Annual Meeting of Board of Trade

NUMBER OF NOMINATIONS ARE ALREADY MADE FOR THE CIVIC ELECTIONS

Candidates Are Now Lining Up for Municipal Election Race

Two in field for Mayoralty; Nine for Aldermen; Three for Police Commission and School Board likely Acclamation

Nominations for municipal honors in next week's election will close at 2 o'clock on Monday afternoon but already several papers have been submitted to E. A. Woods, city clerk. There are seven nominations in for the aldermanic board, two for the police commission and one for the school board. On the latter body there are three vacancies and it appears from the present indications that there may be no contest for this body. As far as known there are no other candidates in the field for the mayoralty besides George W. Nickerson and Alderman Harry B. Rochester, neither of whom have yet had their papers filed. There promises to be a three cornered fight for the police commissioner'ship. It is understood S. D. Macdonald will not run against Wilfrid Macdonald, and word is being awaited from the latter who is in Vancouver.

MILNER DROPS FROM CABINET

Resigns from Position of Secretary for Colonies in British Government

LONDON, Jan. 8.—Viscount Milner resigned yesterday as secretary of state for the colonies. His successor has not yet been appointed.

Lord Milner is sixty-seven years of age, was educated at Oxford University and took up journalism as a profession, being for some time on the staff of the Pall Mall Gazette. It was as Governor of Cape Colony and High Commissioner for South Africa that he came into prominence.

In politics Milner is a Conservative of the old school and many people were unable to understand how Lloyd George, who was always a radical up to the time of the war, could have taken him into his cabinet. His resignation was not a surprise.

Year's Building Reaches Nearly Half a Million

Permits for 1920 amount to \$406,649.50, including New School; Slightly Less than for Previous Year

City building permits for the year 1920 show a total of \$406,649.50 according to figures obtained from the building inspector's office this morning. This includes building on city lots and also along the waterfront. A large portion of this total is the value of the \$175,000 school being built at Hays Cove Circle.

The total for 1920 is not as large as that of 1919, the aggregate for that year being \$508,084. Considering the high cost of building materials and labor prevailing during the last twelve months, the total is very satisfactory, however. Totals for other years were: 1918, \$406,301; 1917, \$98,700; 1916, \$28,300; 1915, \$33,760; 1914, \$601,675; 1913, \$198,332; 1912, \$316,717; 1911, \$265,771, and 1910, \$245,111.

May Use Tanks to Aid in Clearing Lands of B.C.

Farmers' Institutes Convention at Victoria Considering Proposal; Co-operative Marketing Similar to California System is Decided On

VICTORIA, January 8.—Tanks may be used to aid in clearing land in British Columbia. That is the latest proposal. The importation of a number of the big war machines from overseas to clear up thousands of acres for the farmers of this province is being seriously considered at a convention of farmers' institutes here.

The convention decided on the establishment of a wholesale co-operative house for farmers similar to the California system.

ASK SEPARATE FISHERY HEAD

Board of Trade Would Have a Deputy Minister of Fisheries Distinct from Marine.

At the meeting of the Board of Trade last night a communication from the B. C. Salmon Canners Association was read asking Prince Rupert to join in a memorial to the Premier asking him to appoint a deputy minister of fisheries in charge of that department separate from any other. The time was now opportune for such a move.

The board endorsed the memorial.

At the annual meeting of the Board of Trade last night a resolution was passed requesting the Provincial Government to proceed with the construction of the proposed new court house at once.

Officials Slated by District Member

Four Men Named as Being Enemies of Prince Rupert; nothing against them personally but only officially

In an address to the Prince Rupert Board of Trade at their annual meeting last night Colonel Peck, speaking on the subject "The Enemies of Prince Rupert and the things we should do to them" very severely slated Capt. Nicholson, Capt. Logan, Port Engineer Brownlee and Inspector Williams of the fisheries department, as men who knocked this port on every possible occasion. He said he spoke deliberately and took all the responsibility.

The Colonel went on to say that the head of the G. T. P. Steamships was not in sympathy with Prince Rupert, yet if there were no town here, there would be no steamship company. All here were proud of Vancouver.

