Incompleted Ships Pass to Government

Returned by Arrangement with Trustee; L. W. Patmore Sends Further Affidavits South Fe a cing Action of Sheriff

VANCOUVER, February 18.—Following the dispute between the department of Marine and Fisheries of the Dominion Government and W. E. Hodges, trustee for the creditors of the Prince Rupert Drydock & Engineering Co., an application was made to the bankruptcy court yesterday afternoon for directions regarding the disposition of the plant and equipment of the shipyard.

MR. BUTT IS BACK IN CITY

ENJOYABLE WHIST DRIVE WAS GIVEN

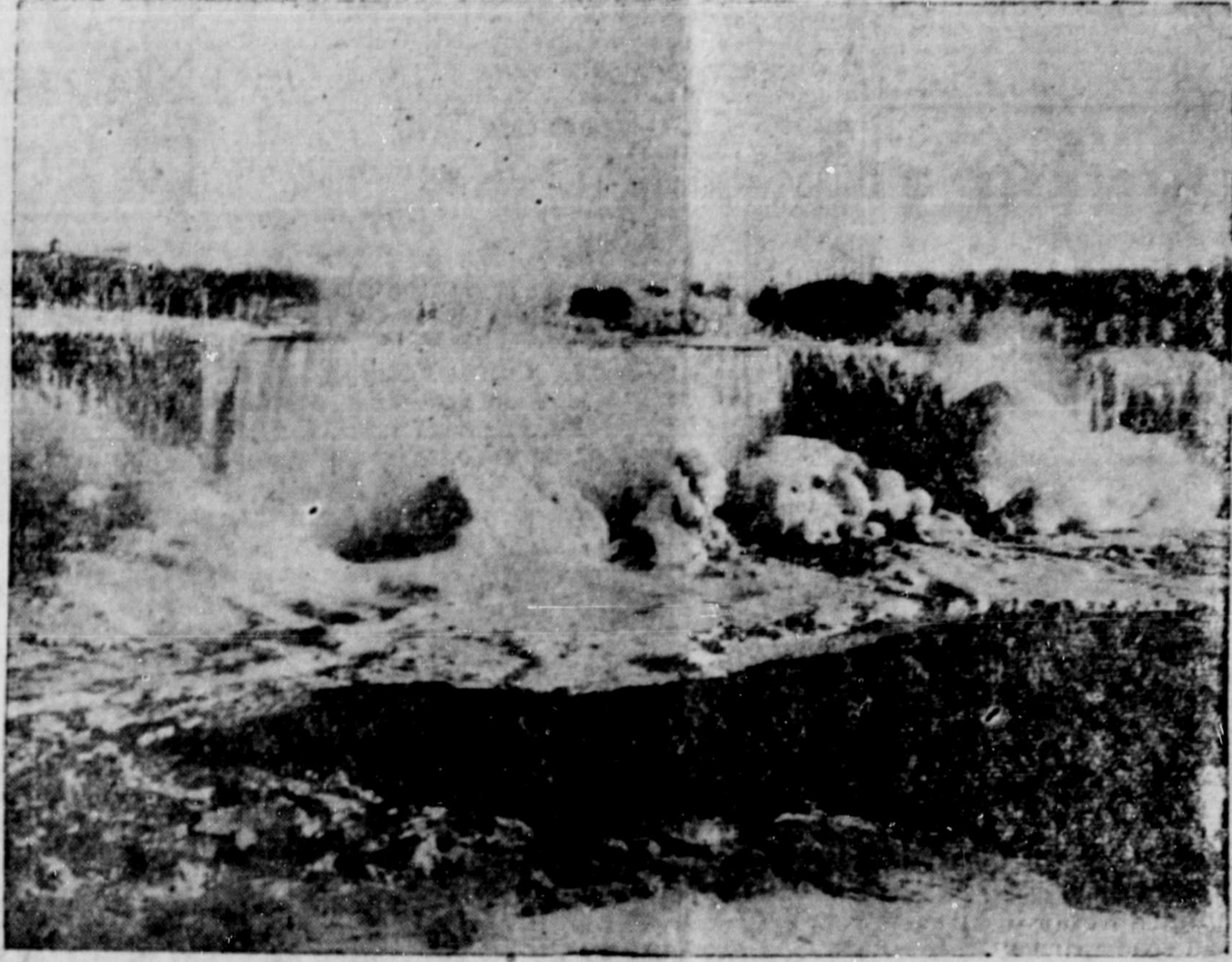
Affair by Rebekahs Proved as Enjoyable as Ever Last Night.

