Terms Strike Settlement Announced VICEROY'S REPRESENTATIVE AT DUBLIN GIVES WARNING TO MEMBERS

British Parliament Grants Ten Million Pounds for Subsidy

LONDON, June 29.—The House of Commons has sanctioned a wage subsidy of £10,000,000 in order to settle the coal miners' strike. The subsidy will be effective in three months' time and will be subject to three months' termination notice thereafter. Miners' wages will be reduced two shillings in July, half a crown in August and three shillings in September. The owners will forego profits in the next three months and will thereafter take seventeen pounds for every hundred paid as the standard of wages. It is thus asserted that the wages to be paid the miners will be twenty per cent above the 1914 standard. The anxiety with which parliament acceded to the request of Premier Lloyd George to make the £10,000,000 grant clearly reflects its anxiety to have the strike ended and the mines in operation again as soon as possible. The miners will go back to work on Monday but many days will be required to repair the damage done during the period of inactivity before actual mining will commence in the most of the mines.

RENEWAL OF PACT IS NOW BEING HELD

Great Britain Asks Japan to Postpone to Allow Further Discussion and Consultation. LONDON, June 29.—It is understood that Britain has requested Japan to postpone the renewal of the Anglo-Japanese alliance from July to October to permit further discussion here and also to allow for consultation with the United States. Japan has agreed to this. The present treaty between Great Britain and Japan lapses on July 1. Refer to Dominions. LONDON, June 29.—Premier Meighen's speech occupied the most of the morning session at the Imperial Conference today. It is understood that a proposal has been made that the question of the renewal of the Anglo-Japanese treaty be postponed for several months to enable the overseas premiers to return home and consult with their colleagues and, if necessary, call a referendum of the people to uphold or reject the proposals settled at the Imperial Conference.

VICTORIA SETS OUT ITS PLANS

Proposes Two Alternative Schemes for Settling Relations Cities and Province. VICTORIA, June 29.—The provincial government will be asked by the City of Victoria to hand over to the municipalities of British Columbia the income tax, the personal property tax, half of all the proceeds from liquor permits, the amusement tax, half of the motor taxes and a number of the license fees. As an alternative proposition the Victoria council suggest that the provincial government take over the hospitals and schools of the province. Much data is being prepared by the city for the fall session of the legislature when these matters are to be especially taken up.

GERMANY PAYS FORTY MILLION ON REPARATION

Another Installment Handed Over Today to Commission at Paris. PARIS, June 29.—Germany today paid another forty million gold marks to the reparations commission, making the total amount paid to date 250,000,000 marks.

BUSINESS IS NOT VERY GOOD

Report from Vancouver and Victoria is Anything But Encouraging. H. F. Pullen, who returned to day from Victoria and Vancouver, reports that business conditions in the south are very quiet. Merchants all complain and look for little improvement until next spring. There is, however, little outward evidence of depression. Most of the people drive expensive cars and live well. There are no vacant stores in Vancouver or Victoria and the lumber mills seem to be operating. Prices of goods and wages tend to be depressed, thus decreasing the cost of living. Cheap Strawberries. In Victoria on Saturday, Gordon Head strawberries were being sold in the shops at three pence for 25c and all lines of farm and garden produce are away down in price. In places where there has been little reduction in wages there is a general speeding up and production is increasing. The printers' strike at Vancouver continues but the shops are being operated independent of the unions, although not with full staffs. The master printers say the strike was a blessing to them as the business had fallen off considerably and there was little to do. Want Information. Great interest is taken everywhere in Prince Rupert among all classes of the community and all want information in regard to the city and interior district. The impression is general that Prince Rupert is today the most prosperous town in the west and probably in all Canada.

FISH CAMPAIGN GREAT BRITAIN

Canadian Trade Commissioner Says People There Think Salmon Only for Summer. OTTAWA, June 29.—Reports from the Canadian trade commissioner at Liverpool state that the trade in Canadian frozen salmon is being hampered by the fact that the British people regard salmon as a strictly summer food. An advertising campaign is recommended in order to popularize the Canadian frozen fish in Great Britain to such a standard that it will be demanded all the year round. The best fish for selling overseas is that which weighs from seven to fourteen pounds.

