### IRISH SIEGE TO CONTINUE

DUBLIN, April 4.—The Irish Labor party has issued a manifesto stating that the siege of Ireland would likely continue. A war program was suggested involving a Sinn Fein commercial boycott, a moratorium on land rents, purchase of annuities and a general policy for the protection of Irish industries.

Extra Session of Legislature.

While it seems like an extra expense calling the Legislature together in the autumn, when they are to meet early in the year in regular session, the necessity lies in the desirability of taking action before the municipal year commences in order, that the municipal councils may be able to arrange the finances in their budget.

We have before expressed our opinion that the municipalities ought to so arrange their finance that they will not have to come back at the Legislature. At the same time it must be admitted that it would look bad for any of them to default on their bond interest and would make it difficult for all municipalities to finance their undertakings in future.

There is a general feeling that municipalities do not get as good service from employees as do private employers. There often is not that careful attention to duties and enthusiasm for the work that marks the service of private corporations.

Aldermen Not Always Careful.

Aldermen who undertake municipal duties as a hobby in their spare time are not always as careful of the finances as they should be. Money is voted for things that a private concern would not think of doing.

NICARAGUANS NEVER SEEN AN AIRPLANE

Took Flight when One was Driven Down There Recently

SAN JUAN DEL SUR, Nicaragua, April 1.—There are even yet in remote parts of the world people who never have even heard of an airplane. Some of those people live in the little Nicaraguan village of Gigante where the naval plane NC-6 was forced down by a hurricane while on its flight from San Diego, Cal., to Panama along with about a dozen other planes in January.

