Largest Load Fresh Fish Dispatched

INTERIOR PULP MILL PROPOSITION WILL SOON BE GROWING INDUSTRY

Logging Camps and Pulp Plant Closed By Whalen Co.

VANCOUVER, June 7.—All logging operations of the Whalen Pulp and Paper Co. at Swanson Bay have been closed down and will not resume again for two months, according to announcement made by Henry Whalen, who has just returned from the northern camp. This shut down also includes actual pulp manufacturing operations at the big mill at Swanson Bay and most of the employees have been paid off. The reason for the closing down of the logging camps is that there are large supplies of logs on hand. Mr. Whalen left last night for Quatsino Sound where a similar condition prevails at the Port Alice plant. Many camps will also be closed down there.

STEAMERS SAIL FOR NORTH NOW

Shipping Board and Owners State No Difficulty Getting Independent Crews.

SEATTLE, June 7.—The Steamship Cordova, of the Alaska Steamship line, sailed last night for St. Michaels, Alaska, with an independent crew and the Victoria leaves today.

The Shipping Board and owners report that there is no difficulty in getting crews now to man their vessels.

IS UNWILLING LEAVE SILESIA

German Commander There Says Has Neither Power Nor Inclination to Do So.

BERLIN, June 7.—General Von Hofer, commanding the German forces in Silesia, has replied to the Allied ultimatum demanding the withdrawal of his forces from that country, stating that he neither has the power to do so nor would he be willing to recall the self-defensive forces from the places they are defending. The German forces are said to be increasing in the district and the situation is becoming complicated.

