## VOTING ON CITY BY-LAWS WILL TAKE PLACE IN SEPTEMBER

### Peers Clash on Irish Question As To Stand Unionist Party Takes

LONDON, July 28.—The Marquis of Salisbury and Lord Birkenhead, government peers, clashed on the Irish question today in the House of Lords. The marquis claimed to be making the Unionist peers when he stated that they felt some and humiliation at the government's concessions to the Fenians.

Lord Birkenhead, who is the government leader in the upper house, denied that Unionists were disapproving the government's policy. He excused the delay in publishing the result of the negotiations on the ground that the magnitude of the issue required caution.

### ULTIMATUM FROM STATES ON SHIPPING

WASHINGTON, July 28.—The United States Shipping Board has issued an ultimatum to British shipping lines that unless the United States ships are accorded fairer treatment in the competition for the transportation of mail from Alexandria, Egypt, it will declare an open market for anything at any rate.

### EMPIRE CHAIN OF WIRELESS

Understood Premier's Conference Recommends Establishment at Cost of £2,000,000.

PREMIER MEIGHEN MAY PROLONG HIS VISIT

LONDON, July 28.—There seems to be some authority for the statement that the British Empire Premier's Conference has approved plans for the establishment of a chain of imperial wireless stations at a total cost to the British Government of £2,000,000. It is thought the business of the conference will be concluded this week.

Premier Meighen, who is expected to sail for Canada on August 3 with Lord Byng, the new Governor-General, may be asked by Premier Lloyd George to remain longer in London. Premier Meighen, it is expected, will attend a dinner to be given in honor of Lord Byng by the Canada Club tonight.

### JAPANESE ARE AGREEABLE TO A CONFERENCE

WASHINGTON, July 28.—Secretary Hughes yesterday announced the acceptance by the United States government of proposals for a far Eastern conference in connection with the discussion of the Japanese acceptance of the understanding that the United States is not opposed to the agenda of the far Eastern conference before it continues.

### ORIENTALS GET CONTROL

Merchants' Convention Matter Brought Before It.

PRINCE RUPERT, July 28.—The retail merchants' convention was held yesterday that one third the retail grocers in Vancouver are Orientals. Fifty per cent of the merchant tailoring business are in the hands of Orientals. The association was formed to act as a body in trying to prevent Oriental immigration.

### DEMANDS RELEASE OF AMERICAN PRISONERS

WASHINGTON, July 28.—There was a formal demand for the release of American prisoners in Russia made on Soviet leaders by Secretary of State Hughes today.

### ONE BRIGHT BUSINESS SPOT SEEN

T. H. Johnson Tel's Rotary Club of Conditions as He Saw Them in East.

"There is one bright spot in the trip that I made in the east which points to an improvement of business conditions and that is the abundant harvest on the prairies, both in Canada and the United States," said T. H. Johnson, manager of the Canadian Fish and Gold Storage Co. in an address to the Rotary Club this afternoon. "This will give an impetus to trade both in this country and across the line."

Mr. Johnson said the fishing business as well as others, was in a bad way on the East coast. One gigantic trawling company capitalized at many million dollars was just ordered to be sold up by the courts and another was operating only half the boats and those at a loss. Fresh haddock was being sold in Boston at two and a half cents a pound. This gave Prince Rupert little chance of competing when the express charges amounted to four and a half cents a pound.

No Local Trawling.

Some buyers had spoken of purchasing Prince Rupert flat fish but the price they offered made it absolutely impossible to operate without loss and that they were not prepared to do.

In the East, Mr. Johnson said the wages of the men had been cut fifty per cent and they were now expecting the cost of transportation to come down. If this happened the business might improve. Better times should come in the spring but the general opinion was that the outlook for the winter was a rather dreary one.

### MANY BILLS WILL BE SLAUGHTERED IF HOUSE PROROGUES AUGUST 26

LONDON, July 28.—If Parliament prorogues on August 26 there will be considerable slaughter of the legislative program. The licensing bill may be dropped unless there is a general agreement to pass it in the House of Lords. It was expected to have an easy passage through the House of Commons.

### VISITORS TO ROTARY CLUB

Delegation From Southern Coast Cities Expected Saturday to Present Charter.

A delegation of Rotarians from Seattle, Vancouver, Victoria and Nanaimo is expected to arrive here on Saturday morning to present the local club with its charter. They will be suitably entertained while in the city and will meet the club at a banquet Saturday evening.

Saturday afternoon they will see the city and on Sunday afternoon will be taken out on the water. The committee in charge of arrangements in addition to the standing committee consists of Dr. Kergin, Fred Dawson, Mayor Rochester, T. H. Johnson, George Munro and the officers of the club.

### Ratepayers Will Vote on Four Bylaws Presented by City Council in September

Four bylaws will be submitted to a vote of the ratepayers by the City Council in the month of September. The definite date has not yet been announced, the bylaws not having yet completed their preliminary stages. They will be as follows:

A \$5,500 money bylaw for the building of the public school in Section Two.

