MOLLISON IS ON HIS BIG ADVENTURE

HYDER MEN BELIEVED DROWNED IN CAPSIZED SEA SLED

Scottish Aviator Hops Off For Projected Return Flight From Ireland Across Ocean and Back

PASSED ON WEDNESDAY

William Chenoski, Resident of City For Nineteen Years, Passed Away Yesterday

After a lengthy illness with asthma from which complaint he had suffered for years, William Chenoski, aged 63, native of Ukraina and resident of Prince Rupert for some nineteen years, passed away about midday yesterday in the Prince Rupert General Hospital where he had been a patient for some time. The late Mr. Chenoski had lived in Canada for twenty-five years, the most of which time was spent here. Besides his widow, he is survived by four sons—Mike of Anyox and Nick, Roy and Pete of this city—and two daughters—Mrs. Mary Kunka in Vancouver and Katie here. A brother of deceased, Nick Chenoski, lives in Vegreville, Alta., and there is a married sister in Edmonton. The funeral will take place tomorrow morning with a service from the Church of the Annunciation, the B. C. Undertakers being in charge. Deceased was a Roman Catholic.

SHIP NOT IN DANGER

Schooner Sophie Christenson Leaking But Not in Need of Immediate Assistance

DUTCH HARBOR, Aug. 18.—The fishing schooner Sophie Christenson, for the safety of which some anxiety has been entertained, has sent a wireless message to the effect that it is leaking but not in need of immediate assistance in Behring Sea. The coastguard cutter Montgomery has been sent out to stand by.

VANCOUVER WHEAT

VANCOUVER, Aug. 18.—Wheat was quoted at 54½¢ on the local exchange today.

Had Perfect Take-Off This Morning From Port Marnock and Was Farewelled By His Wife and Large Crowd—Harbor Grace to Be First Stop

PORT MARNOCK, Ireland, Aug. 18.—Capt. J. A. Mollison, noted Australian long distance flyer, hopped off from here at 11:35 this morning on a trans-Atlantic flight to New York and return. He planned to make his first stop at Harbor Grace, Nfld., where he expected to arrive in twenty-two hours' flying. He will then refuel immediately and dash for Roosevelt Field, New York, and make a turn-around, dashing back again without stop to Croydon, England.

If Mollison succeeds it will be the first trans-Atlantic solo flight from east to west and the first crossing of the North Atlantic Ocean in a light machine.

Weather conditions were reported good for the trip.

Mollison is using a small machine weighing little more than one ton and carries an ample supply of gasoline. Before his departure he said that he expected to complete the round trip in two and a half days.

A big crowd witnessed Mollison's departure. Miss Amy Johnson, famous English woman flyer, who married Mollison a few weeks ago, was on hand to wish him Godspeed and, just before he entered the cockpit, his young wife kissed him good-bye. The crowd, which had been cheering, suddenly hushed as the two whispered together.

In the words of Amy Johnson "it was a fine start, anyhow" as Mollison roared down the hard sand for a quarter of a mile before a clean take-off.

Sighted at Sea LONDON, Aug. 18.—The Cunard liner Ascania, bound from Montreal to Liverpool, reported having sighted Capt. J. A. Mollison, who is on a trans-Atlantic flight, 650 miles west of the Irish coast five hours after he had hopped off. The weather was favorable, the liner reported.

Captain Von Gronau Hops Off From Lac La Biche Today For Prince Rupert Via Pr. George

EDMONTON, Aug. 18.—Capt. Wolfgang von Gronau, German trans-Atlantic flyer, who is now essaying a flight around the world with three companions, hopped off from Lac la Biche at 10 o'clock this morning for Prince Rupert in his big twin-motored Dornier flying boat "Greenland-Wal." Von Gronau stated that he intended to fly to Prince Rupert via Prince George where he may refuel, proceeding to Prince Rupert direct. Von Gronau plans on proceeding from Prince Rupert to Japan via Alaska and the Aleutian and Kurile Islands.

OUTLOOK BRIGHTER

Prospects Again For Success at Conference—Expected to Close Very Soon

OTTAWA, Aug. 18.—The Canadian cabinet and United Kingdom delegation to the Imperial economic conference are meeting late this afternoon. The Soviet Russia situation has been overcome, it is stated, and the "whole atmosphere breathes success." The conference will close within 36 hours, it is further intimated. Unofficial reports continue that the British preference on Canadian wheat will be six cents per bushel or five cents under the prevailing rate of exchange.

