DAIL EIREANN DISCUSSES THE PEACE TREATY IN OPEN SESSSION

Fight in Irish Parliament Over Agreement with Britain Griffith and De Valera Speak

DUBLIN, Dec. 19.—Dail Eireann met in open session this morning for the consideration of the Irish agreement. The motion for the agreement was moved by Arthur Griffith and seconded by Commandant McKeown, one of the most famous of Irish Republican army leaders, who said "the Irish people voted the substance and not the shadows."

Immediately after the meeting began an argument arose as to whether a document introduced by de Valera at a private meeting last week should be introduced at this session.

FRENCH ORDER IS INSTITUTED

RIGHT OF DOMINIONS GIVES NO LICENSE, SAYS SIR A. STANLEY

LONDON, Dec. 19.—Sir Arthur Stanley, ex-governor of Victoria, in addressing a meeting of the Australian natives Association, held at Australia House on "Some Aspects of the Relations of Australia to the Mother Country," said that no sensible man in England would now question the right of the Dominions and the States within their borders to govern their own affairs, but he thought that Queensland was going too far in saying that because the City of London would not lend that state the money which it had asked for a short time ago they were attempting to interfere with the internal affairs of Queensland.

Surely the City of London was entitled to choose where it would invest its money. If it was considered that certain legislation which had been passed by Queensland detracted from the security of money lent to the state he was afraid they would have to do without the loan. But this was not an interference with the right of Queensland to control her own internal affairs. In the future the cause of international troubles would arise out of commercial questions—tariffs, emigration policies, and trade relations—and it was most important that the democracies of the British Empire should study trade relations and the effects of tariffs, emigration and trade restrictions imposed by one country upon the citizens of another.

The part to be played by the Dominions in the control of foreign policy, Sir Arthur Stanley said, would probably be solved in the future. He did not think the solution was to be found in an Empire Parliament or in the Dominions appointing their own diplomatic representatives at foreign Courts, but in strengthening the informal and the formal bonds between the Dominions and the Mother Country.

BOSTON, Dec. 19.—The 100-ton British schooner *Donald J. Cook* of Lunenburg has been burned off this coast. The crew were all saved.

ELECTED MEMBER OF PARLIAMENT DIED ON SUNDAY IN QUEBEC

LACHUËTE, Que., Dec. 17.—P. R. McGibbon, re-elected member of parliament for Argenteuil, died of pneumonia yesterday. He caught cold while watching a fire a week ago. Mr. McGibbon defeated D. Black, the Progressive candidate, and Thomas Christie, the Conservative, on December 6 in the election. He was first elected to the House of Commons in 1917, succeeding K. H. Perley, Conservative.

Route to Orient From Europe.

The statement made by the editor of The Pas Herald that the Hudson Bay waters are open all the year round comes as somewhat a surprise to many of us. He says he can back up his statement by reference to government reports, and that while there are ice floes in the bay and care is needed at certain seasons of the year to navigate the waters, yet there is no time of year when vessels are debarred from getting through. On the strength of this the Hudson Bay Railway has been built and the rails are laid on all except about seventy miles at the northerly end. This he expects to see completed in the near future, and then it will be for Prince Rupert and other points interested to unite to have the line operated to the best advantage direct from Port Nelson to Prince Rupert, with ships at either end carrying the passengers and freight to and from the Orient.

The idea is a fascinating one and is worthy of attention. We who live in Prince Rupert can readily understand how the practicability of the Hudson Bay route has been belittled in the past owing to the persistent propaganda of those who are opposed to the development of anything except the Montreal and Quebec routes. The C. P. R. certainly will not favor action to make the Hudson Bay port an active factor in transportation, any more than they have favored Prince Rupert and the Grand Trunk Pacific. It will be worth while for us to get the most up-to-date and reliable data in regard to the route and then to add our quota to the demand for its development.

Bank Merger to Save Failure.

Judging by the Canadian Press reports, the Merchants Bank has been merged with the Bank of Montreal to prevent failure. That such action can be taken is a great improvement on having the institution go into liquidation. The people are protected. Just what caused the trouble we here are not likely to know. It is possible the big failures of businesses in the east have made big drains on the concern. If people closely associated with the bank have been mixed up in the failure, the people of the country should be told of it. One of the dangers of our banking system seems to be that directors of the bank are men who are in business in a big way and who borrow largely. Because they are directors of the bank the corporations with which they are connected get special borrowing privileges, and special borrowing privileges lead to speculative business with eventual collapse. Possibly none of these things have affected the Merchants Bank, but whatever it is there ought to be a probe to bring it to light so that troubles of that kind may be avoided in future. The people's money is in the bank and the people have a right to an assurance that it is safe.

