HUNS RETIRING AGAIN EFFORT TO FORCE HUNS FROM OSTEND; COAST POSITION ISOLATED

GERMANS FORCED TO RETIRE ON WIDE FRONT ON BOTH SIDES OF LA BASSEE CANAL IN BELGIUM

will Find Himself Trapped Unless He Beats Speedy Retreat;
British Monitors Co-Operate with Troops by Bombard-
ing Coast.

(Special to The News via G.T.P. Telegraphs.)
London, October 3.—Magnificent news from the western front is that the Germans are retiring on a wide front north and south of Labassee Canal. This section of their line lies just north of Ypres, between that town, now in Allied possession, and Arras. The retrograde movement is the logical outcome of the advance of the British and Belgian forces east of Ypres and the Lys Valley. That, and the extension of the Allied lines to the north, has had the effect of placing the Lens-Armentiers salient at the point of a salient in which the Germans will find themselves trapped, as they were in the St. Mihiel salient by the Allies, unless they beat a speedy retreat.
Further north the British and Belgian troops have maintained progress and have captured several more towns. Roulers is particularly expected to be occupied by the Allies. Their line is now well beyond the Roulers-Menin road and they are encircling it. The depth of the advance east of Ypres is already such as to practically isolate the Belgian coast positions from the rest of the German front.
British monitors are heavily bombarding the district from the sea and a very slight further advance will compel the retreat of the Germans from Ostend.

LARGE TONNAGE OF MERCHANT VESSELS

Output in September is 20,000
Tons in Excess of Previous
Month.

London, Oct. 3.—The British Admiralty announces that the tonnage of merchant vessels completed in United Kingdom shipyards during September amounted to 144,772 tons, which is 20,000 tons in excess of the figures for August and has only twice been surpassed in any month of this year.

DAMASCUS HAS BEEN TAKEN BY ALLENBY'S TROOPS AND 7,000 PRISONERS SECURED

GERMANS PREPARING FOR ADVANCE OF ALLIES IN ALSACE
BY REMOVING INHABITANTS — 20-MILE
FRONT ADVANCE NORTH OF
ST. QUENTIN
(Special to The News via G.T.P. Telegraphs.)

London, October 3.—The big advance continues in Palestine. General Allenby has occupied Damascus, taking over 7,000 prisoners during the attack and has secured the junction of the Hedjaz Railway with the line from Beyrout, which town is in possession of French cavalry under his command.
London, October 3.—British troops this morning resumed their attack north of St. Quentin. The Germans continuing their rearguard movement from Lens to Armentieres along a 20-mile line.
Geneva, October 3.—German military authorities are removing the inhabitants of Alsace in the expectation of a Franco-American attack. The inhabitants of 20 villages have been sent to Bavaria. Some have escaped to Switzerland.

MANY MEN AND MUCH BOOTY

Paris, Oct. 3.—From September 10 to 20 the Allies captured 2,844 officers, 120,492 men and 1,600 cannon. They also took over 6,000 machine guns.

"No Bill" is Verdict of Grand Jury
in Campbell Manslaughter
Case at Victoria.

Victoria, Oct. 3.—Dan Campbell of Victoria, the police officer who shot and killed Albert Goodwin, draft evader, who was alleged to be resisting arrest near Cumberland, is not to stand trial on the charge of manslaughter, on which he was committed. The Grand Jury in the assize court having returned a verdict of "no bill," Campbell accordingly has been discharged.

TO BUY STOCK FOR BRITISH COLUMBIA

BURNING OF CITIES BY THE GERMANS MUST CEASE OR REPRISALS FOLLOW

London, October 3.—The burning of Cambrai and St. Quentin and the devastation of one of the most populous regions of Europe as the Germans retreat, has aroused great indignation and it is said in diplomatic circles that Germany will be warned soon that if she allows the work of destruction to continue severe reprisals will follow. The cities on the Rhine will be marked for similar destruction.
Washington, October 3.—An ultimatum to Germany regarding the ruthless destruction of cities and private property in Northern France and Belgium is being urged on the allies and is under consideration.

