Liquor Board Purchase is Criticized

NORTHERN RANGES ARE BEING INSPECTED BY BIG AMERICAN CATTLE MAN

Montana Senator Would Have Thousands of Catt'e Range On Queen Charlotte Islands

If Senator Stevens, one of most enthusiastic about everything he had seen since his arrival for the Queen Charlotte Islands recently with F. L. Buckley to look over the prospects for cattle ranching there, finds conditions in any way approaching what he expects, he intends to transfer part of his activities to the north and, within a short time, have between four thousand and five thousand head of livestock ranging on the Queen Charlottes.

Senator Stevens is a most agreeable and genial gentleman and in conversation with the July News before his departure for the islands said that he was long.

SULPHITE MILL EXPECTED SOON

So Says J. A. W. Bell Addressing Rotary Club Yesterday Afternoon.

J. A. W. Bell, general manager of the Prince Rupert Pulp and Paper Co., who addressed the local Rotary Club at their weekly luncheon yesterday noon, proved a welcome speaker through the cheerful and optimistic statements he gave out in regard to the future operations of his company.

After congratulating the citizens present upon the fact that they had a Rotary Club established in Prince Rupert, Mr. Bell went at once into the subject of the prospects of the early establishment by his company of a pulp and paper mill at Seal Cove.

He did not wish to indulge in any wild promises of gigantic operations in the immediate future or anything of that nature. He impressed upon his hearers the well known difficulties of obtaining capital for industrial enterprises at the present moment, instancing the French nation just now having difficulty in floating a \$100,000,000 loan in the United States, offering at 9%, guaranteeing 8 per cent interest.

He thought that the erection of a sulphite mill would materialize at no very distant date. The reports of the engineers and experts who had looked over the ground available for sites were most encouraging and would doubtless go a long way towards furthering the project.

Altogether he was most hopeful of the future in regard to the enterprise, he had great faith in Prince Rupert, and was confident it was only a question of a few years when things would be humming here.

WOULD TRY SUN YAT AS ROBBER

Chinese Government Orders the Arrest of Republican President.

SAN FRANCISCO, May 27.—The Chinese government at Pekin has ordered provincial officials to capture and try as a robber Dr. Sun Yat, who recently has been appointed president of the Chinese Republic with its capital at Canton.

AMMUNITION FROM STATES IS TAKEN IN DUBLIN VICINITY

Supply Amounting to 166,388 Rounds Said to be Originating in United States.

LONDON, May 27.—Ammunition manufactured in the United States amounting to 166,388 rounds, has been captured in the Dublin district since March 26 last, Sir Hamar Greenwood, chief secretary for Ireland, stated in the House of Commons yesterday.

CONFIDENCE IN BRIAND VOTED

WOULD TRY SUN YAT AS ROBBER

French Premier, However, Dis-appointed Many Followers With Statement on Ruhr.

PARIS, May 27.—The Chamber of Deputies has voted confidence in the Briand administration by a division of 310 to 262.

The confidence vote was made narrower on account of Premier Briand's recent address when he declared that the present situation in the Ruhr region did not call for armed occupation by France. This declaration met with the evident disappointment of many of the premier's followers.

BRITISH LEAVE ON WAY SILESIA

Four Battalions Started from Rhine Yesterday Morning to Assist Peace Making

LONDON, May 27.—Four battalions of British troops on the Rhine yesterday began their advance to Upper Silesia to reinforce the Allied troops already there.

LONDON, May 27.—Four British battalions are already advancing from the Rhine into Upper Silesia, to be followed shortly by two more to oppose the insurrection.

PHIL GERVUTZ IS SENTENCED

Gets Five Years for Conspiracy to Defraud Merchants Bank.

VANCOUVER, May 27.—Phil Gervutz has been sentenced to five years in prison for conspiracy with J. S. Bancroft, assistant manager of the Merchants Bank, who was sentenced to four years; in conspiracy to defraud the bank in connection with the theft of Victory bonds. This four year term for Bancroft is on a second count as he is already under a four year sentence for theft. Both sentences will run concurrently.

ENGLISH MAGNATES HERE SEEKING LOAN.