By means of the merger many economies will be brought about. Duplication will be avoided, and no doubt the bigger institution will be strengthened by the amalgamation. There is a steady extension going on all the time by the Bank of Montreal. This sudden extension will bring more business for the amount of outlay than will the opening of new branches and will make the Bank of Montreal a very strong institution, probably the strongest in Canada.

Build Well for The Future.

In addressing the Edmonton Board of Trade a few days ago President Tory of the University of Alberta urged that business men build their businesses and their city on solid foundations with the idea of permanence. "Stand together for a common purpose," he urged. "Build, not for today, but for the future. Be honest and straightforward in your business methods. Go forward step by step for the development of this city and this province."

Western cities grow up in a very different manner from the way the old English cities were built. Over there they had some commercial beginning and grew up slowly. They were free from the complicated problems and civic institutions which are peculiar to the growing city of today.

A unity of purpose, the speaker said, characterized the builders of the cities of England. There was a magnificent spirit of unity gripping the builders, and that community spirit—the spirit of loyalty to the locality—was the thing that made the cities of the old country permanent and abiding. The cities were built with the idea of permanency, and that word can be seen written across all the institutions of all the great cities of the old world.

The new western city bears the marks of having been built only for the present, and everywhere there are signs of the builders having only the self-seeking thought in mind. The idea had been prevalent in the past that the city was the place to make all the money one could, and then move on to some other place and do the same thing. The very pavements of Edmonton and the direction of the street car lines, the doctor said, were illustrations of the self-seeking spirit, and he urged the Board of Trade to get in mind and instill into others in the building of the city the idea of permanency. The great commercial centres of the world have all been built on honesty and straightforward methods of business.

What applies to Edmonton applies equally to Prince Rupert. There is too much of the idea of making money for the purpose of moving away instead of building up a city that will be a credit to the community and where there will be innumerable happy homes. That is the ideal.

ASK CHANGES IN ALBERTA

Municipal Councils in Convention Pass Important Resolution.

EDMONTON, Dec. 19.—The abolition of the present system of school taxation and control by local school trustees, and the substitution of a general plan of municipal school boards to have charge of all educational matters within each municipality, will be urged upon the government as the result of a resolution to this effect passing in the convention of Alberta rural municipalities.

The convention also decided to ask for legislation requiring the use of wide bench sleighs in the province and the prohibition of the sale of sleighs narrower than the standard width of wheeled vehicles, after the first of October, 1922. This resolution has been turned down for the last year or two by the convention, but after a desultory floor fight it was endorsed by a vote of 87 to 71. The resolution was a facsimile of the one proposed by the Edmonton Automobile and Good Roads Association.

Another important resolution carried during the morning was one asking for the simplification and consolidation of municipal statutes along the lines suggested to the convention previously by John D. Hunt, clerk of the executive council. Deputy Minister of Municipal Affairs J. H. Lamb, who got a splendid reception from the convention after his speech, characterized this resolution as one unprecedented in the nature of western organizations by reason of its advanced demands, and while conceding the right of the municipal association to thus insist on matters of legislation, pointed out that this new status of greater self-determination must also carry with it a greater degree of local autonomy and local responsibility on the part of the municipal officials.

BOOTLEGGERS ARE SHIVERING

New U. S. Commissioner at Ketchikan Deals Out Justice Without Fear.

KETCHIKAN, Dec. 19.—Arthur Fox, the new United States commissioner of Ketchikan, made the bootleggers shiver when he passed sentence on the first bootlegger to appear before him since he took office. It was Frank Morillas who pleaded guilty to selling hootch in the California Coffee House. He was sentenced to three months in the federal jail and was fined \$250.

Following the cleanup made on the night before last, officers last night again made some arrests for alleged sales of booze. John Goddard of the Club Gigar Store, Frank Reno of the Hub, Birdie Clark of the red light district and Dan McDonald of the Panhandle were the victims.

The complaints in all four cases allege that the defendants on Tuesday night sold drinks of liquor to Officers Wilson and Wainwright, who had arrived in town from the north but a few hours before.