PORTLAND MAN HERE TONIGHT WITH PICTURES

Well Known Barrister of Oregon
State Here After Telling
Story of West in
Big Cities.

Telling of the land of romance, regeneration and renaissance, its beauties and possibilities, Frank B. Riley has recently returned from a tour of the Eastern and Central States carrying the message of the Pacific Northwest. He has met with a splendid reception everywhere and now he is touring the home district letting the people know the work that they are doing. Tonight he shows his wonderful collection of pictures at the Empress Theatre under the auspices of the Daughters of the Empire of this city.
Mr. Riley is not a professional lecturer but a prominent Portland barrister who is so enthusiastic about the country and its possibilities that he has taken a few months off in order to tell the people of the east about it. He has lectured chiefly before private clubs, and organizations of business men and professional men and world travellers, the class of people who might be expected to come to the West. He has given the message in a personal intimate way and his success has been most marked.
In Portland the lecturer is president of the mountaineering club and he has held many important positions in connection with the Chamber of Commerce and other organizations. Telling The News of his trip east this morning Mr. Riley said that everywhere he had been received with enthusiasm. He could have spent three months in and around Boston alone, and the same applied to Philadelphia. The story of the American and Canadian West appealed to the imagination of the people back there and very many of them were planning to come to this country at the earliest possible date.
It is understood that tickets for this picture lecture are selling well and that a good crowd may be expected.

GERMAN TRICKERY AGAIN IN EVIDENCE

Are Persuading the People That
Bulgaria Did Not Want
Peace But Rulers Forced
It on Them.

The German Government is trying to persuade the German people that the Bulgarians are not with their Government in making peace with the Allies. The suggestion that Premier Malinoff in concluding the military convention is lacking the support of the nation is discredited, however, by the speech of King Ferdinand to Parliament, in which the statement is made that a full statement of Bulgaria's position will immediately be laid before the representatives of the people.

NO BONUS ON NEXT VICTORY LOAN BONDS

Ottawa, October 3.—No bonus will be allowed in the next Victory Loan. Bonuses in the last loan cost the Government seven million dollars through paying interest on money they had not yet received. The amount paid to bond dealers was three quarters of a million and to canvassers, a little less than a million and a quarter.

**St. Dunstan's Hostel
Works Miracles.**

People who have never visited St. Dunstan's Hostel find it difficult to believe all the tales which are told of the wonderful work which the blind men do after being trained there. The loss of one sense seems to stimulate the activity of the others with the result that after a course of training men are able to do work which even men who see would find it most difficult to accomplish.

St. Dunstan's is known throughout the world. Its fame has spread and with the knowledge of the work it is doing comes the desire to share in the work by contributing money to keep it going and to enlarge its scope. Just now there are efforts being made to raise money for this deserving institution, and it is certain that the results will justify the efforts.

When men have gone to the front and entered the jaws of death to be rescued, but with one of the senses gone, the least those at home can do is to provide them that training which will give them the prospect of a useful life and the enjoyment of the senses which are left.

**Customs Receipts
Show Prosperity.**

The customs returns which were published in this paper yesterday indicate a degree of prosperity here which is remarkable. The total for August and September of this year is nearly double the total for the corresponding months of last year, the figures being for 1917 \$39,569.25 and for 1918 \$72,995.46. These figures speak volumes. They indicate that, without any additional stimulus from shipbuilding, business is improving at a rapid rate.

**Semi-Official
In Germany.**

The Cologne Gazette has recently published a bitter and vicious attack on German semi-official veracity. It declares that everything published as semi-official has been shamelessly and futilely false.

