HOUSE OF COMMONS DISAGREES WITH SENATE RE PROHIBITION; REFUSE TO ADOPT AMENDMENT

BY 105 VOTES TO 35 AMENDMENT MADE BY SENATE LIFTING DOMINION PROHIBITION WHEN PEACE SIGNED, IS TURNED DOWN—COMMONS RETURN TO RED CHAMBER IN ORIGINAL FORM

Ottawa, June 27.—The House of Commons has disagreed with the Senate's amendment to the prohibition bill by a vote of 105 to 35. On a motion by Premier Borden, the prohibition bill was brought in some weeks ago in the House of Commons to confirm the Order-in-Council prohibiting the importation, manufacture and inter-provincial trade in alcoholic liquors.

This Order-in-Council, which was brought in under the War Measures Act, stipulated that it should remain in force for the period of twelve months after the conclusion of the war. Doubt having arisen as to whether this Order-in-Council could remain in force after the expiration of the War Measures Act itself (which terminates upon the proclamation of peace) the government brought in this bill which validates the Order-in-Council for the post war period of twelve months.

The bill passed the House of Commons in that form and went to the Senate, where it was so amended that it would make Federal prohibition terminable at the conclusion of the war.

The Commons have returned the bill to the Senate for ratification in its original form.

STRIKE STILL AT VANCOUVER

While Hundreds of Men Have Returned to Work Without Formality, Many Stay Out.

VICTORIA METAL TRADES STRIKE AT END TODAY

Vancouver, June 27.—While hundreds of men returned to work yesterday in Vancouver without waiting for the formal announcement of the strike committee, it is by no means certain that the general strike will end Friday noon.

The strike leaders have announced that at a meeting attended by over a thousand strikers on Thursday, the vote taken was solidly against terminating the strike until all the men arrested in Winnipeg had been taken from the penitentiary.

The strike committee has called for a mass meeting of the strikers today, Friday.

Metal Trades Back.

Victoria, June 27.—The strike called on Monday morning last by the Metal Trades Council ends on Friday morning at 8 o'clock. The Longshoremen's and Seamen's strikes are not affected by the decision of the Metal Trades.

