Grand Trunk Pacific Under Fire

DR. REID CONFIRMED IN RECEIVERSHIP AFTER MUCH DISCUSSION

GOVERNMENT MAKES STATEMENT REGARDING RECENT ACTION IN TAKING OVER G. T. P. RAILWAY

says that Premier Borden made an Offer for the Grand Trunk as Well as Subsidiary Line but this was not Accepted; Finances of Road are Discussed by Acting Premier.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Ottawa, March 21.—In the House of Commons yesterday a resolution was carried which pledges the House to the confirmation of Hon. J. D. Reid, Minister of Railways, in the position of receiver for the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway and a bill was introduced to give effect to the resolution.

The matter was discussed in committee until a late hour in the evening, the general plea in favor of it being that public ownership should be given a fair chance.

Wanted C. P. R. Too.

W. F. McLean of South York expressed himself in favor of the acquisition, not only of the Grand Trunk and the Grand Trunk Pacific, but also of the Canadian Pacific Railway and all telegraph and express companies connected therewith.

Mr. Robb, chief opposition whip, feared that the policy of passing into national ownership of the Grand Trunk would result in the same effect in the west as the Intercolonial had in the east.

Sir Thomas Explains.

Discussing the Grand Trunk Pacific Sir Thomas White said there were outstanding securities guaranteed by the Dominion Government of \$54,000,000; \$33,000,000 were held by the Dominion Government, the balance being in the hands of bondholders. The Dominion Government as guarantor of the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway Company was interested in the Grand Trunk Pacific to the extent of \$145,000,000. In addition to this, securities amounting to \$87,000,000 had been guaranteed by the Grand Trunk Railway.

Borden Offers to Purchase.

The Acting Premier then went on to state that an offer had been made by Mr. Borden to the Grand Trunk for the purchase of the Grand Trunk Pacific. The proposal of the Government was that they should take over the Grand Trunk Pacific and the Grand Trunk Railway Company, to acquire all assets, and to assume all obligations of both companies, the Government to make annual payments of \$2,500,000 for the first three years, \$3,000,000 for the succeeding five years, and \$3,600,000 annually thereafter, such terms to be distributed by the Grand Trunk management among the holders of the four per cent guaranteed and other stocks. The Government also offered as an alternative to submit the entire question to a board of arbitration.

Company's Reply.

The reply of the Grand Trunk made no reference to the obligations of the company regarding the Grand Trunk Pacific, but offered the Government to pay annual rental to the Grand Trunk of \$5,000,000.

Sir Thomas said the Government would have found itself in a position, if this request was complied with, of shouldering the deficits of the C. N. R., deficits of the G. T. P., and paying the Grand Trunk shareholders over \$5,000,000 a year.

No More Money.

Government notified Grand Trunk that Dominion Government would not again ask Parliament to vote any further sums for the purpose of meeting fixed charges or deficits on running expenses. The next thing that happened, said Sir Thomas, was a notice received on March 3 that on the following Monday the Grand Trunk Pacific in the west would close down. There was no discussion, no previous intimation. Immediate action being necessary.

GOVERNMENT SCORED FOR ACTION REGARDING G. T. P.

D. D. MACKENZIE, LEADER OF OPPOSITION, OBJECTS TO USE OF WAR TIME ACT WHEN WAR WAS OVER—KELLY HURRIES TO OTTAWA

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Ottawa, March 21.—D. D. Mackenzie, the new leader of the Liberal party in the House of Commons yesterday rose to the occasion on the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway policy, raked the Government fore and aft for using the War Measures Act after the war was over and stated that he was opposed to the proposal as outlined to the House and embodied in a resolution moved by Sir Thomas White. The resolution was one to confirm the appointment of Dr. Reid as receiver for the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway.

Mr. Mackenzie asked for all documents and correspondence between the Government and the company. He declared that the Government was usurping the functions of the courts.

