FEDERAL TAX UPSETS PLANS OF LIQUOR BOARD

NEW PROPOSAL FOR THE GOVERNMENT OF IRELAND BY LORD HUGH CECIL

Government Liquor Sale Will be Delayed until July Say Members of Board

VICTORIA, May 17.—Commencement of the Government of liquor in British Columbia has now been delayed indefinitely, it is stated today. "There are many problems that have to be dealt with yet," said Colonel Winsby. "There is no chance of getting the system started early in June. If it started soon after July 1 we shall be doing well." Members of the board declare the new federal taxes on liquor will hit the B. C. Liquor Board hard. The new taxes greatly increase the cost and selling price of liquor in the province and it is expected that it will cut down the quantity sold. Consequently the board and the profit thereon will be greatly affected.

By Parcels Post. VICTORIA, May 17.—Liquor is sent to consumers in British Columbia through parcels of the province pass an act of the province such delivery. Hon. J. H. Ross, postmaster-general, has informed the attorney-general that the act will be made and sites will be made.

OTTAWA, May 17.—The vote on the budget is expected to take place about Wednesday. If the vote is taken then or on Thursday it is expected prorogation will be within two weeks thereafter.

TOULOUSE, France, May 16.—Twenty people were killed and fifty wounded in a collision between express trains. One jumped the track. Foul play is suspected.

ANNUAL REPORT CITY AUDITORS

Confidence in City Shown by the Record of Taxation Collections Made.

The annual report of the city auditors, Riddell, Hodges, Stead & Winter, was submitted to the council last evening and has been laid over for a week to give each alderman the opportunity of scanning the report which is rather massive. At a later date it will be printed and embodied in the annual report of the city for the year 1920.

According to the report of the auditors for the year the collections had been the best in the history of the city and thus the confidence that the ratepayers had in the office was shown. 62 Per Cent Collected. There had been a levy of \$254,276.98 general taxes for the year and the collections had totalled \$207,925.30, or 82 per cent. These figures compare favorably with 1919 when there was a levy of \$175,696.51 with \$139,401.85 collections, 79 per cent. In 1918 the levy was \$161,137.08, collections \$101,437.08 or 63 per cent. The local improvement levy for the year had been \$59,486.35 with collections of \$12,963.16, or 22 per cent. The levies in 1919 and 1918 had been a similar amount with collections 59 per cent and 57 per cent respectively.

The following increases over 1919 in general rates had been shown in 1920: Dog taxes, 16 per cent; trade licenses, 19.5 per cent; light rates, 30.5 per cent; road taxes, 58 per cent; phone rates, 17 per cent, and water rates, 37 per cent.

FRANCE LEADS IN MILITARY

Has Two Thirds of all Men Under Arms on the European Continent.

WASHINGTON, May 17.—France and Poland lead by large majorities other continental nations of Europe in military effectiveness under arms, according to British statistics received here in official circles. France controls approximately two thirds or slightly more than three million men reported under arms today in Europe by her understandings concluded with Belgium, Czechoslovakia, Poland, Roumania and Jugoslavia.

VANCOUVER, May 17.—Mrs. Aaron Home, 33 years of age, died last night as a result of being struck by a Fourth Ave. street car.

MACHINISTS GO BACK TO WORK

Cecil Proposes a Separate Kingdom for Irish People

BELFAST, May 17.—Lord Hugh Cecil, while staying with Lord Londonderry's family at County Down, proposed a separate kingdom for Ireland with a prince of the English house for king, probably the Prince of Wales.

Cecil would give Ireland two small parliaments, one each for the north and south and an army but no navy, with Britain empowered to cancel the constitution in case of war.

Some south of Ireland leaders, including John Dillon, called the scheme preposterous.

NEW YORK, May 17.—Harry Boland, an Irish Republican, states that De Valera and his colleagues are ready to discuss peace, now that the Irish people have demonstrated their will.

