## UNPLEASANT ENDING TO SATURDAY'S MEETING OF THE PEACE CONFERENCE

Versailles, June 30.—The world peace was signed and sealed on Saturday under circumstances which somewhat dimmed the expectations of those who worked during the long years of the war and the months of negotiation for its achievement. The German plenipotentiaries left, but it was evident from the program of the day and from the expressions of M. Clemenceau that they were still far from conciliatory. Regular intercourse with the Allied nations is dependent, not on the signing of the plenipotentiaries, but upon ratification by the Assembly.

President Clemenceau when signing made the remark that they would expect the terms of the treaty to be observed loyally and completely.

The German delegates, through Dr. von Heimesen replied. After returning to the hotel he said that had they known they would be treated on a different status from the others after signing, as shown by their separate exit before the general body of the conference, they never would have signed. Under the circumstances the general tone of the sentiment was one of relief at the incontrovertible end of hostilities than of complete and unalloyed satisfaction.

Official notification has been given to Germany that the blockade will not be released until the treaty is ratified by Germany. This was done by a resolution adopted by the Council of Four and presented to the German delegation before their departure to Berlin.

## PREVENT TROOPS ENTERING HAMBURG

Large Mob of Men and Women Block the Way and Soldiers Retire.

Berlin, June 30.—Government troops attempted to enter Hamburg yesterday but retired. They were met by a large mob, including many women.

The communists in control at Hamburg had, it is said, promised they would offer no opposition to the entry of the Government soldiers. When the troops were met by the mob, however, it was decided to retire temporarily to avoid possible bloodshed. The date for a definite advance on Hamburg is not set.

## The Strike Situation

The local strike situation looks much more hopeful today. H. McCall, general superintendent of the G. T. P., returned last night and at once investigated the conditions which are hindering the settlement. He found that there was a misconception in regard to the attitude of the company and he gave out the following statement:—

"We will re-employ any employee that went out on strike whose position has not been filled or whose services are required. It is not our intention to displace anyone who was employed during the recent trouble."

Mr. McCall further said that these were the conditions under which the men all along the line had returned to work and that the staff was 95 per cent complete.

J. L. Mullen of the Prince Rupert Drydock & Engineering Co., stated this morning that the conditions under which his men were to return were similar to those offered by the railway company.

## MAY TRY FORMER GERMAN EMPEROR

Expected That Holland Will Inform Him He Must Appear Before Tribunal.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Amsterdam, June 30.—The Allied and associated powers will not ask for the extradition of the former Emperor of Germany, the Paris correspondent of the Telegraaf learns, but will ask the Dutch government in the name of the League of Nations to see that Herr Hohenzollern does not escape the moral consequence of his acts.

It is expected that Holland will inform the former Emperor that he must appear before an international tribunal.

## MR. McDONALD GETS GIFT FROM SCHOLARS

The young people were all lined up to give Mr. McDonald a proper sendoff before he got onto the train with Mrs. McDonald.

In the few moments to spare the principal thanked the children for their thoughtfulness and promised to thank them further by letter as there was no time to do so today.

On his return from visiting his old home in Prince Edward Island Mr. McDonald will become superintendent of all the public schools of this city.

## NO PEACE YET WITH THE TURKS

Delegates Advised by Big Four to Return to Constantinople as No Hope of Settlement.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Paris, June 30.—The Council of Four at a meeting Saturday reached an agreement on the economic terms to be imposed on Austria.

A note was sent to the Turkish delegation yesterday by the Council of Four advising the members to return to Constantinople. The message said that there is no reason to believe that any agreement can be reached in the near future because of the great differences in the demands of the Turks and the concessions the Allies are willing to grant.

## PROVINCIAL BONDS SOLD

Toronto Syndicate Takes Three Million Dollars at 93.34.

Toronto, June 30.—A syndicate of Toronto bond houses has purchased \$3,000,000 issue of bonds from the province of British Columbia. The purchasers are Wood, Gundy & Co., Dominion Securities Corporation and Aems & Co.

The price paid was 93.34 which means that the province borrows at about 5.55 per cent, a little lower than the rate paid by the province for a similar loan earlier in the year.

## LABOR PROTESTS AGAINST ALLEGED DISCRIMINATION

STRIKE SAID TO BE NO LONGER SYMPATHETIC, BUT POLITICAL AND FOR PURPOSE OF GETTING MEN BACK ON THEIR JOBS.