At last after four years a German journal has hit on that characteristic of their system of government which has betrayed them more than any other. The German semi-official system is peculiarly its own. It consists of spreading deliberate and tenacious lies and giving them an official tinge, but not quite official authority. It is a system typical of their pedantic false cunning. Inevitably the German people for a long time believed implicitly in information so disseminated, and all their expert writers adopted it as their text. For a long time the Germans believed that the label "Semi-Official" stamped all such information as reliable; now they know it was merely used as a covering for the crudest lies. That is the explanation of the "Dent in our home front." They are passing through a phase of intense and dreadful enlightenment.

The Allies have been semi-officially annihilated twenty times over. They have semi-officially had all their tanks destroyed. Semi-officially all their available tonnage is at the bottom of the sea together with a large proportion of their battle fleet. Semi-officially we have been starving for eighteen months. Foch's reserves were semi-officially used up by June. Semi-officially not a single American soldier would cross the Atlantic, partly because of the "U" boats, partly because of the bitter anti-war feeling in the United States. Semi-officially even if they came they would be an unarmed rabble. And so on through the dreary list of silly lies.

**Germans Know
Stories Were Lies**

Now the Germans know they were lies. They see their armies beaten on all fronts. They see a vastly increased and rejuvenated Allied army in hot and invincible pursuit. They see from this that the "U" boat has utterly failed. They see themselves without a friend in the world steadily breaking up through being submitted to an intolerable pressure. They are being bombed and they are not bombing back.

No wonder their spirit is failing them, no wonder that poor old mountebank Hindenburg has to put his name to four columns of hysterical twaddle. Surely if Germans read Allied leaflets with such demoralizing avidity it must be because they wish to know the truth, which they cannot obtain in their own government-ridden journals. Why do the Allies take no notice of German leaflets? They drop plenty. That is the deadly unanswerable question.

A few days before the German defeat and retreat from the Switch line, Von Ardenne declared that the German retreat was over. Another writer declared that Germans would make a decisive stand on the Vis-Queant line. By the time the paper appeared in England we were four miles past that line. In the Bapaume fighting all the German papers stated that we had suffered a heavy defeat with the most dreadful losses. We published our losses and confounded them by so doing. We have just caught them out beautifully over the figures of "U" boat sinkings. They had been denied, of course. Now all these errors were made because the writers were relying on semi-official information. One always knew that this moral debacle would come one day. You 'cannot fool all the people all the time.' Hindenburg believed that you could, but then he is hardly as wise a man as Lincoln.

**Registration of
United States Citizens**

Male citizens of the United States living in Canada of AGES 21 to 30, both inclusive, MUST REGISTER BY REGISTERED POST with the registrar under the Military Service Act of the district in which they live, during the TEN DAYS NEXT FOLLOWING SEPTEMBER 28th, 1918; and male CITIZENS OF THE AGES 19, 20 and 31-44, both inclusive, must so register during the ten days next FOLLOWING OCTOBER 12th, 1918.

It must be emphasized that THIS INCLUDES AMERICANS LIVING IN CANADA OF THE ABOVE AGES, MARRIED AND SINGLE, AND INCLUDES ALSO ALL THOSE WHO HAVE SECURED DIPLOMATIC EXEMPTION OR HAVE REGISTERED WITH AN AMERICAN CONSUL, OR HAVE REGISTERED FOR MILITARY SERVICE IN THE UNITED STATES.

Registration letters may be handed to local postmasters for despatch to the proper registrar, under the Military Service Act.

MILITARY SERVICE BRANCH**Notice—Military Service Act, 1917****Men Exempted As Farmers**

Having in view the importance of leaving a sufficient number of men on those farms which are actually contributing to the national food supply, notice is hereby given as follows:

1. ALL MEMBERS OF CLASS 1 POSSESSING EXEMPTION AS FARMERS, which is expiring, and WHO WISH TO REMAIN EXEMPT, SHOULD communicate with the registrars under the Military Service Act OF THEIR RESPECTIVE DISTRICTS, REQUESTING AN EXTENSION IN TIME OF SUCH EXEMPTION. Questionnaires will thereupon be issued to these men by the registrar and they will receive further exemption upon furnishing satisfactory proof that they are contributing sufficiently to the national food supply.

