Republicans To Consider Proposal ENGINEERS AND PROSPECTORS SEARCH FOR MINERALS AT ATLIN

British Government Decides to Hold Navy Supreme by Building New Ships

LONDON, August 4.—The House of Commons voted in favor of the government's naval policy to build four ships of the Hood type before 1925 to replace obsolete vessels.

In an animated discussion Colonel Amery and Right Hon. Winston Churchill for the government pointed out that Great Britain stood the risk of dropping to the status of a third-rate power and might find it difficult to catch up with the other powers.

A resolution passed by the Empire Premiers was read that the Premiers recognized the necessity for naval supremacy and the co-operation of all the Dominions toward that end but it was decided that each Dominion must decide the extent of its naval participation, and no decision should be made after the disarmament conference.

PRINCE OF WALES MAY VISIT CANADA IN SPRING

LONDON, Aug. 4.—The Prince of Wales may be in Canada in April or May next year. The Prince's tour concludes at Karachi and he will return to England via Japan and Canada, repaying the recent visit of Crown Prince Hirohito to England in the former country.

ATTITUDE OF ULSTER TOWARD IRISH PEACE

Craig Refuses to Confer With Sinn Fein, but Will Attend at London.

LONDON, Aug. 4.—Sinn Fein wants to get Ulster's attitude toward the peace plan before calling the Irish Parliament. Premier Craig on behalf of Ulster is willing to go to the London conference but will not confer with Sinn Fein. This attitude on the part of the Ulster leader may result in many weeks' delay in De Valera's reply to the British Government.

UNITED STATES MEETING OF GREAT COUNCIL

Senator Harvey and His Will Attend Supreme Council Monday.

LONDON, Aug. 4.—A formal meeting for a United States representative to attend the meeting of the Supreme Council on Monday was given by Ambassador Harvey and will attend.

UNITED STATES WILL HAVE TO MAKE GREAT CUT IN EXPENDITURE

WASHINGTON, Aug. 4.—A \$250,000,000 must be cut from the ordinary government expenditures this fiscal year if the tax reduction is to be maintained. This announcement has been made by the Treasury department.

BABY POLICE GET BIG SEIZURE LIQUOR

\$5,000 From Two Homes Being Unstamped by Liquor Board.

DOVER, Aug. 4.—The city police this morning seized liquor valued at more than \$5,000 from two homes on Dover street. The liquor was found contrary to the provisions of the Liquor Control Act.

Greater Mining Activity in Northern Section of Province Noted This Year

Many engineers are scouting for properties in the north of the province and prospecting is more active than it has been for several years, says George A. Clothier, provincial district mining engineer, who returned last week from a six weeks' trip of inspection into the country in the vicinity of Atlin.

When Mr. Clothier was north the main excitement was a stampede to the east of Little Atlin Lake. A find of placer gold had been reported, and quite a number went from Atlin, Carcross and Whitehorse. It turned out, however, that there was nothing to cause excitement and the rush subsided.

The placer mining in the Atlin country is improving generally, said Mr. Clothier. Several of the smaller creeks are beginning to show up well and on the older creeks there are more men working than there have been for two or three years. The prospectors are making, at least, good wages and there have been some pretty fair cleanups.

Quartz Mining.
As far as quartz or lode mining is concerned, the prolonged litigation of the Engineer Mine has been holding the country back. Trial is now set for September this year and, which ever side wins, it is almost certain that operations will again be started. It is hoped that with this trial the long series of law suits will be finally ended. Mr. Clothier states that the operation of the Engineer Mine will have the same good effect on the Atlin district as the Premier has at Stewart. The Engineer is a gold mine.

TAXATION IS UNDER REVIEW

Position of Municipalities Being Investigated by Premier and Finance Minister.

VICTORIA, Aug. 4.—A thorough investigation into the financial and taxation situation affecting the municipalities of British Columbia commenced this week by Premier Oliver and Finance Minister John Hart assisted by other officials. They will devote a month to the work and hope to arrive at a solution of the problem ready for report to the Legislature at the autumn session. Action will then be taken which it is hoped will be of a definite and final nature.

Irish Situation Takes Sensational Turn When Valera Calls Meeting

LONDON, August 4.—The Irish situation took a sensational turn when it was announced in Dublin that Eamonn de Valera, a Republican leader, had called a full meeting of the Irish Parliament to consider the British proposals for peace. In Dublin it is reported the Ulster has been sounded and the returned is that she is unfavorable to the Sinn Fein. It is reported that the Ulster ministry had received no communication from De Valera.

It is understood that Dublin Castle is free to release members as it sees fit. Members "on the run" have returned to homes.

LONDON, August 4.—Reports published here that the government of Northern Ireland has definitely and finally refused to do anything to do with the government peace proposals in Ireland are declared to be "absolutely unfounded." No proposals have been submitted to the Ulster cabinet by the government, it is stated.

WILL REDUCE FREIGHT RATES, SAYS CARVELL

MONTREAL, Aug. 4.—A letter to the Montreal Board of Trade from F. B. Carvell, chairman of the Railway Commission, says the commission is preparing to take steps to reduce the freight rates on Canadian railroads.