Vancouver Sun Publishes Letter to Premier Oliver about Purchase Warehouse

VANCOUVER, May 27.—The Daily Sun has published an open letter to Premier Oliver enquiring into the circumstances surrounding the recent purchase by the government from Charles E. Campbell of warehouse premises for the provincial liquor board. The price paid is reported to have been \$150,000.

The Sun states that the entire property including lots and building was assessed at \$58,500. The paper asks whether the premier intends to "ratify and adhere to the purchase or demand repayment of the sum paid in excess of the real value."

Oliver Knows Nothing.

TORONTO, May 27.—Premier Oliver of British Columbia who is visiting his father at Priceville, said today that he knew nothing of the details of the transaction of the B. C. Liquor board for a warehouse in Vancouver, when asked regarding the letter appearing in the Vancouver Sun alleging that \$150,000 had been paid for premises ready

worth only half that amount.

Farris Replies.

VICTORIA, May 27.—J. W. de B. Farris, attorney-general, in reply to the charge laid by the Vancouver Sun that the government had paid approximately double the value for the Campbell's warehouse in Vancouver, explained that under the B. C. Prohibition Act, a portion of Campbell's place had been rented for liquor storage purposes. He stated that when the supply of liquor had begun to pour into the province under the new act, the government had naturally looked to these premises which were already partly occupied and to which the government were tied by a lease.

On April 1 last, after rental valuations had been received from Vancouver firms, a lease was secured for five years at \$1,400 per month, with the option of purchase for \$150,000. When the liquor board had been appointed it considered that it would be better business to purchase than to rent, pointing out that the interest charges would

SMUTS APPEALS CHANCE LEAGUE

Asks That It be Given Chance to Show What It Can Do.

CAPE TOWN, May 27.—General Jan Smuts, premier of the Union of South Africa, in the assembly today warmly defended the League of Nations and made an earnest appeal that the league be given chance to show what it can do.

Referring to the Irish question, the premier stated that the British Government might want to consult the dominions on the subject.

GALE BRINGS DRUG RECOMMENDATIONS TO ATTENTION OF EAST

MONTREAL, May 27.—Mayor Gale of Vancouver has submitted to Mayor Martin and the city council a series of recommendations for the suppression of the menacing drug traffic to be brought before the federal authorities.

CUNNINGHAM IS NEW PRESIDENT MANUFACTURERS

James Ramsay, M.L.A., Refers to Provincial Policy Meeting Yesterday.

VANCOUVER, May 27.—J. A. Cunningham, manager of the B. C. Refining Co., has been elected president of the B. C. Manufacturers' Association, succeeding J. H. Falconer, who was chosen temporary president.

James Ramsay, M.L.A., at the meeting of the association yesterday, referred to a letter he had received from Premier Oliver stating that the financial policy of the provincial government provided for no aid to industries hereafter. This would not, however, apply to scientific research.

WISH BRITISH ADMINISTRATION

Inhabitants of Trans-Jordan Revolt Against Newly Appointed Ruler.

JERUSALEM, May 27.—The inhabitants of Trans-Jordan are reported to have risen in revolt against the newly appointed ruler, Prince Zeid, the third son of the King of the Hejaz. The prince's forces have been defeated, it is said. The revolutionists desire to be governed by the British administration of Palestine.

PENSION BOARD REPORT TABLED

Advise Continuation Fifty per cent Bonus But no Further Grants.

OTTAWA, May 27.—The continuation of the fifty per cent bonus of pensions to returned soldiers is the feature of the report of the parliamentary committee on pensions and re-establishment which was tabled in the House of Commons today. The committee has again decided against further bonuses or gratuities.

DRY DOCK BOYS HAD SMOKER LAST EVENING IN HOTEL

Last evening the Dry Dock boys again made merry, holding another of their famous sing songs in the Commissary, when songs, recitations, vaudeville stunts and boxing bouts were pulled off to the delight of the large audience who enthusiastically applauded each and every event. BUBONIC PLAGUE REPORTED TO BE ON AT TAMPICO

Dominions Not Prepared to Assist.