2. GRAND TRUNK FINANCES ARE QUITE SOUND

Recent Issue of Notes at Low Rate of Interest Shows Good Condition of the Company.

It was announced yesterday from Ottawa that negotiations were about to be reopened with the Grand Trunk Pacific looking to the taking over of that road by the Dominion Government. Prior to that it was thought here that the matter was settled for the present.

The recent issue by the Grand Trunk Railway Co. of £3,000,000 three-year 6% notes in London at 99 has caused much favorable comment in financial and railway circles. This flotation shows the strength of the company and the credit it enjoys in the greatest financial markets of the world, and also shows that it does not require to depend upon Government or any other assistance to meet its obligations. The rate at which this issue has been placed is a much more favorable one than has been obtained for any other railway securities sold in Canada or the United States for some time.

From sources that can be depended upon it is learned that the Company is in excellent condition financially. It has met all its obligations in the past and with its strong London and New York banking connections, and its excellent traffic showings at present, and its prospects for the future, it holds one of the highest places in the sound corporations of the Dominion.

PTE. J. CLAPPERTON IS WOUNDED AGAIN

Gets His Fourth Lucky One in France and is Now in a Base Hospital.

"Doc" Clapperton has just received a card from his son Pte. John Clapperton to the effect that he has been wounded again and taken to a base hospital. This is the fourth time that he has been injured, his wounds on each occasion being in the head.

Pte. Clapperton joined the 48th in this city under Major McMorde and after training in Victoria went overseas with that unit. After getting three doses of shrapnel in his cranium he transferred to the Fighting Seventh with whom he was engaged when he received this last wound, details of which have not yet come to hand.

Pte. Clapperton was born at Edinburgh, Scotland, and before coming here was a member of the Cameron Highlanders. He was an electrical engineer at the drydock when war broke out and at once he decided to rejoin the army. He was made a sergeant and held that position until after he was wounded the first time, when he reverted. His wife and family lived here for a time, but returned to the old country soon after the 48th left.

Curiously enough Mrs. Clapperton has seen something of the war. She went to London from here and a bomb from an aeroplane dropped in the same street on which she was walking. She then went to Cambridge and a similar thing happened. Now she is in Edinburgh where she thinks she will be safe.

A small troller brought in 1,000 lbs. of spring salmon yesterday as a result of three days' fishing. He sold the catch for 14½ cents a pound and walked ashore with a check for \$142.50 as his wages for the time he was out.

Another boat, the Lillian M., arrived yesterday with 16,000 cohoes which he sold for 65c. each. He did not catch these himself but was simply packing for the trollers outside.

PRINCESS ENA HERE WITH CANNERY CARGO

C. P. R. Freighter Arrived From Voyage to Japan Where Rice Riots Were in Progress.

The C. P. R. freighter Princess Ena, Capt. T. Cliff, was in port yesterday discharging freight at the Government wharf. She brought cans for Tucks Inlet, box shooks for Wales Island and general freight for Port Edward and Skeena points.

This is the first trip north for the Ena since she crossed the ocean to Japan with a cargo of explosives for the quarries at Chinnampo in Korea and Kobe in Japan.

The steamer arrived at Kobe just at the time of the rice riots. Some rich Japs had cornered the rice market and forced the price up from about twenty sen per sho (5 lbs.) to sixty-five sen. The result was that the poorer people found it difficult to get enough to eat. They protested and to enforce their protest they went around the town with clubs, breaking all the windows and generally smashing things up. This roused the Government and they shipped in rice and brought the price down.

The steward of the Ena, who is a first rate amateur photographer, took a number of photographs of the barricaded windows and the crowds.

