T. D. Paterson is Elected in Delta

PRINCE RUPERT IS UNDER VICTORIA OFFICE IN DOMINION PUBLIC WORKS

Prince Rupert Public Works Office is to Remain Closed

Delta District has been Added to That of Vancouver Island with J. P. Forde of Nelson in Charge at Victoria; Nelson Remains Open

VANCOUVER, February 4.—(Special)—In connection with reorganization of the Federal Government departments which is being carried out, the Prince Rupert public works office will be closed permanently and the administration of the Skeena District and the northwestern part of the province will be added to the Vancouver Island district with office at Victoria and J. P. Forde of Nelson in charge.

Due to the influence of R. F. Green, the member for West Vancouver, who has always had a strong influence with the Government as a Conservative of the old school, the Nelson office will remain open, in spite of the fact that it was marked for closure.

The official notification in regard to the changes is that they are made in the interests of economy and efficiency.

Liberal Elected by a Large Majority

T. D. Paterson Chosen in Delta by Lead of 600; Government Seven to Good in B.C. Legislature

GLOVERDALE, February 4.—T. D. Paterson, Liberal, was elected in Delta constituency yesterday by a majority of approximately six hundred. F. J. A. Mackenzie, the defeated candidate, was also defeated in the general election in December, but on two previous occasions carried the constituency.

In the December election the figures were Oliver 1,334, Mackenzie 1,116, and Payne 1,107, the plurality of Oliver over Mackenzie being 218.

The present standing of the parties in the Legislature which meets on Tuesday will be Liberals 27, Conservatives 13, Independents, including Socialists and Soldier-Farmers, 7. This gives the Government a clear majority of seven over all others, and several of the independents will support the Government on their general policy.

Satisfactory Win
Delta Constituency.

The victory for the Government in the Delta constituency by a large majority is a most satisfactory result. While a defeat there would have made no material difference at present, it would have made the life of the Government more precarious than it will now be. As it stands the majority will be sufficient to carry on without danger of a snap verdict being secured in the House. It is assured now that for the next four or five years at any rate, the present Provincial Government will carry on. This will make for stability and will give an opportunity to make good the promises in Prince Rupert district especially in regard to the erection of the Government Buildings.

There was an idea prevalent in many quarters that if there had been only two candidates in the field in each constituency, the Oliver Government would have been defeated. The outcome in Delta shows that this was not likely to have been the case. With two in the field the Government was stronger than with three.

Rumor Regarding
Steamers Interesting.

The rumor which came through on the wire from Vancouver yesterday and which is supplemented today in regard to the Prince George and Prince Rupert going off the run and being used elsewhere aroused a lot of interest yesterday, but as there is no information available of an authentic nature, it is useless to speculate on possibilities. It will be noted, however, that there was a somewhat similar rumor last year, and there is usually something behind these rumors. We hardly need to worry over the matter for if the G. T. P. does not give us a service, some other line will do so. We have a lot of business to offer and there is no doubt at all but we shall be well served with steamers.

Train Service
To Be Improved.

The official announcement is that we shall get back our through train service as far as Winnipeg. That is a concession for which we must be thankful. We shall no longer be a spur line, exactly. We must get busy and use every means to develop our resources and then we shall undoubtedly get a proper service. If the railway will co-operate with us, especially in regard to refer, cars it will help a lot, and that we are now expecting them to do.

Must Beware of
Insularity.

There is a tendency in an isolated community like this to get the idea that we are the whole thing and that the adjacent districts are of no particular account. This is one of the things we have to beware of. We must not become insular or conceited. We have to remember that our success depends wholly on the development of the district of which we are a part. Our district extends from the Queen Charlottes on one side to Prince George on the other and from Queen Charlotte Sound on the south to the Alaska boundary and the Yukon on the north. In all this great district there is steady progress being made. We must take an interest in all the developments and try to get the viewpoint of the people who live in the outlying sections.

Like to See an
Excursion Next Summer.

We would like to see arrangements made for an excursion under the auspices of the Board of Trade or some other organization which would give local business and professional people an opportunity to see the wonderful valleys of the interior, the mines of the north or the islands to the west. Some few Prince Rupert people have visited these places but most of them have not and it would be an education for them to find out what is being done there.

The table given is for Port Simpson but the time for Prince Rupert varies only a few minutes on some days and on others is the same. The range of the tide may be computed as 5 per cent greater at Prince Rupert than at Port Simpson both at springs and neaps. Therefore the rise in the Prince Rupert harbor is slightly greater than Port Simpson.

The height is in feet and tenths of feet above the average level of lower low water.

GRANBY WINS
COAL CASES

Has to Pay \$30,000 for 200 Acres of Coal Lands; Appeal Entered

VANCOUVER, Feb. 4.—The Granby Consolidated Mining, Smelting & Power Co. yesterday almost entirely won its two appeal cases against the decision of Mr. Justice Gregory in favor of the E. & N. Railway Co., seriously affecting the rights of Granby in its coal operations on Vancouver Island.