That the present is a political strike, not against any employer or set of employers, but against the Government of Canada, was the introductory statement of Alderman Casey at the meeting last night called by the labor men to protest against discrimination in taking back men who have been on strike.

Later in the evening Alderman Casey said that the sympathetic strike was a thing of the past. The thing now was to re-establish themselves back on the job. All the employers were willing to take their employees back except the G. T. P. He asked had they been Bolsheviks or revolutionists? No they were some of them very conservative. They would remain on strike until they were reinstated as men or until they were busted and forced to leave.

The meeting was a large one and a number of addresses were given by labor representatives. R. T. J. Rose presided.

In opening the chairman explained the steps which had already been taken to try to secure the return of the strikers to their old jobs. He said that all the employers had been willing to take them back except the G. T. P. Superintendent McCall was away but Mr. Carey had told them that there were a number of them who could not get back. As a result of the negotiations he was sure there was discrimination. They had been willing to work alongside the men who had been taken on during the strike, but they would not stand for discrimination.

## Telegrams.

A telegram was read from Frank Myers of the Loggers Union saying that Vancouver employers were refusing to recognize the One Big Union and stating that each camp must decide whether to strike or not.

Another telegram asked for action to be taken to protest against the deportation of Winnipeg strike leaders without an open trial. A resolution of protest was passed.

## Ugly Attempt.

Alderman Casey outlined the course of the Winnipeg strike. He said that when the strike took place the Minister of Labor had deliberately set to work to prejudice the minds of the people against the strikers. The minister tried to show that it was a bold and ugly attempt to bring on a revolution. He did that thinking to bring condemnation on the strikers.

Alderman Casey then told of the formation of a board of arbitration which the men refused. This board was made up of two lawyers, H. B. Lyall of the Manufacturers' Association and Russell the labor leader, and was to be presided over by ex-Mayor Waugh. Later it was shown by one of the men from the back of the hall that one of the lawyers was the solicitor for the unions at Winnipeg, this making two labor representatives, two from the employers and the ex-mayor presiding. Mr. Casey still contended, however, that he was right in classing them as capitalists.

## No Ulterior Motives.

The debate on the subject in the House of Commons was outlined by the speaker and he said that not once did any members say it was an attempt at revolution. The payment of a living wage and the right to organize was the cause of the strike. They should try to disabuse their minds of any ulterior motives.

W. E. Thompson explained that while he had been opposed to the sympathetic strike he was wholeheartedly with the effort to secure reinstatement. He asked those in the audience to make up their minds that all the men must be reinstated. He thought if it was necessary for this purpose every man, woman and child should be made to suffer.

Mr. Cameron, a returned man, spoke of what he considered to be the injustice meted out by the G. T. P. after they had been fighting to make the world safe for democracy. Men were treated as Bolsheviks because they had the audacity to support their fellows. Speaking for the teamsters and chaffeurs, they would range them-

**STRIKERS ARE MAKING MONEY AT VANCOUVER**

**While Street Cars Tied Up Jitneys Earn Big Sums and Serve the Public.**

Arrivals on the steamer from Vancouver Saturday tell of a curious situation that has arisen there. While the street cars are all tied up, jitneys are operating on the streets by the hundred, every car available being impressed into the service. Some of these are being driven by the B. C. Electric employees, but most of them by shipyard workers and others who have had to leave their work but who had cars of their own or were able to hire them.

The jitney drivers take in anything from twenty to thirty dollars a day, most of them about twenty-three to twenty-five dollars. It costs them two dollars for gasoline and allowing five or six dollars for other expenses and wear and tear, they earn net about fifteen dollars a day. The result is that they are not at all anxious for the strike to end and some of them vote for it to continue.

As very few of the men have been earning more than seven or eight dollars a day at the shipyards and some less than four dollars, the strike has proved a bonanza for them. The question which is now being discussed is how long the jitneys are to continue after the strike is settled. The people generally are with the jitney men and the union men have been patronizing their right along. While they have had to pay ten cents a ride they have enjoyed an unusual luxury and have had the benefit of speed and an absence of straphanging.