Reports coming from Juneau are that these arrests are but the start of a number that are to be made in the campaign against bootlegging.

In the commissioner's court three of the women arrested, Birdie Clark, Lena Bell and Rose Burke, pleaded guilty to charges of selling liquor and each was fined \$100 and costs.

LATE JAS. DUNSMUIR'S ENGLISH ESTATE WAS VERY VALUABLE ONE

The probate of the will of the late James Dunsmuir of Hatley Park, Victoria, in so far as his English estate is concerned, was recently confirmed in London, showing personal estate in that country in addition to his Canadian property valued at over a million and a half dollars. The London Times mention of the probate is as follows:

The Hon. James Dunsmuir of Hatley Park, Esquimalt, Vancouver Island, British Columbia, a former premier and lieutenant-governor of the colony, lately president and chief stock owner of the Wellington Colliery Company, and a former president of the Esquimalt and Nanaimo Railway, who died on June 6, aged 68, left personal estate in the United Kingdom valued at £326,346 8s. 6d. The total value of the property is not stated, nor is the value of that in British Columbia.

Probate of his will, dated October 15, 1917, has been confirmed in London in favor of his widow, the Hon. Mrs. Laura Miller Dunsmuir, of the same address, and of Hyde Park Square, London W., to whom he left all his property absolutely.

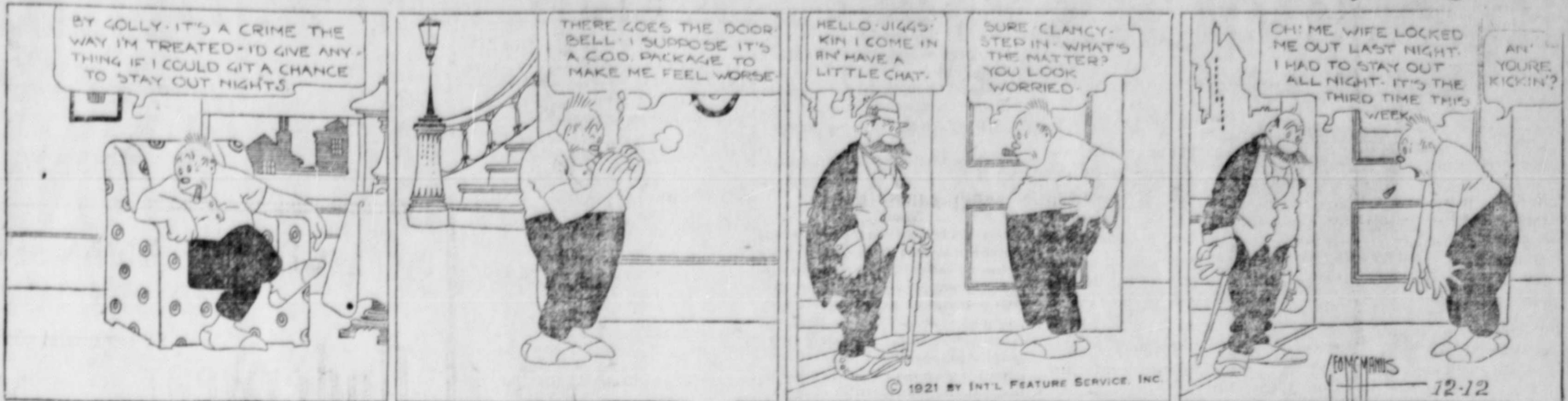

SERVICE TO WEST COAST OF ALASKA

Steamship Starr Passes Through Ketchikan Bound to Seward.

KETCHIKAN, Dec. 19.—On her way to Seward to begin the mail run to the Westward, the Steamship Starr, of the San Juan Fishing and Packing Co., departed for Ketchikan and for her destination two hours later. Capt. O. A. Johansen, known to many here, is master of the former commanded the Dora and the Bertha when the ships were operated by the old Alaska Commercial Company in the late '90's, and later the Dora was taken over by the Alaska Steamship Company. He also commanded the fishing steamers, Zapora and Chicago.

