All Coal Miners Quit Work Tonight

PORT RESTORE MONARCHY IN HUNGARY BY PUTTING CHARLES ON THRONE

British Coal Miners Go Out On Strike Tonight Midnight; Wage Demands Unsatisfied

LONDON, March 31.—The Government has refused to subsidize coal mines in order to allow the operators to increase wages of the miners. As a result the officials of the Miners' Federation today instructed all coal miners to quit work on April 1 throughout Great Britain.

LONDON, March 31.—The coal miners have already begun to strike as their shifts come out in the various districts with the decision of the executive to call a strike at midnight owing to the failure to settle with the miners in regard to wage demands.

LONDON, March 31.—(1 p.m.)—The entire country is awaiting the result of the labor conference which has been called to consider the grave crisis which has arisen through the decision of the coal miners to cease work at midnight.

LUMBER MILL MANAGER BACK FROM ISLANDS

E. F. Doby Says No Activity at Masset Inlet—Shannon Bay Camp Closed.

CHATHAM, Mass., March 31.—The British freighter Gaelic Prince is ashore on a ground about near here. The vessel left Boston yesterday after having unloaded part of her cargo from Victoria and other Pacific ports. She was making for New York when she went ashore.

E. F. Doby, manager of the Prince Rupert Lumber Co., has returned from a business trip to Masset Inlet where he is closing up the camp which has been operating at Shannon Bay. The last raft is being completed this week and the camp will then be finally closed. About eight million feet of all has been taken from this camp.

Mr. Doby says there is no activity on Masset Inlet but by campers went in there about two weeks ago.

No word has been received from Mr. Buckley but he is expected back from England soon and may have something to say in regard to the work at Buckley Bay. In the meantime the mill and camp are closed.

LONDON, March 31.—Cardinal O'Connell of Ireland, has been reported by Sir William Balfour Paul and three other southern Unionists with the object of securing peace negotiations between the British republicans and the Government.

DEPENDENTS TO BE AID BY OTTAWA

OTTAWA, March 31.—Relief extended by the Dominion Government to returned men married or single with dependents but no further assistance will be given to single men and dependents.

POLICE KILLED

OTTAWA, March 31.—Fourteen men are missing, five of whom are believed to have been killed in a riot at police barracks at Perth.

MUTINEERS SHELLING KRONSTADT

Sailors of White Sea Squadron Turn on the Bolsheviki.

STOCKHOLM, March 31.—An anti-Bolshevik mutiny among the sailors of the White Sea Squadron has taken place. Ships have been seized and the sailors are shelling Kronstadt. It is further reported that the Bolsheviki forces have withdrawn from Archangel.

FIREMEN FOUGHT IN CLOUDS OF NEW YORK

Blaze in Thirty-first Storey of the Equitable Building, one of Highest in History.

NEW YORK, March 31.—Firemen fought among the clouds this morning for more than an hour subduing a blaze in the thirty-first floor of the Equitable Building. It was one of the highest fires that the New York department has ever been called upon to fight.

BONDED INDEBTEDNESS ON RAILWAY IS LARGE



John S. Myrick, president of the United States Lawn Tennis Association, announced at the meeting of the committee in charge of the dinner to be given the Davis Cup team on April 22 that Sir Auckland Geddes, Ambassador to the United States from Great Britain, would be a guest of honor. In view of the fact that the team which won the trophy this year played both in England and Australasia, it was considered particularly appropriate that the British Ambassador should be present. His acceptance, inspired partially, perhaps, by his own interest in the sport was, therefore, most gratifying to the committee.

As Mr. Myrick said:—

"The fact that the British Ambassador has done us the honor of accepting our invitation shows clearly the position which tennis has attained internationally and promises to make this dinner the most important event of the kind that has ever been held."

Organization of the committee was completed at the meeting of the University Club, this being very well attended. The dinner will take place in New York city. In addition to the Davis Cup team, members of former teams and men active in tennis throughout the United States are expected to be present.

BEER CLAUSE LIQUOR BILL IS UP TODAY

Thomas Uphill Moving Amendment to Provide for Municipalities Licensing Sale.

