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Beautiful and Talented Actress to Be Seen Here Tonight in "The Doll's House."

Distinguished for her beauty and her remarkable talents as an actress, Elsie Ferguson has within the few months since she became a motion picture star, gained enviable and deserved popularity. MINERS' DELEGATE FROM ANYOX SAYS NO STRIKE THERE

That the Granby copper mines will not be in working order for at least two months was the statement made today by J. J. Ellis, delegate for the Miners' Union at that town, who is in the city today, says the Vancouver Province. The mine has been closed down since the fire on March 2 and about 1200 men left Anyox to find work elsewhere. About 500 men who have families in the town are still there and are now at work repairing the buildings, he said. Mr. Ellis stated that there were rumors to the effect that the miners at Anyox had gone on strike when the wage reduction was was made and that the mine was now being run by "scab" workers. There was absolutely no truth in it, he said, and the mines were quite "fair." Some time ago a strike vote was taken but failed to get the two-thirds majority and the reduction was consequently accepted.