In the judgments Granby wins absolutely in what is known as the Dunlop case and provincial legislation in this regard is upheld.

In the Ganner case the title to the property is found to be invested in the Granby Company, but in the case for the assessment of damages in respect of coal rights, these shall be considered as to coal "in nature." The outside price at this rate is set at \$150 an acre, so that in respect to the total 200 acres the outside amount of the claim that Granby may have to settle is \$30,000.

Notice of an appeal to the Privy Council has been given.

COMMITTED SUICIDE

Chauffeur of Late King Alexander Took His Own Life

ATHENS, Feb. 4.—The late King Alexander's chauffeur, Mitso Dimitriadis, has committed suicide from grief over the death of the King, which, it will be recalled, was the result of a monkey's bite. Mitso was King Alexander's inseparable companion on all his automobile rides and motoring was the King's fad. Alexander was, perhaps, the most affable sovereign in Europe and had a talent of making everybody feel at home. He was always very kind to all the members of his household, but seemed more strongly attached to Mitso than to any of the others.

When Alexander fell death approaching he called Mitso to his bedside and gave him a small gold cross which the King had worn all his life. After the King's death, Mitso became inconsolable. The other night while contemplating a photograph of the King he shot himself. A wreath sent by Madame Manos, King Alexander's widow, was one of the floral offerings at his funeral.

NO TRAVEL BETWEEN
HOLLAND AND SERBIA

THE HAGUE, Feb. 4.—The rupture of diplomatic relations between Holland and Jugoslavia has resulted in the virtual prohibition of travel of Dutchmen in Serbia. The Jugoslav government has announced it will not grant visas to Hollanders.

The break occurred over alleged bad treatment of M. Rappaport, an Austrian subject, who was Dutch consul at Belgrade during the war. The Serbians contended he was an enemy subject, unfriendly and in effect a spy.



BOND HOUSE OPENS BRANCH IN THIS CITY

General Manager Here Arranges With Thomas McClymont to Handle Local Office.

Arthur Bernstein of the National Bond Corporation was in the city yesterday making arrangements for the opening of a branch office in this city and the agency has been taken by ex-Mayor McClymont who will have charge of the local affairs of this financial concern.

The company proposes to do here a general business in foreign exchange and will deal in Victory bonds, Canadian Government and municipal bonds, and all classes of good bonds and debentures. They will buy and sell drafts on all foreign countries and do everything which pertains to the operations of a good financial house.

The company, which sees in Prince Rupert a field for its operations, is a very strong one. It has its headquarters in Vancouver and has on its board of directors such well known and eminent men of business as Sir Douglas Cameron, K.C.M.G., Brig.-Gen. Sir Henry M. Pellatt, C.V.O., Sir John M. Gibson, K.C.M.G., K. G. C. A. Barnard, K.C., Brig.-Gen. J. Duff Stuart, Hon. Alex Henderson, K.C., J. S. Cowper, until recently member of the legislature for Vancouver and a former editor of this paper, Arthur F. Bernstein, general manager, Charles E. Campbell, and F. G. Elliot.

TAX PIANOS AND DOMESTIC SERVANTS

Paris Levies Lower Rate on Women Than Men Employees.

PARIS, Feb. 4.—This city has just been authorized to collect higher taxes on pianos and domestic servants. For the privilege of being managed by an automatic cook or a diplomatic maid, Parisian families will now have to pay 40 francs a year. If the servants are men the amount is doubled.

A sliding scale of 40 francs for one woman servant to 200 francs for five of them and from 80 to 500 francs for men servants is provided for in the bill. No provision is made for families having more than five servants, the law-maker probably holding this to be sufficient tax on the family's patience. Taxes and governesses are assessed 150 francs each.

The tax on pianos is to range from 50 to 60 francs. A mechanical piano will cost its owner the higher sum.

MAY SELL CHAMPAGNE WITHOUT ANY KICK

POOR CONDITION OF RUSSIAN RAILROADS

Leon Trotsky Says Engines and Cars Broken Down and Condition Terrible

LONDON, Feb. 4.—A Moscow wireless despatch reports that Leon Trotsky has resigned the position of Commissary of Communications and has been replaced by M. Yemshanyov.

At the recent Congress of Soviets, Trotsky said that the condition of Russian railroads was terrible. The number of broken-down locomotives and cars was growing and repairs were in a chaotic state.

He said repairs on locomotives were difficult because there were over 100 different types and it was difficult to collect the spare parts. He advocated no more than seven types of locomotives and suggested mass production.

"In order to begin our socialist economic system," he said, "we must sweep out all this monstrous motley of techniques and rule-of-thumb chaos which remains to us from the past, by means of standardization."