DUBLIN, May 17.—A car ambushed in Ballantynestown resulted in the death of Inspector Blake and his wife, Capt. Cornwallis and Lieut. McCreary, all of the crown forces.

PARIS, May 17.—Two war millionaires, Roger Gault and Jules Bureau, have been arrested here charged with swindling the banks, it is alleged that they borrowed nearly twenty million francs, with which they bought factories, maintained a chateau, bought six automobiles and lavished tips as high as a thousand francs.

WASHINGTON, May 17.—The British authorities at Hong Kong have sent river gun boats against the Southern Chinese forces in Kwang Tung province, according to despatches of protest received here by Dr. Sun Yat Sen's agent.

TEN PER CENT CUT IN WAGES

Montreal Accepts; Week's Strike at Moosejaw Ended by Men Accepting Loss

MOOSEJAW, May 17.—Bricklayers and plasterers have ended a week's strike by accepting \$1.15 an hour. They asked \$1.25.

The carpenters are protesting the wage of 80c, but are remaining at work.

MONTREAL, May 17.—The bricklayers and masons have accepted the ten per cent wage cut in order to stimulate the industry. The new agreement is retroactive to May 1.

CREWS SIGN ON ALASKA ROUTE

Strike Breakers Expelled From Steamer Swiftscout at Portland.

PORTLAND, May 17.—Marine strike sympathizers raided the steamer Swiftscout, fought the crew and expelled it, and then left the ship before the police arrived on the scene.

SEATTLE, May 17.—Passenger, freight and mail service with Alaska was resumed with crews signed on the new Shipping Board steamer.

EUROPE ALSO FELT MAGNETIC STORM

Britain and Northern Countries—Telegraphic Lines Also Seriously Affected

LONDON, May 17.—The telegraph and telephone lines of the British Isles and Northern Europe were seriously interrupted by the great magnetic storm which practically paralyzed the telegraphic transmission of North America on Saturday and Sunday.

PLATINUM AND GOLD MINING NEAR MASSETT
Party Now Using Machines for Separating Rich Minerals from Sand

MASSETT, May 17.—The black sands of Massett Inlet, known as the Blue Jackets, are again being treated with machines to separate the gold and platinum from the sand and the present endeavors show promise of being successful. The work is now being conducted by a party of Vancouver and Massett men and an up-to-date machine is being used. The party is fully convinced that it will be successful and that their machine is the only one that is capable of handling such sand. The ore is expected to run from 50c to \$100 in platinum and gold, mainly the former. It is expected to launch out in the near future as far as Rose Spit, Cape Fife and down the coast a distance of twelve or fifteen miles, operating machines at various points. Points down the East coast show signs of being richer than even the Blue Jackets. It has always been thought that the black sand of Graham Island was just rich enough to keep miners working but poor. It seems now, however, that the right machines are all that is required to make a successful commercial proposition.

Fish Business Compared With Farming.
The stability and importance of the fishing business was pointed out the other day in an apt illustration in which the product was compared with the product of a farm. A boat came in with a catch of 25,000 lbs. of halibut. This is not at all an unusual catch as everyone knows. It was simply one of many boats in, some with more and some with less. The fish sold at an average of 10c a pound, bringing the fishermen and owners of the boat \$2,500. The catch was made in nine days. A farmer raised 50 steers which he sold at \$50 each and received for them cash amounting in all to \$2,500, the same amount as the fish boat. The steers took three years to prepare for market. They realized the same as the little cargo of halibut which was caught in nine days. Fishing goes on continuously. The product is marketed regularly and the income is steady. There are few places on the coast where there is as great a cash turnover as in the city of Prince Rupert.

