STRIKE LEADERS WILLING TO TALK SETTLEMENT IN THE WINNIPEG LABOR TROUBLE

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Winnipeg, May 21.—Strike leaders are showing a willingness to talk settlement. Citizens are recruiting a vigilance force which is being enrolled to serve in case of trouble and the G. W. V. A. has announced its president from Ottawa.
The railway passenger service is being maintained and the Federal ministers are expected to arrive Thursday, but it is understood they have no definite plan or powers. Great confidence is expressed, however, that Hon. Gideon Robertson, who has settled a number of former strikes, will be successful in this case.
The leading strike developments today came in the form of a conference between union delegates and Premier Norris and other officers regarding the officially announced willingness of the union men to discuss settlement of the strike on the basis of a general union, and degotiation and reinstatement of all idle members who were employed prior to the general strike.

FINED \$200 FOR CONDUCTING STILL

Moonshine and Paraphernalia are Seized by Constables Bailey and Adams.

Last night Constables Bailey and Adams raided the premises of Marie Ramano, 8th Ave., and seized 2 stills, three quarts of moonshine, one barrel of fermenting liquor, one quart of "mother's wine," one box raisins and all the paraphernalia necessary for the manufacture of intoxicating liquor.
The accused was brought before Mayor T. McClymont and W. E. Collison in the police court this morning, with W. E. Fisher for the prosecution and L. W. Patmore for the defence, and fined \$200 after pleading guilty, or in default, six months.

PEACE TERMS TOO LIGHT, SAYS BARON

French Minister of Blockade Resigns as Protest Against too Generous Treatment of Germany.

(Special by G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Paris, May 21.—Baron Denys Cochin, former Minister of Blockade, has resigned from the right group in the Chamber of Deputies after a meeting of the group, at which it was decided to send a note to Premier Clemenceau criticising the peace treaty.
In a letter addressed to Le Temps, Baron Denys Cochin says he considers the treaty too generous and unworthy of France and her allies. "If it weighs heavily upon Germany," he said, "it is because Germany's crimes were big and that her reparation must be costly."

OPPOSITION TO THE BOLSHEVIKI

New Government Set Up in Hungary Under Count Jules Karolyi.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Basel, May 20.—Count Jules Karolyi, nephew of the former premier of Hungary, has set up a government in opposition to the Bolsheviki and has issued a manifesto in which he proposes to restore law and order and says that the Entente powers have been advised of his action.

MOUNTED POLICE OPEN NEW OFFICE

Inspector Ackland of the Royal North West Mounted Police, and Sergeant Cope have taken charge of their new office in the old B. N. A. Bank building on Second Avenue. They expect to have a number of men who will be stationed at different points throughout the district, which includes the whole of northern British Columbia.
Prince Rupert is headquarters for the north, which is a sub-district reporting to the headquarters at Vancouver.

People at Lac La Biche Forced to Save Themselves by Taking Shelter in Lake.

Lac La Biche, Alta., Lac La Biche village is in ashes and the entire district is homeless. The condition of the people is perilous. A forest fire swept over the district and the townspeople saved their lives only by herculean efforts. The people were forced into the lake and all their homes and belongings and buildings were wiped out.
The government is rushing relief northward.

GENERAL STRIKE MAY BE CALLED IN CALGARY IN SYMPATHY WITH WINNIPEG

MINERS ALREADY OUT IN THAT CITY ON ORDER OF UNITED MINE WORKERS—DISPUTE OVER HOURS AND WAGES OF SURFACE MEN

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Calgary, May 21.—A general strike may be called here. The miners are already out and an order has been issued by the district officials of District 18, United Mine Workers, for a general strike of all members in the district to take effect at once.

The dispute is over the hours and wages of surface men affected by the recent order of Commissioner Armstrong. The commissioner and the Government have been persistent in their refusal to reconsider their action and the miners have decided to walk out. However, the effect of the strike is not very great at present as very few of the miners are working.
Executives of labor unions in Calgary will meet tomorrow night to take a strike vote in sympathy with Winnipeg. Recommendation for this was made at a meeting of the Trades and Labor Council this evening.



