Briand is Made New French Premier

WINSTON CHURCHILL REPORTED TO HAVE ACCEPTED IMPORTANT POSITION

Aristide Briand is New Prime Minister of France

Will Confer with Lloyd George; Believes in Complete Enforcement of Peace Treaty and Solidarity of France, Great Britain and U.S.

PARIS, January 17.—Aristide Briand, minister of foreign affairs in the late French cabinet, has been appointed Premier of France and has already formed a cabinet. It is also announced that he will confer with Premier Lloyd George over German disarmament and other matters now awaiting settlement, on January 25.

Little enthusiasm is evinced by French newspapers over the new Briand cabinet. Most of the journals express mild satisfaction or have reserved judgment.

The significance of the Briand appointment is not lost upon the people, who regard his friendship for Premier Clemenceau, always insisted that the Peace Treaty must be carried out, that the interests of France in the near east must be served. He has been an advocate of complete solidarity between France, Spain and the United States.

NOTHER SINK PLOT IS SAID TO BE EXPOSED



Patrick Kenny, Irishman, Charged with Attempted Murder and Destruction

LONDON, Jan. 17.—What the police allege to be another "big sink plot" to destroy property in London was discovered on Sunday when Patrick Kenny, an Irishman, was charged with participating in an attempt to murder two policemen and trying to ignite barrels of oil in the premises of the Vacuum Oil Co., where 60,000 barrels containing 2,500,000 gallons of oil were stored.

WILL SUPPLY OCEAN FALLS REEVES CHOSEN SOUTHERN B.C.

Northern Interior Co-operative Lands Big Piece of Business From Pulp Town.

For some time past the Northern Interior Co-operative Association has been endeavoring to secure a contract to supply produce from the Bulkley Valley to Ocean Falls. In its efforts the association was assisted somewhat by M. Marion M. L. A. Last week H. A. Beck, general manager of the Co-operative, received a wire from Ocean Falls, notifying him that his tender for supplies had been accepted and became effective immediately.

Mr. Beck is to be commended upon securing this business for the Co-operative, as it is one of the most important markets on the coast. It will be a great aid for the Bulkley farmers, who will have an outlet for a much larger quantity of produce. —Omineca Herald.

A series of snowslides between Golden and Field have delayed traffic considerably on the Canadian Pacific Railway. Snowfalls have been very heavy in the Selkirks and the Rockies, but in the latter it is not yet up to the normal, although three feet has fallen in the last few days.

NORWAY'S LABOR PARTY SPLIT ON INTERNATIONALE

CHRISTIANIA, Jan. 17.—Norway's labor party has definitely split on the proposal to adhere to the Third Internationale of Moscow. A new labor party will be formed, of which most of the labor members of parliament belong.

BILL HAMILTON DIED IN HYDER

Restaurant Man, Well Known Here, Passed Away in Mining Camp on Friday.

STEWART, Jan. 17.—William H. Hamilton died suddenly on Friday night as a result of heart trouble.

Mr. Hamilton was an old timer of Prince Rupert, having worked in the White Lunch and other restaurants as well as having been engaged in fishing. He conducted a restaurant in Hyder known as "Bill's Place."

He was predeceased by his wife but two sons survive, one in Vancouver and another in California.

Churchill Probably Colonial Secretary

Unofficially Reported that Well-Known Newsaperman and Statesman is to Take Vacant Post in British Government

LONDON, January 17.—Right Hon. Winston Churchill, secretary of state for war, it is reliably although unofficially stated, has accepted the post of secretary of state for the colonies in succession to Viscount Milner, who resigned that position on January 7.

The secretary for the colonies is the minister who has to do with Canadian affairs and for that reason the appointment is important to that country.

Mr. Churchill started out in life as a newspaperman. He is the son of the late Randolph Churchill and inherits some of his peculiarities. He served as war correspondent in Cuba during the Spanish campaign and in India during some of the frontier troubles. Taken prisoner by the Boers during the South African war he made a sensational escape and wrote some interesting articles for the newspapers during the campaign. He has been both a Liberal and Conservative and now he is a member of the coalition government of Lloyd George. He has held many important positions in the Government and came into prominence during the early stages of the war, when he was secretary for war and the Royal Air Force.

Mr. Churchill is a Conservative at heart and is disliked by the extreme labor parties both in Britain and the overseas dominions on account of his attitude of opposition to those organizations. He is, however, in close touch with the trend of affairs in the overseas dominions.

COLD SNAP IS FELT IN NORTH

Sixteen Degrees of Frost Here but Nearly All Interior Points Below Zero.

