MOUNTED POLICE SUPPRESS STRIKERS' NEWSPAPER IN WINNIPEG FOR SEDITION

ACTING EDITOR ARRESTED—ANOTHER ALIEN DIES AS RESULT OF WOUNDS RECEIVED DURING RIOTS ON SATURDAY—STRIKE BREAKING UP

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Winnipeg, June 24.—The Royal North West Mounted Police yesterday suppressed the Western Labor News, published by the strike committee and organized by them. The acting editor, J. S. Woodsworth, has been placed under arrest and charged with sedition. This action has been taken because of certain alleged inflammatory articles which appeared in the strikers' paper, especially after the riots on Saturday.

One other alien has succumbed to wounds received during the rioting on Saturday, when the strikers and police exchanged shots on the street. His name is Steve Scherbanowicz and he is the second victim. He was shot in both legs, gangrene setting in. Negotiations for getting the Metal Trades dispute settled were resumed yesterday, and there is every indication that a satisfactory basis of settlement will be speedily arrived at now, thus permitting work to be resumed generally. The gradual braking up of the general sympathetic strike is indicated by the increasing number of men in all lines of trade and business now returning to work.

COURT MARTIAL FOR ADMIRAL

Sinking Fleet in Scapa Flow Was Break in Armistice Terms; Admiral von Reuter Responsible.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

London, June 24.—Admiral von Reuter, who was in command of the German fleet of warships when they were scuttled while at anchor in Scapa Flow on Monday, will be court martialled for having broken the terms of the armistice.

It is stated here freely that Admiral von Reuter could not have been unaware of the arrangements being made for this wholesale destruction of the German ships, and he must be held responsible for the actions of his officers and crews, when they opened the sea-cocks of the ships and permitted them to sink.

CALLS UPON PRESENT GOVERNMENT TO RESIGN

CYCLONE SWEEP MANY INTO LAKE

Debris in Wake of Fergus Falls Cyclone Being Searched for Dead—Will Drain Nearby Lake.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

St. Paul, June 24.—As the result of the cyclone which destroyed a large part of the city of Fergus Falls on Sunday afternoon over sixty bodies had been recovered up till last night. The work of searching the debris is proceeding, although even with every assistance possible it is slow work.

Lake Alice, one of the nearby summer resorts, is to be drained, as it is feared that many other people have been swept into the water and drowned.

The force of the wind was so extreme that a Great Northern train was blown from the tracks some twenty-one miles from Fergus Falls, only the engine and one car remaining on the rails. A report brought here yesterday by railroad men returning from the vicinity of Fergus Falls states that some 200 people were killed. The Grand Hotel collapsed, burying seventy-five persons in the ruins. Other three city blocks were demolished at the same time.

Churches Blown Down.

Fergus Falls, June 24.—As the result of the cyclone every church in the town has been blown down, the post office and library buildings are badly damaged; the Great Northern station and freight house is completely demolished; the Northwestern College and the Cereal Milling Company's elevator are completely blown away; the Fergus Brewery is a mass of ruins, and the Fergus Sash and Door Factory has suffered the same fate.

More than 150 persons seriously injured have been cared for at the state insane hospital. Two men were in the Northern Pacific Railway station and clung to the office safe, while the cyclone swept the station away from over their heads.

PEACE TREATY WILL BE SIGNED BEFORE FRIDAY

Announcement Made by French Premier—Italian Delegates Will Sign—Germans Still Protest.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Paris, June 24.—The signing of the peace treaty is not likely to take place before Thursday, and possibly it may be Friday before this historic event is accomplished, according to an announcement made by Premier Clemenceau.

The Italian delegates at present in Paris have been authorized to sign the treaty on behalf of the Italian Government. This announcement has removed the one question which it was feared might have delayed signing.

The note received from the German Government signifying its intention to subscribing to the peace treaty unconditionally, as voted by the National Assembly at Weimar is couched in such language that it maintains the German position that the peace conditions are practically those of a "peace of violence."

