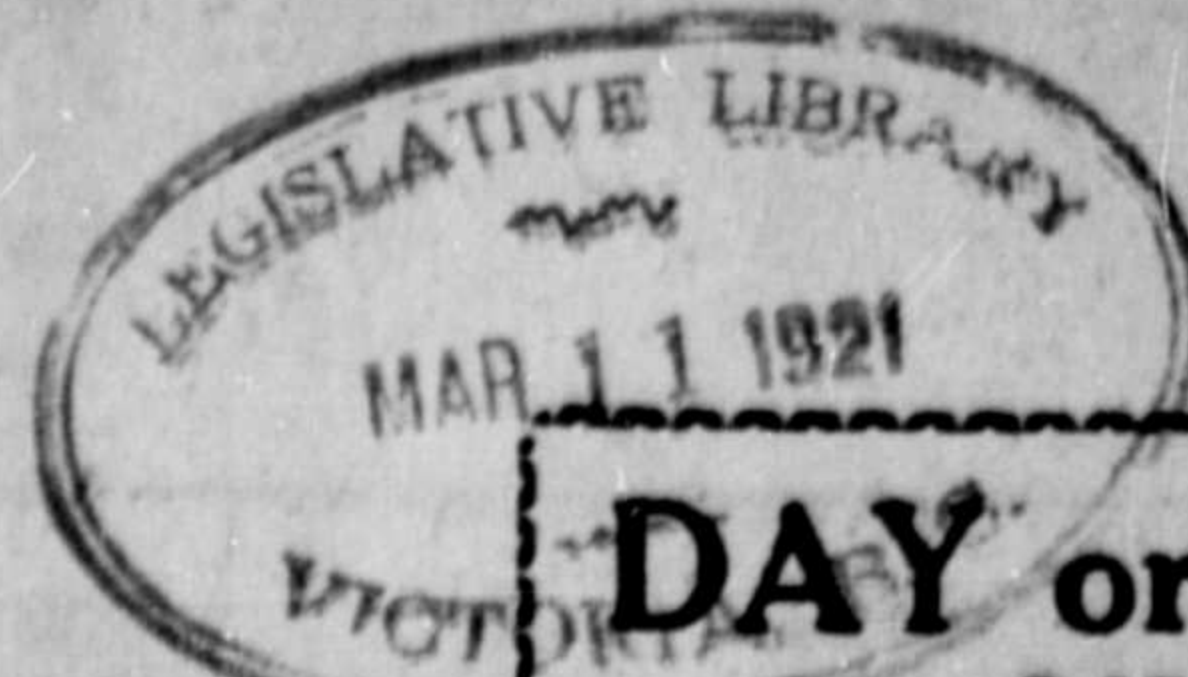

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British Coal Strike Outlook Is Bad

FIFESHIRE MINERS HOIST RED FLAG AND ATTACK POLICE; NEGOTIATIONS OFF

Transport Workers Throw in Lot with the British Striking Miners; Negotiations Are Off

LONDON, April 6.—Earl Curzon informed the House of Lords that a coal strike compromise was impossible on the basis of giving the industry or state control as demanded by the miners. The House of Lords adopted a resolution providing for emergency powers by which the Government might deal with emergencies of the strike.

LONDON, April 5.—(p. m.)—Railway transport workers are making the question of a sympathetic strike on Wednesday. The alternative suggested is to refuse to transport coal.

Many factories are closing and workers generally are impatient to settle the general question of reduction of wages. There may be trouble. Government is massing troops in London. Several parts of the country have been menaced. At Edinburgh and in the South Wales, there were open attacks on those who were working the mines. Emergency miners have been driven to work in some places.

ORDER COAL IN CANADA

Fuel Purchased in This Country as Result of Miners' Strike.

LONDON, April 6.—It was learned here this morning that large coal orders have been placed in Canada as a result of the strike of coal miners in this country. This is in addition to the coal ordered from the United States and European countries.

ANOTHER ELECTION IN GREAT BRITAIN

Minister of Agriculture Makes Second Attempt to Secure Seat

LONDON, April 6.—An election takes place on Friday to fill the vacancy in the Taunton constituency. Sir Arthur Griffiths Boscawen, minister of agriculture, is being opposed by James Lunn, laborite.

The Canadian cattle question is not figuring so largely in this election as when Sir Arthur was defeated in Dudley. The labor candidate says the lifting of the embargo would mean the admission of two million Canadian cattle in Great Britain, and the minister replies that Britain could not use that many if they came. Also there are no means of transporting so large a number.

SEVEN FEET SOLID HIGH GRADE GALENA

Rich Strike Made in Mayor District, in the Yukon Territory.

DAWSON, April 6.—A nine-foot silver ledge was struck on the Rico claim in the Mayo district, Yukon Territory. The vein showed seven-foot solid of high grade galena. Big production is under way.

DISCUSS MANDATES

Notes Sent by United States to Other Countries Interested.

WASHINGTON, April 6.—New notes on the subject of mandates have been sent by the United States Government to the governments of Japan, Britain, France and Italy.

MINE EXPLOSION.

CALAIS, April 6.—Fourteen bodies were taken out of a mine at Trelys yesterday following an explosion.

LIQUOR BOARD APPOINTEE.