TOMMY CHURCH MAY RUN FOR UNIONISTS

TORONTO, June 29.—That Mayor T. L. Church is ambitious to become the Meighen government candidate in West York for the coming by-election is the rumor in political circles today. Three others are named as being in the running for the government nomination: Ex-McGorman J. L. Anderson, who was formerly a Liberal, but became a Unionist when the Borden Government went to the country on the conscription issue; Leonard Wallace, warden of York county; and Alderman Sam Ryding. Mayor Church is at present on his way to Jersey City to attend the Carpentier-Dempsey fight.

FUNERAL OF LATE OFFICER

Full Military Ceremony This Afternoon When Late Lieut. W. O. Macdonald Buried. Possibly never in the history of Prince Rupert has a more solemn and impressive sight been witnessed than the full military funeral that took place this afternoon, when the body of the late Lieut. Wilfred C. Macdonald was laid away in its last resting place in the cemetery at Fairview. There was a large and most representative assemblage of Prince Rupert's citizens taking part in the ceremony. The casket was removed from the R.C. Undertaking parlors at 2 o'clock this morning and taken to the Catholic Church. At 2 o'clock the military parade under Sergeant R. W. Cameron, marched from the headquarters of the Great War Veterans to the church. The firing party, consisting of six members of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police, under the command of Captain A. E. Acland, took up its position, three on each side of the church door. Military Honors. After the brief service in the church, the coffin was carried out to the gun carriage by the six pall bearers, comrades of the deceased in the 16th Canadian Scottish. Majors G. E. Gibson and S. D. Johnston, Captain Forbes Sutherland, Sergeant James Deville, Corporal J. Dennis Allen and Pte. H. E. Wearmouth. As the party emerged from the church, Sergeant Cameron immediately called the parade to attention, the firing party standing at attention, with arms reversed and heads bowed. Upon the placing of the remains upon the gun carriage the firing squad took up its position at the head of the procession which then left the church for the cemetery in the following order: Firing squad composed of members of the R.C.M. Police under Capt. A. E. Acland; Pipe Band; G. V. A. Brass Band; Buglers; Gun carriage with casket containing the body of the deceased officer; car carrying the floral tributes; cars with the family of the deceased and surviving members of the late lieutenant's battalion; representatives of the Navy and Flying corps, under Lieutenant G. P. Tinker; members of the Great War Veterans Association; members of the Benevolent and Protective Order of Elks; citizens on foot, and lastly, the cars of the mourners. At Graveside. The service at the graveside was most impressive, the large gathering standing reverently and silently, the men with heads bowed, as the few short, beautiful words of the church service were pronounced by Bishop E. M. Buno before all that was mortal of the deceased officer was consigned to the grave. The firing of three rounds by the firing squad and the sounding of the last post by Bugler W. Rance brought the ceremony to a close. Floral Tributes. Among the large number of floral tributes sent in memory of the deceased were wreaths, crosses and sprays from the Great War Veterans' Association, Neville, Macdonald & Rorvik Co., Benevolent and Protective Order of Elks, Sixteenth Canadian Scottish Battalion, Dominion Government Fisheries Department, Mr.

BELFAST, June 29.—Sir James Craig, premier of Ulster, today declined an invitation from Eamonn de Valera to meet him in Dublin for a conference. The ground Premier Craig gave for his refusal was that he had already accepted Premier Lloyd George's invitation for a similar conference at London.

BOB EDWARDS WILL BE CANDIDATE FOR ALBERTA HOUSE

CALGARY, June 29.—Robert C. Edwards, editor of the Calgary Eye Opener, and one of the best known men in Western Canada, is the latest mentioned as a possible candidate in Calgary in the provincial elections, which will be held next month. Mr. Edwards will run, it is said, as a supporter of the Stewart government.

