Railway Costs the Dominion Millions

PETROGRAD IS REPORTED TO BE TAKEN BY REBELS; RUTHENIAN DEFECTION

Immense Deficit on National Railways for Year Just Fast

Costs of \$30,000,000 in Operating Expenses Alone in Addition to Interest and Sinking Funds and Other Liabilities

Estimates for Year Are Much Higher Than Last

Nearly Forty-five Million Dollars More to Be Spent by Dominion Government than was Absorbed in 1920

OTTAWA, March 9.—The operating deficit of the Canadian National Railways for the year just closed amounted to \$30,000,000. In addition to this there are current and overdue liabilities amounting to \$20,000,000 and payment of the sinking fund to be made.

According to the estimates brought down yesterday by Premier Meighen, the total railway obligations requiring cash are \$50,000,000 and to cover this and estimated further expenditure for the year the sum of \$170,000,000 has been placed in estimates for the year.

Finance Minister Drayton yesterday afternoon tabled the main estimates for the coming year, amounting in all to \$582,062,698. This is an increase over last year of nearly forty-five million dollars.

The sum of \$57,000,000 will be required for the Grand Trunk railway.

BEER CLAUSE NOT LIKELY

That is Opinion Gathered From Discussions in Legislative Corridors.

VICTORIA, March 9.—Keen differences of opinion in regard to the beer clause were heard in the legislative corridors yesterday. Members have been lobbying among themselves and their opinions are modifying daily. It seems improbable that the liquor bill will contain a clause granting the right to sell beer other than through the government agency. The fate of the jitney bar hangs in the balance.

RAILWAYS ARE TOO COSTLY

Hon. J. D. Reid Says McAdoo Award Hindering Development.

OTTAWA, March 9.—Wide interest has been aroused by a statement in the House of Commons by Minister of Railways Hon. J. D. Reid that the "cost of railway operations is hindering or preventing the future development of both Canada and the United States has been hindered by the McAdoo award and some action must be taken."

MUCH MONEY HARBOR WORK

Estimate Provides for Four Million for Purpose, Including Drydock at Esquimalt.

OTTAWA, March 9.—Harbor and river works provided under public works chargeable to capital in the estimates today aggregate \$34,000,000 including a revote of the sum of \$3,000,000 for the new graving dock at Esquimalt.

FAILED RUPERT BUT LANDED PILOT JOB

Lieut. W. H. Brown Received New Appointment Under Air Board.

VANCOUVER, March 9.—Lieut. W. H. Brown, M.C., who was marooned on an island near Bella Bella when on his way to Prince Rupert to fly at the fall fair, has been appointed pilot navigator to the Air Board here.

MODERATION BILL AGAIN

Several Sections laid Over; Others Approved—Ottawa Appeal Discussed.

OTTAWA, March 9.—The legislature spent two hours considering a number of sections of the Moderation Bill, several of which were laid over and others approved.

Discussing the motion of Premier Oliver that the Legislature at Ottawa to pass legislation relating to importations of liquor into British Columbia, Mr. Bowden declared it unnecessary that there be an insertion of a section in the Moderation Bill to make it conform with the Doherty Act. A provision that no one be in possession of liquor unless it was purchased from the Government store would achieve the end.

Farris' View. Farris disagreed with that and claimed that the Doherty Act permitted the ban only on such importations as were brought in for a purpose illegal under provincial legislation. As a province only could pass legislation within the scope of its jurisdiction and could not stop functions, therefore the Doherty Act did not meet the situation. A. Macdonald moved the adjournment of the debate and will be the next speaker.

IRISH REBELLION WAS GERMAN MOVE

Is Admitted by Sinn Feiner in Speech at Boston.

BOSTON, March 9.—Germany's participation in the Irish rebellion of Easter, 1916, is admitted by Devery, a Sinn Feiner, in a speech here.

He said that the Sinn Feiners in the United States have arranged for the Germans for a shipment of arms to be delivered in Ireland.

DECLARES GERMANY MUST PAY.

PREMIER OF SPAIN SHOT IN STREET

Driver of Car Also Killed by Assassins Last Night.