DRY WEATHER GIVES TROUBLE

DAWSON, Y.T., Aug. 4.—Dry weather has caused many forest fires in the Yukon. The town of Gordon's Landing has been destroyed. It was already nearly deserted and the loss is not great.

While the fire losses have caused some loss, there is an even greater loss from the closing down of hydraulic for lack of water. This means unemployment and a decrease in the gold output for the season.

MOSES COTSWORTH STARTS AN ACTION AGAINST MR. BOWSER

VICTORIA, Aug. 4.—Moses Cotsworth has started suit against W. J. Bowser, leader of the opposition in the Legislature, for an alleged libelous statement made six years ago. Suit may be brought for libel at any time within six years, and Mr. Cotsworth has waited until the last moment before opening fire. He says that his reason for the delay is that public opinion was such at the time of the alleged offense that it would have been impossible to get a fair verdict.

True News This Time From Russia.

There has been a lot of false news come from Russia over the wires, but this time it seems as if the news of a famine there was really true. Unfortunately this is so. The peasants are starving and there is a terrible shortage of food throughout a great deal of the country. Before the winter is over it is difficult to know what the condition will be.

Sometimes in this country we look forward with dread to the coming winter, fearing that times may not be good, but Russia is a thousand times worse than we. The people know that unless help comes they will die from lack of food. The condition is serious, and already the nations of the world are taking action.

The continued disorganization of the country under Soviet rule has accentuated the condition. We may not admire the action of the Russians or their rulers in the past few years, but we must realize just the same that they are now in need of help, and it will be the duty of the civilized world to answer the call and feed the hungry people there.

Irish Delay Is Good Omen.

Perhaps it is a good omen that there is delay in the settlement of the Irish question. If the truce lasts much longer the people of that country will get the peace habit again and it will be more difficult to get back to the murder program which has been going on there so long. The difficulty facing the South now is to convince the North that they can work together with them in harmony and without infringing on any of their rights.

People who do not live in Ireland find it difficult to understand the intense emotions which sway the people of that country. The hate is not only against the English, but against each other. Irish people who have come from there to get away from the constant turmoil are very pessimistic, but now that there has been a taste of war with its consequent bloodshed and terror, possibly the people will be more likely to settle down peacefully under a new government. At any rate it is to be hoped they will. The whole world has been disturbed by the troubles in the little island. There are Irish people everywhere, and even here in Prince Rupert former residents or children of former residents of Ireland feel very bitterly and take sides silently either for North or South. The northerners think the southern Irish are murderers and the southern Irish think the English are murderers. Both are honest in their convictions.

Half-known Cousins Says English Paper.

The Manchester Guardian under the caption "Our Half-known Cousins" comments on the lack of knowledge of British statesmen of the British viewpoint. It says:

"At short intervals we are reminded in some vivid way of the extraordinary difficulty which English politicians, even men of wit and sympathy, find in understanding the light in which Canadians and Australians see us. The late Speaker of our House of Commons is the last to learn the lesson, probably with much surprise. In a speech at Toronto he recently suggested that our House of Lords might usefully be converted by a certain amount of re-forming into a kind of 'Imperial' chamber to deal with business of interest alike to us and the Dominions or one of them. He was perhaps a little wounded to find that even the hospitable friendliness of his Canadian audience did not wholly prevent it from laughing. One has to be profoundly unacquainted with Dominion national consciousness to suppose that any arrangement implying so distinctly provincial status for a Dominion would receive serious consideration. It would not have been acceptable before the war; it is trebly impossible now that the war experience of Canadians and Australians has immensely enhanced their estimate of their own national strength and efficiency in comparison with ours. In their eyes our House of Lords is a picturesque political curio, to be visited and viewed with a kind of patient amusement, like the village stocks or one of our many King Charles' Oaks, but not to be thought of, any more than an old English warming-pan, for any sort of use by a lusty, confident young nation. What we have to deal with is not what Canadians or Australians might, with a more perfect charity, think of our House of Lords, but what they do think of it. Otherwise we shall be provoking more of these uncontrollable titlers."

Old John Is on Finance Question.

It will be satisfactory to the people to know that Old John, or in other words Premier Oliver, is making a personal investigation of the financial problems as they affect the municipalities. He has made many previous investigations into matters of public interest and has proved his ability to put his finger on the weak spots and to get to the bottom of all questions. The fact that he is associated with the minister of finance in this probe and that they will spend a month at the work ensures that the next session of the Legislature will learn more about municipal finance than has been known for some time past. If the case for the municipalities is not a sound one, John will find it. He did not spend all those years in opposition without learning to get below the veneer of propaganda artists and political tricksters who were out to work for special interests or for political gain.

The Canadian Express Company has handled a large quantity of strawberries this year from Terrace and other Skeena River points. Part of the pick has come here and another part has gone to points east as far as Edmonton.

During the month of July, shipments to this city amounted to 1036 crates, all for local consumption. Of these 465 came from Terrace, 224 from Remo, 337 from Vamasdol and 10 from Shames. These were the only points that made shipments.

