## AUGUST AEROPLANE SPRUCE PRODUCTION IS TWICE THAT OF JULY

### LITTLE ACTIVITY DURING LAST TWENTY-FOUR HOURS ON GERMAN WESTERN FRONT

**SLIGHT ADVANCES IN REGION OF EPEHEY AND VERMAND  
WEST OF ST. QUENTIN; COUNTER ATTACKS  
HAVE BEEN REPULSED SOUTH-  
EAST OF ROUPY**

London, September 12.—There has been little fighting all along the line during the last twenty-four hours. The Germans are ready for a determined stand and the Allies are making every preparation before attacking. To avoid unnecessary loss of life in the Allied forces is the aim of General Foch.

London, September 12.—The British in their operations have further advanced their line north of Epehey and the region of Vermand west of St. Quentin, according to Field Marshal Haig's last statement.

Paris, Sept. 12.—German counter attacks around Laffaux were repulsed by the French yesterday, according to the War Office announcement which says: "German counter attack south-east of Roupay, near St. Quentin, was repulsed. In the region of Laffaux and Celles sur Aisne, six enemy attempts to reach our positions were repulsed."

### REMAINS OF VICTIM IN SHOOTING AFFRAY EXPECTED TODAY

The body of Frank Martin, the Stewart road superintendent who was shot and killed two days ago at Swamp Point, together with the man who did the shooting, will likely arrive in town this evening by the steamer from Anyox.

The inquest was held yesterday by Coroner Andrews at Swamp Point, and the preliminary police court hearing also took place. The prisoner, Johnstone S. Harkley, will be brought to Prince Rupert from Anyox as soon as possible, and it is expected that connection will be made with the Prince George leaving there today.

### WANT MORE FOOD

### LATEST INSTRUMENT OF GERMAN FRIGHTFULNESS IS NEW GAS SHELL

Paris, September 12.—The latest instrument of German frightfulness in gas is the small shell containing pumice stone and phosgene. The shell is projected by a rifle.

According to French investigators the combination of pumice stone with gas greatly increases the length of time that phosgene remains in the vicinity where the shell bursts and continues to be dangerous.

The Allied troops have been cautioned that it may be necessary to wear gas masks for twelve hours after the shells have fallen.

### MILLION BARRELS GASOLINE DEFICIT

Washington, Sept. 12.—Fuel Administrator Garfield informed the Senate today in response to the Lodge resolution of inquiry, that unless conservation steps were taken there would be a deficit of approximately one million barrels of gasoline at the end of the year. Based on the consumption during the month of August he estimated that there was only about one month's supply ahead.

### PERSIC TORPEDOED WITH 2,300 TROOPS ABOARD; ALL SAVED

London, Sept. 12.—When about two hundred miles from shore the troop ship Persic with 2,300 American soldiers aboard was torpedoed on Friday afternoon last, according to a statement just issued. The vessel was able to keep afloat until she reached shore, where she was beached and all hands were saved.

The ship was a member of a large convoy approaching the English coast.

### STEEL WORKERS ARE ASKING MORE WAGES

London, Sept. 12.—The steel workers at the Sydney mines are asking a general wage increase of ten per cent. for all that unless conservation steps were taken there would be a deficit of approximately one million barrels of gasoline at the end of the year. ### LABOR OUTBREAKS

London, Sept. 12.—More labor outbreaks in the London area seem imminent. The firemen, railway porters, postal employees and gas laborers are affected. It is also reported that 300,000 Lancashire cotton operatives are in a threatening mood.

### INDEMNITY TO GERMANY

London, Sept. 12.—The first portion of the Russian indemnity to Germany was sent on Saturday last from Moscow to Berlin, amounting to 250,000,000 roubles, one half in gold and the remainder in notes.

### AN IMMEDIATE CHANGE IN GERMAN GOVERNMENT IS FORECASTED AT AMSTERDAM

**SOCIALIST AND CATHOLIC PARTIES TO BE REPRESENTED  
WITH DR. SOLF AS CHANCELLOR IN PLACE  
OF VON HERTLING — PEACE  
SUGGESTED**

London, Sept. 12.—Reports from Amsterdam forecast an immediate change in Government at Berlin with Dr. Solf, Colonial Minister, succeeding von Hertling as chancellor and with the Socialists Scheidemann and Matthias Ersberger of the Catholic Centre party among the personnel.

