**PROOF THAT BOLSHEVIKI WERE BEHIND THE ONE BIG UNION AT WINNIPEG LABOR TEMPLE**

DOCUMENTS OF CONSIDERABLE IMPORTANCE ARE FOUND WHEN LABOR TEMPLE RAIDED ON TUESDAY AT WINNIPEG—BOLSHEVIKI LITERATURE RECEIVED FOR FURTHERANCE OF ONE BIG UNION

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)  
Winnipeg, June 21.—Plans for a silent parade today of returned soldiers as a protest against the continuance of the sympathetic strike has led to the re-publication of Mayor Gray's proclamation forbidding street parades during the continuance of the strike.  
Documents indicating that the Bolsheviki desired and partly acquired control of the Trades and Labor Council at Winnipeg and that the sympathetic strike was brought about by men whose ultimate object was the establishment of Bolshevism and soviet rule in Canada, were seized at the Labor Temple when raided on Tuesday morning.

**NEW MINISTER FOR METHODIST CHURCH**

Rev. J. M. Nuttall, Transferred Here From Anyox, Commences His Ministry in Prince Rupert.

Tomorrow the Rev. J. H. Nuttall will conduct the services at the Methodist Church for the first time as pastor. Transferred from Anyox to Prince Rupert, Mr. Nuttall finds a much wider field of labor here and will doubtless find it capable of more intensive cultivation.

**RAILWAY STRIKE IN GERMANY**

Weimar, Where New German National Assembly is in Session is Entirely Out Off.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)  
Weimar, June 21.—Weimar tonight is completely cut off from railway communication with all other sections of Germany, because of the suddenly called strike of the railway employees. Aeroplanes and telegraph form the only means of communication with the outside world.

**BRITISH SUBMARINE GETS RUSSIAN CRUISER**

**WAR PENSIONS TO BE TAX FREE**

Finance Bills Pass First Reading in Commons—Children's Age Extended to 18 for Exemption.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)  
Ottawa, July 20.—The committee stage on resolutions has been completed, and the finance bills based thereon were given the first reading. In the course of the discussion, Sir Thomas White promised to meet the two points which were raised. One was that the income tax resolution be so amended as to provide that pensions awarded to soldiers or widows be free from tax.

Another was that there should be an increase in the age for which exemption of two hundred dollars is allowed. In the resolution the age is stated at sixteen. The age limit, it was urged should be eighteen, so that those men with children not over eighteen years of age would have \$200 added to exemption of income tax. The finance minister agreed to both these proposals.

**RUSSIAN STOWAWAYS BELIEVED TO BE AGENTS SPREADING PROPAGANDA**

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)  
Victoria, June 21.—Disguised as Canadian soldiers, the eight Russian stowaways who were discovered on board the Montague, which brought members of the Canadian Siberian Expeditionary Force back from Vladivostok, are believed to be Bolsheviki emissaries, who have been sent out by Lenine and Trotsky for the purpose of spreading Bolsheviki propaganda.

**TURKS TURN GREEK**

(Special by G. T. P. Telegraphs.)  
Salonica, June 20.—Large numbers of Mohammedans living in Greek Macedonia have expressed their intention of withdrawing their allegiance to the Turks and swearing fealty to Greece.

**FRENCH LINE OF STEAMERS COMING TO B.C.**

Enquiries Being Made Through Agent-General as to What Exports Might Be Expected.

With the view of establishing a regular line of steamships trading between Calais and ports on the Pacific coast, a French firm has written to the agent-general in London asking information as to what exporters would probably have traffic for France which this new line could handle. The French firm is that of Henri Moreau, of 33 Rue Etienne-Marcel, Paris, and they wrote under date of May 13 as follows:  
The Agent-General for British Columbia, London.

Dear Sir,  
We are intending to operate this year a line from British Columbia ports to France, via Vancouver, Seattle, Tacoma to Calais port.

Consequently we apply to your good offices in order to know what British Columbia exporters will be able to take the opportunity of our new service. Possibly you will be kind enough to let us have all possible information regarding our request.

**FINDING MEN FIT TO SIGN PEACE TREATY**

Germany Busy Reconstructing the Ministry—Bernstorff Said Named as Signatory At Versailles.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)  
Berlin, June 21.—The cabinet has resigned. President Ebert will retain office temporarily. The portfolio of Matthias Erzeberger in the new cabinet will be that of minister of reconstruction and fulfillment of the treaty.