QUEEN WILHELMINA WILL VISIT NORWAY

THE HAGUE, June 29.—Queen Wilhelmina, who for years has never left Holland is planning a three weeks' boat trip to the Norwegian fjords this summer. She will travel incognito.

INDIAN FROM ALERT BAY ON MURDER CHARGE

Tom Williams Alleged to Have Committed Murder in September, 1914. VANCOUVER, June 29.—Tom Williams, an Alert Bay Indian, was brought here yesterday, in custody of the provincial police, charged with the murder of Ernest Jack Young, a fisherman and hand logger of Carter Bay, Dickson Island, on September 2, 1914. Young's body was first found in 1916 by two loggers. It was then in a hollow log covered with an Indian mat. The discovery was made by the loggers left without taking the body and later, on account of the district having been swept by a forest fire, failed to identify the location. This spring the charred bones were again found by Sergeant Anzelm, a mounted policeman. The man had been shot through the head. Williams was committed for trial by the magistrate at Alert Bay.

IMPOSSIBLE GET QUESNEL JULY 1

Delayed Construction of Bridge at Steelhead Hinders Plans. VICTORIA, June 29.—The delay in the construction of the bridge at the entry of Steelhead will make the completion of the Pacific Great Eastern Railway to Quesnel by July 1 impossible. Work beyond Quesnel is, however, planned for August and also track laying in a southerly direction from Prince George.

COAL COMPANY IS TO BE PROSECUTED

Fails to Comply with Provincial Statute Requiring Semi-Monthly Payment Wages. VICTORIA, June 29.—Prosecution of the Pacific Coal Co. for failing to comply with the provisions of the act requiring semi-monthly payment of wages to employees has been ordered by Hon. William Sloan, Minister of Mines.

REPUBLICAN LEADER HAS BEEN SHOT DEAD

Leo Murphy, Commandant of Republicans, Resisted Arrest at Waterfall. CORK, June 29.—Leo Murphy, commandant of the mid-Cork brigade of the Republican Army, was shot dead last night when he resisted arrest by the Crown Forces at Waterfall. Forty-five rebels were captured and a quantity of arms were seized.

DOUGHERTY CHOSEN AS INSPECTOR OF INSURANCE PROVINCE

VICTORIA, June 29.—J. P. Dougherty, of Vancouver, has been appointed provincial inspector of insurance at a salary of \$3,600 per year. Mr. Dougherty is at present assistant manager of the Vancouver Insurance and Vessel Agency, Limited.

QUEBEC POLICEMEN AND FIREMEN HAVE CONCLUDED STRIKE

QUEBEC, June 29.—The strike of the policemen and firemen here ended at noon today. It commenced last Saturday but broke up largely to the lack of unity among the strikers. There were no disorders.

Parliament Opening South Ireland Was a Dismal Failure

DUBLIN, June 29.—The opening of the Southern Parliament of Ireland occupied but ten minutes time this morning. Lord Chief Justice Maloney, representing the vice-roy, postponed the reading of the King's speech until a representative assembly materializes. He issued the warning that the continuance of the South Ireland parliament could not be assured unless at least half of the members of the house took the oath of office. Only eight senators and two or three commoners assembled today, they representing the Imperialists and the Protestant communities. The Sinn Fein members ignored the opening. Parliament has been adjourned until July 13.

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PATTULLO WILL VISIT ENGLAND

Minister of Lands Will Take up Lumber Export and Immigration Matters. VICTORIA, June 29.—Hon. T. D. Pattullo, minister of lands, will leave in the early part of July for England to take up in British commercial circles the question of developing the lumber export trade from British Columbia. Mr. Pattullo will be accompanied by Wm. Turnbull, provincial lumber commissioner. While in England Mr. Pattullo will also take up in political and agricultural quarters the matter of diverting immigration of a high standard to British Columbia.

CAMPAIGN FOR TAX COLLECTION

Minister of Finance John Hart Instructs Department Make Collections regardless of Results. VICTORIA, June 29.—Hon. John Hart, provincial minister of finance, has issued instructions to the Taxation Department to strictly enforce the provisions of the Taxation Act regardless of results that may follow. This is being taken as the opening of a campaign by the province of British Columbia to obtain some of the money that is owing it in taxes.