The fire brigade had a call at 6 o'clock last evening to the Smith Building where a small blaze caused by ashes being thrown against the side of the building was extinguished with little damage.

MEMBERS LEAVE FOR VICTORIA

Alex. Manson and H. F. Kergin Gone to Attend Session of Legislature.

Alex. Manson, the re-elected member for Omineca, and H. F. Kergin, the new member for Athin, left last night for Victoria where they will attend the session of the Legislature which opens Tuesday.

At the last session Mr. Manson was deputy speaker, and there is a possibility of his being chosen speaker to succeed John Keen, now clerk of the House. The Government has not as yet announced its plans in this connection, however. There was a rumor that Mrs. Ralph Smith would get the position, but she has also been mentioned as a likely member of the cabinet, sitting as president of the council without portfolio. This would be preliminary to giving her charge of a department.

In view of the large majority given Paterson in Delta, it is quite possible the Government may open the Vancouver constituency again and give Mrs. Smith a portfolio, possibly that of education.

LAWYERS MAY HELP KEEP MENTAL BALANCE

Address to Manitoba Bar Association by Edward Anderson, K.C.

WINNIPEG, Feb. 4.—"The lawyer by training, association and precedent should be able as no other profession or aggregation of bent to act as a balance wheel and bring the world back to sanity and right-mindedness," said Edward Anderson, K.C., president of the Manitoba Bar association, in the opening address before the annual convention of the association in the Fort Garry hotel.

He pointed out that a disregard of constitutional authority is prevalent and that every unbalanced mind promulgating some doctrine finds an audience. Hatred and jealousy, national and individual, are rampant, and it is difficult to keep a proper mental balance, he continued.

He was optimistic regarding conditions in Canada and the United States, and said that Bolshevism has less chance to make progress in a community where the great principles of common law are administered because people trained under this system have a high regard for precedent, tradition and constituted authority. Lawyers have always played a prominent part in governing society and their duty today is greater than ever before, he added.

SENATOR WOULD FORBID SMOKING

WASHINGTON, Feb. 4.—The president and even senators and representatives might have to take the streets to enjoy cigar, cigarette or a pipe as an aid to statesmanlike reflection, if a bill offered by Senator Smoot becomes law. It forbids smoking in government departments or "any independent establishment of the government" as a fire protection measure.

NORMAL BUYING IN THE SPRING

Industrial Canada says Conditions will Improve Soon, with Lumber Active

TORONTO, Feb. 4.—Canadian industry is facing the present price situation with courage and looks to the future with optimism. By the spring there should be a return to normal buying, according to the general view of Canadian manufacturers as expressed in the Canadian Products Annual Review Number of Industrial Canada, which constitutes a valuable symposium of industrial opinion. A revival of activity in the metal and iron and steel industries is anticipated by the Spring. The Vice-President of the Canadian Car and Foundry Company says that while financial conditions may delay the placing of orders for a time, it is felt that within the next two or three months these obstacles will be removed. If labor becomes settled, particularly in the building trades, the President of the Steel Company of Canada looks for a business revival shortly. The outlook of the pulp and paper industry is regarded as favorable, with the promise of largely increased production.

The President of the Laurentide Company says that all newsprint mills in the Dominion are contracted up to full capacity, and they have the assurance of the publishers that they expect to use the full amount of their contracts.

Motor Cars

In the automotive industries, T. A. Russell, President of Willys-Overland Limited, points out that 70 per cent of the cars now in use are business vehicles. "This," he says, "gives the motor car industry a confidence in its future, and manufacturers generally are looking forward to a gradually improving demand after the first of the year. There has also been a decided check on production in the last six months, and it takes so long to get under full production, when a break has been made, that quite a few keep observers expect to see an actual scarcity of motor cars during the months of March, April and May." Wm. M. Gray, Vice President of the Gray-Dort Motors, Ltd., is equally optimistic. As far as their plant is concerned, he regards the outlook for the 1921 market as "very favorable."

Shipbuilding

In the shipbuilding industry the situation is complex. With the reduction in prices of materials and the increasing efficiency of labor, prices are steadily coming down, and the managing director of Canadian Vickers, Ltd., Montreal, states that it is confidently predicted that with the further reductions, both in wages and materials, anticipated in the near future, prices will be so reduced as to enable Canada to compete in the open markets of the world, if exchange difficulties can be overcome. J. E. McLurg, of the Halifax Shipyards, however, sees no encouragement from the present situation and believes that by next July every shipbuilding plant in the country will be closed down for lack of orders.

Lumber Outlook

In the lumber industry the general opinion is that with the small production in recent months and with very much reduced stocks, the industry should experience a prosperous year. In the mining industry, while conditions on the whole are quiet, a revival of gold mining is anticipated in Ontario and British Columbia, and the Fort Norman oil discoveries of the Imperial Oil Company are fraught with great significance for the country.