The ship, formerly a fishing vessel, has undergone extensive alterations at the Seattle Shipbuilding and Drydock Co., according to Capt. Johansen. She is now equipped with adequate passenger accommodations and space and is exceptionally well fitted for her route, which is to be the most northerly mail service in the world. Since the Dora was taken off the run, westward communities have been isolated and held back in their development because of the irregularity with which mail passengers and freight were handled by gun boats. The Starr is sufficiently large to make trips in any weather and under any circumstances. The mail contract of the San Juan Fishing and Packing Co. is for four years, at the rate of \$78,000 per annum.

CAR LICENSE SHOULD BE RENEWED AT ONCE

The attention of the public is directed to the fact that the change in the rule of the road comes into effect throughout the province on the 1st of January next. 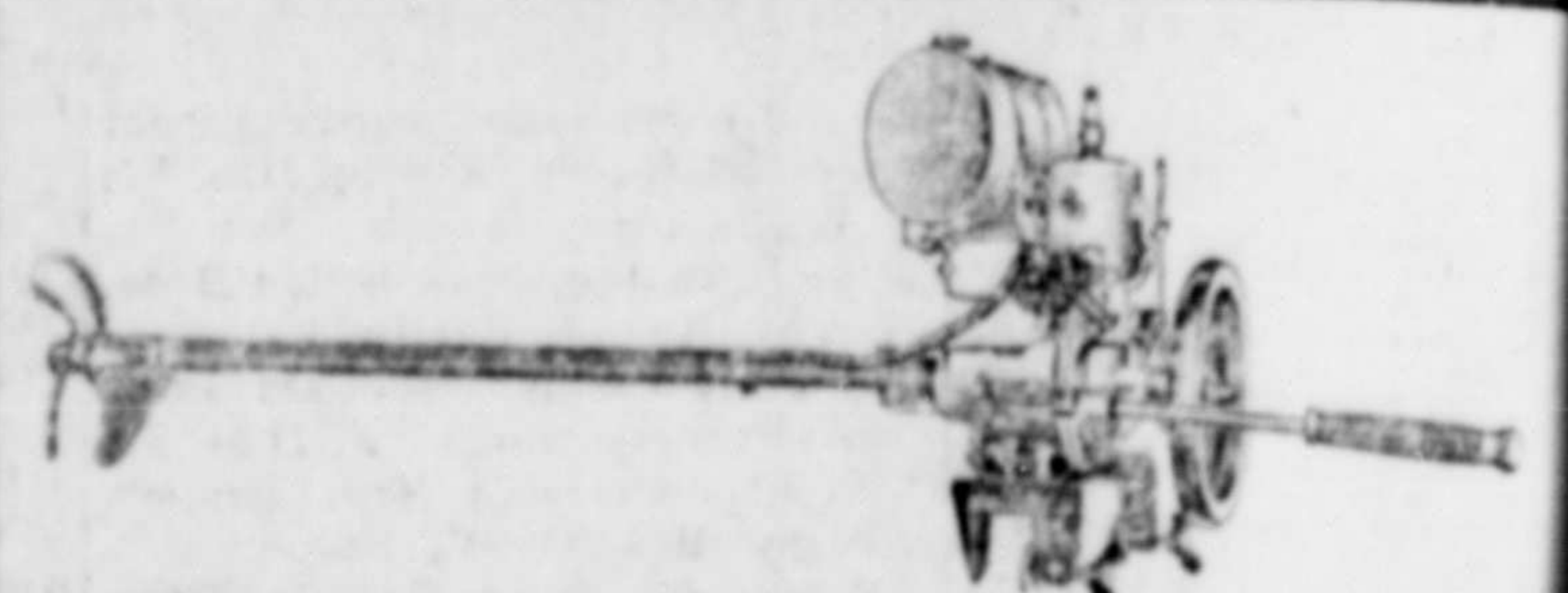

IRMA OIL FIELDS SHOWING PROMISE

Imperial Oil Co. Started Big Drill on Downward Course There Ten Days Ago.

On Thursday, December 8th the Imperial Oil Co. started on its downward course in search of oil at Irma, a large rotary drill which the company brought from Wyoming.

The crew used for operating the drill includes twelve men and a night and day shift is run.

The derrick, which is the largest ever erected in Western Canada, is 112 feet high and has a 21 foot base.

The Irma oil field has been attracting attention for some years but this attempt of the Imperial Oil Co. to locate has been the first on a large scale. Promising indications have been found and the people in that vicinity state that chances there are as good if not better than at Fort Norman.

