EXPLAINS WHY STRIKERS'

WITH INCITING POLICE TO NEGLECT DUTY: PRISONERS BROUGHT BEFORE JUSTICE OF PEACE AND REMANDED FOR EIGHT DAYS IN PENITENTIARY

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Winnipeg, June 18.—Remand has been granted in the sedition sases for eight days. The ten strike leaders arrested early on Tuesday morning appeared at the Stony Mountain police court. Their labor friends were unable to reach the court room in time the hearing, owing to the bad state of the roads. The anmuncement is made that application will be made this morning

A Serious Conspiracy.

Documents seized in the raid on the Labor Temple yesterday bow a deep and serious conspiracy, says the Hon. Gideon Robertson, Minister of Labor, who is still in the city. The correspondence also shows that the receipt of Bolsheviki money was acknowledged by the strike leaders. It also indicates that a special committee was selected on June 10 to investigate and report upon the possibility of cutting off the electric power from the city.

Deportation Formalities.

Ottawa, June 18 .- It is understood that the government will proceed with the deportation formalities. Government action gainst the Winnipeg agitators will be taken under the amended Immigration Act. It is believed that steps will be taken immediately by the Federal authorities to carry out the order. The Toronto Metal Trades Council has sent a vigorous protest to Premier Borden.