USK TOWNSITE CASE MAY BE SETTLED OUT OF COURT BELIEVED

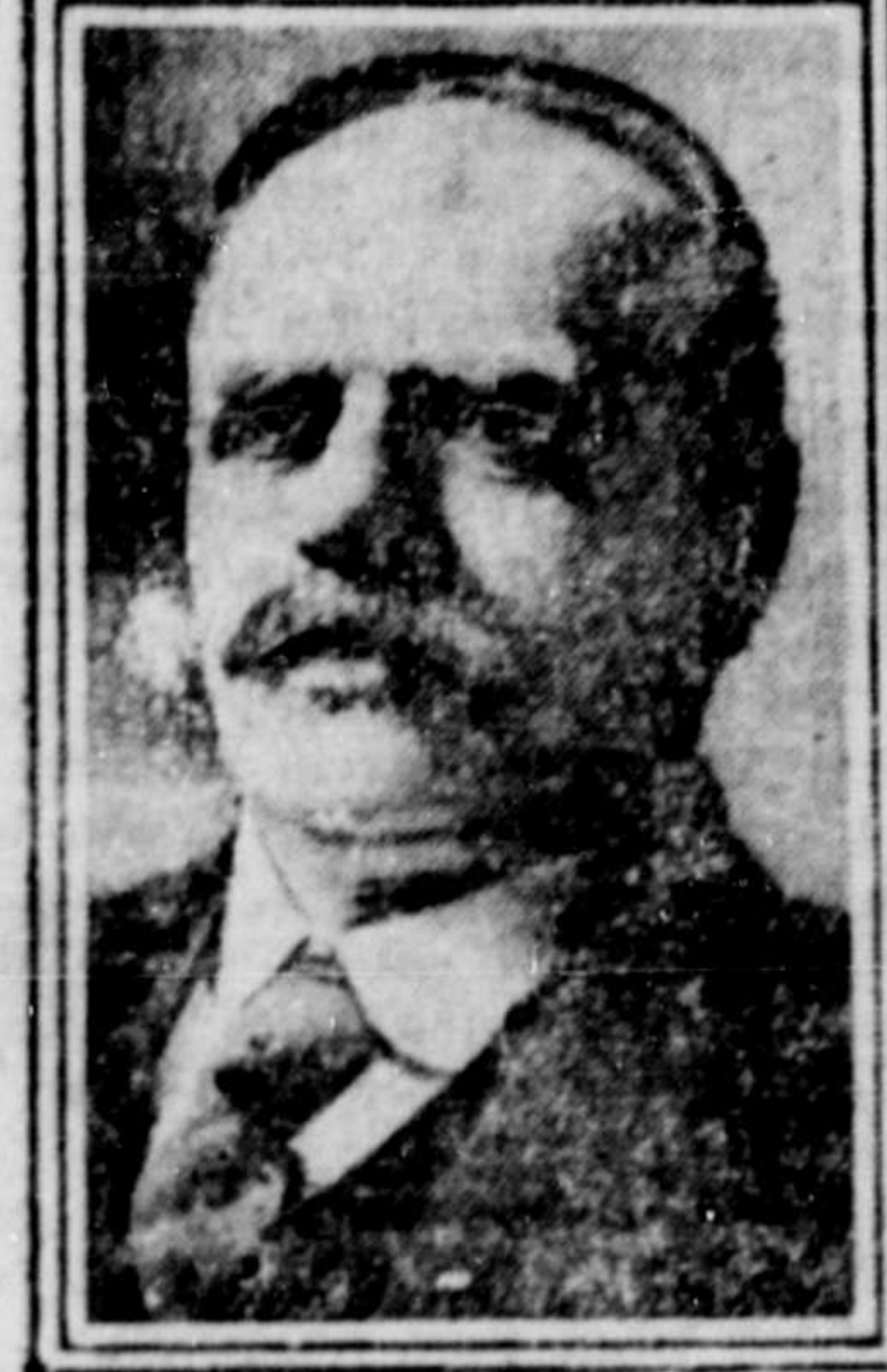

Today the case was continued in the assize court before Mr. Justice Gregory and the plaintiff's case was concluded at 1 o'clock, adjournment then being made. The contending parties it is understood are endeavoring to get together and settle their differences privately.

CROWN FORCES TAKE 100 REPUBLICANS

CORK, June 7.—The crown forces have captured more than one hundred members of the Republican army in Mill Street after a battle in which three Sinn Feiners were killed.

GOLD STRIKE PEACE RIVER

Country is Wildly Excited and a Stampede is Already Commencing.

EDMONTON, June 7.—The Peace River country is wildly excited over a gold find by Dr. Gauthier on an unnamed creek near the Cadotte River. There is much mystery surrounding the find but parties are preparing to invade the approximate district immediately despite the fact that the exact location of the discovery has not been divulged.

MANY SOLDIERS ARE KILLED AND WOUNDED

Sir Hamar Greenwood, Chief Secretary for Ireland, Makes Announcement.

LONDON, June 7.—Sir Hamar Greenwood, chief secretary for Ireland, has informed the House of Commons that 127 soldiers have been killed and 286 wounded in Ireland since January, 1920. Sir Austen Chamberlain, chancellor of the exchequer, announced that additional forces were being sent to Ireland immediately.

REPRESENTATIVE AT GENERAL ASSEMBLY PRESBYTERIANS DEAD

CLOVERDALE, June 7.—Alex Murphy, aged 56, who left here a few days ago to attend the Presbyterian General Assembly at Toronto representing the Presbyterians of Surrey district, died at Barrie, Ontario, as the result of an auto accident. Mr. Murphy was a retired farmer of this place.

FIVE POUNDS FOR A WIFE

Agreement Reached Governing Tribes on Border Sierra Leone and Liberia.

LONDON, June 7.—Five pounds sterling and no more will be the price of a wife according to the recently ratified convention between Great Britain and Liberia, the negro free state in Africa. This convention regulates the relations between tribes living on the border line between Liberia and Sierra Leone. Women's rights in future, are to be recognized.

AMBUSCADE DISPERSED

DUBLIN, June 8.—The military last night dispersed an ambush of forty civilians, killing one, in County Waterford.

Establishment of Paper Mill at Prince George Entails Large Expense

PRINCE GEORGE, June 7.—"We propose making an enormous investment in this pulp and paper plant, but before doing so we wish to make sure that we shall get interest on the money," said R. J. S. Tyrhurst, manager of the Fraser Timber Syndicate, speaking of his company's project yesterday at Prince George. "We never expect to get our money back but we do want to be sure of a reasonable rate of interest."

Mr. Tyrhurst said that the government cruise of the pulp limits would be completed on June 19 and at the end of July the principal members of the syndicate will be on the coast for the purpose of signing up an agreement with the British Columbia government along the lines of the tentative arrangement entered into last December. The syndicate wishes to secure much better forest protection than at present and to have set aside at once any agricultural settlements that may be made and the rest of the limits set aside as a perpetual forest reserve.

