WINNIPEG STRIKE LEADERS BE DEPORTED IF CONVICTED

CARMEN DECIDE AGAINST CONTINUANCE OF SYMPATHETIC STRIKE—STREET CARS OPERATED YESTERDAY AND RAILWAY TRAFFIC BEING HANDLED WITHOUT A HITCH

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Winnipeg, June 19.—Today concludes the fifth week of the sympathetic strike and there are growing evidences of the disintegration of the movement, which has been repudiated by the international trades union organizations. The back to work movement has become more marked this morning as practically all the utilities are being operated and many workers are back to all trades affected.

The railway passenger traffic was conducted yesterday without a hitch, and the movement of freight continues to improve. This applies not only to the C. P. and the G. T. P. but also to the C.N.R., which was the railway system hardest hit by the general strike.

Deportation Will Follow.
Ottawa, June 19.—The trial of the eleven men arrested on the charge of seditious conspiracy against the government will be before a special board appointed by the Dominion Government. If convicted their deportation will follow immediately, and the families of the men shall also be sent out of the country. "If the charges under the order-in-council providing for deportation fail, criminal charges will follow," said A. J. Andrews, K. C., the chief prosecutor.

Ivies Unfrosted.
At the close of the session of the Methodist conference yesterday, the Rev. Wm. Ivens, one of the strike leaders now under arrest, was given "notice of location," which under the Methodist church law means that he cannot remain any more as a Methodist minister, and he gives up the standing and function of minister conferred upon him at ordination.

Back to Work.
The first street cars ran at eight o'clock yesterday morning and the company has intimated that the full service will be resumed very shortly. The striking members of the Brotherhood of Carmen passed a resolution declaring against the continuance of the sympathetic strike.

A.F. OF L. DECLINES TO RECOGNIZE SOVIET

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Atlantic City, June 18.—The American Federation of Labor convention has refused to endorse the recognition of the Soviet Russian Government. It also rejected the recognition by the United States Government of the existing Irish Republic and voted against the general strike proposed for July 4 in protest against the conviction of the innocent for the bomb explosions in San Francisco.

NEW BRITISH DIRIGIBLES DEMONSTRATE PREPAREDNESS FOR BLOCKADE OF GERMANY

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Copenhagen, June 19.—The new British dirigible R-34 has been reported flying over the southern Baltic. It was seen to be flying in the direction of the Hanseatic ports, thus demonstrating the preparations which the Allies have made in order to carry out the threat of enforcing a complete blockade of Germany should the Government refuse to sign the peace treaty.

The big airship, which is the largest ever launched in any country, is equipped with machine guns and bombs ready for instant action should occasion demand.

The R-33, her sister ship, is also reported to have left Great Britain last night to take up her station over Heligoland and the Kiel Canal.

RUPERT'S FISH GOES SEATTLE

**More Fishing Boats Compelled to
Take Their Catches to Com-
petitive City for
Disposal.**

Owing to the strike conditions still prevailing on the waterfront which prevent the local firms handling the catches of the fishing boats on their arrival here, few of the fishermen are coming into Prince Rupert with any hope of disposing of their fish. In some cases the sale of the catch is effected at the Prince Rupert Fish Exchange, but in practically every case the fish goes to some other port to be landed.

The arrivals yesterday and today are the Tide with 5,000 lbs. of halibut; Joe Baker, 7,000; Sattsuma, 8,000, and the Minnie V. with 110,000 lbs. These catches after being sold here will likely go to either Ketchikan or Butedale for disposal.

Two other boats, the Doreen with 14,000 lbs. and the "Pair of Jacks," with 25,000, arrived last evening, but sailed immediately for Seattle. Meantime, Prince Rupert's markets, which have been built up slowly and laboriously, are being supplied by her competitors.

BRITISH DIRIGIBLE TO CROSS ATLANTIC

RESCIND PROHIBITION LAW WITH THE SIGNING OF PEACE

SENATE MAKES DOMINION ORDER-IN-COUNCIL LAPSE CO-INCIDENT WITH THE SIGNING OF PEACE TERMS, PROHIBITING INTER-PROVINCIAL TRAFFIC IN ALCOHOLIC LIQUOR

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Ottawa, June 19.—That the Orders-in-Council prohibiting the manufacture and transportation of intoxicating liquor shall terminate with the signing of the peace terms, has been declared by the Senate.

A bill was received in the Chamber from the House of Commons which sought to enact as a statute law the various orders-in-council proclaimed under the War Measures Act, was taken up by the Senate in committee of the whole. Senator Deveber offered an amendment striking out the words "and for twelve months thereafter" from the declaration that the regulations "shall continue in force during the continuance of the war and for twelve months thereafter."

The amendment was carried by 34 votes to 24 after a number of speeches dealing chiefly with the constitutional point raised on the second reading of the bill, that by section 121 of the British North America Act, inter-provincial trade could not be interfered with by the Federal House.

Methodist Objections.
Toronto, June 19.—The Methodist conference in session here, upon receipt of the news of the action of the Senate in amending the Prohibition orders-in-council confirmation bill, the passage of which will leave only the provincial prohibition laws in effect throughout Canada, and will permit citizens in one province to import supplies of wet goods from another, passing a resolution calling for either the reform or the abolition of the Senate.

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SELF'S CAFE TAKEN OVER BY J. C. GAVIGAN

**Famous Third Avenue Restaurant
Acquired by New Owner at
Midnight Last Night.**

A business deal was put through last night whereby Self's Cafe changed owners, the business having been purchased from Ben Self by J. C. Gavigan. On the stroke of midnight, Ben Self ceased to have anything more to do with the cafe and its new owner took it over.