LITTLE CHANCE OF THE AMENDMENT CARRYING

VICTORIA, March 31.—The liquor bill comes up in the Legislature today when Thomas Uphill will introduce an amendment in the form of a clause giving license powers for beer sale to municipalities, which would have absolute control over such sales.

Seven per cent proof spirit beer is provided for and treating is forbidden and no other liquor is to be sold in the same premises with beer. It is not likely that the amendment will be accepted by the Legislature which defeated all special beer sales in clubs or hotels when the bill was in committee.

AUTONOMY FOR SOUTH VANCOUVER

Premier Says Government is to Supervise Finances to Protect Province.

VICTORIA, March 31.—Autonomy will be restored to South Vancouver Premier Oliver announced in the Legislature yesterday. The Government will retain supervision of the finances of the municipality in order to protect their own interests as they have \$790,000 invested in the district.

ZABASSA GOES OUT AS INDEPENDENT BOAT

Leaves for Halibut Banks on Saturday in Charge of Capt. Candow.

The fishing schooner Chief Zabassa which has been operated by the Canadian Fish and Cold Storage Company up till this year on what is known as the company lay, is leaving for the fishing grounds on Saturday as an independent boat. This means that the members of the crew all share in the result of the trip and the catch is sold by auction along with other fish offering at the time of her arrival.

Capt. Candow is in charge of the schooner. She carries six dories, which means twelve fishermen as well as the captain, engineer and cook.

SALMON TROLLERS PREPARING FOR WORK

Many Will be Fishing Next Month for Springs.

The salmon trollers are preparing to leave in April for the spring salmon trolling grounds. These will operate off Dundas Island, Queen Charlottes and a number of other favorite locations and the purchasing companies send their collecting boats to buy the fish and bring them to the cold storage or other plants ready for shipment in ice to the market, or to be frozen or otherwise prepared before being sent east.

Effort to Restore Monarchy In Hungary with Charles as Ruler; Dictatorship Already

VIENNA, March 31.—It is reported here that ex-Emperor Charles has proclaimed a military dictatorship at Steinamanger and that General Lehar is at the head of 15,000 troops ready to march on Budapest and restore by force, if necessary, Charles to the throne of Hungary.

LONDON, March 31.—An exchange telegraph dispatch from Paris says it is reported there that a majority of the Hungarian troops have rallied to the standard of the former Emperor Charles who, it is expected, will march on Budapest.

VIENNA, March 31.—It is stated here that 30,000 Jugo-Slav troops are massed at Vaarasdin, Croatia, with the intention of marching on Steinamanger for the purpose of preventing the restoration of the Hapsburgs.

HERRING SEASON IS NOW CLOSED

The herring season is closed and a satisfactory pack has been made by the Canadian Fish and Cold Storage Co. and by others, the quality this year being better than ever before owing to improved methods of handling. For a week the cold storage boats were cruising around looking for herring and failing to find any returned and the season is declared closed.

SKIPPER OF S.S. NURSE DISCOVERED DEAD IN HER BED

QUINCY, Mass., March 31.—Captain Daniel Higgins, one of the old school of Cape Cod sailing skippers who had been shipwrecked several times and always found a way to shore in safety, is dead of old age. He was in his 89th year.

WALLA WALLA, March 31.—John Schmidt, the murderer of two Seattle policemen, will hang in the gallows of the State Prison here tomorrow morning.

ISLAND RIOTS

LISBON, Mar. 30.—Grave riots are reported from the island of St. Thomas, Gulf of Guinea.

B. C. PACKERS TO OPERATE CANNERIES

VANCOUVER, Mar. 31.—B. C. Packers decide to operate the same canneries as last year despite market depression. Of fourteen to operate, ten are in the north.

Election May Be Almost Any Time.

While the Daily News has taken the view that an election this year is not very likely, there are increasing evidences that the Dominion Government is weakening and that there is a probability of some drastic action being taken by Premier Meighen in the near future.

The first of a series of letters defending the administration of the railroads has been received in which it compares the operating expenses of the Canadian National with those of the C. P. R. and tries to explain why the road had such a large deficit last year.

Tax Reduction Was Expected.

It was expected that this year there would be a considerable reduction in taxation. The experiment in railway ownership and operation prevents this.

This is the one thing just now that is stirring the financial interests that are backing Premier Meighen. They are feeling the pinch and to no good purpose expect to see an ever bigger debt and a heavier tax next year.