MADRID, March 9.—Premier Dato of Spain was assassinated last evening while returning from the Chamber of Deputies in a motor car. The car was attacked on the street and several persons fired a number of shots, killing the driver as well as the Premier.

PRESENTATION

ALEX. McRAE NEW HEAD OF WHALEN PLANTS

Pulp Manufacturing to Resume About April 1.

VANCOUVER, March 9.—L. M. Glodell has been appointed superintendent of all the steam plants of the Whalen concern. C. W. Wright is to remain superintendent of Swanson Bay. The Swanson Bay and Port Alice wood fibre sawmills are expected to reopen about April 1 and will employ a considerable number of men. This announcement is made by S. H. Garrigan, who has just returned from Bangor, Maine, with his wife and family and has taken up his residence in Vancouver. Mr. Garrigan says that he expects Mr. McGarry to visit the coast soon for a conference respecting the further policy of the mill operations.

Petrograd in Hands Of Revolutionaries

White Ruthenians have Proclaimed Independence from Russia; Conflicting Reports Received

COPENHAGEN, Mar. 9.—Petrograd is reported to be in the hands of the revolutionary forces after a terrific bombardment of the city followed by machine gun battles in the streets.

News from Russia is conflicting. Bolsheviks' despatches report partial successes of the Soviet, the B. Shyeviki recapturing the suburbs of Petrograd.

WARSAW, March 9.—White Ruthenians have proclaimed their independence from Russia, says a Minsk despatch.

The Ruthenians inhabit White Russia comprising southwestern Russian provinces centering upon Minsk.

BALLANTYNE REQUESTED TO WAIVE RIGHTS

Hardship on Shipyard Creditors if Government Refuses to Pay For Material.

At a meeting of the council of the Board of Trade held yesterday afternoon the following telegram to Hon. C. G. Ballantyne was ordered sent:

The Government is exercising lien powers not available to private persons in taking over the ships, material and equipment of the Prince Rupert Drydock and Engineering Co. thus working a great hardship on merchants who furnished supplies without notice of the Government's extraordinary power, we request that the Government do not exercise its unusual powers to the serious hardship of bona fide creditors, but pay the creditors for materials and supplies furnished for these ships, as we believe such a course just and equitable.

A copy of the telegram was sent to Col. C. W. Peck with a request that he show it to the representative of the creditors, M. P. McCaffery.

BUDGET ON MONDAY NEXT

Drugless Physicians Act Referred to Select Committee for Report.

VICTORIA, March 9.—Hon. John Hart has been working hard on the annual budget and this will be brought down on Monday next, it is announced here.

Night sessions of the Legislature will commence on Tuesday, an indication that the session of the Legislature is not likely to be a long one.

The "Drugless Physicians Act" was introduced on Tuesday, this being a measure to license chiropractors, osteopaths and others, who at present are not allowed to practise legally. It was referred to a select committee of the House.

HALF MILLION DOLLAR LOSS

Timber to the Value of \$485,000 Destroyed by Fire During Last Year.

VICTORIA, March 9.—Fire cost the province a lot of money last year, according to a report to the Legislature by the minister of lands. Standing timber on 390,000 acres of land was burned, the value of the timber destroyed being \$299,000. Range and young growth timber was lost to the province from the same cause, the destruction amounting to \$186,000. This makes a total loss to the province from fires during the year of \$485,000.

MEMBER DIRECTORS OF CORPORATIONS

OTTAWA, March 9.—By a majority of 51 the House of Commons yesterday declared in favor of cabinet ministers being allowed to sit as directors of private corporations.

MORE MEN ARE BUSY AT DOCK

One Hundred Engaged in Ship Construction and Fifty-Nine Repair Work.

One hundred and fifty-nine men are now working at the local dry dock and shipyard for the Wallace Shipyards Co. One hundred of these, including three gangs of riveters, are actually engaged on the work of ship construction on the two government vessels under the Wallace contract. The remainder are engaged in repair work and general work about the yards.

The annual overhaul of the Prince John is going ahead.