The Irma district, besides having these oil indications, is one of the best mixed farming districts in the west. There are good railway facilities serving it. Irma town, the centre of the dis-

GERMANS GET AFTER MOVIE FILM BUSINESS

BERLIN, Dec. 19.—German motion picture film manufacturers have perfected a co-operative organization one of the prime purposes of which is to capture the European trade held by American producers. In the effort to compete with the American film the Germans are endeavoring to develop a "screen humor," which heretofore has been lacking in their productions. Virtually all Teutonic films, until recently, have dealt only with historical, legendary and romantic subjects. Some of the more ambitious German companies have engaged American directors and are striving to put American "heat" into their plays, to meet home consumption as well as export demands, for American films smuggled into the country during the last several months when importations were forbidden proved surprisingly popular. A survey of the world film markets by interested Germans disclosed American films were more popular than any others in Italy, England, Scandinavia and the Balkans, which led to a discussion of what was wrong with the German technique. The consensus of opinion seemed to be that the American films were "better handled" and were sprinkled generally with a lively humor. This verdict was sharply criticized, however, by a number of German producers who hold the opinion that German technique is bound to prevail over the "slip-stick comedy" and the "silly sentimental things produced to show rows of white teeth and a smile." STR. PORT SIMPSON ON WAY TO ATHABASCA

Vessel Being Transported in Knock-down Form to Northern Interior.

In connection with the moving of the stern wheel steamer Port Simpson, which was taken to pieces at this port and shipped to the interior by rail over the Canadian National Railway, the following is from the Edmonton Bulletin: These cars of machinery, representing engines and fittings for the H.R.C. steamer on the Athabasca service went north on Wednesday's train over the A. S. G. W. system, being routed through to Waterways from which point it will be hauled to the Prairie at McMurray and there built into the new vessel. Chief Engineer Sutherland accompanied the shipment and will be in charge of the installation of the machinery, while the shipbuilding will be under the supervision of George Askew of Vancouver, the builder of the "D.A. Thomas" and the "Distributor." The new H. B. C. boat will be a sister ship to the vessels mentioned, and when completed will rank as one of the largest vessels of the northern waters, in addition to which she will be a powerful craft. Her boiler develops 300 horsepower and with this drive behind her stern-wheel it is felt that she will be able to maintain the speed record of the Athabasca.

The "Port Simpson" will be a three-decker, with passenger, freight and hurricane decks. She will draw three feet, six inches in still water, and is designed for a speed of fifteen miles per hour. Electric lighting will be used throughout the vessel and she will have accommodation for 150 passengers.

The hull for the new steamer is being constructed at the coast, and will be shipped to McMurray in knock-down form, where it will be re-assembled by Mr. Askew, Captain E. B. Haight who has been on the coast in connection with the transshipment of the machinery and parts for the new vessel, also went north on Wednesday's train to Lac La Biche, but will reach McMurray in the near future. The building site on the Prairie at McMurray is all ready for the reception of the steamer, and no difficulty is anticipated in having the boat ready for the water with the opening of navigation.

SHOT GORILLAS CENTRE AFRICA

Fine Specimens Secured by Prince William of Sweden For Museum.

TELLS OF ADVENTURE.

LONDON, Dec. 19.—How he shot fourteen gorillas and thousands of birds and mammals in Central Africa is told in the Times by Prince William, younger son of the King of Sweden. The collection of museum specimens includes about 1000 mammals, 2500 birds and between 5000 and 6000 insects and other specimens. This is the Prince's own story.

The Belgian Government had generously given us a license to shoot fourteen gorillas. To our great satisfaction we were able to bag this lot. They were animals of both sexes and all ages. Our museum's gorilla exhibits will be the finest in the world.

Method of Hunting.

How should one shoot gorillas? One must, to begin with, have strong legs and a stout heart. Few animals give the huntsman sterner work. You must tramp about on the steep hillsides, clatter down steep ravines, and climb up on the opposite side, till you come upon a fresh trail. Then you must creep and crawl balance yourself from tree to tree, endeavor to imitate the movements of the quarry you are pursuing. With good luck, after a day-long pursuit, you may find yourself in the midst of a challenging group, of which you may bring down one or two ere the rest, with deafening screams and the rush of an avalanche, dart away through the woods, sprouting young trees and tearing away branches in their precipitous flight. They generally fly before man, and only turn when wounded. Then they rise on two legs and rush madly at their foe; otherwise they rarely quit their four-footed attitude.

