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Republicans To Consider Proposal ENGINEERS AND PROSPECTORS SEARCH FOR MINERALS AT ATLIN

British Government Decides to Hold Navy Supreme by Building New Ships

LONDON, August 4.—The House of Commons voted in favor of the government's naval policy to build four ships of the Hood class before 1925 to replace obsolete vessels.

In an animated discussion Colonel Amery and Right Hon. Winston Churchill for the government pointed out that Great Britain stood the risk of dropping to the status of a third-rate power and might find it difficult to catch up with the other powers. A resolution passed by the Empire Premiers was read indicating that the Premiers recognized the necessity for naval supremacy and the co-operation of all the Dominions toward that end. It was decided that each Dominion must decide the extent of its naval participation, and no decision should be made after the disarmament conference.

UNITED STATES MEETING OF GREAT COUNCIL

UNITED STATES WILL SAVE TO MAKE GREAT CUT IN EXPENDITURE

TAXATION IS UNDER REVIEW

Position of Municipalities Being Investigated by Premier and Finance Minister.

VICTORIA, Aug. 4.—A thorough investigation into the financial and taxation situation affecting the municipalities of British Columbia commenced this week by Premier Oliver and Finance Minister John Hart, assisted by other officials. They will devote a month to the work and hope to arrive at a solution of the problem ready for report to the Legislature at the autumn session. Action will then be taken which it is hoped will be definite and final.

Irish Situation Takes Sensational Turn When Valera Calls Meeting

London, August 4.—The Irish situation took a sensational turn today when it was announced in Dublin that Eamonn de Valera, Republican leader, had called a full meeting of the Irish Parliament to consider the British proposals for peace. In Dublin it is reported the Ulster has been sounded and the answer returned is that she is unfavorable to the Sinn Fein. It is reported that the Ulster ministry had received no communication from De Valera.

It is understood that Dublin Castle is free to release members of the Sinn Fein. Members "on the run" have returned to homes.

London, August 4.—Reports published here that the government of Northern Ireland has definitely and finally refused to do anything to do with the government peace proposals in Ulster are declared to be "absolutely unfounded." No proposals have been submitted to the Ulster cabinet by the government.

PRINCE OF WALES MAY VISIT CANADA IN SPRING

LONDON, Aug. 4.—The Prince of Wales may be in Canada in April or May next year. The Prince's tour concludes at Karachi and he will return to England via Japan and Canada, repaying the recent visit of Crown Prince Hirohito to England in the former country.

Greater Mining Activity in Northern Section of Province Noted This Year

Many engineers are scouting for properties in the north of the province and prospecting is more active than it has been for several years, says George A. Clothier, provincial district mining engineer, who returned last week from a six weeks' trip of inspection into the country in the vicinity of Atlin.

When Mr. Clothier was north the main excitement was a stampede to the east of Little Atlin Lake. A find of placer gold had been reported, and quite a number went from Atlin, Carcross and Whitehorse. It turned out, however, that there was nothing to cause excitement and the rush subsided.

The placer mining in the Atlin country is improving generally, said Mr. Clothier. Several of the smaller creeks are beginning to show up well and on the

DRY WEATHER GIVES TROUBLE

As far as quartz or lode mining is concerned, the prolonged litigation of the Engineer Mine has been holding the country back. Trial is now set for September this year and, which ever side wins, it is almost certain that operations will again be started. It is hoped that with this trial the long series of law suits will be finally ended. Mr. Clothier states that the operation of the Engineer Mine will have the same good effect on the Atlin district as the Premier has at Stewart. The Engineer is a gold mine.

J. N. Fuffner's property on Fourth of July Creek, fourteen miles from Atlin, is now under option to a large mining company who already have a crew of men there. There are very encouraging surface showings of silver lead. Considerable prospecting for quartz is also going on in the hills about Atlin.

Rainy Hollow.

In the Rainy Hollow country, about 55 miles from Haines, Alaska, and just across the panhandle in B.C., there are several good looking prospects besides the Maid of Erin hornite and chalcocite mine. R. W. Wiley, of Portland, Oregon, is developing this property which looks very promising. There is a good equipment of tractors and trailers, and it is expected that 500 tons of ore will be shipped this winter. The Alaska government has spent a great deal of money on roads leading into this country through Alaska. There are other good looking prospects in the vicinity of the Maid of Erin and the country for 40 miles beyond to the Yukon boundary line is well mineralized.

While on his trip north, Mr. Clothier also paid an unofficial visit to the Wheaten River country in Yukon Territory near Carcross. There are some very good looking gold and copper prospects in that vicinity.

ATTITUDE OF ULSTER TOWARD IRISH PEACE

Craig Refuses to Confer With Sinn Fein, but Will Attend at London.

LONDON, Aug. 4.—Sinn Fein wants to get Ulster's attitude toward the peace plan before calling the Irish Parliament. Premier Craig on behalf of Ulster is willing to go to the London conference but will not confer with Sinn Fein. This attitude on the part of the Ulster leader may result in many weeks' delay in De Valera's reply to the British Government.

CANADA GAINS SHIPPING LINE

Italian Ships Diverted From New York Owing to Immigration Restrictions.
