CITY OF TORONTO NAMES MAYOR CHURCH AGAIN

BETHMANN HOLLWEG, FORMER CHANCELLOR OF GERMANY, HAS PASSED

Mayor Church Has His Biggest Triumph

Defeats Samuel J. McBride by 16,200 in Toronto Mayoralty Contest; Other Returns

TORONTO, January 3.—Thomas L. Church has been re-elected mayor of Toronto for the seventh consecutive term defeating Former Controller Samuel J. McBride by a majority of 16,200 votes. This is Mayor Church's greatest triumph.

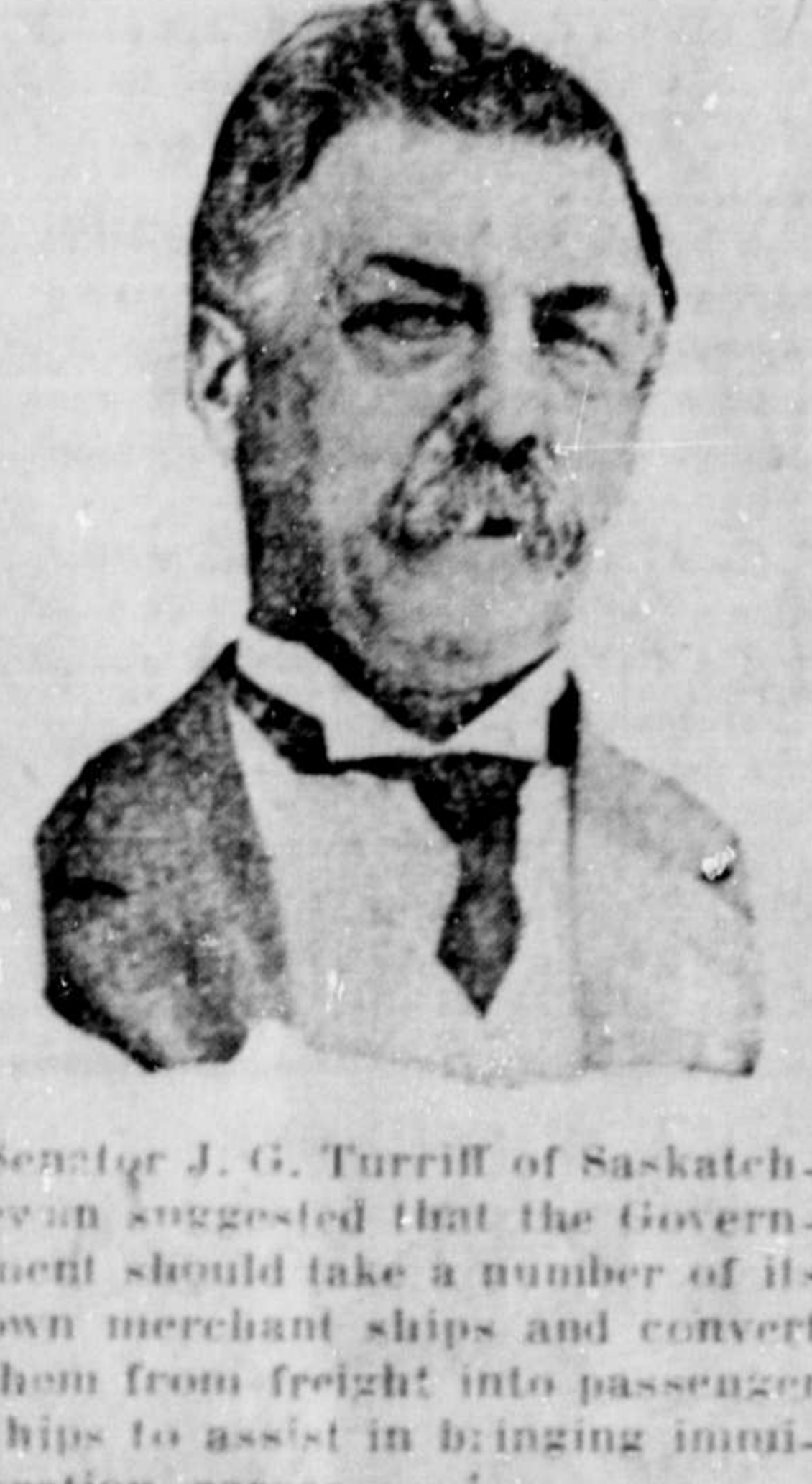
ATLAS ARRIVES TO GO INTO DOCK

Tanker, Which Went Ashore in Wrangell Narrows, Reaches This Port.