A Sulphite Plant Would Mean Much to Community, Says Engineering Expert

Further Particulars Given by H. S. Taylor in regard to Proposed Industry; Construction Alone would be Great Thing

Before leaving for the south last night on the Prince George, Howard S. Taylor, representing the big engineering firm from Dayton, Ohio, that is here in connection with the proposed new sulphite plant, was asked further particulars in regard to the plant and what it would mean to the community.

Mr. Taylor said that it would cost anywhere from \$800,000 to \$1,000,000 and the work of construction itself would mean an immense lot in the city outside of the actual operation as a permanent industry afterwards. To spend that much money here meant good times in the city.

CHINESE FINED SELLING DRUGS

Decision of Police Magistrate Reversed—Fine of \$200 Each Imposed.

The appeals entered by the police commission in Judge Young's court against dismissals made recently by Magistrate McMorde when Kwong Gin and Kwong Sun were let go on charges under the Opium Act, were allowed yesterday afternoon and fines of \$200 and costs imposed on the two Chinese.

The decision of Magistrate McMorde thus upset by Judge Young rested on technicalities where the magistrate decided that the substances in question had not been proved to contain a certain percentage of drug under the act.

FISH SHIPPED TO VANCOUVER

No Arrivals in South so Prince Rupert Supplies Markets of Coast Cities.

The fish vessels arriving yesterday morning from the banks sold yesterday afternoon to various of the fish firms and were mostly shipped south on the Prince George to Vancouver and Seattle to fill local market requirements on account of the scarcity of fish being landed at these ports during this time between seasons.

FOREST RANGERS UNDERWENT TRAINING

VICTORIA, Feb. 18.—Fifty-seven returned soldiers in 1920 received training as forest rangers. In each forest district of the province men were given field training from April 1 to September 30, after which they were given an opportunity to qualify as forest rangers.

**Drydock Matter
 Soon Be Settled.**

Affairs in connection with the Prince Rupert Drydock and
 Engineering Co. are developing fast and it is very possible some
 settlement will be arrived at very soon which will allow work on
 the ships to proceed under the Wallace contract. This is what
 people are looking for. At the same time it is desirable that the
 creditors of the concern should get all that is coming to them.
 There certainly should be no high-handed attempt of the Govern-
 ment to override the law and to obtain by might that which
 cannot be secured as a matter of right.

Everyone is anxious to see work on the hulls continue and
 the Wallace company in full possession and in a position to pro-
 ceed unhampered with the industry which has been a source of
 worry ever since it started.

**Price of Coal
 Investigation.**

It seems reasonable that the public should know why the
 price of coal is so high on Vancouver Island. An investigation
 would show that.

If the Government is already in possession of the facts in
 connection with the coal mining business, there is no need for
 an investigation, but the facts should be published through a
 statement made in the Legislature or a special report from the
 minister of mines. People have a right to know, if the prices
 are too high.

In Prince Rupert there have been complaints in regard to
 the price of coal and at one time an effort was made to fasten
 the blame locally. This failed. It was shown that the trouble
 lay at the other end. Now it would be interesting to know what
 is the cause.

**Interviews on
 Sulphite Plant.**

The interviews given by H. S. Taylor, the engineer who is
 here giving expert advice in regard to site for the proposed
 sulphite plant, which it is expected will become the nucleus of
 a much bigger concern, have proved very interesting reading for
 the people of Prince Rupert. Mr. Taylor says this is an ideal
 location for such a plant but there is the handicap in the matter
 of power. Until a large electric plant is installed here, there is
 nothing to do but use steam. This is much more costly than
 electric power and is one of the handicaps to building here. If
 the city grants free water to the company that will to some extent
 make up the difference.

Many people here seem anxious that the company shall be
 granted concessions which will enable them to locate in the city,
 and the Daily News is also in strong sympathy with the general
 idea, the details to be worked out by the mayor and city council.
 We want that mill. That is generally agreed on, so far as one
 can hear on the street. We want basic industries started here so
 that we may have an industrial city as well as a seaport town.

**Are Men Better
 Sports Than Women?**

It is alleged, with what authority cannot be definitely ascer-
 tained, that women cannot play a game and stick to rules like a
 man. It is said that they are not amenable to discipline and take
 every opportunity to go beyond the regulations whenever opportu-
 nity occurs. This is a slashing indictment and one we should
 not like to endorse without proof positive that it is correct.