If these changes are made it is a sign that Germany is about to launch a peace offensive. They are of profound importance, as the leader of the majority Socialists, Schiedemann, wields much power, while Ersberger has been the stormy petrel of German war politics.

Stockholm, Sept. 12.—As a first step towards peace Germany must renounce her pan-German ideas, is the opinion of Professor Delbrück of the University of Berlin.

### SPRUCE OUTPUT WAS DOUBLED DURING THE MONTH OF AUGUST

**SPLENDID RESULTS OBTAINED THROUGH CO-OPERATIVE  
EFFORT AND HARD WORK ON PART OF LOCAL  
OFFICIALS; STILL GREATER RESULTS  
EXPECTED DURING SEPTEMBER**

The output of aeroplane spruce in this district for the month of August was just double that of the month of July. That is the statement just issued by the officials of the Imperial Munitions Board. The figures in connection with the cut are not available and will not be published until after the war, but they are very large and are still on the increase. This is splendid work and is largely due to the energy and good management of the local officials who are using every effort to keep the work going without a hitch.

### Result of Co-operation.

When only a comparatively few months ago Hon. T. D. Pattullo was asked by the Imperial Munitions Board to co-operate in this work and the Spruce Bill was rushed through the legislature in order to make it possible for the

officials of the Board to go on to any land and take the timber needed in time of war, no one suspected that such development would follow. The Minister of Lands was enthusiastic at the time and some people thought he was just a booster, but the results have passed all expectations. Owing to the fact that the timber was all near the water and that Prince Rupert was here to act as a distributing centre and a convenient shipping point for the product, things were soon humming. Added to that some good men were placed in charge of the work and the results have justified the means.

### How It was Done.

The increase in the output has been made possible largely through the opening of the Buckley Bay mill by the Masset Timber Co.; the fact that the work of the Graham Island Spruce & Cedar Company's mill was brought into full operation; the speeding up of the production at Swanson Bay, where the output was doubled, and the operation, although not to full capacity, of the Prince Rupert mill.

While it is possible that the rate of production will not in future increase at the same ratio, yet the total output for the month of September, if all goes well, will be very much larger than for August. The latest word from Queen Charlotte City is that Olier Besner's mill will be cutting spruce in about a week, although it will be several weeks before it is working to anything like capacity. The local mill is gradually speeding up and the Georgetown mill has been overhauled and is now helping to provide the aeroplane material.

Naturally Prince Rupert is reaping a good deal of the benefit from all this business. The employees, although only a few live here, come here to spend their money and the merchants have all they can do to supply them.

### DAMNING INDICTMENT OF GERMAN METHODS

London, Sept. 12.—E. H. L. Gorges, Administrator of Southwest Africa, has presented one of the most sensational reports ever issued in connection with the German colonial mobs. It constitutes most damning indictment of German fitness to rule black native races and is brimful of well authenticated instances of rapine, murder, lust, knavery and of despoliation of simple, harmless natives of Southwest Africa.

### THIRSTY ONES REMAIN DRY; WHISKY SEIZED

**Constable Adams Gets Liquor and  
Lays Trap for Criminals, but  
Fails to Get Them.**

Yesterday afternoon Constable Adams saw five boxes packed in Chinese manner, being taken along the street on a rig for delivery. On inquiry he discovered that they came from the wharf, and the driver said that a Chinaman was to meet the rig on Eighth Avenue, and give instructions as to their disposal. Constable Adams got into the rig and wanted to meet that Chinaman. The rig went up McBride Street and turned along Eighth Avenue, but the alleged Chinaman failed to materialize, although he could not know that Constable Adams was on the wagon, he being out of sight. The five boxes were thereupon taken to the police office and were found to contain sealed bottles of good Canadian rye whisky.

The bottles had been taken out of the original cases and repacked in boxes of Chinese origin and were addressed to Kwong Ying Chong, care of Wong Lee. There were about two dozen bottles of whisky in each box.

Patriotic Fund to  
Remain as Formerly.

It will be unpleasant news to many to hear that the Canadian Patriotic Fund is to be continued. There was an unofficial intimation last season to the effect that that would be the last year during which the people would be asked to support this fund. This was in response to an agitation against it.