The oil tanker Atlas reached here yesterday afternoon about 3 o'clock to go on the local dry dock for survey under instructions from Captain Logan who represents the underwriters. The Atlas had pumps going in her forward hold on her arrival here and it will be decided after she has been examined on the pontoons whether she is fit to proceed to San Francisco in her present condition or whether repairs will have to be made here.

The Prince Rupert left the pontoons this morning and is again afloat. Tenders for her repairs will be closed on Wednesday and the contract will be awarded soon after, it is understood. Yarrows, B. C. Marine, Goughians and Wallace are tendering on the job.

German Chancellor, Who Spurned Belgian Treaty, Is Dead in City of Berlin

BERLIN, January 3.—Dr. Theobald von Bethmann-Hollweg, former German Imperial chancellor, is dead.

Bethmann-Hollweg was the author of the famous "scrap of paper" phrase, having described the Belgian treaty as such when he attempted to justify the military invasion of Belgium in 1914, although he admitted such invasion was unjust. He received prominent attention throughout the world in June, 1919, when he formally asked the allied powers to place him on trial instead of the ex-kaiser. The Supreme Council, however, decided to ignore his request.

CANADIAN NAVY COMING PACIFIC

Present Plans to Arrive Esquimalt about March

One of the prettiest home Weddings of the season was held last evening at the residence of Mr. and Mrs. James Thompson, River Road, Lulu Island, when their eldest daughter, Miss Elizabeth J. Thompson, was married to James B. MacKay, of Prince Rupert, Rev. J. J. Nixon was the officiating clergyman. While Miss Agnes Webster played the Lohengrin wedding march, the bride entered the drawing-room with her father, by whom she was given away. She looked very charming in her gown of white duchesse satin and georgette, with embroidery and pearl trimming, and her beautiful veil fastened with a spray of apple blossoms. OTTAWA, Jan. 3. The people of the Pacific coast will probably have their first look at Canada's new fleet early in March. According to present plans the squadron will arrive at Esquimalt about March 1st. The fighting ships will leave Halifax on January 6th for a cruise to the West Indies. In the West Indian waters they will have gunnery practice and general fleet work with the British North Atlantic squadron, after which they will start for the Pacific.

Captain Adams of the Aurora, the senior officer of the fleet, was in Ottawa last week to make his first report to Canadian naval headquarters. Lieutenant Charles Beard, commanding officer of the Patriot, was also in the capital to spend a few days with his parents.

COLONEL PECK IS HERE AGAIN

Hopes to Stay a Month and Look after Private Business First Time Since War

Colonel C. W. Peck, V.C., M.P., arrived yesterday from Vancouver on the Chelohsin and hopes to be in the city for a month to attend to some of his private business. This will be the first opportunity he has had to do this since his return from the war.

Speaking of dry dock affairs this morning, Col. Peck said that it was his opinion the work would recommence shortly. The government had first been of the opinion to proceed with the completion of the two ships itself, but by a later message he has received it would seem that the department of marine will now call for tenders. There is a possibility that the dry dock may be secured and operated by another private company.

W. E. Hodges, receiver of the Prince Rupert Dry Dock and Engineering Co., also reached the city on the Chelohsin yesterday afternoon.

STATE OWNED OR PRIVATE

No Government Would Undertake Ordinary Work of Prospecting For Minerals.

COBALT, Jan. 3.—Advocates of state ownership have on many occasions cast envious eyes on the gold and silver mines of the north. They would have the government take the handling of these resources away from private capital and nationalize them.

In this connection there is considerable food for thought in the report recently published to the effect that oil has been struck by operators on the Mackenzie River.

One can well picture the fate of any government that would be so foolhardy as to risk the people's money in drilling for oil in such wild territory. It would not last long enough to get a derrick on the ground.

Millions Spent.

It is usually the case that when a big mineral or oil find is made that the question crops up as to why the government does not occupy these properties for the benefit of the people. Only the completed success is seen by those who make these suggestions.