A \$10,000 money bylaw for the furnishing and equipment of the Hays Cove public school.

Water Mains.

A \$50,000 money bylaw for necessary extensions to the water mains including work done on Fifth Street, Fraser Street and Eighth Street; Second Avenue between McBride Street and First Street, and McBride Street, between Second Avenue and Third Avenue.

A bylaw for the ratification of the water supply agreement between the Prince Rupert Pulp and Paper Co. and the City of Prince Rupert allowing the company any surplus supply not exceeding 3,000 gallons per minute from the city system.

The first two bylaws and the fourth have already gone through committee stages at the council and the third will come up at an early date.

Other Bylaws.

Two other by-laws are now being prepared for passage by the council but it will not be necessary for them to be voted upon by the people. One is the Taxi Parking bylaw and the other the bylaw for raising \$36,000 for the completion of the Hays Cove School. The former does not involve the incurring of a debt or the allowing of a concession or subsidy. The latter is authorized by the original \$150,000 bylaw for the school on which the full sum was not realized.

### Halibut Fishing is as Profitable as Ever Says Authority on Fisheries

The price paid for halibut this year is from fifteen to twenty per cent less than last year, but on the other hand the cost of operating has dropped even more than that, according to a fishing authority who was interviewed this morning in regard to the present condition of the fisheries. It was pointed out by him that distillate, which formerly retailed at 36c a gallon, now sold for 29c; gear had dropped from 72c to 59c, and all food-stuffs had tumbled. The result is that fishermen are just as well off today as they ever were, especially in view of the much greater purchasing power of the dollar.

"It is all bunk about the fishermen not being able to make anything this year," the same authority said. The fishing industry is on as healthy a basis as ever it was or as ever it is likely to be.

Halibut has not been coming in very fast of late owing to the fact that a number of the boats are fishing salmon or are carrying fish to the canneries. A few are undergoing overhaul.

Coho salmon fishing has just commenced at the Queen Charlotte Islands and fairly good deliveries are being made here. The fishermen there have been making good money this year. Spring salmon fishing is falling off and the deliveries this year at this port from Alaska have not been as heavy as usual. It is customary for a great many spring salmon to be brought from the American territory.

Sockeye fishing is poor, yesterday's average catches on the Skeena being only about sixteen to the boat. Both fishermen and canneries will lose money on the sockeye fishing this year.

Reports from the Naas indicate that the catch is less than last year, when the catch was below the average.

The cohoes will not reach the Skeena for about two weeks and then the run there is not expected to be large. Most of the cohoes are taken by trollers in the straits, especially around Dundas Island.

Marriage of Miss Grace Burns and Emmett Wakefield Took Place Yesterday.

The wedding took place quietly yesterday afternoon at 2 o'clock in the Manse, Fourth Avenue East, of Miss Grace Burns, of Vancouver, and Emmett R. Wakefield, of Telkwa. Rev. A. D. Archibald officiating. Miss Myrtle Burns, sister of the bride, was the bridesmaid and W. J. Wakefield, brother of the groom, was best man. Following the ceremony a wedding supper was served at the home of Mr. and Mrs. W. J. Wakefield, only the immediate relatives of the contracting persons being present.

Mrs. Wakefield is the sister of Mrs. MacDonald, of Telkwa, and visited that place some months ago. Mr. Wakefield is a well known young rancher of the Telkwa district and is a brother of W. J. Wakefield, of this city. On Saturday morning the couple will leave for Telkwa where they will make their home.

### BRYAN DOWNIE KNOCKS OUT COLORED MAN

Referee Gave Decision to Wilson But Boxing Commission Reversed.

CLEVELAND, July 28.—The boxing commission named Bryan Downie middleweight champion of the world, after a bout with Johnny Wilson, colored champion here last night. Referee Gardiner gave the decision to Wilson on a foul in the seventh of the twelve round bout, but the boxing commission ruled it a knockout for Downie.

Wilson was down three times in the seventh round and the commission's decision probably will be upheld.

### WOMAN TRIED REACH HUSBAND

Dr. Stone Fell to Death and Wife is Slowly Recovering From Exposure.

CALGARY, July 28.—Dr. Stone, the United States university president and alpinist whose death was recorded yesterday, fell to his death when loose rock gave way at Rock Chimney, while on a private climbing expedition out of Banff. Mrs. Stone informed the Alpine Club, she is slowly recovering from the effect of exposure and being being five days without food when caught in a shallow crevice attempting to reach her husband's body, which has not been found but is said to be somewhere at the foot of Chimney Rock.

### DAVIS CUP TENNIS PLAYERS DELAYED BY IMMIGRATION MEN

PITTSBURG, July 28.—Members of the Australian Davis Cup tennis team, which left Toronto last night, were detained at Black Rock, New York, by immigration officials because they were not provided with the necessary papers to enter the United States. They were later allowed to continue their journey after a delay of six hours.