WHY AURORA PUTS TELEGRAPH LINES OUT OF COMMISSION
Earth, as Natural Reservoir, Pumps Electric Currents Making Signals Unstable

The disturbances to the telegraphic lines that accompany the aurora borealis or northern lights are not caused directly by that phenomenon, but are caused by the static condition of the ground, that is believed to be the cause of the aurora itself. Telegraphic circuits are formed with the use of ground wires and when the lights are on the earth pumps these currents as a reservoir and makes the signals unstable, so that the codes are unintelligible. In some places when these conditions arise metallic circuits are not used, but this is impossible here for there is no equipment for this change. The conditions prevailing on lines in the north are by no means local, for they have been recorded all over the continent.

The time used is Pacific Standard, for the 12th Meridian west. It is counted from 0 to 24 hours from midnight to midnight. The table given is for Port Simpson but the time for Prince Rupert varies only a few minutes on some days and on others is the same. The range of the tide may be computed as 5 per cent greater at Prince Rupert than at Port Simpson both at springs and neaps. Therefore the rise in the Prince Rupert harbor is slightly greater than Port Simpson. The height is in feet and tenths of feet above the average level of lower low water.

Ladies Swimming Yesterday.
Yesterday was May 16 and a number of Ladies were at the Salt Lakes enjoying a swim. The weather was delightful and the water moderately warm. If this continues, there will be a good crowd at the lake tomorrow taking their first dip of the season. We are sometimes told that our weather is not good, but few places are able to provide enjoyable swimming on May 16.

Salmon as Plentiful As Ever They Were.
The inspector of fisheries says salmon are as plentiful in the Skeena River as ever they were. In spite of the large catches of sockeye every year, there is no diminution of the supply. The fishing has been carefully regulated and enough fish been allowed to pass up the river during the closed days to properly seed the streams. Also the two hatcheries have been useful in keeping up the supply. It is desirable that the fish shall still be conserved. The Skeena is the only large river on this coast entirely controlled by the Canadian authorities and that is the reason why the river is showing no signs of depletion. On the Fraser and Nans rivers conditions are different. The American traps intercept the fish as they approach each of these streams and the supply is diminishing, especially in the Fraser, which as a fishing stream has been completely ruined.

STIFF PENALTY DRUG OFFENCES

Prince Rupert Gets Behind Vancouver Recommendations Towards Eradication of Traffic and Use.

The draft of proposed legislation that has been recommended to the federal government for the province of B. C. by the city of Vancouver with the view of eradication of drug using and traffic was last night endorsed by the local council and a telegram is to be sent to the minister of justice telling of this action.

The following are some of the provisions that will appear in the statutes if the Vancouver recommendations are made law: Increased penalties for selling or keeping for sale—first offence, two years in prison and \$1,000 fine; second offence, five years and lashes. The deportation of alien offenders.

Making a new offence of keeping for sale.

The possession of equipment will be the evidence of keeping for sale.

The same penalty as now to prevail for possession of drugs. Police searches without warrant.

Stricter supervision of the manufacture and import of drugs. Confiscation of vessels or carriages engaged in the trade.

Sending to mental hospital of addicts as insane are now treated.

Printing and possession of labels to constitute offence.

Restriction of the sale of hypodermic needles and apparatus.

Investigation of chloral and its derivatives.

FISHERMEN'S POOR WAGES

Trollers Earned Only About \$50 Each at Dundas Island in April

According to O. P. Smith, fish buyer at Dundas Island, who brings most of the salmon to town, the fishermen at Dundas are not earning much money. He is in a position to know because he handles their product.

Mr. Smith says that the total catch for April was 16,150 pounds and of this approximately 3,300 pounds would be white salmon, for which they get a cent and a half a pound or \$49.50. The remainder of 13,150 pounds was sold at an average of 13 cents, netting them \$1,709 or a total of \$1,759 for the month for whites and reds. As this catch is divided among 35 boats, the catch would average about \$50 a boat for the month, scarcely enough, to pay for gas, much less keep a family.

Mr. Smith has a camp at Dundas Island and operates the Billy Boy between the island and this port.
