ALLIED ARMIES WILL INVADE GERMANY UNLESS PEACE IS MADE

**FOCH HAS ALL PREPARATIONS MADE TO MARCH ON BERLIN
IF GERMANS REFUSE TO SIGN TREATY AND
END STATE OF WAR AT ONCE**

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Coblentz, June 20.—The co-ordination of the British, French, Belgian and United States troops has been completed by the orders of Marshal Foch and all preparations to advance further into Germany will be completed by Saturday, when several hundred thousand of the Allied soldiers will stand ready to march toward Berlin if the enemy does not sign the terms of peace presented to them at Versailles.

Many batteries of artillery and great stores of war material are being moved across the Rhine at Cologne, Coblentz, Mayence and other bridgeheads in the occupied area.

STRIKE SAID TO BE CALLED OFF TOMORROW

**Negotiations Proceeding Between
City and Government Authori-
ties and the Strike
Committee.**

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Winnipeg, June 20.—The general strike, which has paralysed all business in Winnipeg and throughout the west for the past five weeks, will be called off tomorrow, if not today. This is according to definite statements made by a man who is in close touch with the conferences between the Government and civic officials and the strike committee.

It is understood that the strikers have agreed to accept "collective bargaining" as defined by the ironmasters, and which it is declared will be put into effect in the negotiations with the employers.

PLANS FOR HOUSES UNDER SOLDIERS' HOUSING SCHEME

A set of seven blueprints of the plans prepared in connection with the soldiers' housing scheme has been received by the mayor from the government offices in Victoria. These blueprints have been fixed on the notice board in the city hall for public inspection.

These plans are in connection with the housing scheme for soldiers under which a cash grant of up to \$2,500 will be made to any soldier desiring to take advantage of this scheme. A choice may be made of any one of the seven plans, although the prospective builder is not confined to or compelled to accept these plans, should he want to build from a different one.

CARPENTERS UNION ELECT OFFICERS

**Vote Taken on Sympathetic Strike
Results in Only Two Being
Cast in Favor.**

On Wednesday evening the Carpenters' union held a meeting for the purpose of electing officers for the ensuing year. John Vierick was elected president, W. Cameron, vice; financial secretary, L. Tattersall; recording secretary, S. Doreen; treasurer, Geo. Ambrose, conductor, Clarence E. Findlay; warden, Geo. Crate; delegates to Trades and Labor Council, Joe Gillis, John Vierick, J. H. Hilditch and Bert Greer.

Considerable discussion took place regarding the contents of a telegram which was received from A. S. Wells, secretary of the British Columbia Federation of Labor, in which it was urged that all unions affiliated with the Federation should come out on strike in protest against the arrest of the strike leaders in Winnipeg. This telegram was received by Geo. B. Casey. Out of a total membership of around 65, there were only two votes in favor of striking.

SMELTER CLOSES DOWN AT GRAND FORKS THRO' SHORTAGE OF COKE

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Grand Forks, B. C., June 20.—With the forced closure of the Granby Consolidated Mining, Smelting and Power Company's smelter to take place on Saturday from the lack of coke, on account of the strike at the Crow's Nest Pass coal mines, the company will cease, perhaps permanently, all operations at the smelter and at the Phoenix mines.

The employees at both plants will be given the opportunity of being transferred to the Anyox plant, where there is a shortage of labor.

EPSOM OUT OF BOUNDS FOR THE CANADIANS

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

London, June 20.—The order made yesterday closing all public houses in Epsom has been revoked, the magistrate being assured that the military now have the situation thoroughly in hand. The town has been placed out of bounds for the Canadian troops, after their wrecking the police office and rescuing one of their number who had been locked up. During the fracas one policeman was injured so seriously that he died. Civilians are also forbidden to go near the camp, except that they have business there. Double guards are being placed on the outskirts.

SHOPMEN WON'T STRIKE UNLESS BY AUTHORITY

**Vancouver Men Remain at Work
Until International Gives
Word—More Men Go
Back to Jobs.**

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Vancouver, June 19.—The railway shopmen here have decided to remain at work until called out by their internationals. This decision was reached before the notice of the cancellation of the strike as ordered was received from Montreal. Ninety per cent of the shop men voted to remain at work.

Some of the freight handlers and clerks returned to their duties with the C. P. R. yesterday. Those who did not were automatically deprived of their positions by the ultimatum issued by the company that their jobs would be filled forthwith.