But Prince Rupert also wanted a place in the sun. She wanted to be a port and to have an equal chance with other places. Mr. Brownlee, he said, did not hesitate to decry this port and the dock and railway here and they should try to bring business to those institutions. He charged Capt. Logan with favoritism in connection with docking ships and Capt. Williams, the fishery officer, with working against the interests of the port. He urged the Board of Trade not to stand for this treatment. He had nothing against them personally but only in their official positions. As long as they were opposed to Prince Rupert he would be opposed to them.

Co-operation.

Colonel Peck thanked the members of the board for co-operating with him as their member. They had played the game fairly with him. The officers had been public spirited and had given him loyal support on matters in which the welfare of the city was concerned. There had been trying moments and it was a great support to have this organization behind him. A lot of criticism had been made of the Prince Rupert Board of Trade but he appreciated them.

One of the troubles in Prince Rupert, continued the colonel, was that there was too much politics. This divided their energies as a community. If they would combine and relegate their politics to election time they would make better progress. This was very important. The member spoke of the need of getting on getting docks for (continued on Page Four).

No Politics Except During a Campaign.

Colonel Peck made a very wise remark at the Board of Trade meeting last night when he said that there was too much politics in Prince Rupert. The colonel urged that politics be kept for political campaigns and not be continually in evidence. The News has been one of the leaders in this movement and has endeavored to avoid political wrangling. When the fight is on we shall fight, as the colonel suggested, but between elections let us all forget our differences and remember nothing but the welfare of Prince Rupert. Unfortunately political questions are inextricably bound up with the welfare of the city, so that it is difficult to separate them at times. When there is studied indifference to the needs of a place by a government, there seems to be nothing to do but advocate turning that government out.

Be Loyal to Place Where Get Living.

Colonel Peck further urged that people should be loyal to the place where they make a living. That is sound doctrine. Anyone who is not sufficiently satisfied with a place to speak well of it, should seek other climates. To knock the place in which you live in as bad as foul in your own nest. It always reacts on the person who does it.

This has no reference to either of the officials slated by the colonel yesterday. They should be able to defend their own actions, unless they feel that holding official positions debars them from replying.

There are many people who have lived in Prince Rupert for years yet see nothing good in the place. They are unfortunate for they lose much of the pleasure of life. Prince Rupert people do not offer their climate for sale, but that is no reason for always talking about it. It is not as bad as it is painted. Give us plenty of business, some good citizens and friends and no one cares about the climate. We do not live on climate. Prince Rupert is one of the best places in which to live, if you are busy, and if you are not busy, there are other places particularly suited for loafing. The South Sea Islands are ideal for the purpose.

Board of Trade Off To a Good Start.

The Board of Trade is off to a good start. The new president is keen and vigorous and should be able to follow up the good work done by former presidents. While the financial condition of the board is not good, owing to its very active work, the results should be of great benefit to the city.

There are still a good many businessmen who are not members of the Board of Trade. It is the one organization that does the publicity work for the city and that keeps the interest of the city and district always to the fore. It is worthy of the support of everyone. It is to be hoped that in the coming year it will get that measure of backing which it deserves. If all the men who do business here would join the board, there would be money enough to carry on without difficulty.

Therefore the rise in the Prince Rupert harbor is slightly greater than Port Simpson.

this port. There were docks at other places where they were not needed but here they were needed badly.

In the course of his criticism of the officials, Colonel Peck told of an occasion when he was urging more boats for this service, objection had been made that the fleet should be kept uniform. What they wanted, however, was boats that would handle the trade. "Captain Nicholson looks on this port as a joke," he declared, "and the difficulty is to get that out of the minds of some of the people of Canada."

Decry Port.

Brownlee did not hesitate to decry this port. He said everything he could against the place and against the officials of the dock and staff. The spirit was to decry the dock here and take the steamers elsewhere. It was the plain duty of the Canadian National Railway to get business for the dock which the people owned. As long as Brownlee was there he would buck the town.

The speaker said he held the principle that a man should be loyal to the place in which he lived. The town would be known by the determination of its citizens. They should let the officials know that they were not going to stand for such treatment as they had received.

The colonel said he was pleased to see the Wallace shipyard interested here. They were a well known firm. While the people here did not expect anything unreasonable, if that firm was against this town all would be against them. He did not expect anything but good treatment from them, however. They were a good firm and knew their business.

Lloyd's Representative.