**Finding Men Capable.**  
Paris, June 21.—Reports received here over the military wire from Weimar, which is the seat of the German National Assembly indicate that at 9 o'clock last night Germany was still in the throes of the reconstruction of the administration in an endeavor to get a government selected composed of men capable of signing the peace treaty.

**Bernstorff Named.**  
Paris, June 21.—An unconfirmed report received from the Army Intelligence Bureau at Coblenz says that Count von Bernstorff, the former German ambassador to the United States, has been named minister of foreign affairs and will come to Versailles to sign the peace treaty.

**Not Yet.**  
London, June 21.—Friday's Exchange Telegraph report that the Germans had already signed the peace treaty was premature.

**Swiss Preparations.**  
Geneva, June 21.—Special military arrangements have been made for eventualities in case that the Germans refuse to sign the peace treaty. Picked forces have been remobilized at Basle and Constance to protect the Rhine and the northern frontier.

**AGRICULTURALISTS MAKING FOR SMITHERS**

Conference to be Held in Bulkley Valley Town re Centralizing Farmers' Organizations in B. C.

A party of the leading agriculturists in the province arrived in town this morning from the south on their way to Smithers, where the agricultural conference will be held. Among the party are the Hon. E. D. Barrow, minister of agriculture; R. R. Walker, of the Land Settlement Board; Mr. Waby president of the B. C. Poultrymen's Association, and C. Whitney Griffiths, secretary for the Farmers' Institutes.  
Several important matters are coming up for discussion, one of which will be the consolidation of all the different agricultural associations throughout the province, which although doing effective work, will the more so with headquarters centralized.  
Many of the visitors have never been in the Bulkley Valley before and they will see it for themselves at first hand on this occasion.

**MUCH OPIUM BEING IMPORTED INTO B.C.**

Montreal, June 21.—That thirty thousand dollars' worth of opium has been shipped into British Columbia since May 20 has been learned by J. Killoran, registrar of enemy aliens, when Lee Kee, a Chinese merchant of Lagache-terrie Street, was arrested on a charge of trafficking in drugs.

**DIVORCE COURTS ARE LIKELY TO BE ESTABLISHED IN CANADA**

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)  
Ottawa, June 21.—There is a strong probability that Divorce Courts will be established in Canada, thus doing away with the archaic methods of obtaining relief at present existing. This is emphasized in the House of Commons when with the approval of Sir Robert Borden, W. A. Nickle's bill relating to divorce was given its second reading yesterday.

After this was accomplished the House went into committee on the resolution providing for such sums of money, not exceeding \$5,000,000 to enable the Vancouver Harbor Commissioners to carry out construction work and provide terminal facilities as are demanded as necessary for the Vancouver harbor. This resolution was carried, and the bill introduced.

F. S. Cahill enquired as to the negotiations for the purchase of the Grand Trunk Railway system, but the Prime Minister replied that he had no announcement to make regarding this matter at present.

A bill to amend the Fisheries Act, to increase the license fees of the British Columbia Canneries from \$50 to \$500 was reported out of committee and given its third reading.

**FREE RIDES IN VANCOUVER BY JITNEY RAISE**

Fares Raised to 15c—Two Hundred Volunteer Cars Carrying Workers Free is Result.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)  
Vancouver, June 21.—The jitney men, who have been reaping a rich harvest throughout the Vancouver district on a ten cent fare have begun demanding fifteen cents. As a result the citizens have organized a volunteer opposition and have got on the streets of the city some two hundred cars carrying the workers to and from their homes free. The city remains quiet, although in some quarters the fear is expressed that the arrest of W. A. Pritchard, of Vancouver, at Calgary may stiffen the attitude of local strikers.

**NO MORE BEER**

Vancouver, June 21.—The brewery workers have been called out again for the second time by the strike committee. At first the successful competition of the New Westminster breweries prompted the strike committee to order the brewery workers in Vancouver back to work a week ago, but now that the New Westminster breweries are idle, the strike committee will close off the near beer supply here.