The advertisement which caused such displeasure among the "Province" printers has been issued on leaflets and distributed broadcast. It is relative to the strike conditions and accused the strike leaders of being Bolshevik. The Province resumed publication on Wednesday and the Sun will re-appear on Thursday, the printers having gone back to work by the orders from the International Typographical Union.

It is stated that 250 North West Mounted Police from Siberia are on board the Montegale and these will remain in Victoria. This will bring the number of mounted policemen under the jurisdiction of the Vancouver district up to 400.

PROTEST AGAINST WINNIPEG ARRESTS

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Bellingham, June 19.—The Washington State Federation of Labor has passed a resolution demanding that the strike leaders arrested at Winnipeg at the instance of the Federal authorities be released. The Vancouver strike committee is to request the Trades Congress of Canada for a nation-wide strike as a protest against the Winnipeg arrests.

RESIGNATION OF THE ITALIAN WAR MINISTRY

**Premier's Motion Rejected in the
Chamber—King Reserves
Decision as to His
Acceptance.**

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Rome, June 20.—The Italian Government has resigned, following an adverse vote in the Chamber of Deputies. Premier Orlando, in announcing his resignation and that of the cabinet, said that King Victor Emanuel has reserved his decision as to his acceptance of the resignations.

The chamber by a vote of 259 to 78 rejected the Premier's motion in favor of discussing the question of confidence in relation to the foreign policy of the Government on a certain occasion.

STRIKE LEADERS OUT ON BAIL

**Agree to Have Nothing to do With
Further Strike Matters Until
Case is Disposed of**

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Winnipeg, June 20.—The strike leaders who were arrested two days ago at their homes in Winnipeg have been released from custody on bail. Proceedings will be taken against them in the police court and if found guilty of the charges laid against them of sedition and conspiracy, their cases will be considered by a special immigration board and deportation will follow if the charges warrant it.

The Canadian and English strike leaders upon the putting up of their bail, amounting to two thousand dollars, have undertaken to have nothing to do with strike affairs until the present trouble is settled.

WRECK OF C. P. R. S.S. PRINCESS SOPHIA BE- LONGS TO U.S. GOVT.

(Special by G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Victoria, June 20.—The wreck of the Princess Sophia is owned by the United States Government, to whom the vessel was turned over when the C. P. R. applied for the limitation of liability in the matter of claims. Because of this fact the company will be unable to undertake the work of salvage.

NATIONAL INDUSTRIAL COUNCIL TO BE SET UP IN GREAT BRITAIN WILL PREVENT LABOR TROUBLES

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

London, June 20.—The Joint Committee of the National Industrial Conference having agreed with the minister of labor upon the draft of the outlines of the bills to be presented to Parliament for the establishment of minimum wages and the maximum 48-hour week will now proceed to set up a National Industrial Council.

The full council will consist of four hundred members, representing the employers' organizations and the Trade Unions respectively. Each side will determine its own method of election and allocation of representatives.

The new council will deal with all industrial and trade matters affecting the workers and will have power to decide upon all or any disputes arising between employers and employees, making a strike, with its stoppage of work and consequent loss to everyone, a thing of the past.

DOUKHOBOURS CAST THEIR CLOUTS AND HOLD NUDE PARADE

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Grand Forks, June 20.—A nude parading of the Doukhobors who have a large colony near Grand Forks is reported. Passengers on the Lynch Creek branch of the Kettle Valley Railway have been forced to witness the sights, several miles north of Grand Forks.

MONTEAGLE BACK WITH THE SIBERIAN FORCES

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Victoria, June 20.—The Montegale has docked here with 747 members of the Canadian Siberian force under the command of Major General Elmsly. Eighty-six officers and a special force left for Vancouver.

Eight Russian stowaways were discovered on board, who had managed to secure possession of Canadian uniforms.

JOE BOYLE AGENT FOR CANADA IN ROUMANIA

**Well Known Yukon Man Leaves
London to Represent Canadian
Interests in Balkan State.**

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

London, June 20.—Colonel Jos. Boyle, the well known mining man from the Yukon who organized the machine gun detachment from that territory at the outbreak of war, and who is well known to all Canadians for the leading part he played in Roumanian affairs during the past two years, has left London for Bucharest as the Canadian agent in Roumania.

Colonel Boyle will supervise the distribution of Canadian exports to that country, and protect Canadian interests generally under the terms of our agreement with that country. Canada, it will be remembered, is supplying \$25,000,000 worth of manufactured articles, raw materials and food stuffs to Roumania.