Writing to the London Times, Professor Borriedale Keith, of Edinburgh University, says the process of development of Imperial relations was inevitably accelerated in an unprecedented manner by the formation of the League of Nations. The Dominions were thus compelled at a much earlier date than had been anticipated to assume a status for which they were not fully prepared, a fact which Mr. Fielding has emphasized more than once in the Canadian House of Commons. This lack of preparation is evinced most conclusively by the unwillingness of any of the Dominions, even including Australia, to face the burden of a just share in the cost of naval defence. Years, it must be admitted, will elapse before the United Kingdom can expect any serious aid in this regard, save possibly from the Commonwealth. General Smuts, despite his wholehearted doctrine of autonomy, has admitted his misgivings as to the part which the Union can play as regards naval defence.

Broader Viewpoint

International Relations.

Imperial relations, therefore, are now in a transitional state, which may be of considerable duration, and the immediate problem for the Imperial Conference meeting next month is to seek to devise some reasonably effective way of co-ordinating Imperial foreign policy. The Empire at least ought to be united on the issue of reparations, and Dominion statesmen must realize that an international status implies that foreign politics must now occupy their serious attention from a broader point of view than mere Dominion interests. But the process will be gradual, for it must be one of spontaneous evolution in the public feeling of the Dominions themselves.

Daughters of Empire
And New Hall.

The Daughters of the Empire are still assiduously devoting their attention towards the establishment of a suitable edifice in the form of a public hall on their lots at the corner of McBride Street and Fifth Avenue. Nearly all their efforts for the past year have been in that end and they have now a sum in the vicinity of \$2,000 raised for the cause. Their present plan is to raise \$5,000 before any attempt is made to start the building. Then it is proposed to make definite plans with their finances on a substantial basis and with a neat sum in hand. The hall which the Daughters of the Empire propose building will fill a long felt need in the city and while it will be used mainly for dances and similar functions it will also be available for any deserving public cause. The existence of such a place in the city will benefit nearly everyone either directly or indirectly. Therefore the order is deserving of every assistance and patronage. A carnival is to be put on June 3 and 4 by the united chapters in the city. If you feel that the building proposed by the Daughters of the Empire will be nefit you in any way it would be well to assist in getting it under way at an early date.

DIVORCES ARE
ON INCREASEBritish Judge Says Many Un-
defended Cases Collusive

LONDON, May 27.—Divorces are increasing at a great rate here, and so, too, according to Judge Darling, are the "shyster methods," as they are sometimes termed in America, whereby some divorces are obtained. Judge Darling is one of the veterans of the bench who has recently had to tackle divorce cases in addition to his regular judicial work, in order to cope with the growing demand for the untying of nuptial knots.

"We know perfectly well that an enormous proportion of the undefended cases in the divorce court are merely collusive," said Judge Darling. "Men know as well as I do that those letters, 'My dear Billy, do return to your loving Kitty,' are composed in solicitors' offices. Everybody knows it, only it is presumed that the judge in the divorce court does not. Of course he does."

Judges who had retired are dragged back instead of being allowed to enjoy their old age in comfort because there are not enough judges to deal with these cases. And what wonder when people can come into the divorce court and treat it in this fashion?"

He added that what people looked for most in the newspapers were the likenesses of every adulterer who could be snappishly coming out of the courts.



CUTTING TIES IN INTERIOR

Kept Many Men busy Along the C. N. R. during the Past Winter.

PERMISSION IS OBTAINED FOR USE OF HEMLOCK

SMITHERS, May 27.—One of the chief industries of the Bulkley, Nechako and Skeena River valleys during the past winter has been the getting out of ties for the Canadian National Railways. In all something like 1,250,000 ties have been taken out in addition to telegraph poles and piles.

The chief contractors engaged in the work have been Ole Hansen of Prince Rupert, D. Jennings and Jack McNeill of Telkwa, Wm. Coop, and the Fort Garry Lumber Co. The largest contract was that of the Prince Rupert man who took out 520,000 ties besides poles and piling. He has had a large organization in charge of the work, including H. G. Olsen, manager; Harry Orme, superintendent east of Smithers, and Fred Cook west of Smithers; R. E. Allen, manager of the Royal Mills.

Hemlock Now Used.
Since the visit few months ago of W. H. Grant of Toronto, general tie agent for the Canadian National Railways, permission has been given to supply hemlock, the western hemlock having been proved to be even superior to jack pine or any other wood. Practical demonstration of its value was given Mr. Grant when he was here and he is now convinced of its value.

The industry is over for the season but will in all probability commence again in the fall as the railway has to have ties to keep the line in good shape.