At present the power prospects of the Willow River are being investigated and, failing that, power will be developed from the Nechako River. The latter is a low head proposition and very expensive. Another heavy expense will be the installing of booming and storage grounds for logs at a cost of \$180,000.

Mr. Tyrhurst is hopeful of the agreement being signed and the work started almost immediately, but he says that all depends on the British Columbia government.

NEW MINISTER OF LABOR IN GERMAN CABINET



Herr Robert Schmidt is the new Minister of Labor in the Cabinet formed by Dr. Wirth. He is a Socialist and was formerly the Minister of Agriculture.

NORTH IRELAND PARLIAMENT IS OPENED TODAY

Premier Craig Announces Personnel of Cabinet.

BELFAST, June 7.—The parliament of Northern Ireland opened this morning amid impressive scenes in the council chamber of the City Hall. Nationalist, Sinn Fein, as well as all the forty Unionist, members took their seats.

Hugh O'Neill, son of Lord O'Neill, was elected speaker and Sir James Craig, premier, announced the following cabinet:

- There was little outward display of party feeling. The high functionaries, including Vicecount Fitzallen, the new vice roy of Ireland, were received at the city hall by Lord Mayor Coates, who presented an address to which the vice roy replied.

BRITAIN SATISFIED WITH B. C. TIMBER

Included in Specifications of British Board of Works.

LONDON, June 7.—Practical tests of British Columbia spruce and western hemlock—by the British Board of Works, on behalf of the advisory committee on timbers of the Imperial Institute, have proved quite satisfactory, and as a result these woods have been included in the official timber specification of that department as alternatives to European joinery timbers.

EXECUTIONS TOOK PLACE IN IRELAND

DUBLIN, June 7.—Three men convicted of participating in the recent disorders in Ireland were executed here this morning.

Thirteen New Cars Loaded with Local Fish Off for East

At 9:30 this morning a special fish train left this port for middle and eastern States comprising thirteen refrigerator cars loaded with halibut bought by the various companies at the Fish Exchange yesterday morning. The train was made up entirely of new cars which recently arrived in the city from the eastern shops for the local fish business. Each car being identical, the train formed a perfect line and was one of the prettiest ones that has ever been despatched from this port. Its sending out was celebrated generally along the waterfront in a quiet way and many were on hand to see it leave. Photographers were also present to obtain pictures just before it pulled out of the yards. The fish on board is all consigned to the Eastern United States market and each of the local packing plants is represented with car load shipments.

PRESBYTERIANS DEBATE BUDGET

Question of Church Union Will Not be Voted on Until Next Monday.

TORONTO, June 7.—A budget totalling \$1,800,000 for the year 1922 has been submitted to the Presbyterian General Assembly. This is an increase of \$209,000 over last year's estimate. The debate is now proceeding.

The vote of church union, one of the most important questions to be taken up by the assembly, will not be reached until next Monday, it is expected.

TWO MEN BELIEVED DROWNED IN FRASER

Old Man Aged 80 Swam Ashore While Other Two Believed Lost.

CHILLIWACK, June 7.—John and Roy Gregg are believed to have been drowned in the Fraser River on Sunday afternoon. The two men, with John Knox, were crossing the river to an island to attend to some stock when their boat upset. Knox, who is 80 years of age, swam to the island and was rescued yesterday afternoon. There is no trace of the other two men.

REINDEER AND MUSK OX WILL BE RAISED

Dominion Government Has Reserved Lands in North For Purpose.

OTTAWA, June 7.—That the Government intends to take action on the report of the commission which investigated the possibilities of musk ox and reindeer raising in Northern Canada was intimated in the House of Commons on Saturday by Premier Meighen. Certain lands will be reserved for the purpose.

FLOOD DEATH TOLL

PUEBLO, June 7.—The death tolls from the floods this morning reached fifty-five persons.

LLOYD GEORGE IS ON THE SICK LIST

LONDON, June 7.—Premier Lloyd George is suffering from a chill and overwork and has been ordered by his physicians to take a complete rest. All his business and state engagements have been cancelled.