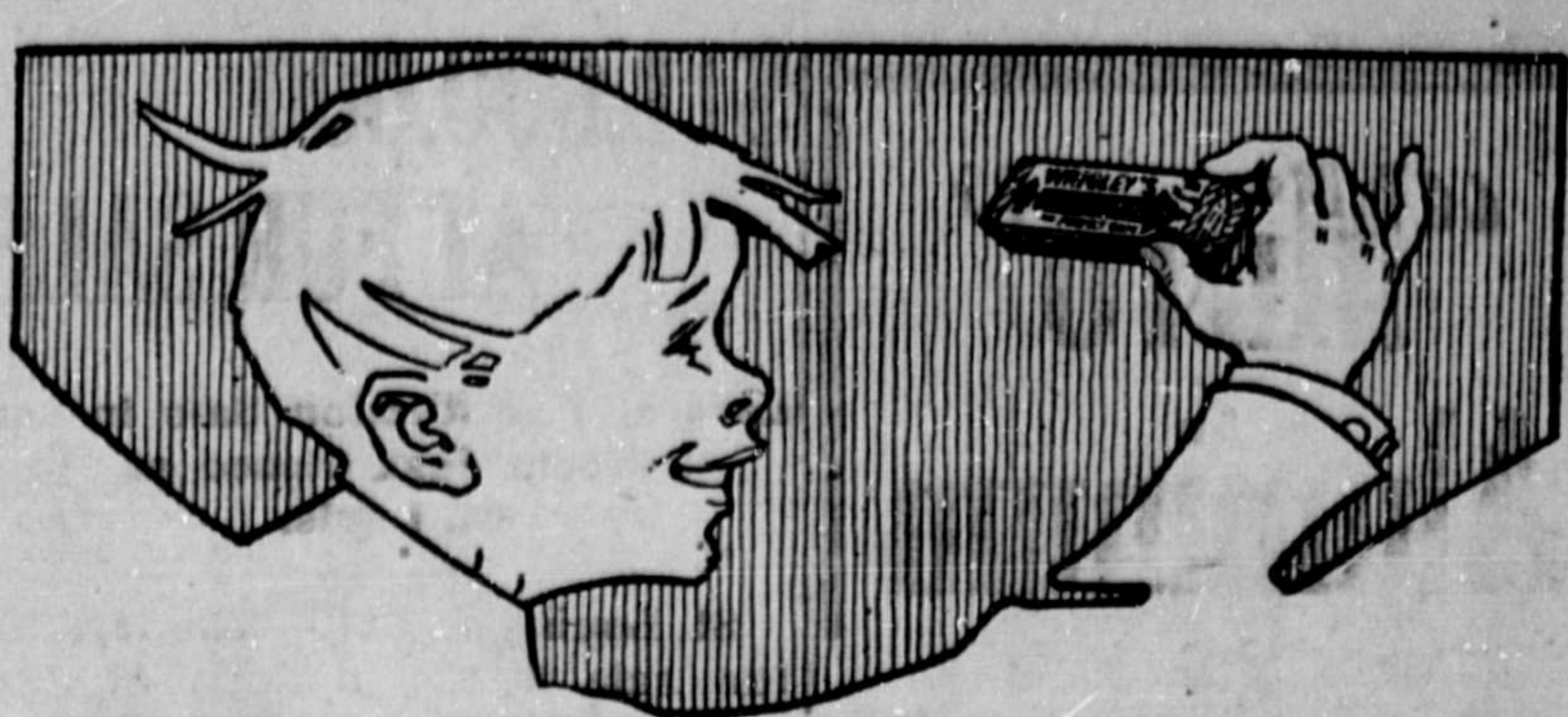

\$11,000,000 AT FUR SALE

Largest Fur Auction Sale in the World Just Closed at St. Louis.

St. Louis, May 21.—The largest fur sale in the history of the world has just closed at the International Fur Exchange. The total sales for the two weeks was \$10,998,838. With the close of this sale St. Louis maintains its distinction as being the leading fur market of the world.

The applause was deafening when the last lot of furs were sold, and when Col. Philip B. Fouke, president of the International Fur Exchange, thanked the assembled buyers for their close co-operation, generous bidding and hearty attitude during the prolonged session.

"The greatest fur sale ever known has passed into history," said Kouke, "and right here a few comments may be pertinent.

"The fur trade is an excellent and most reliable barometer of national prosperity. The jewelry trade, which is so often quoted as the criterion by which the general state of business may be judged, is by no means so dependent upon national prosperity as is the fur trade. FARM LOANS for SOLDIERS




How Returned Men Can Become Farmers

EVERY returned man who wants to become a farmer and is qualified for that vocation can get real, practical help through the Soldier Settlement Board.

The Government's programme includes:—

- (1) The securing of land.
- (2) The loaning of capital needed to purchase equipment and live stock, and erect buildings.
- (3) Agricultural training and farm supervision.

The Loans Granted

Loans may be approved by the Loan Advisory Committee, according to the needs of the settler, on the following basis:—

- (1) Up to \$4,500 on the purchase of land.
- (2) Up to \$2,000 on the purchase of live stock, implements and other equipment.
- (3) Up to \$1,000 on the erection of buildings and other permanent improvements.

The first and third are repayable in twenty-five equal annual instalments; the second in four equal annual instalments beginning the third year, no interest being charged for the first two years.

On all these loans the low interest rate of five per cent. will be charged. A cash payment of ten per cent. of the purchase price will be required on the land—but this may be waived by the Board in special cases.

Qualified settlers on Dominion lands may secure loans up to a maximum of \$3,000 on a plan similar to the above for farm equipment, live stock, and erection of buildings, provided security offered justifies the loan.