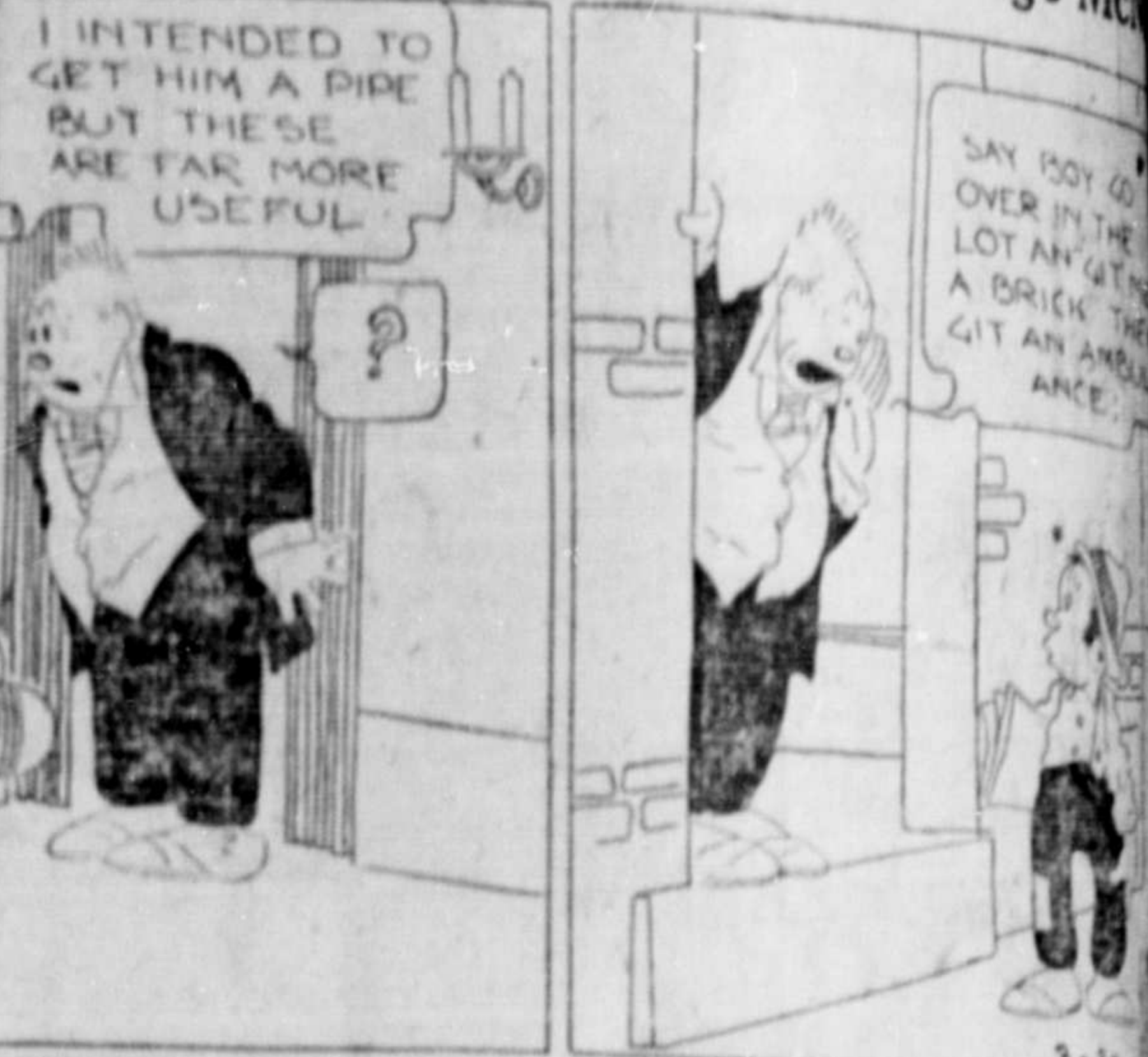
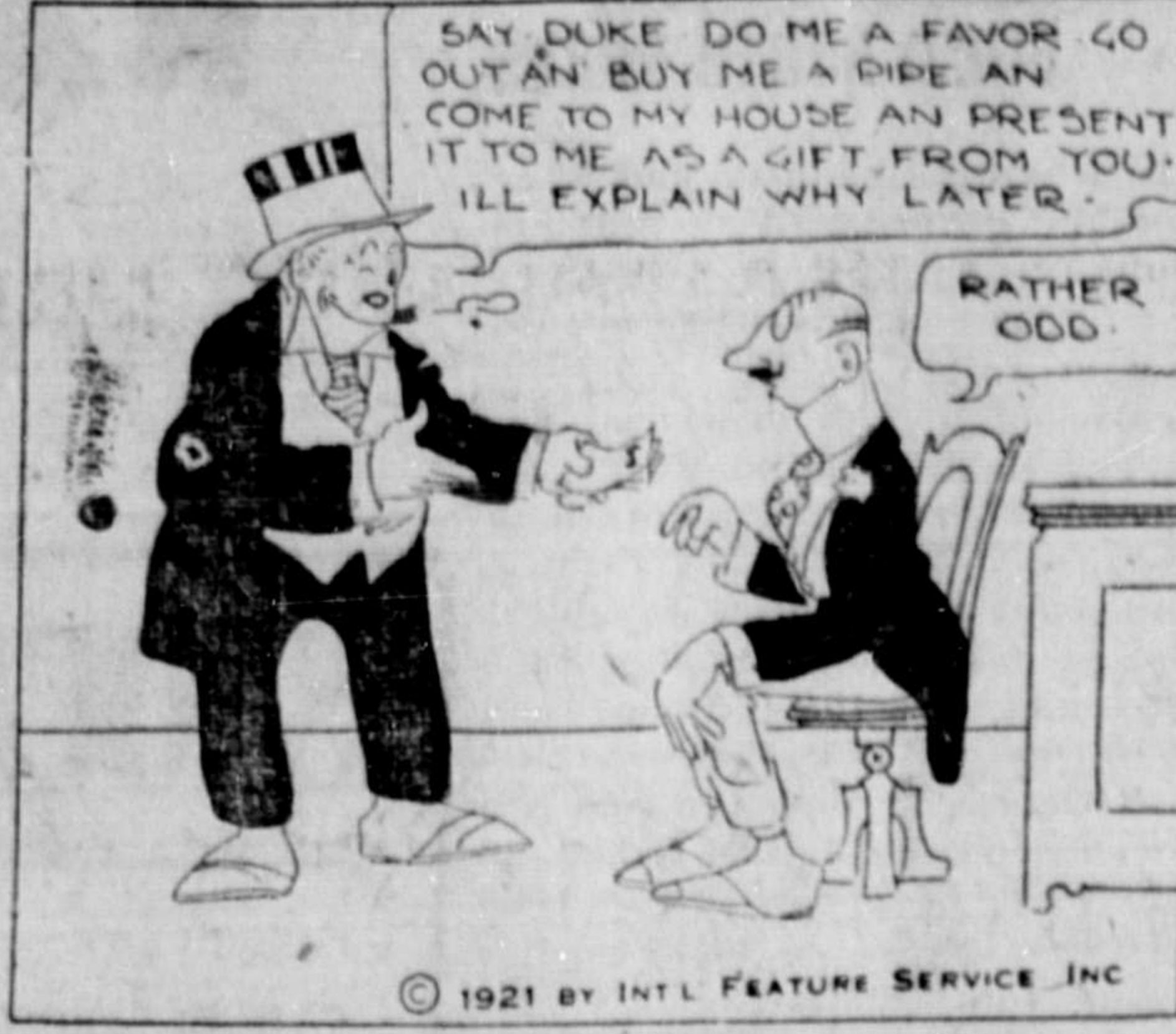

BRINGING UP FATHER

FISH PROVIDE OWN LIGHT IN DEPTHS OF THE OCEAN

PHOSPHERESCENT GLOW ILLUMINATES NEIGHBORHOOD WHERE THEY PASS—ROWS OF LAMPS PROVIDED BY NATURE—IMMENSE WATER PRESSURE.