There is no objection to making contributions to the Patriotic Fund. The objection is to making the soldiers' wives and families seem to be the recipients of charity. Their husbands or fathers are fighting our battles. They are giving up for the time being and risking for all time that which is dearest to them. They have a perfect right to be kept by the state without any appeals to the charitably inclined or any investigation as to how the funds are being spent.

Many dependents of the soldiers feel very keenly the position in which they are placed. Men are forced under the conscription law to go to the war and the same power which takes them from their homes should as a matter of right provide for those that are left behind.

Every City Seems  
To Be Prospering.

A correspondent from the provincial capital says that while he hears that Prince Rupert is forging ahead and very prosperous this city will "have to go some" if it is to catch up with Victoria. In that city they have a lot of shipbuilding going on. New contracts have recently been secured and everybody is working and earning big money. The payroll keeps the pot boiling.

There is general prosperity on the Pacific coast which is most congenial to everyone. It is pleasant to live in a community that is succeeding. There is a note of optimism that it is hard to strike in dull times. On the Pacific coast the people have the goods to deliver and they are delivering them. It is the growing time.

Asks Elimination  
Of Joy Riding.

The fuel controller is asking for the elimination of joy riding in order to conserve gasoline. There is a little joy riding done in Prince Rupert, but not much. The request cannot apply with much force to a city that is shut in as is this one and which depends mostly on water and rail transportation. At the same time it is possible that there might be some saving in gasoline.

In the old country automobiles are not allowed to be used for pleasure purposes. In Ireland recently a wedding party was driving home when they were placed under arrest and haled before a magistrate. It was argued that marriage was a very necessary and desirable thing just now and the justice took that view of the question and disallowed the prosecution.

Big German Effort  
To Hold Back Allies.

Undoubtedly the Germans are now bent on defending their lines and preventing the Allies getting within striking distance of their own cities and towns. Also they are setting up another peace drive in order to try to save some of the fruits of their early victories before it is too late.

The defences are undoubtedly strong and for that reason the Allies have been pausing before making another big drive forward. The pause is not likely to last long for reinforcements are steadily being poured across the Atlantic and absolutely fresh troops are taking part in the campaign.

The peace drive is a danger to the Germans. If the German people once get the idea firmly in their minds that peace is the right thing they will possibly refuse to fight and then the military caste of Germany will be doomed. Already there is much unrest. It may be that to guide that unrest into what is considered safe channels is the policy which is being adopted.

Prince Rupert is  
Preparing for Peace.

Baron Shaughnessy says that it is time to prepare for peace times. A good many people have been saying that for a long time but when the Baron says it he says it with more force than most people. He is a weighty man and his words carry to the ends of the telegraph lines.

Prince Rupert is preparing for peace by encouraging and developing the industries of the district. After the war men will probably come here and take part in the fishing industry. They learned to like the open air life and the spirit of restlessness which has been born in them will easily find vent in the fishing industry. Many of them will come home with pensions and these will be able to fish in the summer and rest up in the winter. It is a most attractive prospect and doubtless will be taken advantage of by many.

RED CROSS STOCKS  
BECOMING DEPLETED;  
APPEAL FOR MORE

A cable from England has just been received at headquarters, in Toronto, saying that although the Red Cross Society has been able so far to supply the demands made upon it, further tremendous drains as a result of the recent great battle are causing stocks to become depleted and the necessity for greater work is urged to keep up a sufficient supply to take care of the wounded. In Prince Rupert either food or money may be left at the Red Cross but on Third Avenue any Friday and by doing so all can "do their bit."

## PEOPLE CROWD TO SEE GREAT FILM AT WESTHOLME THEATRE

"The Barrier" Attracts Full House  
and Proves to Be a Wonder-  
ful Story.

## AMERICAN-CANADIAN FISHERIES DISPUTES ARE TO BE SETTLED

Conference on Subjects Have Arrived at Unanimous Findings  
Which Were Today Filed  
Governments Concerned.