**WESTMINSTER SITUATION**

New Westminster, June 21.—The sawmills here are only partly affected by the strike of the engineers. Non-union labor is being generally enlisted to fill the gaps. The cold storage plants and many others remain exempted from the strike order. It is expected that the street car men will return to work after tonight's discussion. This strike was in protest against the arrest of the strike leaders in Winnipeg. Now that they are out the strikers will return. A good jitney service has been established between New Westminster and Vancouver.

LOCAL NEWS ITEMS Among the arrivals in the city yesterday from the Queen Charlotte Islands were Mr. and Mrs. C. Hammock and E. Wade of Buckley Bay. For the past week the pupils of the Entrance Class have had examinations, as the end of the term has now come for them. Today they are going on a picnic across the bay with Principal A. M. McDonald as the biggest enthusiast. The girls and boys are looking forward to having a very pleasant time in one of the numerous beautiful spots on the other side of the water. Late in the afternoon the C. P. R. steamer Princess Alice arrived yesterday from the north with a large number of tourists who had made the round trip from Vancouver. On the way north the Alice did not call in here as at first expected. There was very little freight on board for this point and the boat is handled by the officers and engineers of other ships now tied up on account of the strike. The steamer sailed for the south at six again, carrying a few passengers and a small quantity of mail from this port. Among those arriving from the south by the Prince Rupert this morning was W. E. McTaggart, editor and manager of The Farmer's Magazine, a monthly periodical which is printed in Vancouver in the interests of the British Columbia farmers. "Ed," as he is more familiarly known to his friends, went overseas and got as far as England in the Y. M. C. A. service, but returned early this spring and has resumed his journalistic work. Mr. McTaggart is also the secretary for the Farmers' Institute and it is in this particular service that he is accompanying the party which arrived today and left on the train for the convention to be held at Smithers. One of the downtown attractions yesterday was the live seal on display in George Frazzell's store window. It was brought in from the mouth of the Skeena by Bobby Frazzell and not seem to mind being in the public gaze. A tank of water was supplied to which the creature could amble when things became too uninteresting on the street. No difficulty was experienced in catching the animal as it was very easily tamed. In fact all that had to be done was to feed it a little and then it was thrown overboard for the night. In the morning it was on the job again when breakfast time came and so the seal was taken onto the launch to satisfy the gaze of curious city folk.

TORPEDO BOAT IS FITTED OUT FOR TRAWLING Old United States War Vessel is Purchased by Seattle Firm; Will Operate Off the U. S. Coast. A new style of hull will be seen shortly in the fishing fleet of the Puget Sound, when the old United States torpedo boat Fox makes her first trip to the banks, fully equipped for other trawling. This is not a government venture, but an experiment by a private firm. They purchased the ship from the government, she being obsolete for war purposes. The old engines and boilers have been removed and new twin engines of 250 h. p. installed. It is expected that the new trawler will have a speed of around 20 knots, which will make her the fastest thing in fishing boats on the coast. This speed is expected to be of great advantage in trawling operations, enabling the vessel to make many more trips than a boat of ordinary design, and also effecting a material saving in ice. She will carry a dozen men, including two engineers and the fishermen. The trawling operations will be carried on along the coasts of Washington and Oregon and arrangements have been made to ship the catches of edible fish to eastern markets, where they will compete with the Atlantic fish. As much of the fish obtained by trawling is of an inedible variety, the company is considering putting in a fertilizer plant to handle this portion of the catch. The actual trawling operations will be under the charge of an expert trawlerman from Grimsby, England.

SONGS AND DANCING AT THE WESTHOLME Vaudeville and Pictures Draw Full Houses at Opera House—Show To Be Repeated Tonight. There was a great crowd at the Westholme Theatre last evening to take in the vaudeville and picture combination. Ellis and McCullough put on a farcical comedy entitled "Get the Money" which was well received. There were some good dancing and fire songs in this piece which made a great hit with the audience, who applauded the show to the fullest. The comedy was followed by a splendid picture entitled "Come On In," a story of German spies in the States at the outbreak of the war. There were some interesting photographs which were particularly good, and well worth seeing. Another episode of "The Lightning Hunter" completed this fine program. The show will start at 8 o'clock this evening owing to its length.