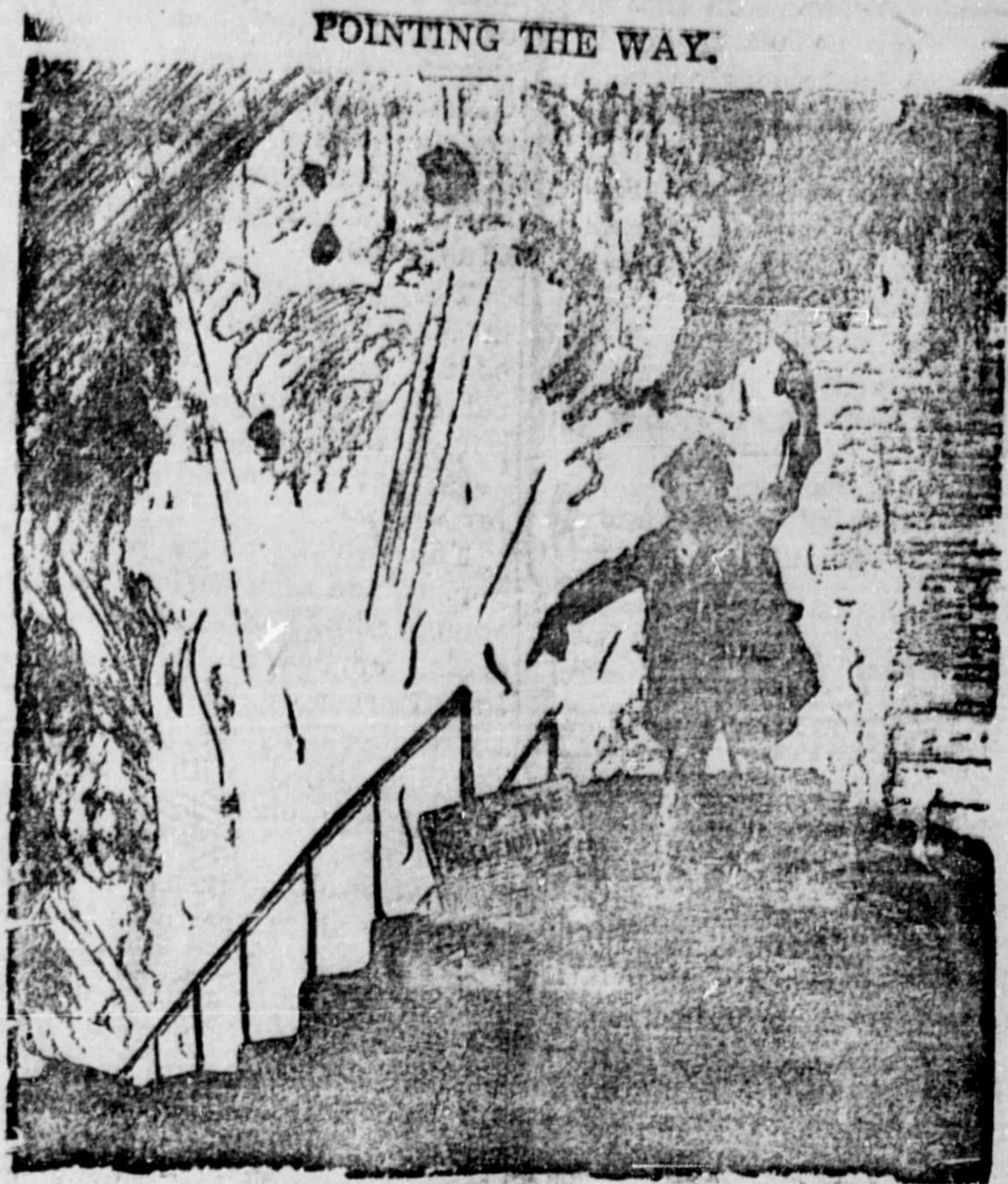

SPARTACANS ATTEMPT SOVIET SYSTEM IN HAMBURG; CITIZENS KILLED AND TOWN PLUNDERED

(Special to The News via G.T.P. Telegraphs.)

Hamburg, June 27.—After severe rioting for the past several days, the city is now completely in the power of the communists and Spartacans. These revolutionaries are utilizing the food riots as an excuse for their attempts to gain control of the city and district.

Bands of Spartacans and Communists, well armed, stormed the city hall and overcame the Government troops stationed there. They captured further large quantities of ammunition, along with many rifles and machine guns.

After arming all the sympathizers in their train, they then swept over the city, hardly sparing a single street, plundering, killing and destroying everything that came in their way. The jails were every one stormed, and all the criminals released, who immediately took active part in further unruly doings.

The Spartacans are at present conferring with the idea of establishing the soviet system of government.

London, June 27.—The first days rioting at Hamburg resulted in the death of 85 persons, and hundreds more seriously hurt.

PEACE FIGHTS AMONG GERMANS

Many Streets Barricaded—Mobs Engage Government Soldiers Upon the Departure of Peace Envoys.

(Special via G.T.P. Telegraphs.)

London, June 26.—Hermann Mueller, minister for Foreign Affairs in the new German Government, accompanied by Dr. Bell, the Colonial Minister, have been selected much against their will as the German envoys to sign the peace treaty, it has been officially announced. They are leaving Berlin today for Versailles.

The prospect of the peace treaty being signed at last is apparently causing grave disorders in Berlin, a report received here via Amsterdam states. Many of the principal streets of Berlin have been barricaded by the turbulent crowds and there have been serious engagements between the Government troops and the mobs, which have caused many casualties on both sides. In many instances the troops have been unable to make any progress against the armed masses of people.

COMMONS HAVE DISCUSSION RE NATURALIZATION

Opposition Fights Retroactive Clause But Failed to Have It Deleted.

AFRAID OF KAISERISM GROWING IN THIS COUNTRY

(Special via G.T.P. Telegraphs.)

Ottawa, June 27.—In the House of Commons the naturalization bill aroused the keenest discussion among the members, both on the Government benches and on the Opposition side. There was specially severe criticism by the opposition in regard to the retroactive clause. "We want no Kaiserism in this country," declared one member during the sitting, while Lapointe added that it went very much further than the British act.

It was argued that a certificate of naturalization could not be revoked so long as the person holding it lived, without judicial enquiry so long as the holder committed no overt act.

The motion to delete the retroactive clause was defeated by 56 votes to 39.

THREE STEAMERS TO ARRIVE ON MONDAY

With the Prince Rupert arriving tomorrow, the Venture tomorrow night or Sunday, and the Princess Alice on Monday, out and in-going travel over the week end will be rather heavy. The Prince Rupert sailed from Vancouver last night with many passengers and a full cargo, and the Venture has also much goods for Prince Rupert and way points. She will take up the usual run to the Naas river. The Princess Alice will proceed north to Skagway on her departure from here on Monday.

MASTERS AND MATES GET THEIR CHARTER

Canadian Merchant Service Guild Duly Incorporated by Dominion Parliament—Embraces All Canada.

The Canadian Merchant Service Guild has been granted a charter of incorporation by the Dominion Parliament. Application was made to the Federal Parliament some time ago for the creation of a body corporate under the title of the Canadian Merchant Service Guild with the object of uniting under one body all masters, pilots and mates operating out of any port in Canada.