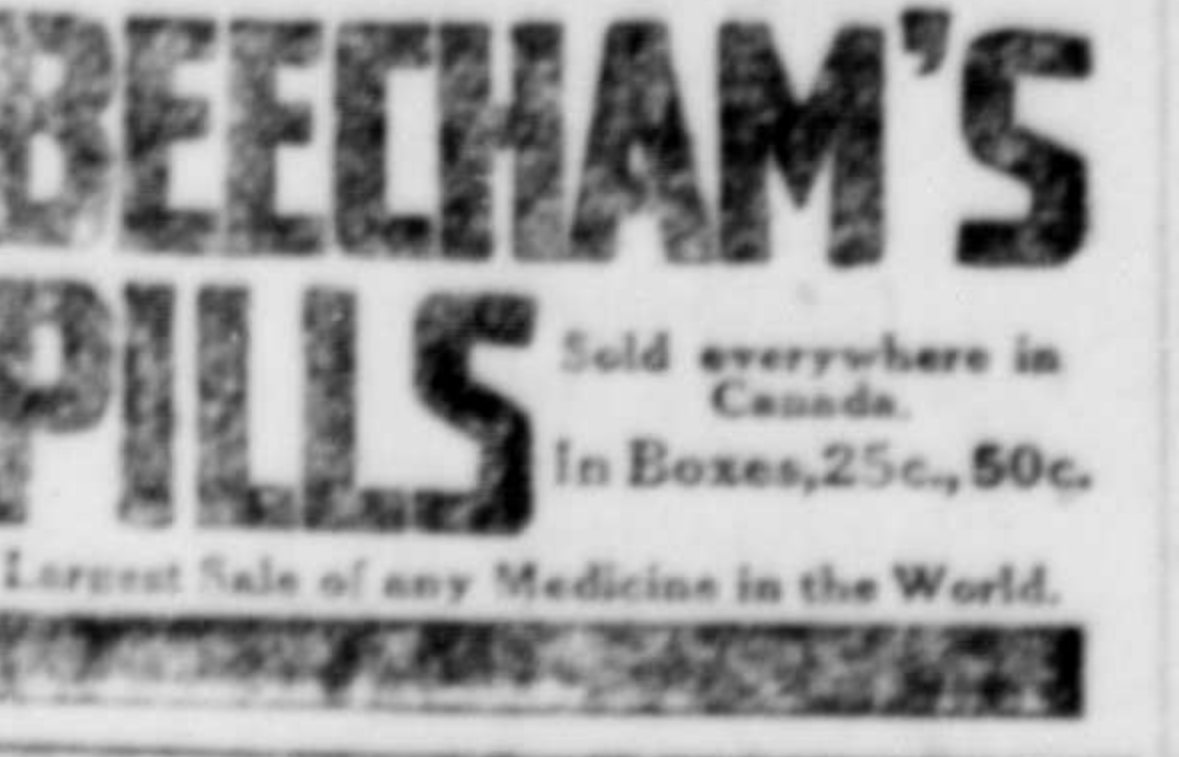

Among the Lions.

The place is an El Dorado for the huntsman, although the relative number of species represented is limited. These are principally lions, leopards, buffaloes, waterbuck, topi, Uganda Gobb, reedbuck, bushbuck, waterbuck. In the rivers hippopotamus; in the woods apes and baboons. More rarely elephants. The herds of topi are fantastically numerous. One can meet with herds numbering from several hundred to over a thousand. Lions are also abundant. We had great sport with them. More than 20 fell to our guns within a few weeks. Among them many a fine male.

I remember especially one night when we saw no fewer than 15 lions gathered round the animal we had set out as a lure. There was only one male, with a black mane almost trailing to the ground. Round him were his harem of lionesses and cubs. One heard a murmur of deep suppressed growls and crunching teeth as they tore the flesh from the bones of the lure between their jaws. When the great lion finally moved a little away from the glutinous assembly he received my shot in his side. In sudden fright the whole lot rushed towards the stone shelter behind which I stood, one lioness dashing at the barrel of my gun slinking out through the loophole and almost leaving my rifle from my hands. But they were evidently starving; they returned again and again to their prey, regardless of our repeated firing. In the morning eight lions lay dead on the ground before our shooting shelter.

Wambuba Natives.