Although no formal motion was made yesterday in the House, it is understood that the Railway Consolidation Act will be dealt with by a special committee of twenty-five members and not by a standing committee which includes a majority of members of the House. The Acting Premier said he believed a smaller committee could deal with the act more expeditiously.

Halifax, March 21.—Howard Kelly, president of the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway, arrived here yesterday on the S. S. Baltic, leaving for Ottawa on a special train.

CAMPAIGNERS OBJECT TO LABOR'S ATTITUDE

Break Off Relations With Trades and Labor Council Until Action Taken.

Victoria, B. C., March 21.—The British Campaigners' Association has decided to break off all relations with the Trades and Labor Council until the latter disclaims all connection with the attitude of the British Columbia Federation of Labor convention recently held at Calgary. The campaigners have been acting with the labor council in the matter of soldiers' employment.

COMPANY FISHERMEN DECIDE TO ACCEPT TERMS SAME AS THOSE IN FORCE LAST YEAR

At a meeting of the Deep Sea Fishermen's Union held in their rooms last night it was decided to accept the ruling of headquarters and go to work on the 1918 terms, which were those set by the Canada Food Board and which the men at that time accepted in order to do their bit in providing food during the war.

Prices Set.

The prices which the men will get on the boats operated by the companies will be on halibut boats three cents for halibut, two cents for black cod and one and a quarter cents for all other kinds of cod.

On the beam trawlers which are operated here under agreement with the Canadian Government through the Canada Food Board the price to be paid will be three quarters of a cent a pound on flat-fish, and a cent and a quarter for any other than black cod, with the same prices for black cod and halibut as is paid on halibut boats, one and a quarter cents on flat-fish.

Prices Asked.

The prices which the men were asking as set by the union headquarters at Seattle were halibut

four cents, black cod three cents and all other cod two cents. On the trawlers the price asked was quarters of a cent a pound on flat-fish and others the same as in 1918.

A vote of the whole of the unions of the coast was taken a few days ago on the advisability of going to work and while the men here voted against accepting the three quarters of a cent on flat-fish the union as a whole accepted and the local branch last night thought it their duty to adopt the ruling and go to work on the 1918 terms.

The last agreement ended on February 2 and since that time the men have been idle and the boats tied up. Now as soon as the boats are ready they will again be operated and the amount of fish coming to this port will be considerably increased.

It is pointed out by the men that prior to the agreement of 1918 they were getting one cent a pound for flat fish on the trawlers and they agreed to lower the rate in order to increase the consumption of fish as desired by the Canada Food Board.

STEEL PRICES TAKE A DROP

Steel Plates Now Sell at \$2.65 a Hundred Pounds and Basic Pig \$25.75 a Ton.

Washington, March 21.—An agreement on a new schedule of steel prices providing for a reduction, has been reached by representatives of the steel industry and the Industrial Board of the Department of Commerce. The prices are for the year 1919 and are effective at once.

A partial list of the new prices follows: Basic pig iron reduced to \$25.75 a gross ton; four inch billets \$38.50 a gross ton; merchant bars \$2.35 a hundred pounds; plates \$2.65 a hundred pounds; and structural steel \$2.45 a hundred pounds.

THREATENED WITHDRAWAL.

Bathing Facilities To Be Improved.

Preparations are being made for a meeting of the Prince Rupert Swimming Club which takes place next Thursday night. At that meeting plans will be laid for the work of the coming season.

The most important duty for the season will be the improvement of the bathing place at the Salt Lakes. The amount of work to be done will depend very largely on the amount of money which can be raised and that will depend on the interest taken in the scheme by the public.

Very few cities have as suitable a place for bathing as has this city. All that is necessary to make it popular is to improve the facilities. Dressing rooms, platforms, diving apparatus, sandy beaches, all these are attractions.

Everyone who is interested in making this a permanently attractive residential city should join the club and attend the meeting in order that the best possible results may be obtained.

New Settlements

Near Prince Rupert.

