BITTER TIME FOR GERMANS AT PEACE CONFERENCE WHEN CREDENTIALS ARE PRESENTED

**FIRST COMPLETE SESSION LASTED ONLY FEW MINUTES;
FOREIGN SECRETARY PALE AND ALMOST
FAINTING FROM EMOTION
DURING ORDEAL**

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Versailles, May 2.—In a session beginning at 3:10 yesterday afternoon and lasting barely five minutes, German plenipotentiaries to the Peace Congress presented their credentials. As a first step in the peace negotiations the German credentials were presented to the representatives of the Allies and the United States.
Pale and almost fainting from emotion, Count von Brockdorff-Rantzau, German Foreign Secretary, who is head of the peace delegation, sat through what evidently was one of the bitterest moments of his life, barely able to sustain himself on his feet through the brief ceremony and to reach the waiting automobile which brought him to the gathering.

IMMIGRATION IS DISCUSSED

**Proposal to Prohibit Entry From
Southeastern Europe Made by
Minister of Immigration.**

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Ottawa, May 2.—With the expectation of an amendment by Home Crayn, the Immigration Bill passed the committee of the House today. Mr. Crayn's amendment aims to prohibit for a term of five years the entry into Canada of people from southeastern Europe. He specified the geographical line of demarcation.
"It is a novel proposal," the Minister of Immigration said, and "we cannot see how the system could be worked. After some discussion, the amendment was allowed to stand. It now remains the only topic for discussion in committee on the bill."
From tomorrow until further orders immigration of Doukhobors, Hutterites and Mennonites is prohibited. The order in council to this effect was signed by the Governor General this afternoon. It was passed under the provisions of the existing Immigration Act, which gives authority to this end.

NEW SCHOOL IS PROPOSED ON THE HILL

**Erection of Public School Adjoining
Athletic Grounds Would
Make Playground for
Children Available.**

The school trustees are wrestling with the problem of the erection of a new public school. The question of where to put it in order that there may be sufficient playground around it is one of the important things which they are considering.
There is a school site on low ground on Eighth Avenue, but it is not large enough to give plenty of playgrounds and the site is considered too low. There is the circle at Hays Cove, but it is planned to erect a high school there some day. The only place worthy of mention and one that is being seriously considered is the land adjoining the athletic grounds on Acropolis Hill.
Large Playground.
In connection with the site on the hill it is pointed out that the athletic grounds might well be used as a playground for the pupils attending the school. It is large and entirely suitable and is not in use by the grownups at the time when the children would be using it. The school could be erected far enough back to be out of the way and at the same time the children could have the use of the fine level grounds. Later if necessary a piece of land could be cleared for a playground as there is plenty available on the hill.
It is further pointed out by advocates of this site that it is the nearest available in the centre of population, that it is high and dry, and that it could serve Section 2 for some time to come. With it erected, the Borden Street school would be used wholly for high school purposes, that being the purpose for which it was built.

Commence Soon.
It will be necessary to commence preparations for building very soon as the season is advancing and already there is one schoolroom opened in an inconvenient store and another must be opened soon. With the increase in population, provision for schools must be made.

St. Johns, Nfld., May 1.—Martin's flight was abandoned at 4:30 owing to unfavorable weather. Reports say the machine was unable to fly today owing to sodden ground.

MAY DAY RIOTS AT CLEVELAND

**One Killed, 100 Wounded and
Many Injured—Socialist
Headquarters Wrecked.**

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Cleveland, May 2.—An unidentified man was killed by a detective's bullet, when eleven policemen were shot or badly beaten and about 100 persons wounded, many seriously. The general rioting which brought on the dramatic finale this afternoon was due to a Socialist May Day demonstration here. About eighty persons were seriously injured, and are in hospital tonight, while scores of others, including women, were trampled by rioters and clubbed by the police.
The Socialist headquarters were totally wrecked by angry civilians bent on putting an end to the demonstration.

JAPAN COMES TO TERMS WITH ALLIED POWERS

**Agrees to Hand Shantung Back to
China on Terms to be Mutually
Agreed Upon.**

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Paris, May 1.—An agreement regarding the Shantung peninsula in Kio Chau has been reached between the Council of Three and the Japanese delegates. It provides for the transfer without conditions to Japan, which voluntarily engages to hand Shantung peninsula back to China, it to be left to the Chinese and Japanese Governments to agree upon the details of carrying out the treaty of 1915 and agreements made in 1918.