A cold snap has struck the north and while it is not very cold on the coast, interior points are in the grip of the ice king. Following the snow fall of the week, during which time it was quite mild, young and old were out tobogganing yesterday, taking possession of the streets in the absence of other traffic.

The temperature here last night reached 16 above zero at the coldest time. At Terrace the coldest was 4 above, at Hazelton 22 below zero, Telkwa 12 below, Smithers 20 below, Burns Lake 15 below and at Fifth Cabin, 38 miles north of Hazelton on the Yukon telegraph line, the mercury dropped to 38 below.

Yesterday a few people were out skating on Morse Creek but many were afraid to venture. Tonight, however, there is likely to be a big crowd there and possibly some will visit the salt lakes.

One tobogganing party from thelander started down Fulton St. toward Ninth Ave. on Saturday night with ten young people aboard a big toboggan. When they were travelling about thirty miles an hour they shot off the road on to the muskeg. There were no fatalities but as a result several of them were limping around all day yesterday. It is said that the steersman did not keep to the rails and that the brakeman was not on duty.

UKRAINIANS IN REBELLION

Soviet Fears Trouble Will Spread Owing to Unrest of Peasants.

RON, Jan. 17.—A despatch from Riga says Moscow reports serious peasant rebellion in the government of Podolia, Ukraine. The soviet government fears the revolt will spread in consequence of the unrest of the Ukraine peasants over the refusal of the soviet to remedy numerous grievances.

Optimism Regarding
Shipyard Affairs.

The special despatch from Vancouver, received on Saturday, to the effect that the order-in-council had already been passed letting the contracts for the completion of the two local ships to Wallace's and that the documents would be signed on the arrival of a Wallace representative at Ottawa, is most reassuring. There had been rumors of difficulties in regard to the transfer of the contracts, but these reports apparently have been false, or if true, the difficulties have been removed.

The next thing to do is to give every support to the new management and try to help them make the yards profitable. If they are not profitable, they will not be operated. That is true of every business. If the ship repair work is done in such a way as to compete with the Vancouver and Victoria yards, we shall be likely to have repair work done here continuously. There is also, under those conditions, a possibility of securing new contracts on a commercial basis. Possibly the Canadian National may build some of their own coasting steamers in their own yards.

When Will Aeroplanes
Come This Way?

There have been so many stories published of possible and probable visits of airplanes to this port that it seems as if there was a hoodoo on the place in regard to these machines. The latest despatch is to the effect that planes will make this a hopping off place en route to Athabasca Landing, from Vancouver. We have some facilities here for sea planes, but none for other varieties of airplanes. While, as a result of previous experience, people here are dubious about this being a visiting point for airplanes, developments are bound to come along those lines in the near future and it is quite possible that the hum of the air engines may be heard here this coming summer.

Those Prince Rupert people who were in Victoria at Christmas time may have seen an immense machine flying in from Vancouver in the teeth of a strong wind. It crossed the city and dropped into Esquimalt harbor. The wind it had to encounter was very similar to the breezes here except that it was not quite so gusty.

Slight Improvement
In Silver Prices.

Silver is now selling at 66 cents, a decided improvement over a few weeks ago. This will have a stimulating effect on the northern British Columbia mines which produce a great deal of silver. This mineral is the big thing in the Alice Arm district and there is also some on the Salmon River near Stewart. As the price is likely to stiffen even yet, the mines will find a market for their output this coming summer.

Preparations for
Active Work.

Already mining men are planning a campaign for the coming spring and summer. The Premier mine is shipping steadily and the Spider is preparing to make some shipments over the snow. This will be followed by activity in other mines of the district.

At Alice Arm there are all sorts of activities planned and it is probable a number of mines will be shipping before autumn. All this spells progress in the north and will react on all the other developments which are in progress or in prospect.

PLAN TO GIVE
RAILWAY BACKOttawa Says Silly Rumor and No
Intention Abandon Government
Ownership Yet

OTTAWA, Jan. 17.—An extraordinary story has been sent out from Ottawa by the Canadian Press to the effect that government operated railways may be handed back to their original owners and that the arbitration to be held, a few weeks hence is for the purpose of determining the price. As a consequence of this announcement newspapers all over Canada have been flooding their correspondents here with queries for detailed information.

"There is absolutely no foundation for the silly rumor," is the comment of responsible officials of the railway department.

