cannery gear, and 7 1/2c a fish when caught with independent gear. 8c is the price fixed for each dog salmon or chum, when caught with cannery gear, and 12c when caught with independent gear.

SCHOOL BOARD ASKS FOR \$150,000 FOR NEW SCHOOL BUILDING

At the City Council meeting last evening, a letter from the secretary of the School Board was received, enclosing plans for the proposed new school building and making application for the sum of \$150,000 for the construction of the school and for a site.

The site proposed is on Acropolis Hill near to Summit Apartments. The application for the money was referred to the Finance Committee and the plans were submitted to the Board of Works for examination and report.

INDIANS CLAIM FOR LOSS OF FISHERIES

Say Cannot Secure Fish for Their Domestic Purposes at Shawatlans Any More.

A letter from the Indian agent was read to the City Council last evening in which it was stated that he was instructed to bring the claims of the Metlakatla Indians before the council in respect to the loss which they have suffered through not being able to get any salmon at Shawatlans owing to the lowering of the lake.

In times past the Metlakatla Indians had been in the habit of securing their domestic supply of salmon at Shawatlans, but of recent years they had not been able to get this, owing to the fish not being in the creek. This, it was claimed, was owing to the lowering of the lake level for civic purposes.

A copy of a letter from Stewart Norrie, fisheries overseer, was enclosed in which it was stated that he thought there would not be sufficient fish there in any case, owing to natural causes.

There was some discussion as to the habits of salmon, and their changes of location. The mayor stated that this matter had been up before some five years ago, and he would have all the information on file brought before the council later.

CAN'T SELL ARMY BEEF TO HOME MERCHANTS

Washington, June 14.—The War Department has been unable to find a satisfactory market in this country for the large amount of canned meats it has on hand, C. W. A. Hare, director of sales, told the House Military Affairs Committee.

Dumping the large amount of meat owned by the War Department on the market would not only mean a big loss to the army but it would be disastrous for many business interests, Hare said.

"It would undoubtedly drive the small grocers out of business," he said.

"The amount of meat held by the government is now about 141,000,000 pounds, valued at \$60,000,000.

"All our efforts to dispose of the meat in this country brought bids offering about 50 per cent. of the cost to the government, and we have been of the opinion that this is too large a sacrifice," Hare said.

Foreign demand, however, has already bid for about 70 per cent. of the total supply at prices slightly under the government cost. Roumania is willing to take nearly the entire supply and offers treasury notes in payment.

The present means of access to the plant here is very inconvenient and now that the work has started up a better means of communication is found to be necessary.
