"Even before the war a dirigible airship maintained a regular passenger service between Frankfort and Berlin for two years, Prince Rupert, B. Statesman Owns Own Aeroplane.

"The British Government has allowed no less than three hundred million dollars in the estimates for the coming year for air service, of which ten million dollars has been set aside for experimental research and civil aviation. Bonar Law owns his own aeroplane which is used for his frequent visits to Paris, and there is a regular daily service of a 17-passenger Handley-Page machine between London and Paris. Although at present aerial transport is a distinctly expensive matter, the progress being made both in aeroplanes and dirigibles is so rapid that it is quite in order for a company such as the Canadian Pacific to be ready to enter the field as soon as air transportation comes within the range of practical politics.

Fog is Airmen's Greatest Enemy.

"Although there are areas in Canada which will for a long time present difficulties, particularly to aeroplanists, there are you were the assessed owner thereof. other areas which conform to the requirements of the experts. Take for instance the western prairies, which offer the conditions described by General Seeley as vital, namely, that they are regions 'where there are wide spaces with almost complete absence of the airman's real enemy-mist and fog-not wind.' 

Largest Fur Auction Sale in the World Just Closed at St. Louis.

St. Louis, May 21.—The largest fur sale in the history of the world has just closed at the International Fur Exchange. The total sales for the two weeks was 10,998,838. With the close of this sale St. Louis maintains its distinction as being the leading fur market of the world.

The applause was deafening when the last lot of furs were sold, and when Col. Philip B. Fouke, president of the International Fur Exchange, thanked the assembled buyers for their close co-operation, generous bidding and hearty attitude during the prolonged session.

"The greatest fur sale ever known has passed into history," said Kouke, "and right here a few comments may be pertinent.

"The fur trade is an excellent and most reliable barometer of national prosperity. The jewelry trade, which is so often quoted as the criterion by which the general state of business may be judged, is by no means so dependent upon national prosperity as is the fur trade. Jewelry is purchased for so many reasons not at all connected with finances that it scarce offers a fixed standard by which to estimate.

Furs a Necessity.

But furs are not in the luxury class-opinion of our lawmakers to the contrary notwithstanding. They are a necessity during certain seasons of the year in many parts of the country. When finances are easy the fur trade prospers; when finances are depressed the fur trade is one of the first to feel the pinch. Furs are assuredly the mercury in the thermometer of trade.

"Therefore, the record prices paid for most furs, and the phenomenal prices paid for a few at the spring sale just closed give emphatic testimony to the general prosperity of the country at large. When it is borne in mind that the sale was open to public auction, that no man paid more than he had a mind to for any lot, that each and every buyer must see his money coming back from those purchases with a due and just amount of profit added, then the prices paid are clear indications of the prosperous condition of trade in general through

out the country. All Countries.

"Not only was there a record attendance from the ranks of American and Canadian fur dealers, but representatives from London, Paris, Amsterdam, Norway and Sweden, a few Russians, several from Siberia, a delegation from Japan, some from several sections of Australia and from South America likewise, registered and participated busily in the sale, paying good prices throughout. All of those foreigners took I freely of our American furs, some choice Alaska sealskins, Hudson Bay sables, mink, skunk, beaver, civet, silver fox, blue fox and other characteristically North American furs, finding appreciation in their estimation."

How Returned Men Can Become Farmers

LVERY returned man who wants to become a farmer and is qualified for that vocation can get real, practical help through the Soldier Settlement Board.

The Government's programme includes:-

- (1) The securing of land.
- (2) The loaning of capital needed to purchase equipment and live stock, and erect build-
- (3) Agricultural training and farm supervision.

The Loans Granted

Loans may be approved by the Loan Advisory Committee, according to the needs of the settler, on the following basis:-

- (1) Up to \$4,500 on the purchase of land.
- (2) Up to \$2,000 on the purchase of live stock, implements and other equipment.
- (3) Up to \$1,000 on the erection of buildings and other permanent improvements.

The first and third are repayable in twenty-five equal annual instalments; the second in four equal annual instalments beginning the third year, no interest being charged for the first two years.

On all these loans the low interest rate of five per cent. will be charged. A cash payment of ten per cent. of the purchase price will be required on the land—but this may be waived by the Board in special cases.

Qualified settlers on Dominion lands may secure loans up to a maximum of \$3,000 on a plan similar to the above for farm equipment, live stock, and erection of buildings, provided security offered justifies the loan.

To Whom Granted

To be entitled to these privileges a man must have served with an honourable record in the Canadian, Imperial, or British Colonial forces in an actual theatre of war or outside of the country in which he enlisted (service in U.S. or Bermuda not included). Others eligible are:

A British subject who lived in Canada before the War and who was on active service with the Allied Forces in an actual theatre of war.

A member of the Canadian Expeditionary Force who served in Canada only, but is in receipt of a pension for disability occasioned by such service.

These benefits are also granted to widows of such men.

A Broad Policy

All soldiers whose best interests will be served by taking up farms will be assisted. Only suitable land will be approved. That is (a) land that is near to existing railways or organized communities; (b) land that will make money for the soldier; (c) land that will provide a first class home.

In addition to these advantages the Board has planned a system of collective purchase, so that it can guarantee settlers the best value obtainable anywhere in live stock, implements, lumber, and other needs. It will also assist soldier settlers with advice and supervision, if necessary, in the management of their activities, so that the best results will be obtained.



The Francois-Ootsa-Tahtsa waterway will be utilized to a point near Emerald lake, and from there the first crew to be taken in will start to cut trail to the Emerald group on Sweeney mountain.