BRITISH WILL PLACE NO NEW DUTY ON FOOD

**House of Commons Spends Day
Discussing Colonial

MONTREAL LABOR REJECTS PLAN FOR ONE BIG UNION; SEATTLE FIVE-DAY WEEK

Vancouver, May 2.—Reports from various parts of the country in regard to the One Big Union are very conflicting. At some points, especially in the west it is meeting with favor from the more socialistically inclined of the unions. In the east, however, most of the unions are dead against it.
Seattle is reported to be taking the bull by the horns and initiating the five-day week at once.
Montreal, May 2.—The "One Big Union" plan got its answer last night from the Montreal workmen. The Trades and Labor council went on record with only four dissenting voices as being opposed to the new plan of organization.
Seattle, May 2.—Beginning tomorrow a five-day week will be enforced, according to the announcement made by the Building Trades Council representing 6,000 workers. Until further notice no work will be done by members of the unions affected either on Saturdays or Sundays.

CZECHO-SLAV WOUNDED COMING TO THE COAST

**Two thousand will be Treated at
Victoria, Others at San
Francisco.**

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
San Francisco, May 2.—An agreement whereby approximately 4,000 wounded and ill Czecho-Slav soldiers are to be brought from Siberia to San Francisco and Victoria for treatment was effected by the British, American and Czecho-Slav officials.
Under the contemplated plan 2,000 soldiers will be brought here, the remainder going to the B. C. port. Measures will be taken to ship the men immediately, congested shipping conditions being the only bar to the immediate transportation of the men.

Settlement of Disagreements.
 There is a settlement with Japan and the Italian situation has improved. That looks very well for a proper world peace. In all probability a similar condition will follow in connection with the labor market. There will be trouble for some time but eventually things will find their level and we shall get down to business as a nation.

The whole world seems to be in an upheaval caused by the stir of world war. We shall never get back to the old conditions, but we shall adapt ourselves to new conditions, and shall forget that they ever were otherwise.

J. J. Coughlan, the shipbuilder of Vancouver, in his evidence before the Industrial Relations Committee, said he thought the men were beginning to see things from a saner point of view. Whether or not he is right we have no means of knowing, but it is to be hoped that the relations between employers and employed will improve so that business may become more stable and British Columbia may be given an opportunity to compete with the rest of the world.

Hutterites Are Religious Sect.
 The despatches have several times mentioned the Hutterites. They are a German speaking people with strong religious convictions. They consider their religious views more important than the laws of the land.

Their religious convictions prevent them from participating in war or contributing thereto in any way whatsoever, whether by the purchase of war loan bonds, subscriptions to the Red Cross and Patriotic funds, or otherwise.

The Hutterites live in colonies of from 80 to 140 each, or thereabouts. Each colony lives in one large house, taking their meals in one room, holding and cultivating their land in common, etc., and owing to their convictions and methods of living, are never likely to become good Canadian citizens or desirable settlers.

Businessmen's Confidence In G. T. P. Vice-President.
 The businessmen of Prince Rupert in their Board of Trade yesterday passed a resolution of confidence in W. P. Hinton, general manager and vice-president of the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway. Some flattering things were said of him, and, curiously enough, there is nobody of any importance who has any other story to tell.

Mr. Hinton is popular with his employees as well as with the general public. He has the happy knack of frankness and makes it clear that he knows what he is talking about, that he is master of the situation and that he intends to take no unfair advantage of his position.

SUGGEST ASSAYERS AT DIFFERENT POINTS

Free Miners' League Makes Suggestions to Minister of Lands To Encourage Mining.

The following memorial has been forwarded to Hon. T. D. Pattullo, Minister of Lands and member for Prince Rupert:

"It is suggested by the Free Miners' League of Prince Rupert that the Minister of Mines appoint licensed assayers at central points throughout the province.

"Furthermore, that the holder of a Free Miners' Certificate, when purchasing his license, receive at the same time, say, five assay coupons, and that these coupons when presented to the assayer appointed for that particular district, will secure for the free miner tests of ore samples at one half of the charges now prevailing, and that the assayer be reimbursed by the Government for the difference in said charges.

"The proposed coupons to be valid for the year of issue only, bearing the name and number of the respective licensees, and to be non-transferable."

OVER three hundred thousand teen-age boys are growing up to replace the wastage of Canada's man-power in the war, and to "carry on" as her future citizens. What work of reconstruction—financial, industrial, or commercial—is so vital to the nation as the reconstruction of Canada's Manhood!

Canada lost 60,383 men in the great war, and 156,799 men were wounded. More than ever is it important that the growing boys of this country be efficient, manly and be inspired with true ideals of Canadian Citizenship. Literally is it true that Canada's future depends upon her boys.

Red Triangle Campaign
\$1,100,000 May 5th to 9th

In co-operation with the Churches the Young Men's Christian Association is extending its service to Canadian boys. The Y.M.C.A. is essentially an institution for boys, and a large proportion of its work since its first establishment has been with boys.