The fact that millions of dollars have been spent in the development of these enterprises by private capital is overlooked. Hundreds of one shots are daily played by private capital. No government that would take such risks could exist.

The History of Porcupine.

Porcupine can be taken as an example. It is estimated that the biggest share of the North's gold production to date, around \$60,000,000, has come from Porcupine. Even at that it is doubtful if all the private capital sunk into Porcupine in the development of various properties has as yet been recovered. And where there has been one success there have been many failures. A real effort to make some progress in the development of a mining property alone entails between two and three hundred thousand dollars, and back in 1912 there must have been 500 such properties in the district.

The advocate for nationalization sees only the handsome surplus of the McIntyre and Hollinger mines. He never thinks of the trying times the owners had in financing and working these properties to bring them to a success.

DOMINION SOON HAVE ELECTION

That is Prediction of J. H. Burnham of West Paterborough

PETERBORO, Jan. 3.—J. H. Burnham, ex-M.P. and straight conservative candidate in the coming by-election in West Peterboro, says he had good reasons for stating that there would be a reconstruction at Ottawa and an appeal to the people by general election at an early date.

"In view of the American tariff it is apparently useless to go on with fancy combinations in Canada," said Mr. Burnham. "We must return to the old parties or the discount on Canadian money will become altogether intolerable."

Rumor of Early Reorganization

LONDON, Ont. Dec. 31.—A prominent Londoner who has just returned from Ottawa states that he received reliable information while in the Capital that the Meighen Government will begin reorganization at the beginning of the new year and that a general election will be held either in February next, or, if it is found more advisable, voting will take place, at the latest, when the farmers have completed their seeding, probably in June. The tariff will be the main issue, as it is felt that this will be strengthened by the threatened action of the United States to place a heavy duty on Canadian products.

MAN FELL INTO ICY WATERS OF HARBOR

Gabriel Rancher Caught Afloat With His Cries for Help.

Quite a little excitement was caused along the waterfront yesterday afternoon by a man's loud calls for help being heard from somewhere out in the harbor just opposite the G. T. P. wharf. Word was received at the police station and immediately assistance was sent. It appears that a man of the name of Gabriel Rancher, who had been out cruising around in a small boat had upset and was drifting around in the icy waters. Svanson's launch was the first to arrive on the scene and picked up the wrecked mariner, who upon being brought to shore was immediately rushed off to the hospital. No serious results are apparent from the result of the accident.

YANCOUVER H'D FORTY-SEVEN ACCIDENTS ON NEW YEAR'S WEEK-END

Frank Kersley was Victim of Only Fatal One—Auto Driver Under Arrest.

YANCOUVER, Jan. 3.—Shortly before midnight on New Year's Eve, Frank Kersley, of the West end, while celebrating and blowing a nickel horn, was instantaneously dashed into another world as he crossed Hastings Street.

He was either knocked down by an auto driven by Clarence Jenkins, of the Travellers Hotel, who is out on \$5,000 bail on a manslaughter charge, or was wedged between that car and a street car.

Forty-seven accidents marred the weekend festivities. Although some cases reached the hospital there was only the one which proved fatal.

Weather Report for Year Past is Satisfactory One

Little Difference from 1919; Extreme Rainfalls Seem to Become Less Frequent as Time Advances

Dominion Meteorologist F. W. Dowling this morning issued a very satisfactory weather report from his office for the year 1920 just passed. The totals differ very slightly from last year, the total precipitation being 82.67 inches as against 82.14 inches in 1919, which was four inches less than 1918, itself a comparatively dry year. These figures would indicate that there is something in the belief that as time goes on Prince Rupert's weather is improving and the excessive rains of ten years ago are not so common. January was the coldest month and August the warmest, December the wettest and July the driest, in that month there being but .77 inches of rain, a local record for a dry month. The highest temperature for the year, 74 above, was reached in July.

UNEMPLOYMENT WAS SUBJECT OPEN FORUM

J. H. Burroughs and N. Booth Spoke at Gathering Last Night

Considering the inclement weather there was a good attendance at the Open Forum gathering at the O.H.U. Hall last evening, about a hundred and fifty persons being present to listen to addresses given by J. H. Burroughs and N. Booth. Unemployment in the world generally, and this district in particular, was the topic of the hour. The speakers brought out most clearly the difference in the causes today and in the past. At the present time it was chiefly due to the breaking down of international credit. After quite a little general discussion a committee was appointed to wait on the city council this evening and go into the question of unemployment as it affects this city.