ENGINEERS REFUSE CUT

English Gas Workers, However, Return to Work at Reduced Wages. LONDON, June 29.—The engineers having voted to refuse the owners' terms a new conference with the union will be called for Friday. The gas workers have agreed to a reduction in wages.

HENLEY REGATTA STARTING TODAY— WEATHER IDEAL

HENLEY, June 29.—The four days of Henley boat racing events here opened today under ideal weather conditions. There are 74 crews and scullers selected for the various events. Forty-one crews intend to compete in the three 8-oared events.

All Gratified
Coal Strike Over.

The news which eclipsed all else in importance yesterday was the announcement that the British coal strike had been settled. It was as welcome news here in Prince Rupert, an outpost of the Empire, as it must have been right in England. The terrible strike had become a matter over which people in every section of the Empire were much concerned. Although it cannot be said that people in Western Canada had come to feel the direct results of the three months' industrial calamity, they had none the less become worried about it for its effect had been very serious in Britain and in affecting Britain it affected Canada in a sentimental if not a material way. The settling of the strike was indeed the most important happening in the British Empire yesterday.

Parliamentarians
And Salaries.

It seems nothing else if not reasonable that cabinet ministers and members of legislative assemblies should be required to pay the income tax. There is no apparent reason why they should not pay the impost that is demanded of every citizen of the Dominion who receives a salary over a certain figure. Why some persons or the parliamentarians themselves should feel that a cabinet minister or a member of parliament should be free from such taxes seems difficult to understand. After all they are but doing a function in the ordinary course of every day business and are carrying out no higher or more valuable usefulness than many other persons in private life. In many cases, too, the parliamentarian has independent means and his parliamentary work is of his own choosing—it is never foisted on him. Therefore if he draws a salary which in size is subject to income tax let him pay the tax. It is no harder for him to live than it is for the other fellow—at least it should not be. Probably, if it does cost him more to keep up than the man in private life, it is caused by his own personal ambitions and aims rather than by his public duties. He has an expense account for the latter—the former come out of his own pocket.

Local G. W. V. A. Shows
Amenability to Law.

The local Great War Veterans' Association may be commended on the attitude it has taken in regard to the selling of beer in contravention of the Liquor Control Act. Its members have been unanimous in their desire to keep within the law and have looked carefully before they leaped. It is true that beer was sold in the local canteen for a couple of days but this was on the understanding that its sale was being sanctioned by the Liquor Control Board. When that was cleared up and it was shown that the Liquor Board had nothing to do with the 'policing' of clubs and it was not for them to say whether or not a club should sell beer, they closed up. They are still closed as far as this is concerned and will likely remain so until beer selling becomes legalized which will not, from present indications, be very soon. The local branch of the Great War Veterans' Association has indeed showed itself more amenable to the law of the land than some of the other branches in the province may have done.

WIRELESS STATION
AT BULL HARBOR IS
NOW IN COMMISSION

Triangle Island Station Closed
and New Plant Opens
Simultaneously.

VICTORIA, June 29.—Bull Harbor, Hope Island is now picking up ships at sea and broadcasting the news for the benefit of the shipping interests on this coast.

The wireless station at Triangle Island was closed last week and the new station built by the Dominion Government at Bull Harbor was put into commission. R. Ainslie is the chief operator at Bull Harbor, with a staff of four assistants.

Triangle Exposed.

Triangle Island has long been the station which has divided honors with Estevan Point in first picking up and establishing communication with ocean ships crossing the Pacific from the Far East, but its exposed position made it extremely difficult to land stores and when the Government decided to dismantle the lighthouse in the island the change automatically affected the wireless plant. Since the early spring workmen have been engaged in erecting the operating station and aerials at Bull Harbor under the supervision of L. W. Stephenson, Government engineer.

More Efficiency.

The station at Bull Harbor is well protected from the open Pacific, and with a modern plant is expected to prove much more efficient than the old Triangle station.