**Britain Facing
Delicate Problem.**

In the matter of a renewal of the alliance with Japan, which is to be taken up soon by Great Britain, there will be a delicate question involved for the latter country. Japan has nothing to lose in the making of the treaty if it will conflict in no way with any of her other alliances. On the other hand, Britain is not in such a position and, even though the renewal of the treaty may be a very desirable accomplishment as far as her relations with Japan are concerned, she has another friendly nation to consider. That nation is the United States. For some years past, and even at the present time, there has been little friendship lost between the United States and Japan and the two countries have been prone to treat each other with a certain amount of coolness. In fact a jealousy seems to exist. The result of Britain's turning down the alliance with Japan can plainly be imagined and, at the same time, too much friendly show with her might be like treading on the toes of the United States. The settlement of the question satisfactorily and the retaining of the good feeling that prevails between Great Britain and the United States and, simultaneously, with Japan is going to require a good deal of diplomacy and careful statesmanship. Happily the question might result in the forming even of a better understanding between the United States and Japan.

**Stewart Will Be
Hub of Mining.**

From present indications, it would appear that Stewart, this season, will be the hub of the mining activities of the north. In the past few weeks there has been a good deal of activity on the outside in the matter of financing a number of mines in that district and, shortly, the work of proving them will commence. In addition, of course, to all this work of a smaller nation, the Premier Gold Mining Co. has settled its strike and mining will resume as well as the big job of getting the tramway built this season. Thus Stewart, in the next few months, will doubtless be a busy place and will keep a large number of men employed. The work there will reflect indirectly on this city.

**Central Interior
Taking Its Place.**

The central interior is steadily filling up with settlers and there is a great period of prosperity in store there, judging from reports that are being received from persons who are studying conditions on the ground. Terrace, Telkwa, Burns Lake, Vanderhoof and Prince George are becoming important centres of agriculture and there is a good deal of activity in other lines. Around Terrace, Smithers, Burns Lake and Fort Fraser there is a good deal of speculation as to the mining possibilities. Terrace has its copper and oil prospects, Smithers, the Hudson Bay and Babine mining fields; Burns Lake, oil possibilities, and Fort Fraser, coal indications. Besides, at Prince George, there is a big pulp and paper proposition which is rapidly advancing out of the state of possibility into accomplishment. With agriculture as a stable and established industry and all these possible developments in other lines, there is good reason to believe that the central interior will soon take its place as a district second to none in commercial and industrial importance to other older and more advanced sections of the province. And thus again Prince Rupert, as the seaport, should benefit to a great extent.

**PRINCESS ALICE IS
MAKING SPECIAL TRIP**

Returning Will Have First Passengers of Season Outgoing From Far North.

The C.P.R. steamer Princess Alice will reach this port on Friday morning making a special run to Alaska ports on account of the heavy traffic that is offering out of Vancouver now for the Yukon and Alaska. The Princess Royal, which will open the regular summer schedule and will arrive here next Monday morning, is already booked up completely and it is

on account of the overflow that the Alice has been commissioned for the run. When the Alice returns from the North she will have on board the first passengers of the season from the Yukon. These passengers have spent the winter in the far North and this will be the first opportunity afforded them of getting out.

The police has been instructed to see that the all night taxis in the vicinity of Gomer Avenue is discontinued. As long as the question does not become vexed the city council has decided not to bring in formal legislation in this regard.

**STREET EXPERT
HAS ARRIVED**

Wednesday Afternoon Council Will Decide on Policy of Work.

On Wednesday evening, the city council will meet in special session to again go into the whole question of the down town street surfacing scheme. Harold Thackeray, an expert in this line of work, has been brought here by the city to superintend the work, having arrived on Sunday night from the south. Yesterday he spent the most of the day with Mayor Rochester in going over the streets and, at the council meeting last night, the Board of Works, through his recommendation, asked that a scrapper, costing \$1816, and a road grader, \$712, be purchased. On motion of Ald. Parker, seconded by Ald. Silversides, it was, however, decided to hold the matter over until the special meeting on Wednesday so that the council may have an opportunity to acquaint itself more fully with the policy that is being adopted in carrying out the work. Speaking of the desirability of purchasing the machines, Mayor Rochester stated last night that Mr. Thackeray had stated that it would be impossible to go on with the work without them. While an outlay of some \$2500 would be involved the mayor felt that it was necessary and the work might as well be started right.

Wanted Policy.