Under the new charter the various masters and mates organizations throughout the country will be incorporated into one big body. The organization will be divided into three sections. The western headquarters will be at Vancouver, the middle west at Collingwood, Ont., and the eastern at Halifax. There are already some 500 members in the western section which embraces the entire coast and lakes of British Columbia.

The constitution of the Canadian Merchant Service Guild forbids the participation in sympathetic strikes and the Guild proposes to remain aloof from the present seamen's dispute on the B. C. coast.

FUNERAL TOMORROW OF MR. JOS. THIBEAU

The funeral of Mr. Joseph Thibeau will take place tomorrow morning at 9 o'clock from the Catholic Church. The death occurred yesterday morning at the General Hospital, where the patient had been admitted suffering from fracture of the skull, following an accident at the Seal Cove mill.

Deceased was aged thirty-six years and came from Pembroke, Ont. He came here to locate with his wife, being employed at Seal Cove. The funeral arrangements are in the care of Hayner Bros.

BONUS FOR STAFF IN GOVERNMENT'S EMPLOY

**SCHWAB ADDRESSES
NEW YORK UNIVERSITY
GRADUATION CLASS**

**Emphasizes Loyalty to Associates
As First Essential to Success in Life.**

In addressing the graduates at New York University the other day, Charles M. Schwab, of the United States Steel Corporation, attributed his success to the loyalty of his associates.

Mr. Schwab said that in years gone by a man of letters would have the honor of welcoming the students into their new careers, and that nothing was more conclusive that the world had gone forward than that "a simple manufacturer" was invited to make the graduation address.

Sees a New Order.
"Great social changes have come in the world," said Mr. Schwab. "What would have been the use of the war unless it made a great step forward? I always like to preach broad democracy as the foundation of true education. Many a man has been educated in the shop and in the factory, and he is as much educated in the things of this life as you are here today in this university."

"It was the practice in years gone by for young men to regard themselves to be on a different social plane if they were educated in a university from other young men whose alma mater was the workshop. But there is no longer class or social distinction. Men are measured today by the things they accomplish in the world.

"I am not unappreciative of the value of education or the part it plays in commercial enterprise. You may ask me to what do I attribute my greatest good fortune. I attribute it to the spirit of loyalty and devotion to those with whom I am associated. Integrity and department are essential, but, above all, loyalty under all conditions and circumstances. Credit will come to you for being loyal and the result is bound to be success."

**TO SALVAGE SUNKEN
MERCHANT VESSELS**

First of British "Mystery" Ships
Launched for Raising Ships
Sunk by Subs.

London, June 26.—The first of a new type of "mystery" ship for the British Admiralty has just been completed. This new type of vessel is intended for salvaging merchant vessels sunk by German submarines around the coasts of the United Kingdom. Six of this new style are to be built, each at a cost of nearly £1,000,000.

The position of the sunken merchantmen has been ascertained by divers in the Admiralty salvage department, who have reported that in many cases the ships can be raised and refitted for service.

The salvage ships present the appearance of a series of towers, composed of hollow blocks of concrete, curved to withstand internal pressure. They have watertight doors, by which the blocks can be filled with water and pumps to replace the water with air.

Having no motivepower of their own, the ships are to be towed in pairs to where a sunken merchant ship has been located. On a calm day the hollow concrete blocks will be filled with water and the ships will be sunk on either side of the wreck. Divers will fasten them tightly to the sunken ship, after which the water will be pumped from the blocks and the ships, it is expected, will rise, bringing the wreck to the surface.

SKEENA FRUIT FARMS
SHOWING FINE PROMISE
Berry Picking Holidays for the Townspeople Becoming More Popular Each Year.

Reports coming in from up river points indicate that the strawberry plantations there give every promise of bearing a fine crop this season. In spite of the unduly cold spring, this season's crop prospects are excellent, both for quality and quantity. Shipping is likely to commence on July 15.

Now that the school holidays are at hand, many of the city families will make their way up river to the various fruit gardens, where they will help the ranchers out with the berry picking. The up river growers are looking forward to a greater number of summer visitors this year than ever before. Indeed, the growers will need a greater number of hands this season, as they have a larger area under cultivation now. This is where the city people have to help out in getting in the crops.

Since the advent of oil of citronelle, the mosquitos, which are unknown to Prince Rupert people, are readily kept at bay and the one annoyance to the city dwellers thereby mitigated.