Washington, Sept. 12.—The American-Canadian fisheries conference which has been investigating the long-standing differences between the United States and Canada respecting fishing rights, today filed its report with the State Department here and the Governor-General-in-Council at Ottawa. The Department of Commerce under the direction of which the inquiry was conducted, has announced that the report was unanimous on all subjects and was expected to lead to satisfactory and permanent adjustment of the questions involved.

## TRIBUTE TO WORTH OF FATHER DUNCAN

Sincere tribute to the wonderful life-work of the late "Father" William Duncan, the pioneer missionary who died at New Metlakatla recently, was paid by Rev. C. M. Tate at a memorial service held in the Church of Our Lord in Victoria yesterday afternoon. The service was attended by many who, though lacking personal knowledge of the noted missionary, had taken a deep interest in his work and were glad to avail themselves of the opportunity to do honor to his memory.

Rev. Mr. Tate, who spoke with deep feeling, was personally acquainted with the late pioneer, having been in charge of a mission at Fort Simpson in the seventies, when William Duncan had charge of the old Metlakatla mission ten miles distant. Eulogizing the work of Father Duncan, Mr. Tate declared that the results accomplished at his own mission were only made possible through the wide-spread influence of the late missionary, who had been a pioneer in more than name, and in far more than the ordinary meaning of the term. When William Duncan went to Metlakatla at the age of twenty-four years the Tsimpsian Indians were in the most primitive state of savagery. Addicted to horrible cannibalistic practices and swayed by the evil influences of the "medicine man," the tribe had gradually improved under the teaching of Father Duncan until they were now an outstanding example of civilized Indians, famed for their industrial achievements.

## BRITISH COLUMBIA AVIATOR LEADS ALL ON ACTIVE SERVICE

Major Ray Collishaw Has Fifty-  
three Official Victories to His  
Credit and is Second only  
to Bishop.

Major Raymond Collishaw, the leading active ace among the British aviators, has written home to his old commander on the Restless at Esquimalt telling of his fiftieth successful exploit against German flyers.

A native of Victoria, where he was born 24 years ago, Major Collishaw has won the D.S.O., with bar, which means that he has won that honor twice; the Distinguished Flying Cross and the Croix de Guerre, with palm. He has recently been awarded the Arctic Medal.

He says in part: "Since you heard of me last, I have received another bar to my Distinguished Service Order; also a newly-created decoration, the Distinguished Flying Cross, created upon H. M. the King's birthday; also another palm to my Croix de Guerre. So I am improving somewhat. I am ever so anxious to work hard and merit another leave to Canada this fall again, so that when I apply the powers that be will look kindly upon my request and maybe it will materialize."

"I am, at last, the first of the fighting chaser-pilots in France, and am now only behind Bishop in record of enemy machines destroyed, and as he is not flying on active service I am leading the list. It has been a most difficult task and you can imagine that I have been pretty busy. So you might pardon my seeming neglect in writing to you. Next month I expect to go on leave to England and am looking forward to the short respite. But in the meantime I hope to raise my score of confirmed official victories to sixty, if possible, as I have fifty-three now."

## PREPARE FOR AFTER WAR SAYS SHAUGHNESSY

Canada Will Be Able to Adapt  
Herself and Adjust Her Industries Quickly,  
He Predicts.

Fort William, Ont., Sept. 12.—"Canada, with her great natural resources, will be able to adapt herself and adjust her industries very quickly after the war." That is what Baron Shaughnessy, president of the Canadian Pacific Railway, had to say as he stepped off the special train which arrived at the union station this afternoon. "Preparations being made," continued his Lordship, "to adjust industries to a change in production in the event of cessation of hostilities. The problem of the returned soldier is of course going to be a great one. Figuring on 300,000 men being overseas, if war stopped tomorrow, it would take ten months to bring them all back if they could return at the rate of 30,000 a month. Every man should be asked before he leaves France what line of work he wishes to take up when he gets back to Canada and the Government should work out a careful demobilization plan."

## ERECTING NEW WHARF TO WEST OF COW BAY

Georgetown Sawmill Co. Has  
Leased Site and Will Open  
Lumber Yard Soon.

In line with the general development of Prince Rupert comes the development of the waterfront. The Georgetown Sawmill Company, which recently leased their mill to Mr. McAfee, is preparing to act as selling agents for the mill here. With that end in view it has leased from the Provincial Government one hundred feet of frontage on the west side of Cow Bay adjacent to the wharf of Albert & McCaffery and is erecting a wharf and warehouse there.