Sunlight is of no use to fish inhabiting the deeper portions of the sea. In the waters off the coast of Porto Rico, where the depth is about five miles, day and night are the same, and it was originally believed that fish lived in perpetual darkness.

It has now been discovered that this is not so. Although there are certain portions of the ocean where light never penetrates (and where fish, in accordance with nature's economical rule, are provided with no eyes), the majority of deep sea inhabitants live in a blaze of phosphorescent light produced by themselves. In other words, these fish carry their own lamps.

Sometimes a fish will have only one lamp, which may be compared with an acetylene lamp on a bicycle. It throws a penetrating shaft of light through the water ahead and the fish's path is perpetually illuminated.

Have Rows of Lamps

Others are provided with organs in which are fitted rows of lamps, which either play upon the water ahead or flash through the water on either side like the illuminated port holes of a ship. The lamps are fitted with lenses and reflectors and their power is accentuated by the tremendous water pressure and peculiar conditions under which they live.

At a depth of 2,500 fathoms the pressure of water upon fish is twenty-five times greater than that required to drive a railway train. Such deep sea fish as have been brought to the surface, although retaining some of their phosphorescent properties, are assumed to have lost the greater portion of their brilliance.

One's imagination finds it difficult to grasp what the great, artificially-lit water chambers must be like. Far below the ocean liners' are enormous watery domes, icy cold, soundless yet as brilliantly illuminated as though the sun were pouring upon them. These illuminated spheres are not stationary. They move, as the living lamps move, leaving behind them utter darkness.

Deep Sea Angler

One of the most remarkable of these fish is the deep-sea angler fish. Like its shallow water relative, it has an enormous mouth with ugly irregular teeth, and a pincer-like appendage by which it catches its prey. But whereas the latter's tentacle is designed to resemble something edible, the former's is designed like a "Will-o-the-Wisp" light, which teases and attracts prey into the waiting mouth. The deep-sea angler fish is found at a depth of 14,700 feet.

Most deep-sea fish bear a strong resemblance to some species of fish inhabiting the waters above them, apart from their quality of luminosity. This suggests that fish migrate from one depth to another, acquiring in the course of time the physical characteristics to their new environment. The nearer the surface they get the less they shine—another example of nature's logic.

But these migrations must be very gradual affairs, for a sudden

transition from one depth to another is as fatal to a fish as it would be, say, to a Laplander who suddenly took up his abode on the Equator.

### SPORT

There is a hint of dissatisfaction among several of the teams which propose to join the Prince Rupert Football Association series this year that one or two of the organizations which also propose entering teams have gone beyond the bounds of fair play in their enthusiasm in obtaining players for the season. According to the constitution of The Dominion Football Association, with which the Prince Rupert Football Association is affiliated, no team or representative of a team is allowed to sign on players for the season on forms other than those supplied by the secretary of the association after the association has been organized for the year. Thus any player who has been signed on so far this year here is not signed properly or constitutionally and the association is empowered to cancel his engagement. The annual meeting of the association is next Tuesday and until after that meeting there will be no officers who are entitled to conduct this year's business of the organization.

Among the reforms that are being urged and may be adopted by the Prince Rupert Football Association this season is the appointment of a board of control which would act as a final tribunal for all disputes that might arise over the suspension of players, appointment and support of referees, etc. The board would act independently of the league proper and its decisions would overrule any made by the delegates. It would consist of three or five members, preferably five, who would be non-players and non-officials of the league. This would be along the lines of constitutional football and would provide a body of fair and unbiased judges free from factional associations who could settle all disputes fairly. In the past the settlement of disputes in some cases has not been received with the best of grace under the old system of delegates.

There will be three cups in competition this season for local football teams. For the season's series and the city championship there will be the Mobley Cup now held by the G.T.P. who will not have a team this year. For the Gilluly Cup now held by the Callies there will be a special series arranged and there will also be the Dominion Day cup ties for the City Cup, also held now by the Callies. Last year there were a large number of medals awarded, some players winning as many as three. There were medals for cup series games and there were medals given when any extra offered. In fact the medal question was quite overdone. In no other place were there ever so many medals and it is doubtful if it did any good to have so many here. In fact it is thought that the main championship was forgotten with the chances for medals so frequent and easy. Fewer medals this year and more enthusiasm for putting up one's own team would do no harm.

The Sons of Canada indoor baseball team wish through the medium of this paper to again urge the Elks to meet them either tonight, tomorrow or on Wednesday in a friendly game of indoor baseball at the Athletic Hall. If they cannot get a game with the Elks they say they will arrange a match with another team.