JUNEAU, July 27.—A sum not to exceed \$3,500 was authorized by the City Council at its regular meeting last night for the expenditure in constructing the new city float. The council also authorized work to begin immediately.

The construction of the float will be under the direction of R. M. Keeny. It will be built between the Alaska Juneau wharf and the rock dump of the same company. When completed it will afford a protected anchorage to small craft, fishing vessels, etc., from south-east winds.

### ALBERTA TOWNS ARE MAKING ARRANGEMENTS WITH THEIR CREDITORS

EDMONTON, July 27.—Eight towns in Alberta have definitely arranged with bond holders and banks about the adjustment of their finances and arrears of debentures and in the case of one other town a similar arrangement is pending. There is little cause of apprehension as to the general position of Alberta municipalities when out of a total of 342 organized municipal corporations the aggregate debenture arrears totals less than \$175,000.

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

FISHERMAN IS FOUND GUILTY

Long Drawn Out Mork Case Heard Before Judge Young Yesterday.

Nels H. Mork, charged with misappropriation of funds from a fish sale of the fishing boat Rambler, appeared before Judge Young yesterday afternoon for trial and was found guilty. He was remanded for sentence until tomorrow afternoon.

Four witnesses, J. C. Martinson, Sergeant McGlinchey, Sergeant Bailey and American Consul A. E. Wakefield, gave evidence. Martinson, a fisherman from the Rambler, testified that the accused had received \$140.50 as the proceeds of a fish sale and had paid \$90 to him, the rest not being accounted for. The officers testified as to making the arrest and Mr. Wakefield told of a conversation he had had with the accused in which he stated he had spent the balance of the money.

E. O. Oughton, of Fisher & Oughton, acted for the crown and W. H. Johnson had the case for the accused.

THE KID HERE AT WESTHOLME

One of Charlie Chaplin's Million Dollar Pictures Seen for First Time.

Charlie Chaplin's first venture into the field of feature comedies, "The Kid," will open at the Westholme tonight. Because the story has a strong vein of pathos throughout, the unusual comedy talent which has made Chaplin the most funny man the world stands out stronger and more joyous than in any previous production in which he has appeared.

"The Kid" is a realization of an ambition which the comedian has held for years. He conceived the story when he was first starting on his screen career, but could think of it only as something he would like. Then he made his contract with the Associated First National Pictures, Inc., under the policy of that distributing organization of permitting uncontrolled production on the part of stars and producers.

Chaplin whipped his idyllic shape and started work upon the production of the story. It took him a year to complete. There are but five characters of importance in it and are characterized as The Man, The Woman, The Kid, The Tramp and The Policeman. The comedian himself plays the part of The Tramp, while a real find as a juvenile actor, Jackie Coogan, has the title role, and Edna Purviance plays the part of The Woman.

**Baby Story.**  
The Woman abandons her baby by leaving it in a limousine car. Thieves steal the car and toss the baby into an ash pile, where it is found waiting by The Tramp. The Tramp raises it through babyhood and into early childhood. The Woman has made a success on the operatic stage and devotes her life and fortune to aiding children of the slums. Thus she comes to know both The Tramp and The Kid without suspecting the latter's identity.

**NEW SPEED BOAT BUILT**  
**Swimming Gala Will Be Held at Salt Lakes on August 7; Good Events**

Kenny Rood's Runabout, "Miss Chief" to Contend for Honors This Fall.

The "Miss Chief" is the name of a new speed boat which Kenny Rood has now nearly finished building and which will be launched in the course of a week or ten days. **FREIGHT RATES ARE DUE FOR A TUMBLE**

Revision Possible About September 1, Manufacturers Concerned.

TORONTO, July 28.—There are a variety of rumors afloat with regard to the prospective developments on freight rates. There is a general impression among traffic men that the anticipated reduction cannot be long delayed. In some quarters it is maintained that the revision in rates will take effect on September 1. Manufacturers are much concerned with the outcome, since they will be affected both directly and indirectly. Firms that sell their goods extensively in the Prairie Provinces are likely to find that a reduction in rates will give Western grain growers a better price for their grain and will accordingly provide more funds to purchase manufactured goods.

**DECLARES TEACHERS TOOK PART IN ROW**

VICTORIA, July 28.—Following the emphatic declaration of officials of the B.C. Teachers' Federation that they had not interfered in the present High School row, as charged, Mrs. Georgina B. Clarke, High School teacher, filed with the School Board last night an affidavit to the effect that she had been told by a Miss Moore "that the Federation intended to take steps to see that no teacher held a position in the Province of British Columbia who was not a member of the Teachers' Federation."

The name of the Teachers' Federation was dragged into the High School imbroglio when Principal Dr. Alexander Robinson in a letter to the School Board regretted the tendency of teachers' bodies to combine to protect inefficient teachers. Federation officials warmly denied that their organization had done any such thing, as did E. Hamilton Smith, representing the High School teachers. They also denied that the organization had attempted to force any teacher to join it.