To Whom Granted

To be entitled to these privileges a man must have served with an honourable record in the Canadian, Imperial, or British Colonial forces in an actual theatre of war or outside of the country in which he enlisted (service in U.S. or Bermuda not included). Others eligible are:

A British subject who lived in Canada before the War and who was on active service with the Allied Forces in an actual theatre of war.

A member of the Canadian Expeditionary Force who served in Canada only, but is in receipt of a pension for disability occasioned by such service.

These benefits are also granted to widows of such men.

A Broad Policy

All soldiers whose best interests will be served by taking up farms will be assisted. Only suitable land will be approved. That is (a) land that is near to existing railways or organized communities; (b) land that will make money for the soldier; (c) land that will provide a first-class home.

CRONIN GETS BUSY ON MINE DEVELOPMENT

Will Personally Direct Operations—Material is Arriving at Points Along Line.

After spending the past winter at his home in Spokane, James Cronin returned to Smithers this week and is more enthusiastic than ever over the mining possibilities of this section in general, and hopeful for good results as a consequence of the work to start immediately on his Bonanza property in the Babines, and on the Emerald group in the Sibola country, Says the Interior News. Mr. Cronin is accompanied by his son.

The first work to be undertaken by Mr. Cronin on the Bonanza will consist of getting operations resumed on the new tunnel to connect with the big vein and tapping a couple of other showings en route and giving them a thousand feet of depth at the contact.

Last fall a contract was awarded to Emil Olson to drive four hundred feet of this new work, and a good start was made before it was necessary to close down camp owing to the difficulty of getting supplies over the trail. Olson reached Smithers on Monday to make plans for the Babine work.

Getting Material.
 Mr. Cronin's personal direction will be given to the preliminary work and development of the Emerald property. Tonight's freight will bring a quantity of supplies and material and Mr. Cronin will leave early in the coming week for Burns Lake, from which point he will direct and start the transport of material to the mine for the crew to be engaged all summer. The Francois-Otsa-Tahtsa waterway will be utilized to a point near Emerald lake, and from there the first crew to be taken in will start to cut trail to the Emerald group on Sweeney mountain.

Mr. Cronin has high expectations from the Emerald, and is

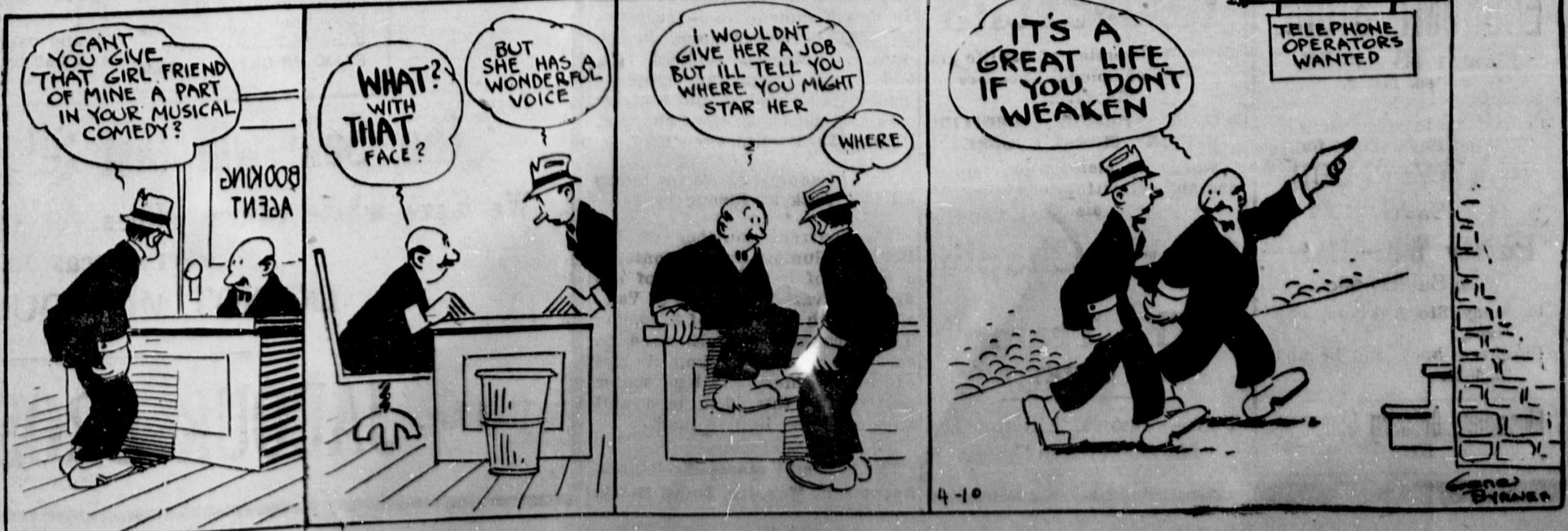