TORONTO FINANCIER DEAD IN THAT CITY

Sir Frank Baillie Started as Clerk and is Now President of Large Companies.

TORONTO, Jan. 3.—Sir Frank Baillie, the prominent financier, is dead.

Sir Frank Baillie started his career as a clerk and has become president of the Canadian Aeroplanes, Limited, Toronto; Bankers' Bond Company, Limited; Canadian Cartridge Co., Limited, and Burlington Steel Co., all of which companies he organized. He was born in Hamilton 45 years ago but has resided here for many years. He is survived by a widow, two sons and two daughters.

NEW MILITARY RULE IN CORK

Persons Knowing Others have Arms Must Report or Become Liabilities

CORK, Jan. 3.—Seven houses and their contents in nearby towns have been burned by the military as the result of an ambush of police near Middleton.

CORK, Jan. 3.—Any persons knowing of others who possess arms or ammunition must report immediately or render themselves liable according to a notice issued here. It is also forbidden to assist rebels in finding food, clothing or shelter.

POLICE COURT

Liquor and Drugs Popular Methods of Obtaining New Year Cheer.

As might have been expected, there were rather more cases before Magistrate McMordeid this morning in the police court than usual on account of the holiday and the customary New Year festivities. Two young men were fined \$20 each for fighting, three others the usual ten and costs for being palpably inebriated, and a Japanese donated fifty dollars for being in possession of liquor. Several Chinamen were remanded until tomorrow on charges of smoking opium and having the noxious drug in their possession. For the previous offence bail was fixed at \$100, while in the latter it was necessary to make a \$200, that being the minimum amount of the fine upon conviction.

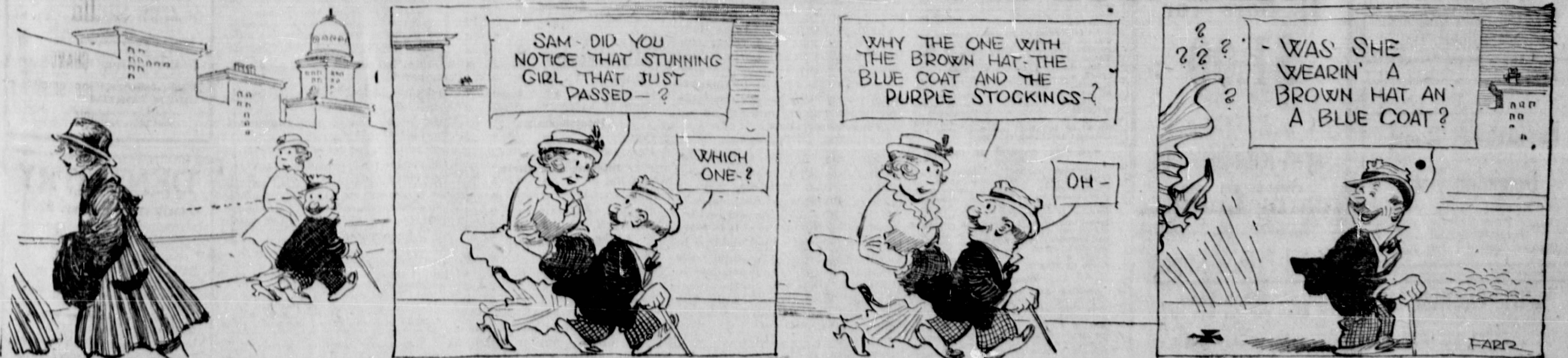

Synopsis of Land Act Amendments

Minimum price of first-class land reduced to \$5 an acre; second-class to \$3.50 an acre.

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land.

Partnership pre-emptions abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emptions with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.

Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres before receiving Crown Grant.

Where pre-emptor occupation not less than 5 years, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, because of illness or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence may be issued, provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$250 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. This cannot be obtained in less than 5 years, and improvements of \$10.00 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years are required.