CATTLE IMPORTATIONS TO BULKLEY VALLEY

Land Settlement Board of Provincial Government Arranging for Shipment of 300 Head..

A great impetus to the cattle industry in Bulkley Valley, with more of this year's bumper crop of feed finding its way to market on four legs, may be expected as the net result of arrangements completed this week between the land settlement board and a number of the district farmers, whereby cattle will be brought in from the southern parts of the province to relieve the feed situation there, says the Interior News.

Commissioner D. D. Munro, of the land settlement board, arrived in the district last Saturday and spent several days among the farmers, taking applications for cattle, and that farmers were alive to the opportunity this activity of the board presented for starting or augmenting their herds is shown by the number of cattle arranged for.

Mr. Munro completed his work in the early hours of Thursday. Several farmers were hustled out of bed after midnight to sign applications in the moonlight in the chilly night in their pyjamas. It is estimated that three hundred cattle were arranged for.

The Land Settlement Board has bought a lot of southern cattle to save them from slaughter; necessitated by the failure of fodder crops in that section. Mr. Munro left on Wednesday to take applications for cattle at Houston and in the lake districts.

The committee which was appointed some time ago to secure data with the object of erecting a cold storage plant and ice factory at Cow Bay is still working and before very long will have something definite to place before those interested. They do not wish to report until they have secured all possible information in regard to the project.

For the sake of your country and the boys "over there," spend cautiously. Think of what Lord Kitchener has said, and ask yourself first, "Is this something I really need or can I do without it?"

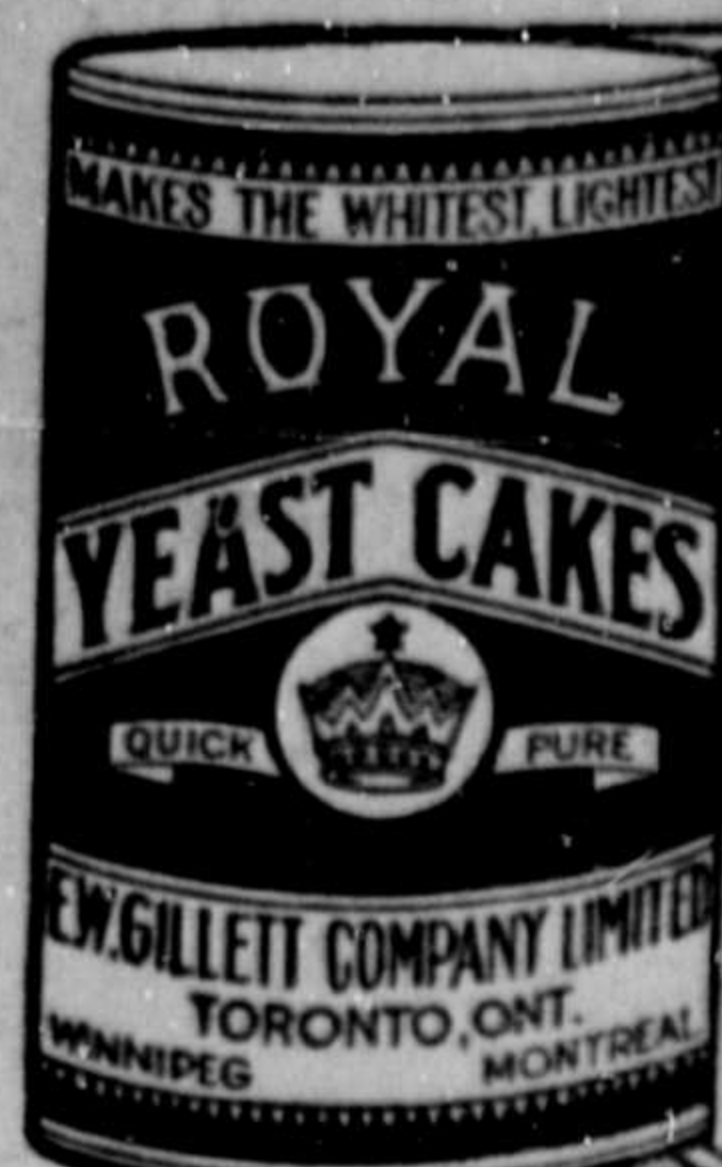

**B. C. BREWERIES'
REORGANIZATION**

Scheme Arranged Subject to Approval of Courts By Which New Company Formed From Old.