Bull Harbor, Hope Island, is located about 65 miles from Triangle Island, being 65 miles east of Shushartie Bay and about 40 miles from Alert Bay.

CASEY STRIKES IT
RICH WHILE DOING
WORK AT ALICE ARM

ALICE ARM, June 29.—A rich strike of native and ruby silver has been made on the Second Thought claims on Clearwater Creek by George Casey, while doing development work. The strike is reported to have been made 1000 feet above the tunnel which was driven two years ago, and in which native and ruby silver was found. The lead has been traced from the tunnel to the new strike. More work will be done on the property this summer, and it is expected that a big body of high grade ore will be shown up. The property is owned by Jack Graham of Alice Arm and George Casey of Prince Rupert.

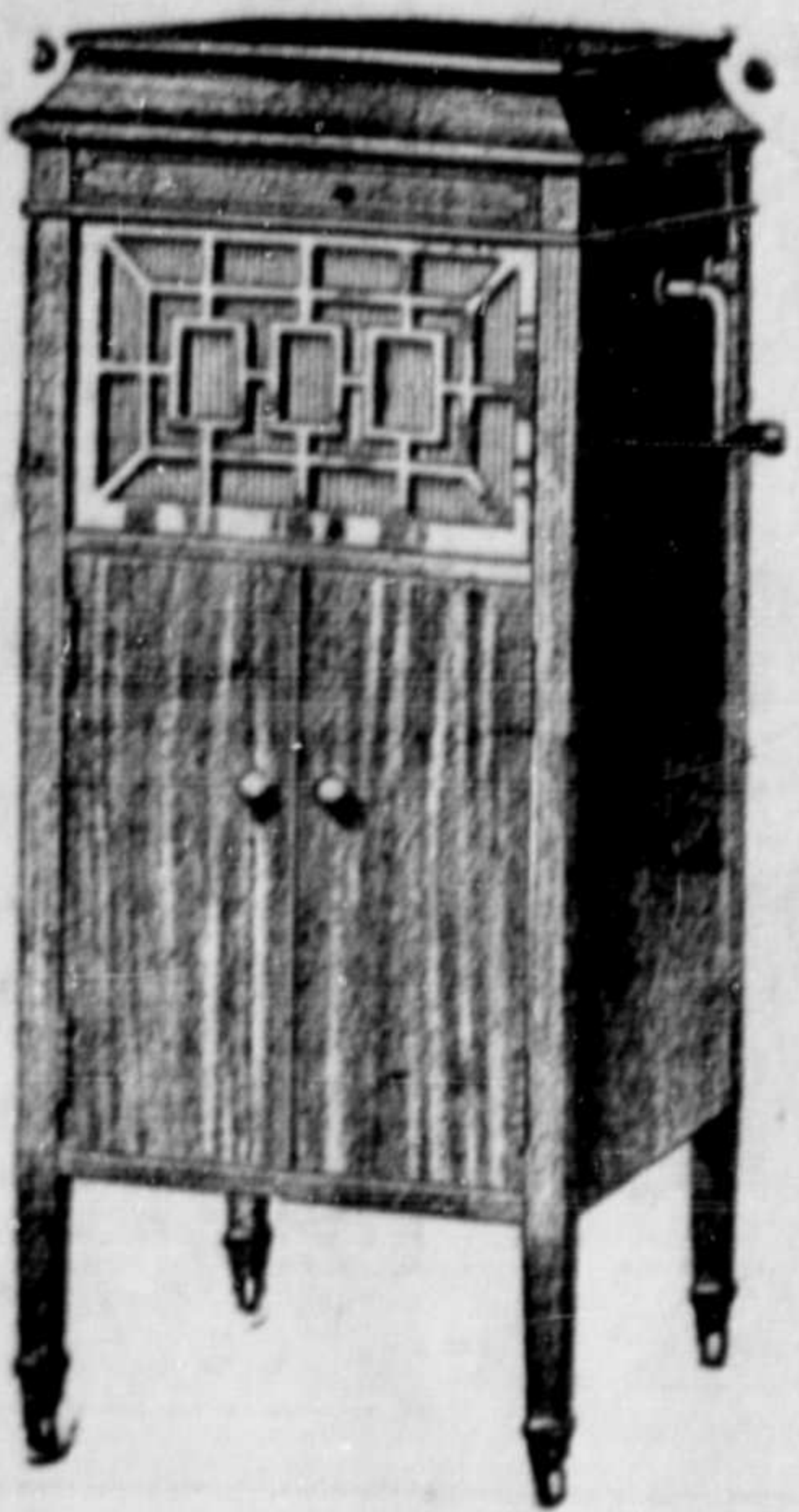

Jack Dempsey knocked out Bill Brennan in the twelfth round of his bout at Madison Square Garden, Dec. 14, 1920, in his most recent contest. The champion's showing that night against Brennan, a good second-rate boxer, was far from reassuring. He was much slower than in previous bouts. Brennan hit him and appeared to hurt him and Dempsey left the ring after the fight bleeding from an injured ear. Dempsey, throughout, failed to show his usual aggressiveness. Brennan apparently had no fear of the champion, and took the initiative in several of the rounds, often standing toe to toe with Dempsey slugging. However, Dempsey managed to wear down the challenger in the twelfth round and a left to the body and a right to the head sent Brennan to the canvass in a neutral corner. It was the only knockdown of an unsatisfactory bout.

"Will the Jack Dempsey who meets Carpentier be the boxer who overwhelmed Willard or the boxer who had difficulty in knocking out Brennan?" is a question heard often as the coming battle is discussed. Dempsey's work at Atlantic City for the past several weeks has failed definitely to make this clear. In training, the champion is buoyant and has been making short work of the numerous sparring partners imported into his camp by Manager Jack Kearns. None of these, however have been of a class capable of testing the champion. A gash over the eye, from a wound received when training at Toledo a couple of years ago, has retarded Dempsey's work to some extent. He will enter the ring at Jersey City weighing a little over 190 pounds, which is slightly heavier than his weight at Toledo a couple of years ago. His trainers have carefully guarded against staleness and his boxing has been curtailed several times. They are evidently satisfied now that the champion will be in tip-top form for the big battle next Saturday afternoon.