What the Y.M.C.A. is Doing for Boys

There are four phases to human development—physical, intellectual, spiritual and social. The Y.M.C.A., in close co-operation with churches and Sunday schools systematizes the development of boys in each of these four phases by what is called "The Canadian Standard Efficiency Training." A boy is "charted" and his development is noted periodically. His record helps the Y.M.C.A. to supply the training he needs most to bring him up to the efficiency standard. With his record chart before him the boy is inspired to improve the faculties wherein he is deficient and to make himself a "four-square man."

Y.M.C.A. wants to reach out to these boys by way of athletic meets week-end camps and social work in the industries, the shops, and factories. Problems such as gambling, industrial relationships, thrift, home relationship, sex education, etc., will thus be dealt with.

"Underprivileged" boys are those whose environment has been poor, boys who have had little opportunity for mental, physical, religious, or social development. The Y.M.C.A. wants to help these boys, by increasing their interests in wholesome sports and games, attracting them to the Y.M.C.A.'s and the Churches, inculcating in them and in the boys born of foreign parents, Canadian ideals of citizenship.

What Makes the Four-Square Man

PHYSICAL TRAINING of boys includes camp craft, health education, swimming, running, jumping, throwing, basket ball and other team and group games.

INTELLECTUAL TRAINING includes supplementary school or college work, direction of home reading, educational lectures, practice in public speaking, sex education, craftsmanship and woodcraft training.

SPIRITUAL TRAINING supplements and supports the work of churches and other religious bodies; it spreads the ideal of daily prayer and scripture readings among boys; it inspires interest in nature, in music, in things artistic.

SOCIAL TRAINING gives the boy an idea of his duty towards others, inculcates ideals of clean speech, clean sport, clean habits, teaches good citizenship and helps a boy choose his life work to best advantage to himself and to society.

The "Y" in High Schools

The Y.M.C.A. recognizes the great field for reaching teen-age boys found in the high schools, and is promoting the establishment of activities in that field. In the High Schools committees and "Boys' Cabinets" are organized and programmes put into operation to stimulate scholarship, inspire purpose, encourage clean speech, clean sport, and clean habits, to direct towards their true vocation in life boys who are "drifting," and to develop manliness and character.

Many boys are forced by circumstances to leave school and begin the battle of life before they are fully equipped. The

Red Triangle in Rural Life

The Y.M.C.A., in co-operation with the churches and other social organizations, is carrying the Red Triangle to the boys on the farm, the boys in the villages and small towns which lack Y.M.C.A. buildings and equipment. The Y.M.C.A. organizes these Church groups and others to carry on active work to interest, entertain, instruct and develop boys; trains their leaders and stimulates and supervises.

The Y.M.C.A., in co-operation with the churches, will hold conferences and camps this year to train leaders in Boys' Work, and in Canadian Standard Efficiency Training methods. These men will go back to their own communities equipped to "carry on." From 18,000 to 20,000 delegates will attend these conferences throughout the Dominion.

The "Father and Son Movement," by which fathers and their boys are brought together in sympathetic relationship is another branch of useful Y.M.C.A. work.

All Y.M.C.A. work is fundamentally religious, and by reaching the boys the Y.M.C.A. reaches men. Fifty per cent. of the Y.M.C.A. work for boys is done in the churches and the proportion is growing.

Helps Boys to Choose Vocation

The "Find Yourself" campaign of the Y.M.C.A. has helped many a boy to analyse his natural abilities and circumstances so as to make the most of himself and his opportunities. A boy is examined and advised what he is fitted for and what amount of education, time and expense is necessary to attain vocations for which he may be suited. In that way he is helped to make an intelligent choice.

For Canada's Girlhood

The Dominion Council of the Young Women's Christian Association has to do with the supervision, promotion and stimulation of all the varied national and local activities of the Y.W.C.A., including the work of caring for the soldiers' wives and dependents coming to Canada from overseas. The Y.W.C.A. budget for Dominion Council purposes this year amounts to \$175,000, and it is planned to set aside that amount from the total objective of the Red Triangle Campaign for the purposes of developing Y.W.C.A. work for Canada's girlhood along somewhat similar lines to those followed for boys.

The expenditure of the Dominion Council of the Y.W.C.A. comprises items for the promotion and superintendence of Immigration and Travelers' Aid, under which head comes the work of caring for soldiers' dependents on the boats and trains; the direction of local Associations in the cities; supervision of Y.W.C.A. girls at work on fruit and dairy farms during the summer; extension of Y.W.C.A. work into the Country districts, and many other forms of service for Canadian girls.