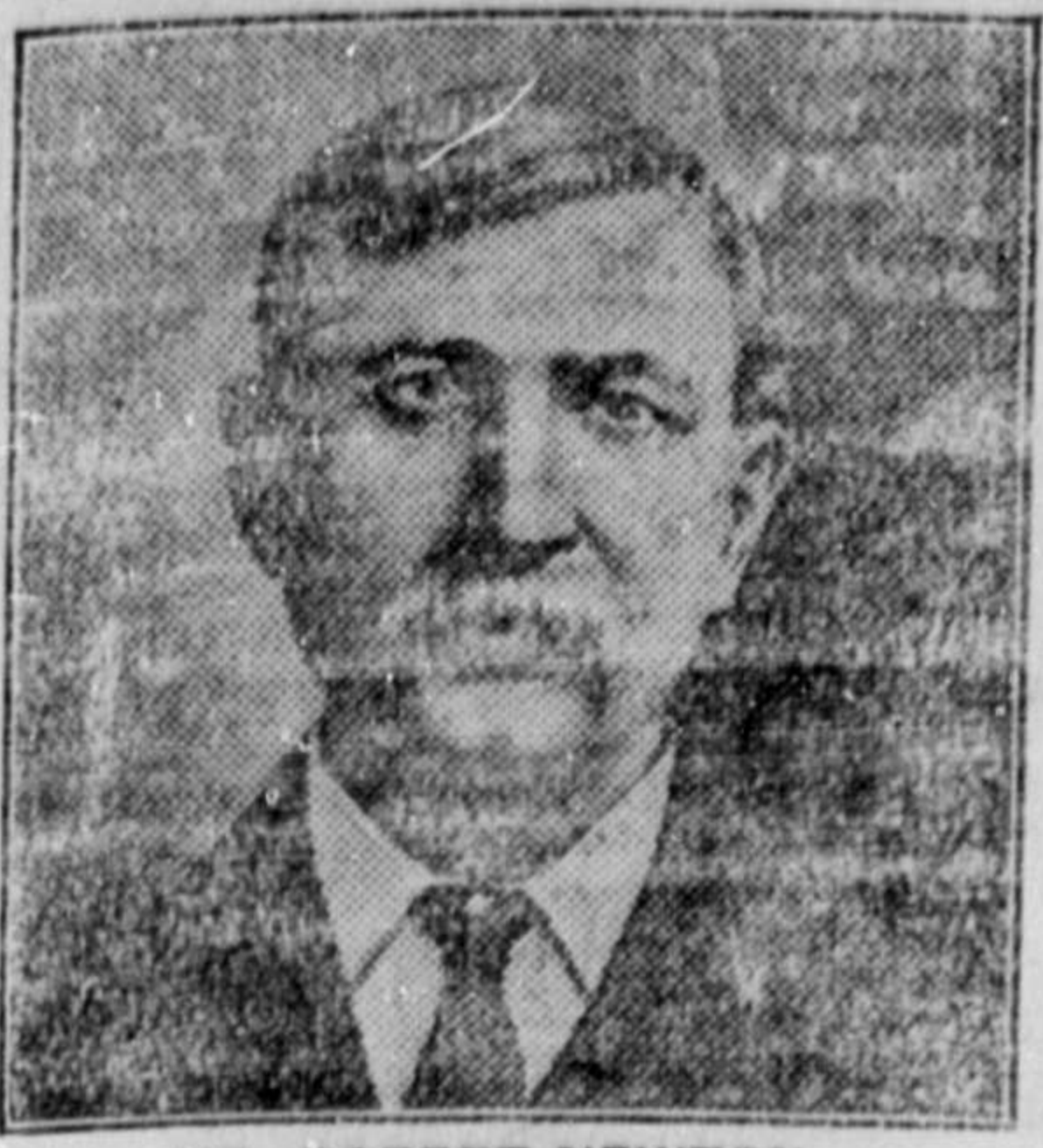

FERTILIZER PLANT ON TUCK'S INLET TO BE DOUBLED IN CAPACITY

Such success has attended the Fish Oil and Fertilizer plant on Tuck's Inlet during the year or so since it has been established that its plant a few miles up the harbor is to be doubled in size.

This plant uses up the waste and scrap fish which since the first cannery started on this coast has been thrown away and annually has amounted to thousands of tons. This fish waste is collected from the various canneries in the district and from the fish packing houses on the waterfront and at the plant a few miles up the harbor undergoes several processes.

This building up of a trade out of waste material and after a very short period having to double the capacity of the plant, is significant of what can be done by intensive methods.