Entries for the 100 yard dash and the relay race on Friday morning in connection with the Dominion Day Celebration should be in the hands of Harry Breen by tomorrow night. The committee is desirous of knowing how many entries are to be so it may make arrangements for the races. From present indications keen interest is to be taken in these events, the only adults' races so far arranged for the day. Of course there will be a complete list of children's sports following the morning parade from the Government Buildings on Second Avenue to the Acropolis Hill.

STEWART LOOKS LIKE RETURN

Conservatives in Alberta Cannot Hope to Make Strong Fight.

EDMONTON, June 29.—Sixty-one provincial constituencies will be involved in the coming election on July 18, provision having been made at the last session of the legislature for five members at large from Edmonton and Calgary, instead of three members each as formerly. Medicine Hat was given two members instead of one. The last legislature consisted of 58 members, including two seats for soldiers' representatives at large these being abolished under the amendments of last session. Instead of being deferred as in previous elections, the northern constituencies of Peace River and Athabasca will be voted on the same day as the remainder of the province this time.

With an election in prospect for some time past practically all the political forces in the province are well prepared for a contest, candidates being definitely in the field in many constituencies. This week will see a large number of nominating conventions and within a few days the full campaign will be under way in all parts of the province.

Excepting possibly in the cities of Calgary and Edmonton the Conservative organizations cannot hope to make a strong fight, and in each of these places the supporters of the Stewart government are entering the campaign with an unusually promising prospect of success. In fact it is generally accepted that the present administration will be returned with probably a greater number of members than it already has in the provincial house.

LADY CHURCHILL DEAD IN LONDON

Was Wife and Mother of Two of Great Britain's Greatest Political Lights.

LONDON, June 29.—Lady Randolph Churchill, widow of the late Conservative leader who attained high position in the House of Commons during his life time, and mother of Right Hon. Winston Churchill, is dead.