The berries arrived generally in good condition and were much appreciated locally. Shipments are still coming but the season is about over. Raspberries will follow.

650,000 SALMON RAN UP FISH LADDER ON THE KARLUK RIVER

JUNEAU, Aug. 4.—More than 650,000 red salmon have escaped the fishermen and passed up Karluk River into Karluk Lake, according to word received by E. M. Ball of the fisheries bureau at this place. The men who are counting the fish going up the river, using the rack designed by C. H. Gilbert for that purpose, reported to that effect.

Dr. H. M. Smith, head of the fisheries bureau, will join C. H. Gilbert and Henry O'Mally at Cordova when the Admiral Watson reaches that port and proceed to Karluk with the experts, where they will personally observe the work that is being done.

The purpose of counting the fish, which ascend the Karluk River is to determine how large an escapement is necessary to perpetuate the fish supply. People differ as to the percentage of the salmon run that would be necessary to reach the spawning grounds in order to prevent the runs from diminishing in extent. If the experiment works successfully at Karluk it will be tried elsewhere.

BATHERS SUFFER FROM DEVIL FISH STINGS

BOSTON, Mass., Aug. 4.—More than 150 bathers were treated at a hospital and thousands more were driven from Nantasket and adjoining beaches yesterday when a school of red jelly-fish drifted inshore and severely stung all who came in contact with it.

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BOOTLEGGERS GET FINED AT WINNIPEG

Magistrate Says Denial of Penitentiary Only Thing to Make Them Tell Truth.

WINNIPEG, Aug. 4.—Because bootlegging is leading to tampering with justice, it must be stopped with a strong hand, Magistrate R. M. Noble said in the provincial police court, when he fined A. Gaisky, a youth of seventeen, the sum of \$200 and costs for selling liquor. The majority of cases being heard in the court these days are liquor cases.

Evidence was submitted which showed that Gaisky had tried to bribe one of the witnesses to keep away from the trial. The witness, Harry Nemirovsky, is to appear again when D. Rosen is tried before the magistrate on the charge of selling liquor. Magistrate Noble warned Nemirovsky to listen to no offers of money.

"The only thing," the magistrate went on to say, "that makes these bootleggers tell the truth is the danger of going to the penitentiary, and sometimes even that will not work."

Other men fined \$200 and costs by Magistrate Noble were M. Linderman, and Harry Threlfall, who was charged with keeping a still. Threlfall will appear again on the charge of selling liquor.

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ITALIAN NATIONALIST ORGANIZATION BEING SPREAD IN STATES

NEW YORK, Aug. 3.—Alarmed at the menace to their country contained in the spread of communism, the Italian Nationalists have taken steps to organize branches of the Fascisti among the Italians of all the large cities of America in order to remove all moral and financial support of Italian-Americans from the cause of communism in Italy and to muster sentiment among these people to the cause of Italian nationalism.

Colonel C. Passimonte, an Italian reservist who fought in Italy throughout the war and who is an official in the Fascisti has been in America for the last month on an organization tour. To date he has established chapters of the society in New York, Philadelphia, Chicago, Boston, San Francisco, Detroit, Cleveland and Canton, Ohio. The New York chapter has enlisted more than 200 members.

Its Tenets.

"1.—It adheres to the principles of this nation's constitution and respects its laws.

"2.—It must, in every possible and permissible manner, support and initiate a propaganda in favor of the due appreciation of the Italian victory.

"3.—To promote the moral, economic, political and intellectual development of the emigrated masses.

"4.—To contribute to the task of protecting the immigrant and to cooperate in every possible way towards safe-guarding their rights if they harmonize with the interests of the nation, and to favor the just causes of the workingman in his relations with the producers.

"5.—To cooperate towards the development of the Italian-American commerce to the advantage of both the emigrant and mother country.

"6.—It favors the Italo-American political, economic and intellectual relations."

SLIMY INFLUENCES AT WORK IN CANADA

Pernicious Literature Condemned By Visitor from States.

TORONTO, Aug. 4.—That slimy influences were tending to creep across Canada's national life by means of pernicious literature which could be seen on book-stalls and other places, was asserted by Rev. R. J. Drysdale, pastor of Mount Her Presbyterian church, Rochester, New York.

The preacher said that in returning to Canada for his summer holidays, once again he noticed things not so apparent before. They knew of certain practices "below the line," he said, which he was sorry to see were tending to creep into Canada also. This he regretted, and he earnestly pleaded with his hearers to emulate the example of Daniel and keep their windows open toward the west. Some men were getting walled in with business expansion.

Prosperity was proving a curse to them, Prayer, Bible reading, and church attendance were being allowed to go, and instead of these, there was being substituted the Sunday colored supplement. The spirit of Babylon was tending to manifest itself in Canadian life, and vices, that destroyed that great city were stealing across the thresholds of Canadian homes, asserted the preacher. He urged that Kipling's prayer needed to be repeated: "Lest we forget." If only a certain success could be assured, said the preacher, some men were prepared to allow much to pass that should not be.