Ald. Silversides asked what the policy of the Board of Works was to be in doing this street work. Had it decided to do it itself or had contract work been considered?

Ald. Kerr, chairman of the Board of Works, stated that the board had always felt that the putting on the rock would have to be done by the city itself. Contracts could be let for the crushing of the rock at Smith Island and the towing of it to the city but the road actual building could never be done satisfactorily on the contract basis. There would only be a very few men required in this work, anyway.

Ald. McNeill emphasized the fact that whatever plan was adopted the city would have to buy these machines.

Ald. Silversides still insisted that there should be some policy set out before the machines were purchased. Ald. Frizzell felt that the work might well be done by contract. Ald. Parker was of the opinion that the council should not authorize the purchase of the machines on the strength of a fifteen minute consultation that the Board of Works had had with the new superintendent. Anyway, when the order was placed there would be no delay in getting the machines here and he thought that they would arrive in plenty of time so that the work would be not delayed on this account.

In urging that the matter be laid over, both Ald. Parker and Ald. Silversides made it clear that they meant no reflection on the Board of Works.

Colliery Company Sinks Shaft into Property on Fraser Lake by Railway

FORT FRASER, June 6.—The Fraser Lake Collieries, Ltd., is sinking a shaft on the shore of Fraser Lake about five miles from here, in spite of the fact that the company has as yet no title to the land. A new seam has just been struck of better coal than has ever yet been found, but its thickness is not as yet proved. It is a bituminous coal.

The officials of the company say that Premier Oliver, at the time of the election, promised that they should have the reserve lifted on the property and on the strength of this they went ahead and started development work. Now they are without title, for the Government has so far refused to cancel the reserve. They have so far spent about \$5,000 in development work.

There are a number of outcroppings of coal along the lake shore close to the railway, but they are more or less broken in character. A mile from the lake there is another important outcrop, all of fairly good quality coal. As the company works the mine and gets farther below the surface they expect the quality of the coal to improve.

The Company.

The company was incorporated in January last with G. H. Mogden, president; John Frew, secretary; H. H. Olson, P. Hagen, T. T. Hamilton, John Frew and C. J. Kettle, directors and M. G. Kettle, manager. They have filed on three claims and a fraction, have put up the necessary fees and are prepared to go ahead with the work if they can get title. In the meantime they are proceeding slowly with the sinking of a shaft in the belief that they will be protected by the Government.

Fraser Lake is 360 miles from Prince Rupert, about half the distance of the mines on the Alberta coal spur. This would mean that coal could be delivered at Prince Rupert for domestic purposes or for shipping at a much lower price than the Alberta coal. It has the advantage of being on the main line.

Its Significance.

If the property is developed and proves to have coal in pay-quantities, it will mean much to Fort Fraser, to Prince Rupert and to all intermediate points and also will be greatly to the advantage of the G.T.N. Railway which will have the carrying of the product.

APRIL REPORT OF FIRE CHIEF GOES BACK TO COMMITTEE

The report from the Fire Chief for the month of April was received by the city council last night but, as it involves the purchase of uniforms and no recommendation in that matter was made, it was decided to turn it back to the Fire Committee for its further consideration.

During the month of April there were 10 calls to the fire department. Outside of a fire on a gas boat, the extent of the damage of which was not known, there had been no loss from fire during the month. The expenses of the department had been \$1,230.01.

The Fire Chief recommended that seven uniforms for the department be purchased.

JUNEAU MINE NOW CLOSED

American Gastineau Company Ceases Mining Permanently.

JUNEAU, June 6.—The mine and mill of the Alaska-Gastineau Mining Company ceased operations permanently last Thursday. Dismantling of the plants has already commenced.

In making a statement, Mr. Geo. T. Jackson, general manager, said:

"Owing to the heavy rainfall of last Sunday, coupled with the warm weather of the past two days, so much water has come from the hills to the Perseverance mine we have been unable to handle it with our pumps, so the mine and mill will be closed."

"We had previously announced that we would operate through June," he continued, "but with this question of water confronting us we received orders to close down at once."

"The paper mills will be built there, for sure," he concluded, "but the actual date of the starting of the construction has not as yet been determined."

With the closing of this property a number of men will be thrown out of employment but it is thought that many will be retained for dismantling work.

Meeting Canners in Vancouver Last Friday Announces Prices.