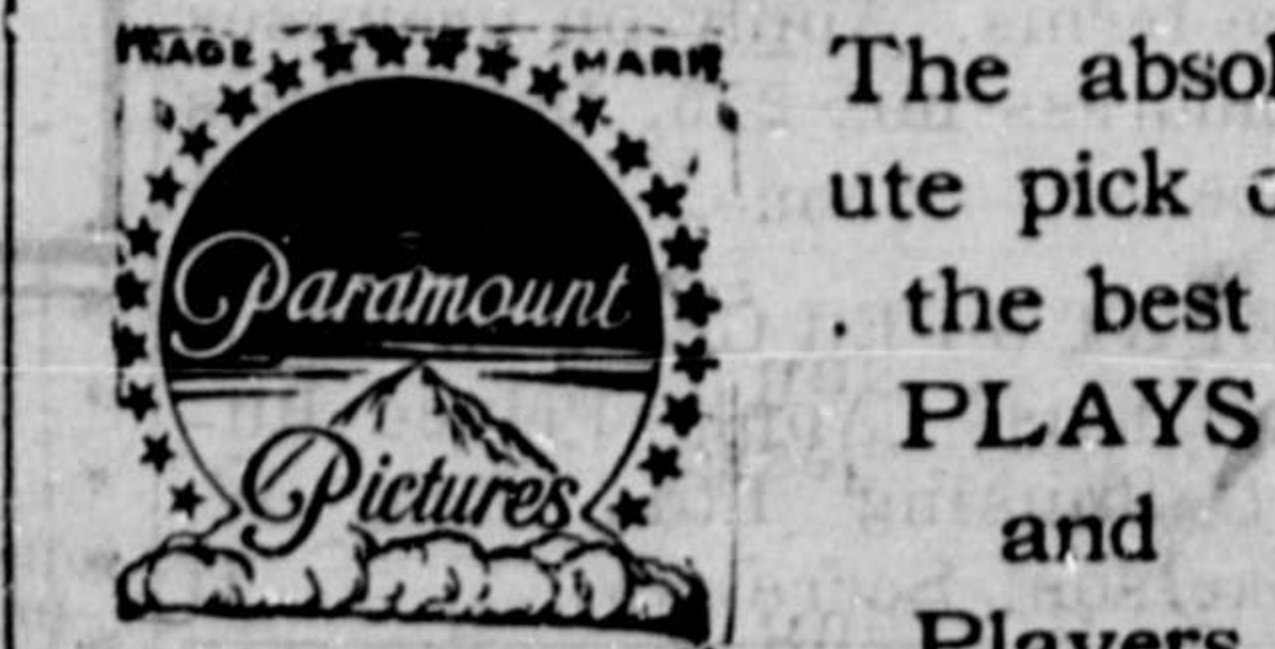
Miss S. A. Mills Recipient of Gift From Members of Baseball Team.

### Synopsis of Land Act Amendments

Minimum price of first-class land reduced to \$5 an acre; second-class to \$3 an acre.

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land.

Partnership pre-emptions abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emptions with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.

Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres, before receiving Crown Grant.

Where pre-emptor in occupation not less than 5 years, and improvements made and cultivation of at least 5 acres, he may be granted intertitle certificate of improvement without permanent residence and may be issued, provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$20 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained in less than 5 years, and improvements of \$10.00 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years are required.

Pre-emptor holding Crown grant may record another pre-emption, if he requires land in conjunction with his farm, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres may be leased as homesteads, title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes areas exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or company.

Mill factories or industrial sites on timber land not exceeding 40 acres may be purchased; conditions include payment of stamps.

Natural hay meadows inaccessible by existing roads may be purchased conditional upon construction of a road to them. Rebate of one-half of cost of road, not exceeding half of purchase price, is made.

### PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT.

The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retroactive.

No fees relating to pre-emptions are due or payable by soldiers on pre-emptions recorded after June 26, 1918. Taxes are remitted for five years.

Provision for return of moneys accrued, due and been paid since August 4, 1914, on account of payments, fees or taxes on soldiers' pre-emptions.

Interest on agreements to purchase Allied Forces, or dependents, acquired direct or indirect, remitted from enlistment to March 21, 1920.

### SUB-PURCHASERS OF CROWN LANDS.

Provision made for issuance of Crown grants to sub-purchasers of Crown lands, applying rights from purchasers who failed to complete purchase, involving forfeiture, on fulfillment of conditions of purchase. Where sub-purchasers do not claim whole of original parcel, purchase price due and taxes may be distributed proportionately over whole area. Applications must be made by May 1, 1920.

### GRAZING.

Grazing Act, 1919, for systematic development of livestock industry provides for grazing districts and ranges, administration Commissioner. Annual grazing permits issued based on numbers ranged; priority for established owners. Stock-owners may furnish Associations for range management. Free or partially free, permits for settlers, campers or travellers, up to ten head.