Yesterday The News told of a number of prairie people coming to settle at the mouth of the Skeena on Smith Island. They will fish and farm and should be able to make a first rate living in a pleasant climate without having to work inordinately hard. They will be independent and will be ruled by neither capitalist nor labor union.

There must be a number of somewhat similar sites where men might take their families not far from this city and where they may be assured of a competency. Porcher Island is said to be well suited to farming and it is also well located for fishing.

The difficulty with most of the settlements is that too few people settle in one place and the result is that there is a lack of social interest and the settlements break up.

It is to get over that difficulty that the Land Settlement Board was formed. The Board has been doing some initial work as was clearly shown from the report made to the Legislature, but so far the fringe has only been touched. Much more remains to be done.

Apartments With Community Kitchen.

One of the latest proposals in regard to buildings here in order to accommodate the people who are coming is to erect an apartment with only one community kitchen. In this kitchen all the food for the tenants would be cooked and there would be one community dining-room run on a co-operative basis, the expense being shared by all and thus saving all outside profits.

It is pointed out that the saving in doing away with all kitchens and dining-rooms in connection with individual apartments would be very large. More than that the saving in labor for the women would be equally large. The plan has been tried and proved successful in other places and the same might apply here.

Tenants who took the rooms would have to eat in the dining-room, and this would hardly be suitable where there were many children, but for single people or those whose children have grown up the plan might prove very useful. The suggestion is given for what it is worth. There are no definite plans on hand in connection with it, but it is being talked about.

Building Society Under Consideration.

A number of businessmen discussing the matter of building among themselves last night all expressed their willingness to take shares in a co-operative building society provided it was run with a minimum of expenses so that the shareholders would get the benefits. The plan outlined was something like this:

Each shareholder to pay in ten dollars a month for one hundred months, and at the end of each month a drawing to take place, and the lucky man to have the right to receive the amount paid in as a loan placed as a first charge on the property to be built upon. The payments would continue until each had paid in \$1,000 and each had received a loan.

Any winner in the draw not wishing to use the money could pass it on to the next in order, or to anyone whom he might designate. The rate of interest on the loans to be set at say six per cent. This was a rough outline of the plan subject to revision. The only difficulty in carrying it out seemed to be to get someone who would be willing to undertake the work without getting any big rake-off.

