# PEACE TREATY WAS SIGNED TODAY AT VERSAILLES BY GERMANY AND THE ALLIES

PREPARATIONS HAD BEEN MADE BY FOCH TO ADVANCE AT  
ONCE IN CASE OF REFUSAL—BLOCKADE TO BE  
LIFTED AND FOOD SENT AT ONCE

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Paris, June 28.—The Peace Treaty was signed today by the plenipotentiaries of Germany and the Allied Governments at Versailles.

For the past week or two there had been rumors that the Germans would refuse when the time came, but all these rumors proved false. Had she refused, Marshal Foch was ready to advance his forces on all sides right into the heart of the country and enforce martial law.

The blockade will now be lifted at once and the food ships that were held up in Great Britain will proceed to their destination with much needed supplies for the beleaguered nation.

## MOONSHINERS FIGHT REVENUE OFFICERS IN THE VIRGINIA HILLS

More Than One Hundred Killed  
in Two Months—Claim Pro-  
hibition Infringes Upon  
Personal Liberty.

Judge Luther E. Hunt, of Roanoke, was in New York last week and told the New York Times that war was raging in the Appalachian Mountains between moonshine whisky manufacturers and the revenue agents.

The Government officials, he said, were talking of sending airplanes over the mountains to hunt moonshiners and stills. More than 100 had been killed in one district in the last two months he said.

"My section of Virginia," said Judge Hunt, "is just like a European battlefield. There are snipers on both sides. Armed forces march along silently at night, and suddenly there will be a pitched battle."

"The natives are determined to continue making corn liquor. They declare it is being made now in the homes of the rich all over the dry states, and that it is an abridgement of personal liberty to deny them the right."

## DOLLY VARDEN TO SHIP ORE IN SIX WEEKS

Major Young on Way to Mine and  
New Directors to Come North  
Next Week.

That in about six weeks from now the Dolly Varden mine will be shipping ore to the smelter is the word brought by Major D. D. Young of the Taylor Engineering Co., the firm that has taken over the Dolly Varden Railway and mine and is now operating it.

Major Young is here today on his way to Alice Arm and he says that the directors of the new mining company are expected to arrive here next Saturday on their way to the mine to look over the property into which they have put their money.

The major is very enthusiastic over the prospects of that district. He says that his report to the people who financed the property was very conservative. It will probably be found much richer than they anticipate. Not only that but a number of other properties in the neighborhood will soon be shipping mines. His company intends to build to the famous Wolf mine and that will insure at least two shipping mines on the line of railway.

There are a number of fine prospects in the other valleys back from Alice Arm, all of which look good and as soon as the Dolly Varden commences to ship he anticipates a great increase of interest in these. Already a number of them have been bonded for large sums, something that would not have been done had not the prospects been good.

## THE NATIONALIZATION OF MINES IN BRITAIN

## TRANSPORTATION COMPANIES REFUSE TO REINSTATE ALL MEN WHO LEFT THEIR WORK

LONGSHOREMEN'S UNION NOT TO BE RECOGNIZED BUT ALL  
WHO WISH WORK WILL BE EMPLOYED—MEETINGS  
BEING HELD TO DECIDE ON COURSE  
OF ACTION

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Vancouver, June 28.—The transportation companies yesterday decided that there would be no general reinstatement of the men who were on strike, but that most of them would be taken on. It was also decided not to recognize the Longshoremen's Union but to employ any who were willing to work.

On the union leaders approaching the C. P. R. officials with a view to arranging for a cessation of the strike following the collapse at Winnipeg they were told that the company did not need men as they had as many as they could employ at present.

Individual meetings of some of the unions are being held today and the question of returning to work is being discussed.

## GRAHAM ISLAND NOTES

The steamer Thomas Crosby paid a visit to the fishing grounds of Langara Island and to Port Clements.

A wharf is under construction at Woden river, five miles above Massett townsite, for the Wallace Fisheries. Contractor Muse is building the structure and will commence operations on the New Massett wharf in a few days.

A large force of men is engaged in constructing Davis rafts at Buckley Bay to be towed to the pulp mills by the three tugs, Lorne, Commodore and Point Grey.

Fishing operations are in full swing off Langara and Marble Islands. Hundreds of trollers with gasoline launches are catching from ten to forty large spring salmon to the boat daily. Cannery packing boats are buying the fish for transport to the Skeena river and are paying from six to ten cents per pound for the catch.

Information has been received from C. M. Wilson, formerly of Prince Rupert and Massett, that he has been successful in the oil fields of Texas and intends returning to interest parties in the oil possibilities of Graham Island.

A new cannery is being built on Massett Inlet. It is not proposed to commence operations this year. Alford Bay cannery on Moresby Island is now in operation, canning spring salmon for export.

The marriage of Simon Woods and Alice Jones took place at Skidegate recently. A large number of residents were present and wished the happy couple long life and prosperity.

Sergeant Arthur Robertson, the pioneer guide and timber cruiser of the islands, returned from overseas on the last steamer. During his absence Sergeant Robertson visited his mother and sister in Scotland.

Mrs. Hutchinson, formerly teacher of New Massett day school, left for the south. Miss Verna Hurst, of the Queen Charlotte school, will spend the holidays in Victoria.

A party of geologists are visiting the Queen Charlotte Islands investigating the animal and bird life, with the aboriginal history of the Haidas. Messrs. Smith and Patch are connected with the Dominion government, under whose auspices they are making researches.

A large number of returned soldiers are trolling in the waters of Heate Straits, combining business with pleasure while considering their future course, thereby reducing the congestion in the cities of the unemployed. Many former comrades in arms have joined forces and own gasoline launches.

**GOOD WORK BY LAND**  
**SETTLEMENT BOARD**  
Nearly Three Thousand Appli-  
cants Have Been Passed  
and \$1,241,194.45 has  
Been Loaned.

Vancouver, June 26.—Those  
who were inclined to be sceptical  
of the success of the activities of  
the Provincial Land Settlement  
Board as far as British Columbia  
was concerned, and there were  
many, will find food for reflection  
in the remarkable figures show-  
ing what has been accomplished  
in the local office.

The statement up to June 20  
shows that no fewer than 2,818  
men have appeared before the  
qualification board and have been  
passed efficient as farmers. Loans  
have been made in 511 cases,  
while there are 196 cases still  
pending, and 129 applications  
disallowed. The total amount  
provided for the purchase of land  
alone amounts to \$1,241,194.45,  
while loans approved for purposes  
other than the actual purchase of  
land reach the total of \$729,796.

Out of this remarkable total  
\$522,600 has already been paid  
out in first payments on land  
purchase and the following  
amounts on other items connect-  
ed with settlement: Horses, \$21,-  
000; cows, \$16,000; cattle, \$1,950;  
swine, \$1,900; new implements,  
\$102,000; second hand imple-  
ments, \$1,900; building materials  
\$4,500; seed, feed and grain, \$3,-  
400.

The last month has proved the  
busiest of all, the office being  
continually crowded with eager  
applicants.
