RAILWAY TO COAL FIELDS FROM STEWART

B. Morkill Tells Rotary Club of Prospects for Northern Country.

There is sure to be a railway from Stewart to connect the Peace River country, said B. Morkill, the mining engineer, who addressed the Rotary Club at its meeting today. It is only 350 miles from the end of the Peace River to the end of the Peace River. The Government, 90 miles to the south of the Peace River, 300 miles to the Peace River. Besides that, if oil is found in the Peace River it will be taken to the coast by the Peace River Canal as the shortest route. Mr. Morkill went on to say that the development of Stewart and the development of the Peace River for this city is a natural supply centre for the north.

Stewart Prospects. Speaking of the prospects at Stewart this year, Mr. Morkill said there was an attempt at a new year but it failed. This year there would not be as much staking and trading, but there would be more real development of properties there. He expected to see several new mines developed in the course of the next few years.

Workmen's Camp. William McNeish, representing the Workmen's Compensation Board, also spoke, telling of the splendid way in which most of the northern firms were carrying on and speaking most appreciatively of the Wallace Company of shipbuilders.

The Workmen's Compensation Board was caring for 1,355 widows and orphans at the present time.

PREPARATIONS INVADE RUHR

France Thinks Nothing but Policy of Force Will Compel Fulfilment of Demands.

DUSSELDORF, May 12.—Preparations for the occupation of the Ruhr district is proceeding despatchly. The German capitulation in connection with the question of reparations. The Paris opinion is said to be that Germany requires a policy of force to compel fulfillment of the demands of the allies.

BRITAIN IS IN FAVOR OF PROTECTION

Policy Adopted for Key Industries by a Large Majority Vote.

LONDON, May 12.—The Government employed the closure to carry a resolution for a 33-1-3 protection for the key industries of Great Britain. The votes stood 236 to 72. This resolution portends a total change in the general policy of the country which has stood for free trade for many years. It is a fiscal policy which will receive a great deal of opposition throughout the country.

BLACK FACE PARTY SHOT AND WOUNDED SEVERAL PEOPLE

DUBLIN, May 12.—Armed men shot Christopher Dolan and wounded another brother taking to find the member of the family released from jail following a court martial sentence. The attacking party had their faces blackened. Later the party killed a railway employee in the same district and chased others from the house in night attire. Crown forces attacked eight civilians at Limerick and shot one, wounded one and captured another.

JOHN BULL & SONS MANAGEMENT TO BE IN SENIOR PARTNER

LONDON, May 12.—A cable from Sydney quotes Lord Forrester, Governor-General of Australia as saying that the general management of the firm of John Bull & Sons must remain in the hands of the senior partner, who, however, should call freely into the council the partner sons who manage the respective branches of the empire.

PAPER MILLS CLOSE THROWING OUT OF EMPLOY 9,000 MEN

NEW YORK, May 12.—Seven large paper mills in the United States and Canada employing approximately 9,000 men shut down yesterday because of failure of the workers and owners to sign a new agreement replacing that which expired last month.

TRANSFER RAILWAY TO GOVERNMENT IS WILL OF SHAREHOLDERS

LONDON, May 12.—A meeting of the shareholders of the Grand Trunk Railway Company decided to ratify the agreement between the management and the Canadian Government providing for the transfer of control of the railway to the Government this month.

Gaily decorated with flags streaming from stem to stern and the Union Jack on her prow the Canadian Scottish awaits her official christening.

MARINE COOKS AND WAITERS STANDING OUT

LONDON, May 12.—The steamship stewards and cooks, who recently declared their intention of not accepting a cut of 17 per cent in their wages, are continuing their firm attitude against the proposition by refusing to sign on the steamships.

SINN FEINERS SPEAK PREMIER

London Daily Mail Says Irish Difficulties Being Smoothly Negotiated.

LONDON, May 11.—Negotiations towards a settlement of the Irish controversy are proceeding smoothly according to the Daily Mail which says that accredited representatives of the Sinn Fein have been in London this week bringing certain proposals to the government's notice. It is understood that they have had interviews with Premier Lloyd George.

MICHAEL CLARK IS OPPOSED TO BUDGET WHICH HE CRITICIZES

OTTAWA, May 12.—The House of Commons yesterday was chiefly occupied listening to the speech of Michael Clark, member for Red Deer, who criticized the budget. He was the first of the Progressive Party to announce support of the opposition amendment against acceptance of the budget.

RECRUIT TRANSPORT WORKERS IN BRITAIN TO HELP IMPORT COAL

LONDON, May 12.—Volunteer transport workers are again being recruited throughout the country to enforce the Government plans to import coal. There were many applicants for jobs.

Alaskan Legislature is Against Effort to Kill Rupert's Fishing Business

JUNEAU, May 12.—The effort to kill the fishing business of Prince Rupert and transfer it to Ketchikan failed as such efforts must always fail. The fishermen will not stand for it. The Hunt memorial seeking a tariff on fresh fish and products shipped through foreign ports was defeated in the House by a vote of thirteen to three after a fight led by Representative Hunter had been made on it.

The position was taken that such a tariff would be injurious to the fishermen by eliminating the Prince Rupert competition and forcing fishermen to sell their catches at Juneau, Ketchikan and other markets.

Representative Cochran said the memorial was on a par with the clause of the shipping bill which the Legislature is now attempting to knock out.

BIRNIE LEAVES FOR THIS PORT

First of New Power Lighthouse Tenders Now on Way Here.

VICTORIA, May 12.—On her initial voyage since being taken over by the Dominion Government, the power lighthouse tender Birnie left yesterday morning for Prince Rupert in command of Capt. H. A. Ormiston.

The Berena, a sister ship, will be commissioned within a week and will be commanded by Capt. Evans, chief officer of the Estevan.

