# GERMAN PLANE LANDS HERE ON FLIGHT AROUND WORLD

Young Scottish Aviator Was First To Span "Big Pond" In East to West Direction Alone

Capt. Von Gronau Unable to Accept Bid to Visit Alaska Capital

Capt. Wolfgang von Gronau, leader of the German round-theworld flight expedition. which is spending a few days in Prince Rupert following its arrival yesterday from Alberta, received a telegram ast night from the Juneau Chamber of Commerce inviting him to visit the Alaskan Capital after leaving Prince Rupert enroute to Japan. Even should he be unable to pay the visit there, the Juneau Chamber of Commerce, nevertheless, sent its best wishes for the success of the flight.

After reading the telegram, Capt. von Gronau announced that would be impossible for him to accept the invitation.

Capt. von Gronau also found it necessary to decline a pressing invitation to visit Jasper Park on his way to Prince Rupert.

ON TO HALIFAX AND LANDED IN NEW BRUNS-WICK-MADE CROSSING IN GOOD DEAL LESS TIME THAN EXPECTED.

ST. JOHN, N.B., Aug. 19:-Capt. J. A. Mollison, Scottish aviator, after successfully crossing the Atlantic Ocean, was forced to land owing to fatigue at Pennfield Ridge, fifty miles west of here, early this afternoon. After resting he will fly on to New York when he plans on making a speedy return flight to Cloydon, England.

Mollison stated, after landing, that during the last eighteen hours of the thirty hours in the air he flew through clouds and heavy mist. He passed over Harbor Grace and Halifax intending to reach New York but "was so tired I couldn't go on."

Immediately after landing on a large field, Mollison requested occupants of a nearby farmhouse to send word to Amy Johnson, his wife, of his safe arrival.

Mollison was still resting at Pennfield Ridge late this afternoon before resuming his flight to New York. He stated he would commence the return flight to Croydon after a "few days'" rest at New York.

HALIFAX, Aug. 19:—Capt. J. A. Mollison, young Scottish aviator, passed over here at 5:45 this morning enroute to New York on the first leg of his projected return flight across the Atlantic Ocean. With his arrival over Halifax,



AND COMPANIONS FLY 900 MILES TO COAST

(Continued from page one)

Rupert yesterday. Keeping well to the north in order to avail himself of the lower crossing of the Rocky lowed the Lesser Slave River and Peace River, crossed the Rocky waterways, crossed the Canadian National line near Smithers, following the Telkwa and Copper Rivers and picking up the Skeena River into Prince Rupert from the, neighborhood of Terrace. An average elevation of 6000 feet was maintained on the flight from Lac la Biche to Prince Rupert, flying over most of the mountains. A thunderstorm and very rough air was encountered over the Peace PALMOLIVE SOAP River and low clouds on the Skeena River from the vicinity of Kwinitsa into Prince Rupert. The plane was flying at a low altitude below the clouds when it arrived here.

Leaving here on Monday morning, Capt von Gronau plans on making his next stop at Cordova, a distance of 1000 miles. From there he will fly to Dutch Harbor, Attu Island, Paramushiru (Kamchatka) and via the Kurile Islands to Tokyo. This is the tentative route for the flight across the Pacific Ocean and it will be subject to change if meteorological or local conditions warrant.

Capt. von Gronau plans on spending some time in Japan and his route home to Germany will be via India, Persia, Mesopotamia, Turkey and Italy. The rather prolonged stay is be-

ing made at Prince Rupert in view of the fact that the plane and engime have to be checked up and arrangements completed for refuel-20 ling and weather reports during the Pacific Ocean flight. Capt. von Gronau does not fly on Sundays unless it is absolutely necessary to OC do so.

Start of Flight

Starting his flight from the Isle 39c of Sylt on the Baltic Sea, Capt. von Gronau made stops at Seydi Fjord and Rejkavik, Iceland, at Ivigtut, BOTTLE CAPS-Greenland, and Cartwright Bay, per lb. Labrador, during the flight across the Atlantic Ocean to Montreal which was accomplished in 36 hours elapsed time.

From Montreal, Capt. von Gronau flew to Ottawa where he conferred with Royal Canadian Air Force officials with regard to his route for the crossing of Canada. Visiting Detroit, where the party were luncheon guests of Henry Ford, Chicago, Milwaukee and Minneapolis was made at Cormorant Lake, Man. Thrift Cash & Carry Thence westward, Capt. von Gronau followed the route which was Phone 179 taken by Wing Commander Earl Godfrey of the Royal Canadian Air

Force in his flight across Canada a few years ago .

der the low clouds on her arrival here yesterday afternoon, there was some speculation as to where a landing would be made, many people being on the waterfront tol see the ship come in. Making a single turn, the "Gronland Wal" came down on the harbor near the plant of the Canadian Fish & Cold Storage Co. and taxied into the booming ground of the Big Bay Lumber Co. to land at the identical place where the United States round the world flyers rested their ships when here in 1924.

The "Gronland Wal" was to be moved from Seal Cove today up to the wharf of Edward Lipsett Ltd. where fuel for her has been in storage for some time.

Petrol rather than gasoline is being used for the flight. By using this fuel, tank space is reduced and more passenger carrying capacity given which is an important factor in the planning of commercial air service. It was the first time petrol had been used for a flight across the Atlantic Ocean, Capt. von Gronau explained last night.