Pre-emptor holding Crown grant may record another pre-emption, if he requires land to constitute or improve farm, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homestead title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.

For trading and industrial purposes areas exceeding 50 acres may be leased by one person or company.

Mills, factories or industrial sites on timber land not exceeding 40 acres may be purchased; conditions include payment of soldiers' free grants.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT.
The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving in the military forces. The time within which the heirs or widows of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for the same under this Act is extended from one year from the date of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retrospective.

No fees relating to pre-emptions are due or payable by soldiers on pre-emptions recorded after June 25, 1918. Taxes are remitted for five years.

Provision for return of moneys accrued, due and been paid since August 4, 1914, on account of payments, fees or taxes on soldiers' pre-emptions.

Interest on agreements to purchase town or city lots held by members of Allied Forces, or dependents, acquired direct or indirect, remitted from enlistment to March 31, 1920.

SUB-PURCHASERS OF CROWN LANDS.
Provision made for issuance of Crown grants to sub-purchasers of Crown lands, acquiring rights from purchasers who die, to complete purchase, involving forfeiture, on fulfilment of conditions of purchase, interest and taxes. Where sub-purchasers do not claim whole of original parcel, purchase price due and taxes may be distributed proportionately over whole area. Applications must be made by May 1, 1920.

GRAZING.
Grazing Act, 1919, for systematic development of livestock industry provided for grazing districts and range administration under Commissioner. Annual grazing permits issued based on numbers raised; priority for established owners. Stock-owners form Associations for range management. Fees, or partially free, permits for settlers, campers or travellers, to be laid down.

BIRDS AIDED IN GREAT WAR

Parrots Announced Approach of Airplanes—Pigeons Used as Carriers—Canaries Saved Lives.

Parrots were tried out early in the recent European conflict as war birds. A number of them were kept in cages on the Eiffel Tower in Paris, to give warning of approaching aircraft.

They acquitted themselves wonderfully, announcing by their squawks the approach of an airplane or airship twenty minutes before its coming could be detected by human eyes or ears. Unfortunately, however, they were unable to distinguish between enemy and friendly aircraft; and, growing indifferent after a while, they ceased to be trustworthy.

The big war work was done by homing pigeons. Even when badly wounded they would do their best to deliver the messages they carried.

Remarkable Pigeon.

A remarkable case in this line was that of pigeon No. 2709, which, on October 3, 1917, flying from the front line to divisional headquarters, was struck by a bullet that broke its leg, drove the metal cylinder containing the message into its breast and passed through its body. Nevertheless, it struggled home to its loft, nine miles away, and delivered the message, dying soon after its arrival. It is now in a museum at Whitehall, stuffed with a label. Died of wounds received in action. A soldier who had done like service would have received the V. C.

In 1918 a pigeon post service in London carried messages of subscribers to the war loan, delivering them at the Tank Bank in Trafalgar Square.

The Germans sometimes camouflaged their war pigeons with coats of paint, and in some instances at least they made the cotes gasproof.

Canaries Useful.

Canaries, as is well known, saved the lives of thousands of fighting men by the warning they gave of poison gas. A percentage of it in the air imperceptible to human beings caused them to drop off their perch—a signal that it was time for the soldiers to put on their gas masks. But in many cases the birds became such pets that the men would keep them in places as safe from gas as possible, thus negating the purpose for which they were meant to be used.

Gulls, actuated perhaps by curiosity, had a way of following and hovering over submerged U-boats, thereby betraying their whereabouts in a way most unsatisfactory to the Germans, but highly profitable to the British and Americans hunting for them.

was put forth that the mines should be operated on the profit-sharing basis and that the miners should share the profits with the companies. An interesting case was presented to them on one property. It is not as yet a producer. The miners here saw their dream shattered when they were asked to work without pay for a couple of years and take their chances of getting a return for their work if the property turned out a producer of commercial ore. It is pretty difficult to imagine public ownership taking the risks attendant upon mining or oil drilling enterprises.

The case of the unfortunate man A. H. Dyke who has been missing since Christmas Eve, is still an unsolved mystery, despite all the efforts of the authorities to clear up the matter. It is feared he must have lost his life in some way or other, along the waterfront through an accident in the dark. Relatives of the missing man have arrived in the city since being apprised of the strange disappearance.