The work of Lloyds was described by the speaker. He had been taken there to see the institution by Capt. Barney Johnson. It was an impartial institution but its representative on this coast, Captain Logan, was not favorable to Prince Rupert, and the local dock. Such treatment would not be tolerated. He would protest most energetically to Lloyds. He thought this might be made a separate district.

The Marfish incident was then mentioned in connection with which the fisheries boat had been taken south for repairs. Reference was made to a hunting trip and the dismissal of the crew. They should not stand for these men but should get out and let them know they were not wanted.

No One Should Knock.

The colonel said Prince Rupert was better off than most places, but they should not allow anyone to knock the town.

At the conclusion President Williams said they had listened with pleasure to the address and were proud of the member who had backed them up and in many cases led the way. He pledged him support in all things regarding Prince Rupert. They must work shoulder to shoulder.

On motion of M. P. McCaffery, seconded by S. E. Parker, a hearty vote of thanks to Colonel Peck was carried with enthusiasm.

WITNESSES WITH THE EVIDENCE IN MURDER MAY ARRIVE SHORTLY

Trouble is Alleged to have Arisen
Out of Domestic Troubles,
with Wife Involved

Constable Ackroyd, of the Provincial police, is expected back here tonight or tomorrow on the Leila R. with the witnesses and evidence in the Booth murder case at Thurston Harbor. There is a possibility that the officer may be delayed by the fierce storm that raged last night on Hecate straits. According to word received in the city the killing was committed by Robert Holmes, and Joseph Booth, a fisherman, is the dead man. Holmes is said to have confessed and a coroner's jury has brought in a verdict of manslaughter. The trouble arose over domestic troubles in which the wife of Holmes, the wife of the alleged slayer, was involved. Holmes was a logger and had been a partner of Booth's.

S. E. PARKER MAKES CLOSING SPEECH

In his closing address to the Board of Trade last night President Parker thanked those who had worked with him so well during the year now past. The committees had done excellent work.

The board had endeavored to do a good many things. They had secured free express delivery and put Rupert on the railway map. Efforts to secure express refrigerator cars had been made but so far without success. They were informed by Colonel Peck, however, that fifty had been ordered in addition to the thirty previously on order.

During the year there had been few lunches but several important banquets at which prominent men had been entertained. They had received promises from ministers of the crown and railway officials but so far none of these promises had been fulfilled.

SAYS RUSSIA HAS NOTHING THAT WE WANT

Paul Milukoff Objects to Trade Relations with Soviet Government

LONDON, Jan. 8.—Professor Paul Milukoff, Russian foreign minister under Kerensky, and considered the leading Russian anti-Bolshevik authority in England, is quoted here as saying: "There is nothing to be obtained from Russia except flax and timber and that has been sold several times over. I cannot imagine that established British firms will consider this a solid basis for trading with a bankrupt country."

Agreeing with American State Department officials at Washington, Milukoff expressed his opinion to the London Globe that the proposed British trade agreement with Russia is "to all intents and purposes, recognition of the Bolsheviks who have never been elected by any vote of the people."

Propagandists "Trade with the Bolsheviks will only intensify the danger of Bolshevik doctrines spreading in England," said Milukoff. "With trade will come, first, agents, then 'consuls'—all trained propagandists whose real work it would be to hasten social revolution."

Milukoff states that Russia has nothing to offer in exchange for goods. He says that Lenin himself emphasizes that the remaining gold reserve is negligible and would certainly be exhausted in a month or two.

"There is one thing that Lenin and Trotsky cannot stop without admitting the awful disaster they have brought upon my unhappy country—that is, the preaching of world revolution. Everything is subordinated to that end," concluded Professor Milukoff.

POLISH MUNITIONS.

WARSAW, Jan. 7.—Poland's first munitions factory began operations near Warsaw recently. About 2,500 men and women are employed in the plant, which has been named "The Projectile."

SMALLPOX AT EDMONTON

Six Cases Reported Since Begin-
ning of Year.

EDMONTON, Jan. 7.—Small-
pox, which a short time ago
appeared to show some disposi-
tion to die out in the city, is again

being kept busy, for since the

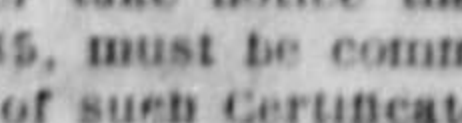