It is generally understood that there is a demand for a change in the administration of the National Railways. Not only the minister of railways but possibly the president of the concern may have to give place for someone who will be expected to produce results.

Locally we have had a very stirring example of the inefficiency of the management of the railway. The failure to provide fish cars to handle one of the best paying departments of the road, is an indication of the general trend of affairs.

If it were not so tragical and did not touch us all so closely, the railway situation would be humorous. The department is sending out publicity material to the newspapers showing how well they are running the railways, and at the same time here we are damning them day after day, week after week, month after month for their inefficiency and failure to provide the common necessities to make the road pay its way.

Privileges for Digby Residents.

There is no provision for Digby Island residents to get to town except occasionally during the day time or when permission can be secured to use the launch. Some of them would like to attend church but they cannot cross to this side without hiring a launch or buying a boat.

PECK ASKS MINISTER REGARDING TRIP UP THE STIKINE RIVER

In the House of Commons a few days ago Colonel Peck asked the following questions:

- 1. Did two employees of the Public Works Department proceed up the Stikine River and down the Dease River to the lower post on the Liard last summer?
2. If so, what was the expense of this trip, including wages of those employees during the period they were engaged in same?
3. For what purpose was the trip made?
4. Was the purpose accomplished?
Hon. Mr. McGuire replied:
1. Yes.
2. \$1,065.08.
3. Reconnaissance was made and data secured as to requirements to improve the waterway for the handling of supplies, etc., to the mining district north of Dease Lake.
4. A report has been submitted and is receiving the consideration of the Department.

H. S. MUNRO WAS AT CASSIDY MINE

Says Plant is Not Paying and Company would be Willing to Lease It

"We are not making 5 per cent on our investment at the Cassidy coal mine," said H. S. Munro, general manager of the Granby Consolidated Mining, Smelting & Power Co. recently, "and would gladly rent it to anyone offering us a reasonable return."

Mr. Munro thinks that coal prices charged the public generally are too high, but cannot see any immediate prospect of a drop. With falling production costs which are now slowly taking place the price will probably be down a dollar a ton at the pithead before the end of the year, however. Educating the consumer to use slack coal, which is quite satisfactory for domestic purposes, is a solution which he suggests.





SELL HORSE FOR MATCHES

Various Causes for Discontent in Russia under Soviet Regime

STOCKHOLM, Mar. 31.—Russian peasants south of Moscow gladly sell a horse for three boxes of matches or a kilo of salt, it is declared by persons in touch with conditions in the interior of the country.

Observers cite this state of affairs as the cause of the counter-revolution in March, which, they say, began to take definite form in January. Unwieldiness of the Soviet administrative machine, the differences among the Bolshevik leaders and the fuel crisis with consequent stoppage of transportation and lack of food are given as the reasons for the subversive movement.

Discontent which was prevalent throughout Russia during the war period, but concealed in the presence of the invading enemy, could no longer be repressed when the fighting men returned home to find want and distress.

Sign of Revolt

The first sign of revolt against the existing order are said to have been apparent at the Russian trades-union congress in Moscow last November. There were further evidences of dissatisfaction in the eighth All-Russian Soviet Congress which convened in Leningrad at Moscow last December. These symptoms of reaction, it is stated, were unapparent on the surface, but made themselves felt among those behind the scenes. Harmonious resolutions were adopted, but the attack came from a quarter whose importance could not be doubted.

led by Selhapiukoff urged the democratization of the government, which, it was charged, was military and bureaucratic. Selhapiukoff also demanded that the food administration be placed entirely in the hands of the trade unions. This was plainly an attack against the Communist executive committee and the highest Soviet authorities.

Freedom of Press

More recently the press of the country has shown signs of greater freedom and has not hesitated to attack policies of the government which, it is said, has entrenched itself by appointing thousands of petty officials.

Press controversies have revealed animosities between leaders. For instance, Troitzky and his followers are declared to be set upon a policy of nationalization of trade unions, whereas Lenin believes it wiser to maintain the independence of the unions apart from the government and, to use them as training schools for Communism. And there are numerous other groups which, it is stated, are bent upon other projects, revealing a tendency to destroy the former unity of front in Russian policy.