WOMEN IN AIR STILL

Mrs. Thalen and Mrs. Marsalis Have Completed Over Eighty Hours of Attempt to Break 122-Hour Record

VALLEY STREAM, New York, August 18.—Mrs. Louise Thaden and Mrs. Frances Marsalis, who are endeavoring to break the world's refuelling endurance flight record for women, were still in the air over here last night after having been aloft for over eighty hours. They still had forty-three hours to go to break the record which is 122 hours.

LANCASTER ACQUITTED

British Aviator Freed at Miami on Charge of Murdering Haden Clark, His Rival

MIAMI, Fla., Aug. 18.—There were scenes of wild enthusiasm in the courtroom here yesterday afternoon when the jury in the case of Capt. William N. Lancaster, English aviator, who was charged with the murder of Haden Clark, young author, who supplanted him in the affections of Mrs. J. M. Keith-Miller, Australian aviatrix, returned a verdict of not guilty after deliberating for more than five hours. Mrs. Keith-Miller, who became hysterical after the verdict was announced, did not disclose her plans for the future. Capt. Lancaster, who has been in jail for months, intimated that his first concern would be to "find a job."

Skidegate Sunrise Is Real Mine In Making; Outlook Is Promising

Development Campaign is Being Continued Steadily and 80,000 Tons of Gold Ore is Expected to Be Proven Soon

(By H. F. Pullen)

Skidegate, Queen Charlotte Islands, is coming into prominence today because of the successful development of the Skidegate Sunrise Mine, formerly known as the South-easter, by the Kitsault Eagle Silver Mines Limited, with W. G. McMorris as local manager. The mine has reached such a stage now that, within a month, if the work goes on

as well as it is doing today, there will be an indicated tonnage of paying gold ore of approximately 80,000 tons with splendid showings beyond which will be prospected and will probably turn out as well if not better. The tonnage mentioned is sufficient to last a mill for three years and by the end of that period it is expected that other ores will have been developed that will be sufficient to carry on for an indefinite period.

While there are pockets or stringers of high grade ore carrying very high values, the indicated ore is of average grade of about \$12 to the ton. As the mine is close to the sea and easy to operate this should give a very good profit on operations.

When I visited the property last week there was an English capitalist, a Mr. King, visiting at the mine as the guest of Mr. McMorris. He made a very thorough investigation and he is very enthusiastic not only as to the values and the ease of mining but as to the present economy of operation under which every dollar expended was being made to bring results. He said he thought there was a real mine in the making there. This is along the line of the opinion of the district mining engineer who reports most favorably on the mine and its prospects.

Postmaster-Druggist Of Alaskan Town On Portland Canal Lost

Oren F. Hill and Tom Walters Feared Victims of Tragedy in Capsized Speedboat Which Has Been Found By Coastguard Cutter

KETCHIKAN, Aug. 18.—The coastguard cutter Alert has wireless here that a sea sled, in which Oren F. Hill, druggist and postmaster of Hyder, and Tom Walters left Hyder on Sunday for a trip on Portland Canal, has been found overturned twenty miles from Hyder. It is feared that Hill and Walters, both of whom were prominent residents of Hyder, have been drowned. No trace had been seen of them since they left Hyder on Sunday until their boat was found yesterday. It is presumed that the small craft capsized and both men were drowned.

GOVERNING OF INDIA

New Constitutional Plans Announced By British Government

LONDON, Aug. 18.—The British government yesterday announced a new constitutional plan which it has settled upon for the government of India by its provincial legislatures. Division of power is placed between Hindus, Moslems and other classes in much the same manner as has prevailed in the past. Separate elections are still provided for instead of joint elections as demanded by Mahatma Gandhi and his Hindu followers. Provision is made for women to hold a certain number of seats in the provincial legislatures and, for the first time, Moslem women are recognized as a political factor in India.