GERMANS WILL SIGN TREATY

Cabinet to Resign and New Ministry Will Accept Terms as Offered to Them.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Weimar, June 20.—The German cabinet has decided to resign to make room for a new ministry, which will sign the peace treaty, or place itself officially on record as accepting the treaty as presented, so that another session of the National Assembly can formally ratify it.

Will Sign All Right. London, June 20.—A report received here by the Exchange Telegraph Co. states that the German Government has decided to accept the peace terms offered by the Allies, stating that while the terms are not very agreeable, some noticeable concessions have been granted by the Allies.

SMELTER CHARGES REDUCED AT TRAIL

A Bolshevik University.

The "Radical Idealists" who are still misgoverning a part of Russia are full of zeal for educational reform. At Voronezh the local Soviet has created a "Street University," each of the principal thoroughfares being placarded with portraits and brief items of information, and thus constituting a Faculty of Law, History, Economics, etc. "In this way," observes the Ivestia, the organ of the Bolshevik misrule, "any citizen, instead of spending years at a bourgeois university, can pick up a general knowledge of the principal subjects as he walks along." Dr. Lemuel Gulliver ought to bring an action against the Voronezh Municipality for plagiarism. It is not the first time he has been plagiarized. There was a French educational reformer who caught up Swift's ironical idea, and wished to build a Latin town in which every wall would give a lesson in Ovid's language. He also proposed to bore a hole to the centre of the earth—and Voltaire, who overwhelmed him with ridicule (Diatribes du docteur Akakia) suggested his real reason was that he wanted a hole deep enough to hide his blushing imbecility.—London Morning Post

INSECURITY AND DISORDERS RIFE IN TURKEY

Young Turks Secretly Reorganizing to Retain Progress—In Many Places Allied Victory Unknown.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

London, June 20.—Admiral Webb at Constantinople reports that insecurity and disorder in the interior of Turkey are rife. The situation at Smyrna where Turks and Greeks are ready to spring at each other's throats at the slightest provocation, is typical of a similar state of affairs throughout the whole Turkish Empire.

Bands of brigands, even within a few miles of Constantinople, are dominating the country and committing the most atrocious murders, robbing peaceable travellers, cutting off their ears and committing similar outrages. Feeling is also running high between the Turks and Armenians, and serious trouble is feared in the near future.

The Committee of Union and Progress, which has been given time to recover itself, is secretly reorganizing with the utmost energy and its propaganda will undoubtedly be assisted by the news of the allied withdrawal from south Russia and the outbreaks in Egypt and India.

Many parts of the interior are still completely ignorant of the Entente victories, as the only argument which would appeal to them, namely, the display of military force, is impossible. It is feared that the situation now, which is extremely precarious, will become acute, despite the co-operation of the Turkish government to maintain order, and it will become even more acute when the decisions at the peace conference are known among the people. The adverse terms for Turkey may result in a massacre on a large scale of those Christian elements both in town and country, who are relying on the protection of the Allies.

ROYAL HUNT CLUB CUP WON BY "IRISH ELEGANCE"

London, June 19.—The Royal Hunt Club Cup at Ascot was won by "Irish Elegance" at 7 to 1; Orion at 100 to 1 was second, and Donsallow, 20 to 1, was third.

POSTPONED FUNERAL OF SIR SAM STEELE

Winnipeg, June 19.—The body of General Sir Sam Steele will not be interred until the strike is over, owing to the mayor's ultimatum against processions.

FISH DESERT HAUNTS IN GREAT SLAVE LAKE

R. N. W. Mounted Police Officer
Returns After Long Patrol
Through Territories.

Edmonton, June 19.—Captain Lucas, who just returned from a long patrol north, reports that there were no caribou to be killed in the Fort Resolution district this winter, contrary to the usual custom, the mild winter not forcing the animals so far south as usual, and that as a result of that and the fact that no fish were to be caught at or within eighty miles of Fort Resolution on Great Slave Lake, would indicate much hardship among the Indians. In fact he found several in a starving condition, who were taken to the fort and cared for.

Absence of the fish in the above locality cannot be explained, but remains a fact, because with fifteen to fifty nets set through the ice, not over a dozen fish could be netted. Captain Lucas ran short of food for themselves and dogs, had to kill off their dogs and proceed on foot with snow shoes, and suffered greatly from lack of food, until he reached trading posts nearer to Lake Athabasca. Neither would his Indian guides stay with him farther than Fort Resolution, as sickness north of there among the Indians was reported and his Indians would not connect with them as a result.