Fearful orgies were frequent among them, and it was unsafe to venture into their country without a strong escort. Now they are tamed, and it does not enter into the head of a Wambuba to seek to injure a white man. LABOR GIANT'S FEET OF CLAY

Shaw Desmond Publishes Book About the Situation in Britain Today.

LONDON, Dec. 17.—The most pungent criticism of the Labor movement usually comes from within the movement or from men who for a period have given in their enthusiastic support, says a writer in the Times. Shaw Desmond was a member of the Labor party for fourteen years, and stood as an independent Socialist against John Burns in the general election of 1910. He has now written a book, "Labor, the Giant with the Feet of Clay," in which he describes the movement as split from top to bottom by fundamentally opposed ideals, tactics and objectives.

Of the British Labor party, Mr. Desmond writes that its rise to power has been meteoric, but "comets sometimes have the property of flashing brightly for a space, and then flashing out again."

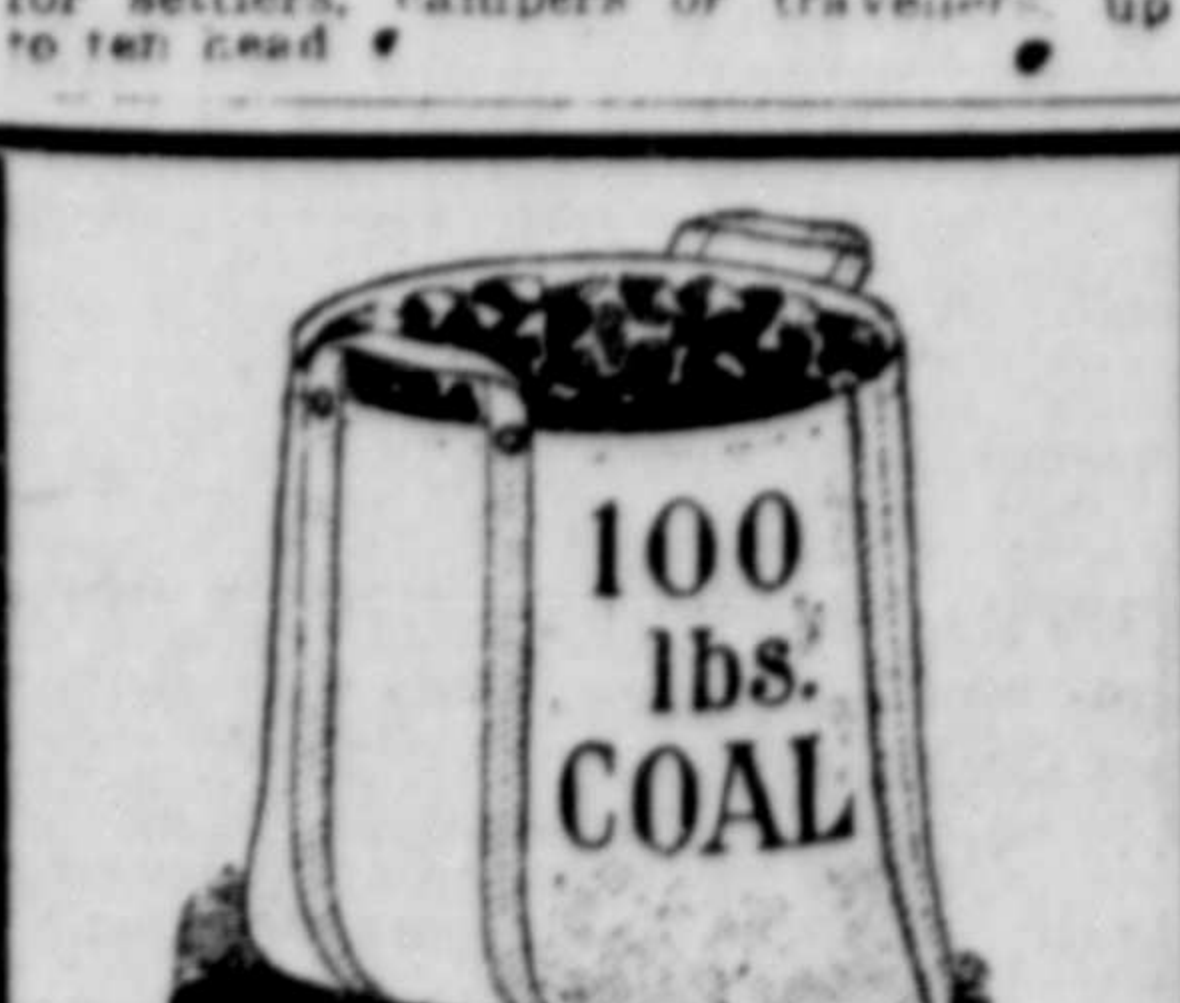
SYNOPSIS OF LAND ACT AMENDMENTS

RE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT
The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The use of which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply on title under the Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the great war. This privilege is also made retrospective.
No fees relating to pre-emption are levied or payable by soldiers or pre-emptors recorded after August 1, 1914, on account of payments, "see" taxes on mortgages.
Interest on mortgages on Crown land or city lots held by members of His Majesty's Forces, or those to be acquired directly or indirectly from an instrument to March 31, 1920.

SUB-PURCHASERS OF CROWN LANDS
Provision made for insurance of Crown lands, acquiring rights from purchasers who failed to complete purchase, involving forfeiture, on fulfillment of conditions of purchase, interest and taxes. Where sub-purchasers do not claim whole of original parcel, purchase price due and taxes may be distributed proportionately over whole area. Applications must be made by May 1, 1920.

GRAZING
Grazing Act, 1913, for systematic development of livestock industry, provides for grazing districts and range administration under Commission.
Annual grazing permits issued based on numbers of animals, but not on land. Owners of stock-owners may form Associations for range management. Free, or partially free, permits for settlers, campers or travelers up to ten head.

again." The party, he contends, is becoming a voting machine. A stage has been reached, fraught with fate, when "success has cemented bureaucracy into one solid, stolid mass, none the less bureaucracy because in it the bureaucrat is not the leader but the led." The British Labor party, he says later, "has reached the stage where the machine has mastered the man."