The firm is about to go into the retail lumber business, spurred thereto doubtless by the prospect of more building here. They will also handle building material with the idea that contractors may be able to get everything they need at the one yard.

The new wharf is being built out in line with the others and, owing to the fact that there is already a good approach, will be most convenient for the purpose. R. S. Wright will manage the business.

## SYNOPSIS OF LAND ACT AMENDMENT

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.  
Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land.  
Partnership pre-emption abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emptions, with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.  
Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to the value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres, before receiving Crown Grant.

Where pre-emptor in occupation not less than 5 years, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, because of ill-health or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence may be issued provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$300 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained on these claims in less than 5 years, with improvements of \$10 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years.

Pre-emptor holding Crown Grant may record another pre-emption, if he requires land in conjunction with his farm, residence or improvements, and provide statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesteads; title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes, areas exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or company.

## PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT.

The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor must apply for title under this Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retroactive.

## TOWNSITE PROPERTY ALLOTMENT ACT.

Provision is made for the grant to persons holding uncompleted Agreements to Purchase from the Crown of such proportion of the land, if divisible, as the payments already made will cover in proportion to the sale price of the whole parcel. Two or more persons holding such Agreements may group their interests and apply for a proportionate allotment jointly. If it is not considered advisable to divide the land covered by an application for a proportionate allotment, an allotment of land of equal value selected from available Crown lands in the locality may be made. These allotments are conditional upon payment of all taxes due the Crown or to any municipality. The rights of persons to whom the purchaser from the Crown has agreed to sell are also protected. The decision of the Minister of Lands in respect to the adjustment of a proportionate allotment is final. The time for making application for these allotments is limited to the 1st day of May, 1919. Any application made after this date will not be considered. These allotments apply to town lots and lands of the Crown sold at public auction.

## TAGGED SALMON IS CAUGHT IN FRASER

At five o'clock in the afternoon  
of August 16 Chief Louis, one of  
the well known British Columbia  
descendants of the noble redskin  
and resident at Soda Creek for  
many years past, landed a sockeye  
bearing the tell-tale tag on the  
upper tail fin.

Although the tag did not bear  
the exact date of the operation  
and release from the ocean traps,  
it is presumed by J. P. Babcock,  
assistant to the Commissioner of  
Fisheries for British Columbia,  
in his communication to Commis-  
sioner the Hon. William Sloan,  
that the finny member was sent  
on its way from American waters  
about the middle of July.

In view of the fact that Soda  
Creek is about four hundred miles  
above the mouth of the Fraser  
river it will be seen that the dis-  
tance was travelled to the upper  
spawning grounds in about one  
month.

Mr. Sloan says that his assist-  
ant in his report made from  
Quesnel, declares that there are  
very few salmon at any point in  
the interior sections of the fa-  
mous waterway and its tribu-  
taries. Chilooten Indians, he re-  
ports, have taken less than three  
hundred sockeye this season  
while the Indians at Soda Creek  
secured a considerably less num-  
ber, one of which, however, was  
the interesting specimen landed  
by Chief Louis.

## CANADIAN NORTHERN EARNINGS INCREASE

Toronto, Sept. 12.—The gross  
earnings of the Canadian North-  
ern Railway System for the week  
ending Sept. 7 were \$901,000 as  
compared with \$715,800 for the  
corresponding week last year, an  
increase of \$185,200. From July  
1 to date the gross earnings were  
\$8,573,700 as compared with \$7,-  
965,900 for the corresponding  
period last year, an increase of  
\$607,800.

## RE-LOGGING OUTFIT GOING TO MASSET

Storm King Arrived Last Evening  
With Donkey Engines and  
Outfit in Tow.

Last evening a logging outfit in

## PRICE OF MEAT IS ADVANCED IN LONDON

London, Sept. 12.—The food  
controller has announced that the  
retail price of meat will be ad-  
vanced two pence per pound after  
September 22. The official state-  
ment explains that the increase is  
chiefly necessitated because of the  
heavier cost of imported meat  
from America and the rise in the  
freight rates.

Amsterdam, Sept. 12.—The Ger-  
mans are reported to be restoring