Help the "Y" complete its work for soldiers; help extend "Y" service to Canadian boys; help bring the Red Triangle to the Army of Industry and to Rural Canadian Life.

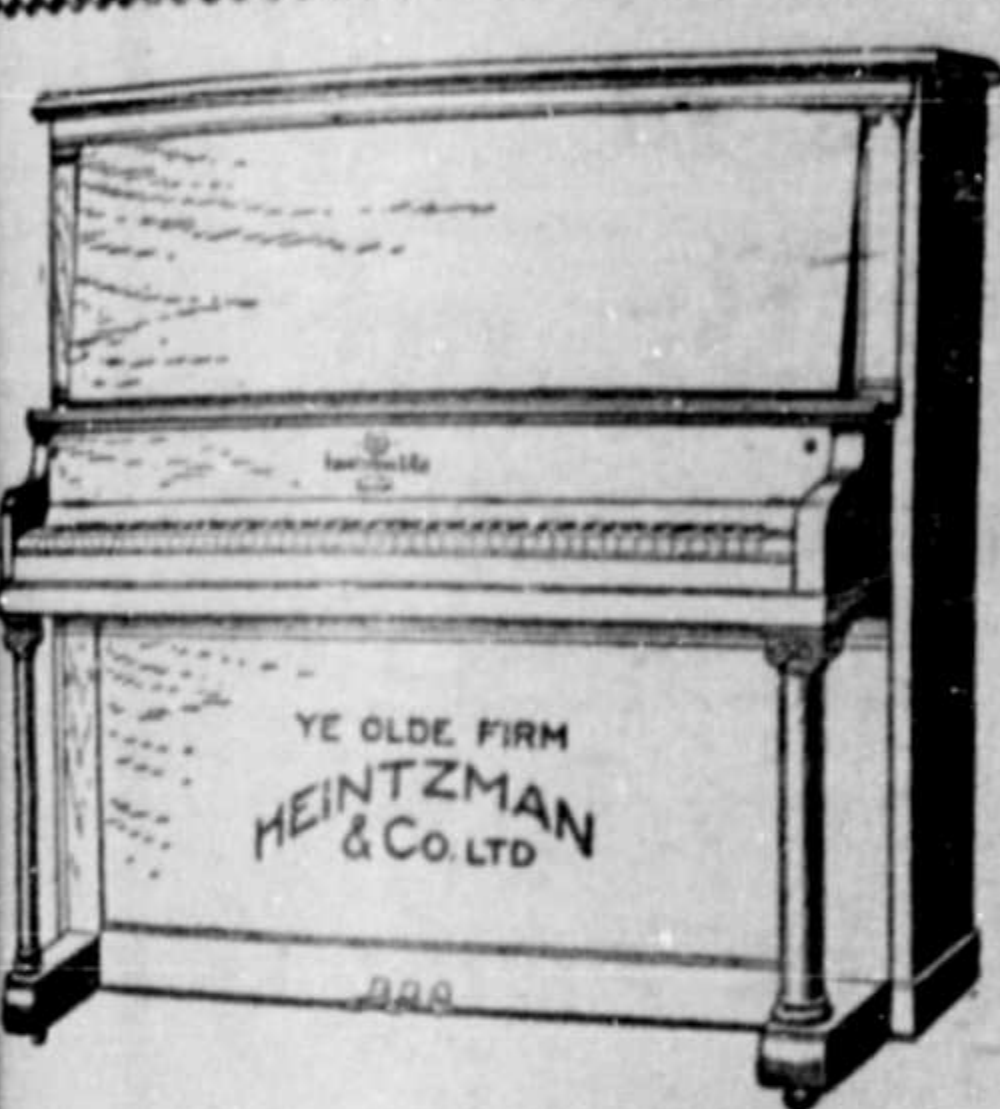

WATER ACT, 1914.
 RIPARIAN RIGHTS

NOTICE is hereby given that under the provisions of section 6 of the Water Act, 1914, every riparian proprietor claiming right to divert water or to the exclusive use of water for any purpose by virtue of his being such riparian proprietor is required on or before the first day of June, 1920, to file a statement of claim setting forth the particulars of his claim. Such statements of claim shall be filed in duplicate with the Water Recorder of the Water District in which the water is diverted or used.

After the first day of June, 1920, no right to divert water or to the exclusive use of water for any purpose shall exist by virtue of any ownership of land, unless the statement of claim has been filed in duplicate with the Water Recorder of the Water District in which the water is diverted or used.

Forms of statement of claim can be obtained from the Water Recorder of several Water Districts in the Province of British Columbia, and from the Parliament Buildings, Victoria, B. C.