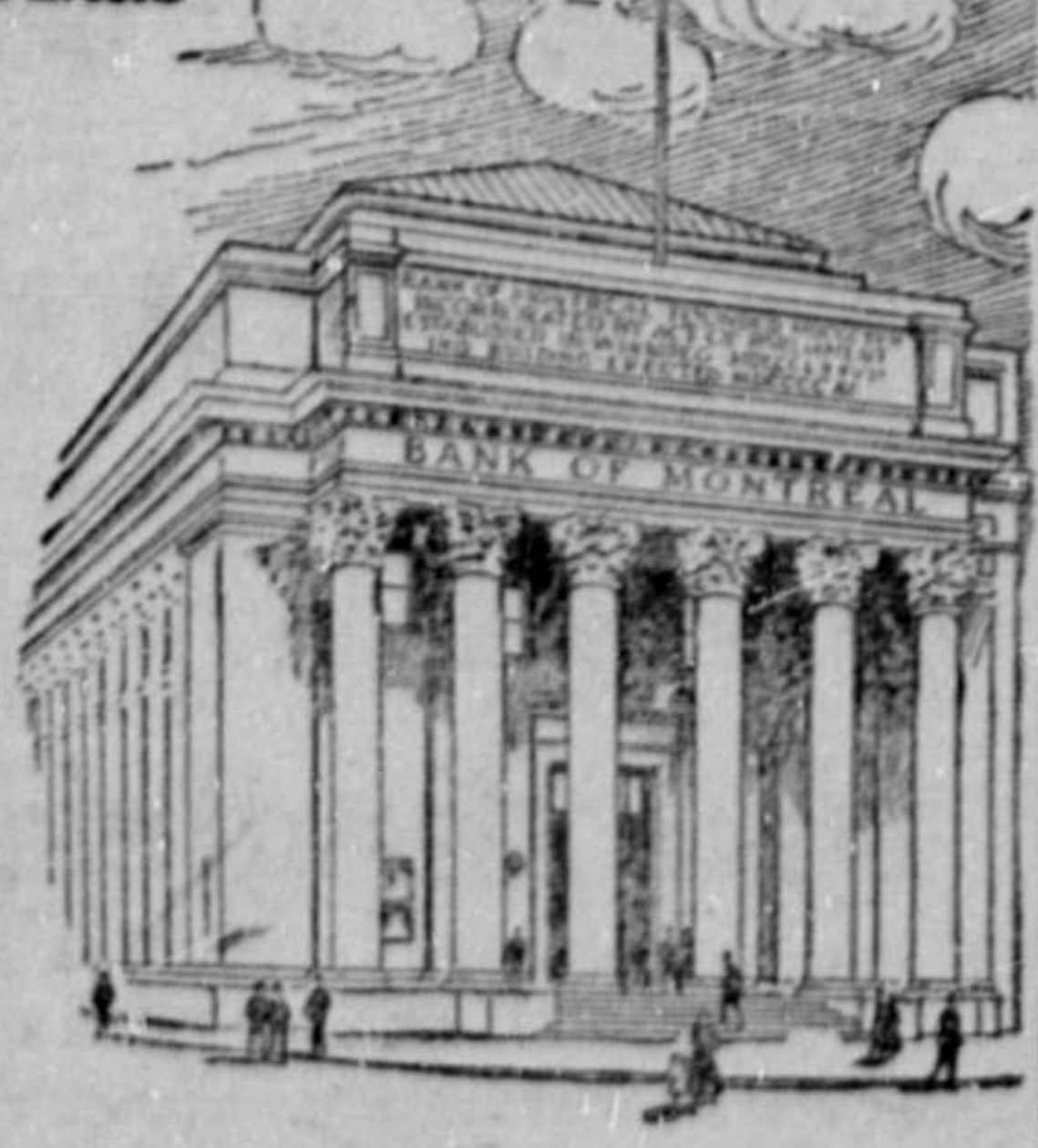

SYNOPSIS OF LAND ACT AMENDMENT

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.
Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is not timber land.
Partnership pre-emptions abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emptions, with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.
Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres, before receiving Crown Grant.

Where pre-emptor in occupation not less than 5 years, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, because of ill-health or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence may be issued provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$300 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained on these claims in less than 5 years, with improvements of \$10 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years.

Pre-emptor holding Crown Grant may record another pre-emption, if he requires land in conjunction with his farm, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesteads, title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes areas exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or company.
PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT.
The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from one year from the death of such person as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retroactive.

TOWNSITE PROPERTY ALLOTMENT ACT.

Provision is made for the grant to persons holding uncompleted Agreements to Purchase from the Crown of such proportion of the land, if divisible as the payment already made will cover in proportion to the sale price of the whole parcel. Two or more persons holding such Agreements may group their interests and apply for a proportionate allotment jointly. If it is not considered advisable to divide the land covered by an application for a proportionate allotment, an allotment of land of equal value selected from available Crown lands in the locality may be made. These allotments are conditional upon payment of all taxes due the Crown or to any municipality. The rights of persons to whom the purchaser from the Crown has agreed to sell are also protected. The decision of the Minister of Lands in respect to the adjustment of a proportionate allotment is final. The time for making application for these allotments is limited to the 1st day of May, 1919. Any application made after this date will not be considered. These allotments apply to town lots and lands of the Crown sold at public auction.

ANYOX STILL LOSING MORE POPULATION

About forty people arrived from Anyox last night and about two hundred still are left in the smelter town. All those at present there are employed by the company, the schools are still in operation and the picture house and poolroom are kept open.