No Demand Change

That to apply the phrase of a celebrated Canadian postage stamp we are likely to "hold a vast deficit than has been," when the result of the year's operation is made public, is now generally admitted and this is likely to create a demand for a change or at least a reorganization of management, but no one has seriously suggested that the roads should revert to the original hands.

The experiment of government ownership is not considered to have gone far enough as yet nor to have been conducted under such general conditions as to justify its abandonment.

ENGLISH WOMEN
LEAVE FOR STATES
AFTER HUSBANDSJackless Jills Would Marry, but
Shortage of Men in Old
Country

Jills are emigrating in considerable numbers from England in the hope of finding suitable "Jill-less Jacks" for husbands in the United States, according to Norah March, Bachelor of Science. Her comments on England's "marriageable" women who may never marry before the National Birthrate Commission some time ago were widely discussed in the British press.

Government figures show there is a surplus of a million women in England whose only hope of marrying depends on their migrating to some part of the earth where there is a more even distribution of the sexes. According to Miss March, they are doing it. She says she is receiving letters from Ameican girls from America that are "significant of the loneliness of some men's lives."

"Women are enterprise today," she added. "Many are emigrating who a few years ago would have feared to take the great adventure."

TICKETS FOR BRITISH
SUBJECTS WITH VOTES
SHOULD ONLY BE GIVENThis is the Resolution of Mariners
and Navigators' Convention
at Ottawa

OTTAWA, Jan. 17.—Among the resolutions passed at the convention of master mariners, pilots and navigators here there is one asking that only British subjects who have the franchise be allowed tickets. This would shut out the Japanese and Chinese, it was pointed out.

EXTENSIONS OF PAYMENT TIME TIMBER LIMITS

Matter Vitaly Affects Prince Ru-
pert in Connection With
New Pulp Mill.

MINISTER OF LANDS ARRANGING MATTER

VICTORIA, Jan. 17.—Although the Government has as yet made no announcement, timbermen say that an extension of time on the payment of the timber licenses which are in arrears, is almost certain. Hon. T. D. Pattullo says no action will be taken until working amendments are presented to the Legislature.

The extensions will have a material effect on the work of organizing the new pulp mill at Prince Rupert as a number of timber limits are held under option pending the complete organization of the company, and payments on some of these are due to the Government. Until the organization of the company is complete, these payments cannot be made.

The importance of encouraging any new industry in the north is of particular interest to the minister of lands and he has this particular case under advisement and the matter will be brought before the legislature at the earliest convenient moment.

LONDON, Jan. 17.—Australia has had a record harvest. The New South Wales crop alone is five million bushels. Throughout the entire country forty million bushels is available for export.

PHYSICALLY UNFIT MAY NOT MARRY

That is Proposal in Manitoba and Legislation Will be Asked Along That Line.

WINNIPEG, Jan. 15.—Production of a medical certificate to show that contracting parties to a marriage are medically fit will be compulsory if legislation to be asked for by the Manitoba Social Hygiene association is enacted.

Delegates attending the annual convention of the association have an appointment with the provincial government for 10 o'clock on January 21. William J. Battley, general secretary, announces. They will request the government to place a bill before the house "making it compulsory for all parties contracting marriage to produce a medical certificate that they are free from venereal disease before the license can be granted."

Nearly 100 delegates are expected to attend the convention, which opens in the Royal Templar building January 20.

SALMON GIVEN

Rivers Inlet Only District Showing More Fish Taken in Province for 1920

VANCOUVER ISLAND HAD TREMENDOUS DECREASE

In an interesting table published in the Canadian Fisherman of December is found a detailed statement of the British Columbia salmon pack for the 1920 season. Of the 1,876,616 salmon of various varieties handled through the canneries of the province for the year, 814,952 were in the plants of the Skeena River, Naas River and outlying districts. The total for the province shows a decrease from each of the years, 1919, 1918, 1917, 1916 and 1910. The number of fish taken in 1919 was 1,393,156. The only district in 1920 that shows a larger catch is the Rivers Inlet district where 152,828 fish were taken this year as against 80,367 in 1919.

The total for the Naas District in 1920 was 81,153 as compared to 97,512 the year previous.

On the Skeena River the 1920 catch was 334,392, while in 1919 the catch was 398,877. The catch in outlying districts, which included canneries in no particular district such as Butedale, was 198,412, a slight increase over 1919, which was 181,163. The Fraser River catch in 1920 was 152,860 as against 158,718 in 1919. The largest and most noticeable decrease was that of Vancouver Island, where only 87,971 fish were recorded, a tremendous decrease from 276,519 the year previous.

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
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