Resolutions and Action.
Mr. Desmond has something to say about the primness and self-satisfaction of the Labor leaders. Meeting Arthur Henderson he observes on one page was "rather like interviewing the Pope." The decline of the Labor party began, he thinks, with the return of 29 members to Parliament in 1904. His sympathy with the British worker, "a sentimental, good-natured fellow, serving by heart," does not blind him to the limitations of the workers in the mass. The worker, he suggests, mistakes the passing of resolutions for action. The average trades unionist would cheerfully kill his grandmother by resolution, and save his conscience afterwards by the satisfying reflection that the resolution to do away with the old lady had been passed by an "overwhelming majority." The probability, however, is that he would stop at passing the resolution, and then do nothing.

Mr. Desmond traces at some length the leaning towards "direct action" which was the outcome of the war, but is convinced that Bolshevism will make no progress in this country. Before ten years have passed he prophesies that in these islands Bolshevism and direct action will be spoken of with a shudder. The dictatorship of the proletariat he denounces as an autocratic tyranny, but incidentally he declares his belief that Lenin, although he has reverted to a sort of state of capitalism, has not given up his idea of converting the world to his doctrines. "It may be taken as assured," he says, "that Lenin is only drawing back to spring when the time is ripe."

Fool's Paradise.
There is a chapter headed "If Labor Came into Power." The plan of the engineers of the machine state, Mr. Desmond writes, is to win over the working men by the promise of more pay for less work, the capture of the municipalities and local governing bodies, and finally the winning for democracy of the governments of the world. From that moment the society visualized is one in which the Labor leader will be supreme, a society in which everything will be decided by the holding up of hands, and in which inevitably the rights of the minority would be brought to an irreducible minimum. When the machine state has evolved the bureaucrat will fast pass into the autocrat, impregnably entrenched behind his official bulwarks, and the end would be a dictatorship. That is one view. He also visualizes the fool's paradise of a parliament as imagined by the I. L. P., in which George Lansbury, "who thinks he is a Bolshevik," Arthur Henderson, "the benevolent radical who thinks he has got religion," Philip Snowden, G. H. Roberts, M.P., the Rev. Conrad Noel, and "heaven alone knows what other flotsam and jetsam thrown up by the movement" will sit together in brotherly harmony.

COCHRANE, Dec. 19.—The frozen body of a trapper, George Picard, 40 years of age, living 30 miles east of here was found six miles from Twin Falls on Thursday. He had been lost in the woods.