It is understood that a meeting of the Board of Directors of the Granby Consolidated Mining and Smelting Company will be held in New York the middle of next week when a policy for the future will be decided upon. The low price of copper makes it difficult to operate, especially in view of the big stocks of the metal on hand and the possibility of the prices going lower yet.

Two building permits were issued recently by the city engineer, one on March 12 to H. R. Bellack of Section 5, Block 14, lot 52 Summit Ave., who is making alterations to his dwelling to the value of \$500. The other went to Alunan of Section 5, block 32, lot 10 on 8th Avenue, who is also making an alteration to his house to the value of \$700.

MINERS' DELEGATE FROM ANYOX SAYS NO STRIKE THERE

That the Granby copper mines will not be in working order for at least two months was the statement made today by J. J. Ellis, delegate for the Miners' Union at that town, who is in the city today, says the Vancouver Province. The mine has been closed down since the fire on March 2 and about 1200 men left Anyox to find work elsewhere. About 500 men who have families in the town are still there and are now at work repairing the buildings, he said.

Mr. Ellis stated that there were rumors to the effect that the miners at Anyox had gone on strike when the wage reduction was made and that the mine was now being run by "scab" workers. There was absolutely no truth in it, he said, and the mines were quite "fair." Some time ago a strike vote was taken but failed to get the two-thirds majority and the reduction was consequently accepted.

Mr. Ellis is on his way to New York where he will undergo an operation.

SITKA SPRUCE PROVES ASSET TO PROVINCE

Lieut. Cooper Young Gives Inter-
view in Vancouver Before
Leaving for Ireland.

Before leaving for Ireland where he has large estates Lieut. Cooper Young who was here recently gave an interview in which he is reported to have said:

"I think that you have in the province one of the greatest assets it is possible to have. It has been found indispensable in the making of machines for our flyers, machines that have stood the test and strain under all conditions and weathers and the wonder to me is that it has been so long overlooked. It was one of the luckiest things in the world that B. C. had this magnificent storage of spruce, otherwise it might have placed the old country and her allies in a somewhat difficult position.

"Yes," he replied in answer to a query as to the possibilities of using fir, "fir might have been used, and as a matter of fact it has been used in aeroplanes. But it has not the same ductility and the same strength as spruce has. I may tell you," he added, "that there was never any possibility of fir being exclusively used for this purpose if the supply of spruce had become exhausted. In no other part of the world," Lt. Young added, "is there the same high quality of spruce as is to be found in this province, and it was, as I say, a mighty lucky thing that you had it.

"But where would we have been had not your sawmill men and your logging operators stepped into the breach?" Lt. Young asked. And he answered his own question by stating that the greatest credit was due to the lumbermen of the Pacific coast and to the many logging operators who had placed their plant at the disposal of the Imperial authorities to say that their efforts had resulted in a great measure in the allies winning the war."