An instance of this tendency among women is pointed to in
 connection with basketball games. It is said, with what truth
 we cannot say, that in the girls' games it is impossible to keep
 the players to the rules. The moment they become excited they
 scamper off after the ball like a mob, and rules of the game
 are sent to the discard. All attempts to keep them in check are
 useless.

We realize that this criticism, which we simply pass on for
 the benefit of all concerned, is likely to cause a certain amount
 of controversy and we hope that the ladies will have a satisfactory
 "come back" and show the men critics that they are not that
 kind of people at all.

The time used is Pacific Standard, for the 120th Meridian west. It is counted from 0 to 24 hours, from midnight to midnight.

The table given is for Port Simpson but the time for Prince Rupert varies only a few minutes on some days and on others is the same. The range of the tide may be computed as 5 per cent greater at Prince Rupert than at Port Simpson both at springs and neaps. Therefore the rise in the Prince Rupert harbor is slightly greater than Port Simpson.

The height is in feet and tenths of feet above the average level of lower low water.

DEMANDS APOLOGY OF JAPANESE GOVERNMENT

China Also Asks Reparation for Action of Neighbor State

PEKING, Feb. 18.—The Chinese government has demanded an apology and reparation from Japan for the sinking last June of a Chinese craft by fire from a Japanese gunboat in the Amur river, shortly after the Nikolaevsk massacre.

According to Chinese naval department reports, the Chinese boat, manned by one naval officer, four marines and 44 workmen, was sent out by the Chinese gunboat lying in the Amur to cut wood for fuel. On its return at 3 o'clock in the afternoon a Japanese gunboat was sighted. The Chinese craft dropped anchor and ran up the Chinese flag.

The Japanese gunboat opened fire and seven shots hit the hull. The boat was partially submerged in shallow water and 34 workmen were killed by gunfire or drowned in efforts to get to shore.

EQUAL PARTNERSHIP AND RACIAL EQUALITY IS ASKED FOR INDIA

DELHI, Feb. 18.—The Legislative Assembly adopted a resolution yesterday that the relations between India and the British Empire be maintained on the basis of equal partnership and complete racial equality.

GERMANY MUST PAY TO LIMIT OF CAPACITY

LONDON, February 18.—Lloyd George declared in the House of Commons yesterday that he had stood by his pledge to the people that Germany must pay to the limit of her capacity.

THINKS RAILWAY SHOULD WANT TRADE

P. Burns & Co., through their head office, have taken up the cudgels on behalf of Prince Rupert to try to help to secure a supply of fish cars. The following letter, a copy of which has been forwarded to the local office, was sent to A. E. Warren, general manager of western lines:

The Letter

"We are in receipt of a letter from our Prince Rupert branch, and in dealing with conditions there they state that one of the deterrents to good business in Prince Rupert is the continual shortage of express refrigerator cars. Time after time large fishing boats have entered this port to discharge their catch, only to find on landing that no refrigerator cars were available, and in consequence they were obliged to go on to Vancouver or Seattle. This means a tremendous loss of business to Prince Rupert business men, because it means that, quite apart from the loss of shipment of this fish through Prince Rupert, the provisioning of these boats is taken care of at Vancouver, Seattle or wherever they discharge.

"We understand that the Board of Trade and City Council have taken this matter up from time to time, but without any practical results.

The Argument

"The Spring season will soon be around again, when this refrigerator car situation will once more be a matter of great importance to the port of Prince Rupert. It would seem in our opinion that it would be just as important, if not more so, to the G.T.P., to have the hauling of this fish over their line, as to the people of Prince Rupert to have the handling of this fish at Prince Rupert, and the provisioning of these fishing boats. In other words, it is a matter of mutual interest, and, being deeply interested in the business and welfare of Prince Rupert, we are bringing this matter to your attention, with the hope that, before the Spring season opens, you may be able to make such arrangements as will provide an adequate supply of these express refrigerator cars for the shipment of fish from that port instead of it being necessary for these shipments to go to Vancouver or Seattle.

He claims that had there been no cars here there would have been a howl and the company would have been blamed for the fish going south.

Mr. Gillis draws attention to the fact that keeping a lot of cars lying idle on the siding is costly and he makes this protest for his company, believing that possibly some of the other fish that was sent south would have gone there anyway.

CLEAN UP SHANGHAI

SHANGHAI, Feb. 18.—The international settlement of Shanghai is to be morally cleaner. One-fifth of the 870 vice establishments in the settlement are to be eliminated annually by a drawing held each year for five years. Under this plan 474 such establishments will be closed on April 1.