ALTITUDE MARK SET

Prof. Piccard Ascends Today Higher Than Man Had Ever Gone Before

DUBENDORF, Switzerland, Aug. 18.—Prof. Auguste Piccard, conqueror of the stratosphere, established a new world's altitude record today by rising 16,500 metres, more than ten miles, above the earth in an aluminum airtight ball attached to his balloon. Piccard took off from here at 5 o'clock this morning and landed at 5 o'clock this afternoon at Edolo, 60 miles north of Brescia.

NORTH ISLAND FISHING GOOD

Skidegate Natives Expect to Have Enough Money to Winter Comfortably

MASSETT, Aug. 18.—So far this has been a very good trolling season. Fishermen have been earning pretty good money, even at the reduced prices paid, and the probability is that, by the end of the season, they will have done as well as in 1931.

The average earning so far seems to be about \$300 to \$400 with a good many earning \$500, a few \$600 and at least one man has been able to bank over \$700 as a result of the operations so far this season.

The Skidegate natives say they expect to fish at North Island for another week or two and then they should pick up at least \$200 per boat fishing in the neighborhood of their home village. This will give them enough money to winter comfortably.

PREMIER TOLMIE'S TASK

Premier Tolmie is home from Ottawa, the cabinet has been called into emergent, if deferred, session to consider the Kidd report and we may look for important political developments at Victoria ere long. The good-natured Premier seems to be somewhat more pleased with the Kidd recommendations than some might have expected he would be. If there is anything in it that displeases him, he certainly does not disclose it in his brief comments on the document.

Of course, it is all but formally announced now that the intent, if not the actual recommendation, of the Kidd report is to set up a Vancouver-controlled coalition government with the possibility of an early appeal to the people. Whether Dr. Tolmie is to continue to be master in his own household or whether he is going to accede to Vancouver's bid for political power is the question in which political observers are now interesting themselves.

"KILLING THE KIDD REPORT"

Under the heading "Killing the Kidd Report," the Vancouver Sun has the following editorial in regard to the Vancouver Province comments on the report:

"The Province newspaper is not interested in British Columbia's business affairs. The public is beginning to understand that the Province's only interest out here is to hold a watching brief for St. James Street.

"Nor is the Province really interested in coalition. All the Province wants is an alibi for saddling Dr. Tolmie on the people of this province. What it is instructed to secure is another Conservative government, probably headed by Mr. Bowser, that by some obstetrical magic will not inherit the sins of the Tolmie crowd.

"It is unthinkable that either Tolmie or any of his moribund group should emerge from their turgid stupidities to lead or even be included in any coalition cabinet.

"Who would call in as physician the very man who had poisoned the patient?"

SKIDEGATE SUNRISE IS REAL MINE IN MAKING; OUTLOOK IS PROMISING

(Continued from Page 1)

Plant Paid For

The present drilling plant has all been paid for and the capitalization is very low. The authorized capital of the company is \$750,000 of which only \$400,000 has so far been issued. By selling the remainder of the stock, sufficient capital would be realized to put in a modern operating plant including a mill which would enable the company to be independent of any of the large operating concerns and avoid the evils of over-capitalization.

The mine is only three-quarters of a mile from the highway and eight miles from Queen Charlotte City. At present supplies are taken in over a rough trail by tractor which operates quite easily over it. The ore is a straight gold proposition, free milling with 60% recoverable or 85.80% by means of the flotation or, with retabling, an additional 8%. It is planned to install a 30-ton unit with possible increase to 100 tons.

Just before Mr. King left the mine several days after I visited it, returns had been received from some additional tests which were of a very optimistic nature, better than anything previously recorded.

The mine is close to the Skidegate Indian village and a couple of miles, perhaps, from the white village. Naturally, the residents of both these villages and of the islands generally are keenly interested in the work going on and they all speak very highly of the persistence and good management of Mr. McMorris. They feel that a good shipping and paying mine at Skidegate will draw the attention of the mining world to the islands as nothing else could and are all anxious to see it succeed.

POWER FOR SKIDEGATE

SKIDEGATE MISSION, Aug. 18:—The natives of this village have ambitious plans in hand for the coming winter. They are looking forward to putting in a modern hydro-electric power plant which will supply them with power and light at a minimum cost.