These are the new 75-foot motor tenders built at Victoria for this service to take the place of the Leebro.

MANNING CONSECRATED.

NEW YORK, May 12.—Rev. Dr. W. T. Manning was yesterday consecrated the tenth bishop of the Protestant Episcopal diocese of New York.

Wallace Company
And This Port.

The Wallace Company is making great progress on the completion of the two big ships here and is carrying out the work so successfully that there is good hope they will find it profitable to remain and carry on the shipyard as a general repair and shipbuilding plant. There ought to be room for such a plant in the north and what place could be more suitable than this?

The announcement made by Mr. Turney yesterday in regard to the possibilities of remaining here was read with great interest by everyone. It was an announcement they had been looking for and which gives them courage to face the future, knowing that even if the Wallace Company should not decide to remain here, some shipbuilding concern will do so in the very near future. With a proper salvage plant in these waters and with the shipping people getting the habit of coming here, there should be no difficulty in securing sufficient business to keep the yard going.

At present the Dominion Government is bonusing a salvage plant with its headquarters at Victoria. Yet most of the shipping accidents occur considerably north of that port. The logical place for such a plant is right here.

Why Not Build
Cars for Railway?

Mr. Turney spoke of the possibility of undertaking other iron and steel manufacturing work until such time as the ship repair business here was sufficient to devote the whole time to it. Why not build fish cars here? The Dominion Government is needing them and there seems some difficulty and delay in getting them. It would seem as if the local concern might be able to handle this work if they could secure a contract.

Always Hope
While Conferring.

As long as negotiations are in progress there is always hope of a settlement. That is true of the Irish question although to mention such a possibility as a settlement of the age old question in public is to arouse a smile of incredulity. Some day it will be settled and then we shall wonder why there was so much fuss over so little. Mexico was a turbulent country with murders and pillage going on everywhere. Today the country has settled down and very soon will be prosperous. So it may be with Ireland. Once the troubles are over there will be no limit to the possibilities of the country. The Irish influence is very powerful all over the world today and only in Ireland are they in trouble. They help to govern almost every nation in the world and do it successfully. There must be something about the soil of the native country that makes for trouble.

Even Elements
Favoring Us.

It would seem as if there was a turn in the tide of the affairs of this city. The ships are being successfully completed, fish cars are said to be under construction, there is a pulp mill being organized here, the court house is being built and the railway station is to be erected in the future, also there is good prospect of a road. Now to cap it all the weather man has given us a splendid day to launch the good ship "Canadian Scottish." Surely Prince Rupert is coming into her own after many days of adversity.

The range of the tide may be computed as 5 per cent greater at Prince Rupert than at Port Simpson both at springs and neaps. Therefore the rise in the Prince Rupert harbor is slightly greater than Port Simpson.

The height is in feet and tenths of feet above the average level of lower low water.

MACHINISTS' STRIKE

Editor, Daily News:
I was instructed as secretary of the Prince Rupert Lodge, International Association of Machinists, to make a correction in your article of yesterday, May 11, headed "Machinists at Dock Walk Out."

The article states that the machinists gave the company half an hour in which to answer to their demand for 82½¢ per hour for machinists and engine fitters on repair work. This the men say is not correct. Mr. Turney, manager, told the committee to go to talk it over with the men involved and notify their shop foreman, Mr. Littler, within half an hour of the result, and unless machinists would do all work, either new work or repair work, at 78¢ per hour, shop would close down.

After the committee had notified their foreman that the men still wanted the local rate of 82½¢ for repair work and he in turn had seen the manager again, he returned to shop, stopped machinery and said unless we accepted Mr. Turney's offer we were through and could get our checks at once if needed and if any men wanted to could hire on in the morning.

This, Mr. Editor, is the correction which the men have asked me to publish, which I hope you will be kind enough to put in Thursday's issue.

ALASKAN LEGISLATURE IS AGAINST EFFORT TO KILL RUPERT'S FISHING BUSINESS

(Continued from Page One.)

the matter in its true light.

First, it is amazing that a legislature preponderantly Republican should oppose a protective tariff, the very doctrine that has made the party great, in the opinion of the great majority of members of that party.

Second, it would not deprive the fishermen of the competitive market at all, if the legislators were better informed. Several years ago when congress was expected to place a tariff on fish, even with a Democratic membership, the big buyers at Prince Rupert planned on moving their headquarters to Ketchikan and Juneau, thereby keeping alive exactly the same competition that now exists.

Keep Out Foreign.

Third, every protective tariff is expected to keep out foreign competition. That is the very idea, and to build up the competition at home.

And furthermore, if a fisherman is to catch his fish in Alaska waters, sell them in a foreign market, buy his supplies in a foreign port, and start out again for the American fisheries, what on earth good is he to Alaska anyway. As a Canadian he may be a first class citizen, but he does no good for America or Alaska. True, it may be said that after he sells he comes back to American ports with some of his money, but the portion is small, especially under the present circumstances, with the rate of exchange as it is.

Rupert's Record.

From February 25 to March 25 this year, Prince Rupert received 1,683,000 pounds of halibut, all caught in Alaska waters. Alaska received 690,000 pounds and Puget Sound 703,000 pounds. Thus the Canadian port received more than as much as all the American ports.

Under the tax recently levied by the legislature, the tax on the Prince Rupert landed halibut, had it been landed in an Alaskan port, and a same amount for each month of the year, would have meant a revenue to the Territory of more than \$20,000 a year and would have increased the commerce of Alaska near two and one-half million dollars.

Tax Not Protect.

The legislature did not hesitate to place a tax on the fresh fish business. Now, why should it hesitate to protect it? If it is protected, it will mean that Alaska will have more business, better transportation, more homes, more fishermen, greater prosperity and greater happiness.