It has been announced in London that, subject to the approval of the British Columbia Courts and the British Treasury, it is proposed to put into effect a scheme of re-organization of the British Columbia Breweries. The plan which was formulated by Sperling & Company, co-operating with a protective committee of the bond holders, provides for the formation of a new company with a capital of 60,000 ordinary shares at \$5 each and a bonded debt of \$2,060,000 in 6 per cent. first mortgage bonds representing the present company's outstanding bonds and an amount of income debentures. The complete present undertaking is to be sold to the new company in exchange for the whole of these bonds, the interest on which, as from July last, will be paid as to 3 per cent. in cash and the balance in 6 per cent. income bonds, carrying cumulative interest from January 1, 1924. Of the new company's net earnings 80 per cent. are to be applied to the redemption of the bonds at par and not until these and the income bonds are redeemed will the shares rank for dividend. It is estimated that by January 1st next not less than \$500,000 of the bonds, or one-fifth of the issue will be redeemed. The affairs of the British Columbia Breweries have attracted considerable attention in this country, and to a greater extent in England, where investors placed about \$2,500,000 in the proposition in which connection it was considered that assurance was given under the Bowser bill that they would receive compensation in the event of prohibition being passed.

A Difficult Career.

Founded in 1912 the British Columbia Breweries very early in its career found itself in financial difficulties, the interest on its first mortgage bonds due January 1st, 1915, not being met. The bondholders a few months later agreed to the postponement of interest for a period of three years and also to the suspension of the sinking fund.

Despite the fact that the company's operations have been very seriously affected by liquor legislation the directors apparently view the future with considerable confidence on the basis of the re-organization now proposed. Sperling & Company have undertaken to subscribe in cash at par for \$39,400 shares and have also agreed to accept in exchange for

**TRIAL TRIPS OF
CONCRETE BOAT ARE
QUITE SUCCESSFUL**

Fine Little Craft Has Been Built Here By J. E. Boddie of Seal Cove.

This morning there was to be seen swinging at anchor at Seal Cove the first concrete boat to be built in Prince Rupert. She is a pleasure launch, measuring some 20 feet long, 7 feet beam, and drawing 3 feet of water. The boat is built on fine lines, there is little to distinguish her from a wooden boat. The hull is one inch in thickness, and the concrete is reinforced by steel.

The chief advantage of a concrete boat in these waters is that she is teredo proof. Although the deadweight of the vessel is slightly more than if she had been built of wood, any disadvantage in this respect is overcome in the design of the vessel.

Another advantage is the low upkeep in repairs. In case of accident, instead of having to replace several planks, all that has to be done is to beach the boat and squirt into the hole some more concrete. A concrete boat will stand up to ice floating on the waters in a manner a wooden boat could not hope to do.

This boat is fitted with a four horse power stationary gasoline engine, instead of the usual marine engine. And the vertical engine in the concrete boat works like a charm, and gets up a fine turn of speed. The vessel has been constructed by J. E. Boddie, of Seal Cove, and was only launched yesterday, and her trial trips have been distinctly successful.

**BIG CROWD ATTEND
CABARET OPENING**

Nine Entertainers Brought North By Tommy Burns on Eight-Week Contract Enliven Proceedings.

Standing room only was the order at the Empress Cabaret last evening after the arrival of the steamer with Tommy Burns and his party of entertainers.