Self's Cafe has become one of the institutions of the city and from now on the name will be changed to the St. Regis Cafe. The same high standard of service will be maintained under the new management and nothing will be left undone to make it the best place for its patrons.

PEACE DELEGATES WILL RESIGN IF THE TREATY IS SIGNED

Berlin, June 19.—The German peace delegates have drafted a memorandum recommending that the cabinet refuse to sign the peace treaty. Count von Brockdorff-Rantzau, head of the delegation, has intimated that he will resign, as well as other members of the delegation unless this view is adopted.

Will Germany Sign?

Will the Germans sign? They will. They will grumble; they will whine; they will fill the air with mingled gutturals; they will invoke the manes of the Fourteen Points and call on Thor and all the denizens of Valhalla to shake their spears. But they will sign. Manoeuvring for delay will occur. It is necessary for the Ebert Government, none too stable, to appear highly indignant. The delegates will sigh and they will sob; they will bewail the sad fate of poor innocent Germans, surrounded by ravenous wolves; there will be an ecstasy of self-pity. But they will sign.

They will sign largely because of Papa Foch. There's a man whose glance is not liked. Germany had a taste of him not only at the Marne but in the wood of Compeigne when the armistice was prepared. It is realized that he is not an easy man to argue with. He is fond of such words as "unconditional surrender," and it is feared he is capable of again giving the order "Forward!" They will sign. There is talk of trade isolation if signatures are withheld. But threatened boycotts do not alarm. What gives concern is Foch.—New York Tribune.

The Ennui of War.

We are coming to be a jaded world. We get the afternoon news from Europe the same morning. We can believe in that phenomenon, but frequently don't believe the news. Are there no thrills left at all? If men cross the Atlantic in the air we ought to be thrilled, because it really is a rather unusual thing. But now it is done we probably shall hear that they have started to bore a tunnel under the English Channel, and for a few minutes that will engage our thoughts on the way to the picture show, where we will see the lady leap from the cliff into the tree top, followed by her pursuer, see the tree bend to the ground to which she escapes and see the tree fly back and hurl the unpopular character clear over the top of the mountain. Even then we will remark, on the way home, that it was just a camera trick. The truth seems to be—from which a trans-Atlantic air flight can turn us but for a moment—that we are getting back to where our idea of real excitement will be a three-alarm fire.—Kansas City Star.

DISSOLUTION OF THE STRIKE COMMITTEE CALLED IN VICTORIA

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Victoria, June 18.—There will be no strike in Victoria. The strike committee has announced to the members of the unions that the committee voted 8 to 8 on the question of a general strike in sympathy with Winnipeg. This deadlock called for the dissolution of the strike committee. On the vote being declared a tie, Chairman Daikers refused to vote and the committee then dissolved. This means that there will be no strike here. The street carmen held two meetings yesterday, but never mentioned strike at all. The Retail Clerks, Teamsters and Truck Drivers at their meetings yesterday both decided against taking part in a general sympathetic strike.

THINK GERMANS WILL NOT SIGN PEACE TERMS

Paris, June 18.—The majority of the members of the Peace Council believe that Germany will not sign the peace treaty, according to Marcel Suin, of the Echo de Paris, who made a canvass of a number of the leading people of the peace-making body.

Many of the strikers are already feeling the pinch of hunger, as they are not receiving any strike pay, the One Big Union having no funds. Many of the workers are unwillingly forced to remain idle when there is lots of work for them to do and they have no quarrel with the local conditions. The women and children, making the families of the strikers, are feeling it most.

The Sun and Province newspaper plants are still tied up. The World declares its news is uncensored, otherwise it would not publish. Kavanagh declares it is afraid to comment upon the Winnipeg arrests.

VICTORIA SCHOOL GIRL MAKES RUNNING RECORD

WHAT WINNIPEG THINKS OF PRINCE RUPERT CITY

"Free Press" Gives the Northern Metropolis Some Descriptive Publicity.

CITY MUST LIVE UP TO ITS GOOD REPUTATION

Said a Prince Rupert man, "Quite a fuss was made at one time over us; we were given quite free, much publicity. When we were a new terminus." With this delightful limerick, the Winnipeg Free Press published a little article regarding Prince Rupert the other day. While many of the citizens here may regard Winnipeg with mixed feelings at the present moment, still the nice things its newspaper says about us ought to be appreciated. The article reads:

"Prince Rupert, the Pacific terminus of the G. T. P., is situated on the northern coast of British Columbia, 550 miles north of Vancouver. A few years ago when it was selected as the terminus of the G. T. P., Prince Rupert occupied a prominent place on the front page of Canadian newspapers from coast to coast. A great future was predicted for the little town and some enthusiasts mentioned it as a possible rival of Vancouver for the honor of being Canada's greatest Pacific city.

"It has developed rapidly since 1914 when the line was completed but it is still a long way from the leadership of the Pacific coast cities. The town has an ideal site. It is at the mouth of the Skeena river, and its harbor is sheltered by Kaien Island, seven miles long.

That Oriental Line.
A number of steamship lines to the Orient have regular sailings from Prince Rupert and it also has steamer connections with all coast points. It has a floating drydock and a shipbuilding plant installed at a cost of three million dollars, and also a two million dollar cold storage plant. The city has several fine public buildings, including a marine hospital and quarantine hospital, drill hall and large exhibition buildings. There are six churches, four schools, five banks and several sawmills. The municipality owns the water, light and power plants and the city streets are particularly well lighted. The residential districts are beautifully laid out and contain numerous fine houses and the city has several large public parks. The population is 6,500."