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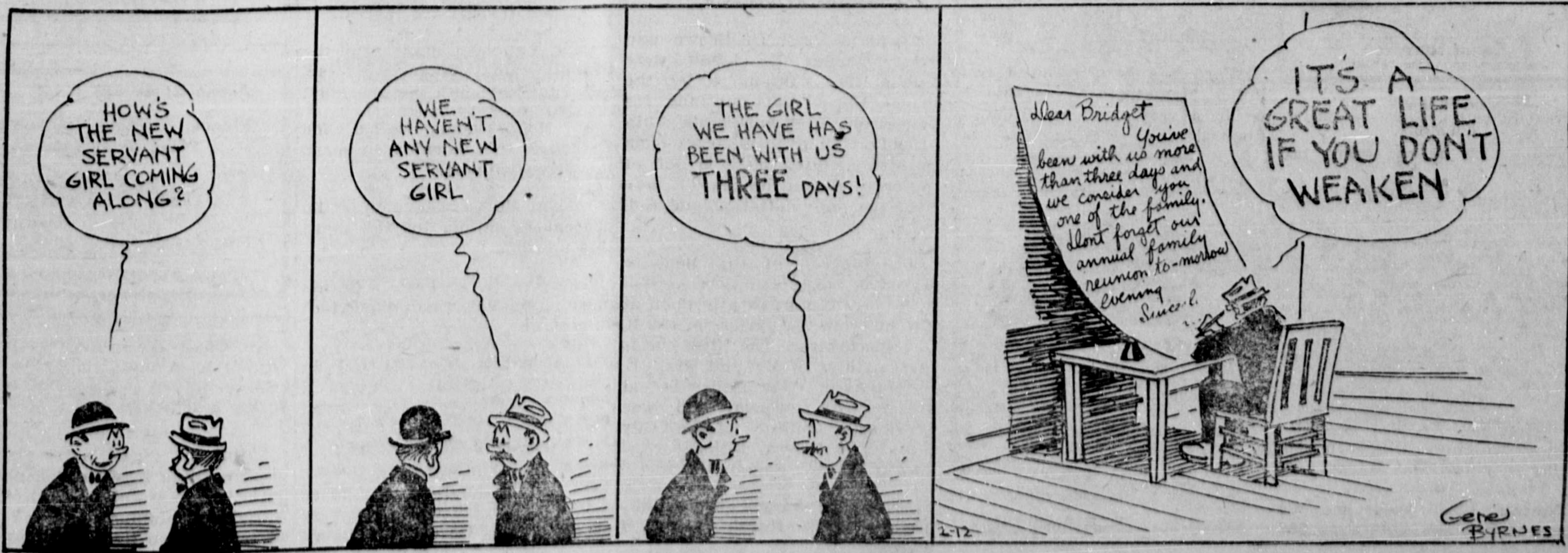

GOVT. MAKES STATEMENT REGARDING ACTION IN TAKING OVER G. T. P.

(Continued From Page One.)

sary in order to insure continuance of the system, the Government fell back on the War Measures Act and appointed the Minister of Railways receiver.

McKenzie's Criticism.

When the resolution was introduced D. D. McKenzie said it was proper that the people should have the fullest possible information. It was alleged that the Government had not complied with the agreement entered into in 1904 and had made it impossible for the company to carry on. There should be a clear statement of the financial standing of the company to March 10th last. He did not at all agree with the steps taken by the Government in this connection. The War Measures Act was never intended to be used in connection with matters of this kind.

Mr. MacKenzie said that now the war was over there was no emergency in connection with the measure, and when there was not only a statute but a well established practice dealing with cases of this kind, it was an innovation of an undesirable character to start proceedings of this character. It would lead to entanglements and difficulties of a very serious nature. Parliament was not the proper body to usurp the functions of a Judge of a Court. The Company had not been given an opportunity of being heard.

In Committee.

When the House went in committee on the resolution White said request McKenzie correspondence and other information was reasonable. He gave a resume of the transaction between the Government and the Grand Trunk Pacific, showing that the Grand Trunk Railway owned all the stock and does own it.

Mr. Lemieux asked if interest on the loans had been always paid. The interest was always paid, Sir Thomas replied, because Parliament voted the money.

Burden on Government.

Sir Thomas referred to evidence given before the Drayton-Acworth commission in 1916. It showed that the Grand Trunk would not continue to be responsible for payment of interest on the Grand Trunk Pacific securities, nor would they be responsible for deficits in operating, but would cast the entire burden of the Grand Trunk Pacific upon the Government.

Mr. MacKenzie asked if the Grand Trunk could relieve itself of its responsibilities under the original agreements.

Relieve Grand Trunk.

Sir Thomas White: "I say no, legally they would not" but if the Government continued to vote seven and a half million dollars a year, it would relieve the Grand Trunk for the year in which it was voted of paying any interest on securities which the Government had guaranteed. The Drayton-Acworth report, Sir Thomas went on, recommended that the Grand Trunk be surrendered into the hands of the people of Canada.