SOLDIERS' HOUSING SCHEME PRACTICALLY READY TO COMMENCE

Money Now Available and City Proposes to Go Ahead With Building Operations.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

In connection with the housing scheme for soldiers, it was intimated by the mayor last evening at the Council meeting that everything was practically ready to go ahead with the scheme in Prince Rupert. Among those entitled to the houses under this arrangement, the mayor placed widows first, then disabled soldiers, and third, married men who had enlisted from this city. He also intimated that more applications for houses had been received than there was money for, and many of these had come from soldiers who had enlisted at other points.

The money for the starting operations will be available at any time now. There are two courses open to the city. One is to have the houses built by the municipality with the money provided for building, and the other is to make the loan direct to the soldier and allow him to construct his own house.

After a little discussion the mayor was requested to appoint a committee to take the matter up as regards the policy to be pursued. This committee consists of the chairmen of each committee.

The seven plans prepared by the government department in connection with this scheme were pinned on the walls of the council chamber last evening for inspection, and of the seven houses there is only one which could be built on one 25-foot lot.

TORONTO STREET CAR MEN ON STRIKE

Toronto, June 23.—The street car employees at a mass meeting held here voted almost unanimously in favor of striking at once in order to secure 55c. per hour and a straight eight-hour day. There are no trolley cars on the down town streets today, although the civic owned lines in the outlying districts and the radial lines between these places and the city are operating as usual.

VANCOUVER REMAINS OUT ON STRIKE STILL

Victoria, June 23.—At a meeting of the Electricians' Union here it was decided to take no part in the walkout arranged by the B. C. Metal Trades. At a mass meeting in Vancouver the strikers passed a resolution to remain out on strike until the Winnipeg strike is settled.

VICTORIA METAL TRADES DOWNED TOOLS TODAY IN SYMPATHY WITH WINNIPEG

SHIPBUILDING OPERATIONS ALL TIED UP AT PROVINCIAL CAPITAL—FIVE THOUSAND MEN IDLE—STRIKE AT NEW WESTMINSTER FINISHED ON MONDAY

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Victoria, June 24.—The Metal Trades Council has called a strike here. Five thousand members of the unions affiliated with that organization downed tools at 10 o'clock this morning in sympathy with the Winnipeg strikers. The largest organizations in the city are affected and the one employing the greatest number of the men now on strike is the Foundation Company, which has 4,200 men of all crafts on its pay roll. The other local concerns affected include the Cholberg Ship Co., Harnor Maine Co., Yarrows, Victoria Machinery Depot and Hutchinson Brothers.

The Vancouver Strike.

Vancouver, June 24.—The likelihood that the local strike here would come to an end shortly became an improbability when it was intimated to the mayor by the business agent of the civic employees that the strike committee would not call off the strike so long as a single employer refused to reinstate all the strikers without prejudice to their former standing.

New Westminster Working. New Westminster, June 24.—The general strike at New Westminster came to an end on Monday afternoon.

RETURN OF SIR LOMER GOUIN IN QUEBEC HOUSE

Slightly Reduced Majority When All Returns to Hand—Forty Seats by Acclamation for Government.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Quebec, June 24.—The return of Sir Lomer Gouin to power in the Quebec House is assured although he will have a slightly smaller majority than in the last House. It is expected that when all the returns are to hand and judging from the seats so far heard from there will be 68 Liberals in the new house, 9 Conservatives and 2 Labor. In the previous house there were 75 Liberals and 5 Conservatives.

One of the striking things about this election was the large number of members elected by acclamation. All the cabinet with the exception of one minister without portfolio were returned unopposed along with forty other Liberal members. One Conservative member was also returned by acclamation. This was Brigadier-General C. A. Smart, in Westmount.

The ministers elected by acclamation are Sir Lomer Gouin, Hon. Mr. Mercier, Hon. Walter Mitchell, Hon. J. A. Tessier, Hon. A. Galipeult, Hon. L. A. Teschereau, and Hon. J. A. Caron.

40,000 MEN ARE BEING DEMOBILIZED WEEKLY

London, June 23.—The War Office announces that between the date of the armistice and June 16 108,641 officers and 2,779,707 men have been demobilized from the British army. Men are now streaming away into civil life at the rate of 40,000 weekly.

According to the posters which are scattered around the city regarding the sports on the Dominion Day celebration on July 1, the attractions this year are to surpass by far those of the few years preceding.
