New Constitutional Plans Announced By British

GOVERNING

LONDON, Aug. 18:-The British government yesterday announced a new constitutional plan which it has settled upon for the government of India by its provincial legislatures.

Division of power is placed between Hindus, Moslems and other classes in much the same manner as has prevailed in the past.

Separate elections are still provided for instead of joint elections as demanded by Mahatma Gandhi and his Hindu fellowers.

Provision is made for women to hold a certain number of seats in the provincial legislatures and, for the first time. Moslem women are recognized as a political factor in India.