LARGE DEFICIT

VICTORIA, Feb. 17.—The deficit on the operation of the P.G.E. Railway last year was \$324,328. For 1919 it was \$202,113, the Premier states.

NO GIGGLING GIRLS

ATLANTIC CITY, N.J., Feb. 18.—Giggling girls who powder and rouge have been barred from jury duty by Judge Louis Repetto, of the district court here. Instructions to his bailiff posted in the court room set down that women juries shall contain: "No busy wives of workmen," "No mothers of small children," "No admixture of men," "No immature women who giggle, rouge and powder, but do not think."

GERMANS SEND-OUT PROPAGANDA BOOKLETS

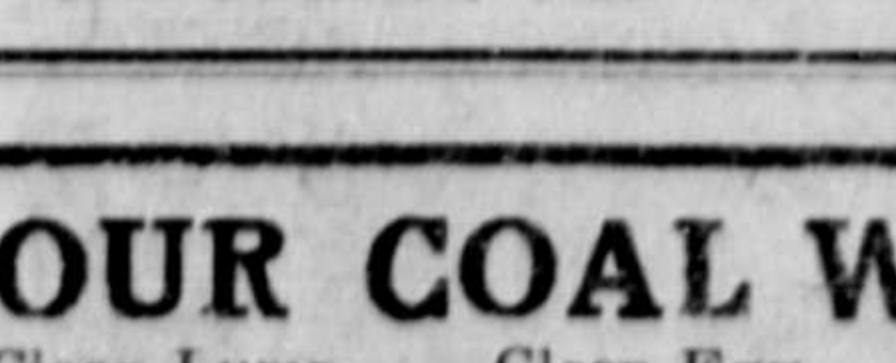

TELLS HORROR SOVIET PRISON

Socialist who Returns from Russia Describes Conditions as He Found Them

BERLIN, Feb. 18.—Prisoners in the jails of Soviet Russia, when condemned to death, are called out to be shot by soldiers who stalk into the cells after midnight, declares M. Schwartz, of San Francisco, the Socialist who went to Moscow to attend a congress of the Third Internationale and was imprisoned there for four months.

In a previous statement, Mr. Schwartz told of the death of his wife as the result of a hunger strike which she began, to end her imprisonment in Moscow, denounced communism in Russia and said he was going back to America to tell the workers there the actual facts about the Russian situation.

Tall and gaunt, his black hair and beard heavily streaked with grey, the American, who had been a Bolshevik before a visit to Russia "saddened and enlightened him," described in a supplemental statement the cold fear and trembling in which the Soviet prisoners wait for the visits in the dead of night.

In Dead of Night

"They always come between the hours of one and two o'clock," he said. "A Bolshevik soldier walks into the crowded cell and in the instant silence calls out the names of the men or women who must die. In the jail where I was, they marched the prisoners down a stairway and into a courtyard. We could hear the volleys of the firing squads. Many men were called out for execution from my cell during these four months. Few of them knew why they had been condemned, but generally it was understood they were 'counter-revolutionaries.' They were shot without trial."

Inured to Horror

After a time the prisoners became inured to these visits and, in the B.H.H. and monotony of prison life, ceased to care whether their names were called or not. Mr. Schwartz said. Gloomy greetings were often passed as the condemned men were marched out. The men about to die would say their goodbyes, wave their cell comrades a so-long, and those remaining would cry out: "Goodby. See you later."

Throughout the first few nights, however, Mr. Schwartz said he trembled as with ague, and his clothes, even to his overcoat, were wet with perspiration. Other prisoners, some of whom had been in the jail for more than a year, took the matter cynically and told him with apparent relish the horrors through which they had gone.

Life or Death

When at last the summons came to Schwartz to leave the cell he said he was certain he was going to the place of execution. But they led him upstairs instead of down. He was taken before an official named Feldman, in whose hands was the power of life and death over all the prisoners in his charge. This man said he had reviewed Schwartz's case and the American was free to go. Then the Bolshevik said:

"Will you tell me what you think of the Soviet government? Will you go back to the United States and speak against us?"

There was a long pause in which thoughts of the four months in prison and the executioners thronged into the American's mind. Then he replied:

Qualified Answer

"If your government really represents the working men I am for it. All my life I have worked for the laboring classes."

Evasive though it was Schwartz said the reply appeared to satisfy the Soviet official, who affected a pleasant and dismissed him.

"If every Bolshevik in America could spend a few weeks in a Soviet prison," he concluded, "there would be no more followers of the Red Flag at home."