The Indian Department has a fund with which it helps the natives with such projects as that planned. Whether Skidegate will undertake the hydro-electric scheme this year depends to some extent on whether the village can get the grant this year. If it does, the work will soon be under way. The plan is to dam the stream that passes close to the Skidegate Sunrise mine and put in the proper plant and wiring. Already villagers have running water laid on from the same stream. The plan is an ambitious one but the Skidegates are an ambitious people and are determined to lead the way in modern developments among native peoples. They have good homes, excellent fishing boats and now they want the most modern form of lighting.

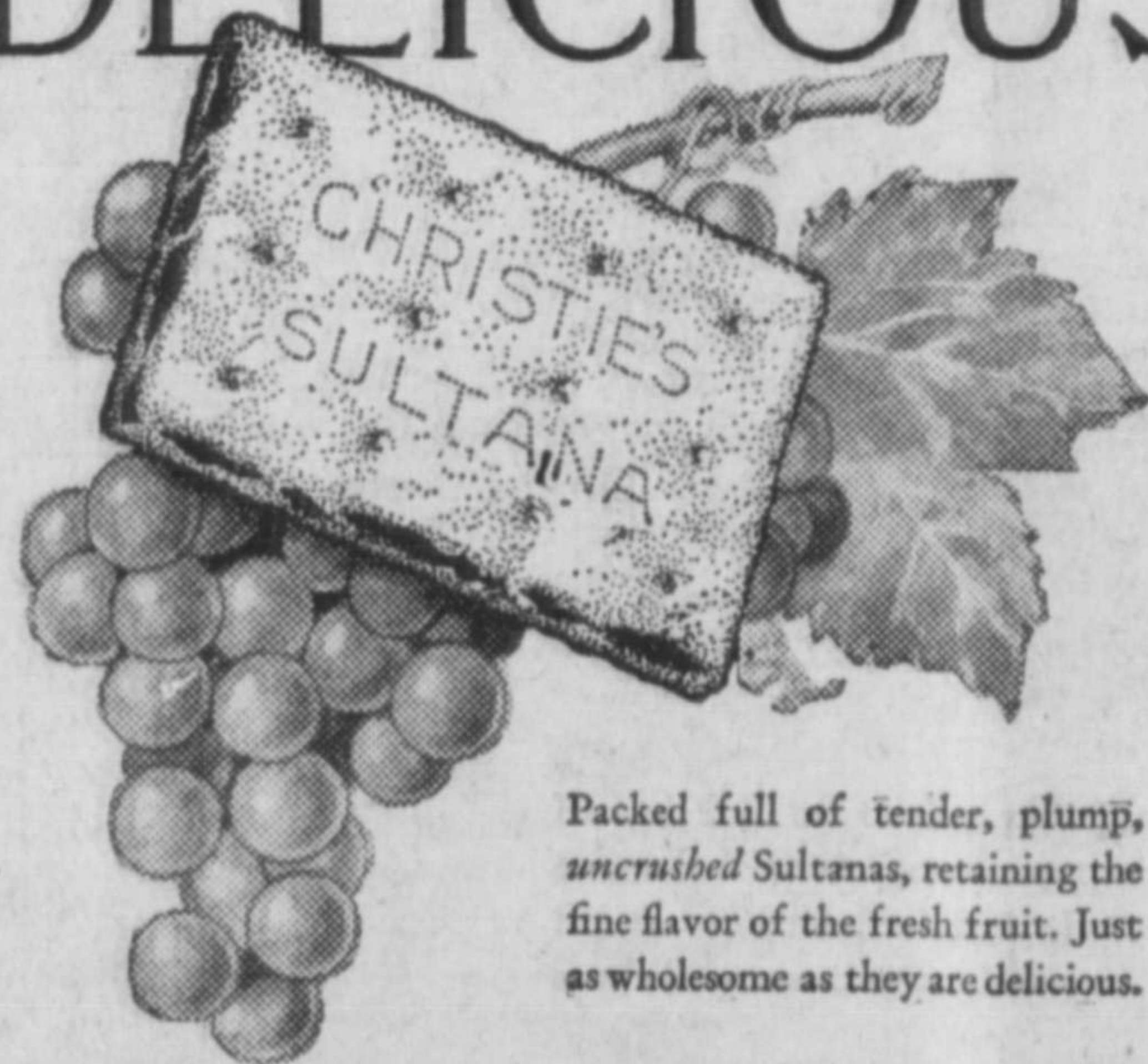