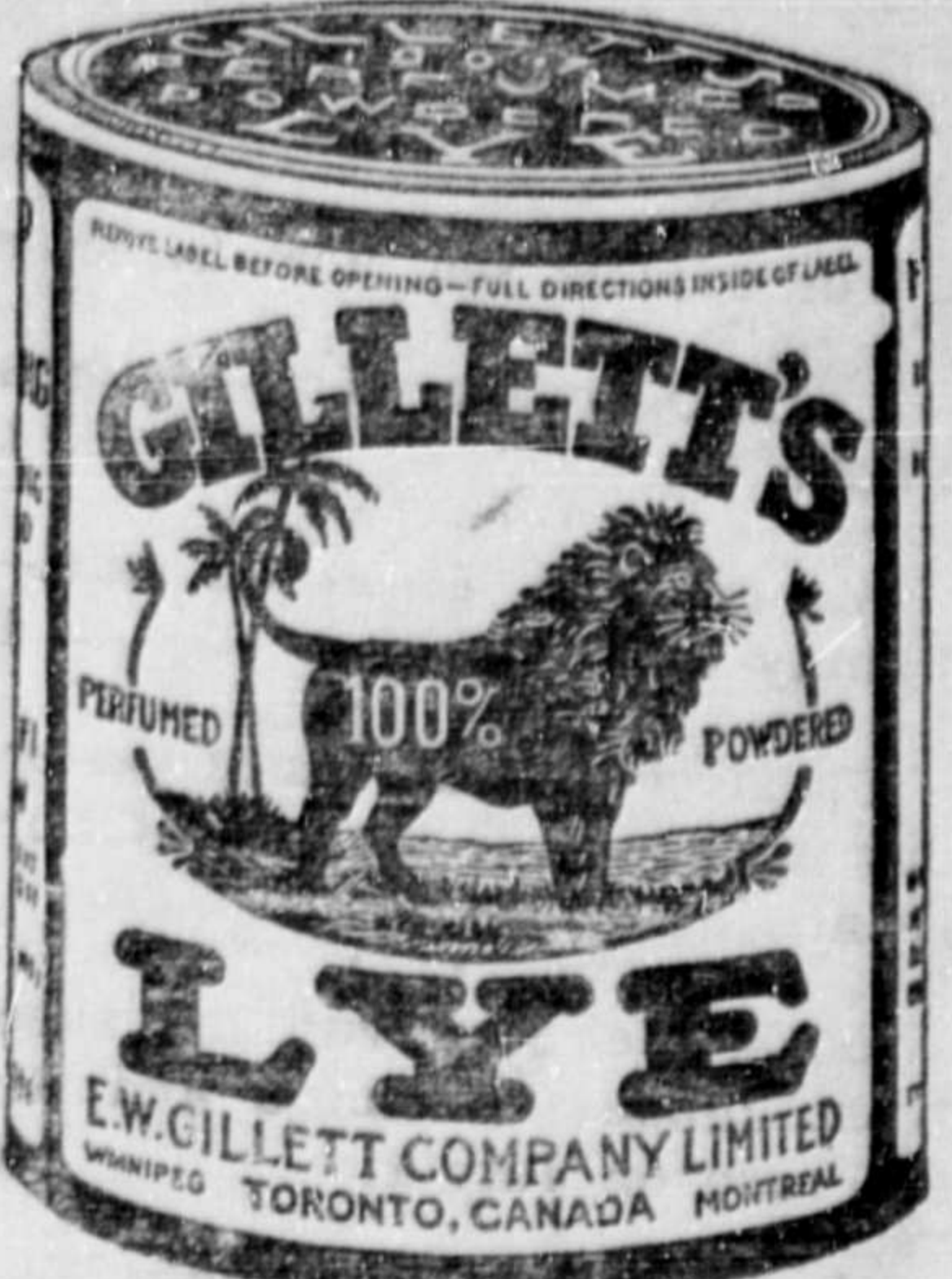

KEEPS SAWING

Seventy-Seven Trees in One Day is Record for Former Ruler; Blocks Sawed Are Sent to the Faithful.

Amerongen, Holland. (By mail.) Seventy-seven trees sawn in one day is the best record obtained by Wilhelm Hohenzollern since his flight into Holland and his semi-imprisonment in the Castle of Amerongen. On May 14 last, he completed the sawing of 3,000 trees. The last of these was cut into about thirty small blocks, which were taken to the ex-kaiser's apartments in the castle and there marked by his own hand with the date of the occurrence. Thereafter they were packed in a case and sent to Germany for distribution among those who remained true to the memory of their former ruler.

It must not be imagined that the trees in question are giants of the forest. Most of them are mere saplings. The ex-Kaiser complained about the smallness of the trunks brought to him and recently some trees of from three to six inches in diameter were brought to him and placed on the sawing block for him. He sometimes becomes very nervous while working at his self-imposed task and is inclined to snap out a sharp remark not much to the liking of those aiding him, whether they be ordinary laborers employed by Count Bentinck, or members of the former monarch's suite.