Not Yet Decided Who Will Act But Deputy Attorney-General Sure.

VICTORIA, April 6.—Members of the new government liquor board were not appointed at the meeting of the executive council yesterday but Premier Oliver announced that according to the best inside information A. M. Johnson, deputy attorney-general, was certain to be on the board.

J. H. Falconer of Vancouver is also said to be a certainty and in other appointee will be either General Leckie or Colonel Tobin. The announcement is expected soon.

GRAND TRUNK STOCK DROPS

Absence of Authoritative Information Causes Depression of Securities.

LONDON, April 6.—In the absence of authoritative news regarding the controversy between the Canadian Government and the Grand Trunk Railway Company, depression of the latter's stocks continues. There seems to be a prevailing idea that the Government of Canada may back down on the deal.

NEER BEER WILL BE UP FOR DISCUSSION

Joint Meeting of Returned Soldier Organizations Will Consider It.

VANCOUVER, April 6.—Returned soldiers' organizations intend holding a meeting to discuss jointly the abolition of near beer bars when the control board is named. In the meantime they will take no action to needlessly embarrass the Government.

TRYING TO PURCHASE BIG FLIN FLON MINE

WINNIPEG, April 6.—Negotiations are under way for the purchase of the Flin Flon mine by a Canadian syndicate, the New York syndicate having allowed their option to expire. The new concern is headed by the Mining Corporation of Canada which owns a quarter interest in the mine.

HERRICK AMBASSADOR.

WASHINGTON, April 6.—Myron T. Herrick has accepted the position of American ambassador to France.

Strikers Hoist Red Flag and Attack Police Force at Fifeshire Coal Mines

LONDON, April 6.—(Special)—Serious rioting broke out last night in connection with the coal strike at Cowdenbeath, Fifeshire, according to a Central News despatch from Dunfermline. The police attacked the strikers with batons but the strikers hoisted the red flag and besieged the police in the station. The situation is assuming a critical aspect, the despatch says.

The trouble arose when the strikers captured the underground manager of a mine who refused to cease manning the pumps. The police responded to a call for aid and rescued the manager but were surrounded by miners whose forces had by this time been increased to thousands.

ESMONDE REMAINS IN VANCOUVER JAIL

Minister of Justice will Not Intervene, He Wires Mayor Gale

OTTAWA, April 6.—The Minister of Justice has telegraphed to Mayor Gale that he is powerless to intervene in the Esmonde case. The proceedings instituted are entirely under the mayors' control, subject to the provincial authorities.

Esmonde remains in jail in Vancouver.

VANCOUVER, April 6.—Esmonde is likely to be allowed to go to Ottawa to secure a passport and from there to New York.

INSURANCE INSPECTOR IS TO BE APPOINTED

VICTORIA, April 6.—Hon. J. W. deB. Farris intimates that J. P. Dougherty of Vancouver will today be appointed inspector of insurance for the province with a salary of \$3,000 a year.

Subjects to Come Before Imperial Conference at London in Coming Summer

MELBOURNE, April 6.—Premier Hughes states that control of the Pacific, naval co-operation, and relations between Britain and the colonies generally are subjects of discussion to come before the Imperial Conference to be held in London in June.

The decisions of the conference will be subject to ratification by the Dominion parliaments.

Asked regarding the possible return to Australia of Cardinal Mannix, Mr. Hughes said Australia would not prevent his returning.

CHANCELLOR IS IN GLOOMY MOOD OVER COAL STRIKE

LONDON, April 6.—(Special)—Sir Robert Horne, the new chancellor of the exchequer, speaking in the House of Commons yesterday concerning the coal miners strike, painted a gloomy picture. He declared that the stoppage of coal production at this time was far more serious than would ordinarily be the case.

RUSH IS ON TO OIL FIELDS OF GREAT NORTH

Hotel Accommodation at Edmonton Taxed to Limit to Provide for Travellers

Hotel accommodation in the city of Edmonton at the present time is practically impossible to secure owing to the number of people who are flocking here from the United States and from eastern Canada, while travellers wiring reservations from outside points find on arrival that their forethought is often of no avail.

The managers of the various hostels are hard put to it to accommodate their guests and in many instances the sample rooms and hall-ways have to be used to take care of the overflow.

The present congestion is ascribed to the interest in the oil fields, say the local hotel men, and still further contingents are expected, while inquiries are being received from all over the continent respecting the conditions that prevail here and the possibility of getting to the north. With the going out of the ice in the northwest large numbers of those in temporary residence here will leave for the far north, but their places will undoubtedly be taken by further contingents, and the present condition is expected to hold good throughout the summer.

FREIGHT RATES TO BE ARGUED

British Columbia Case Not Yet Ready—G. G. McGeer to Handle Appeal.

VANCOUVER, April 6.—The complete case for the British Columbia freight rates hearing will not be ready for the railway commission on Thursday. An extension of time is given for submission of arguments against unfair differentials.

G. G. McGeer has been retained by the Government and the Vancouver Board of Trade to present their case. He will attempt to prove that the net operating costs are not higher in the mountain sections than on other parts of the line and will protest the assessment of terminal operation costs against British Columbia.

RACE MEETING IN ENGLAND ABANDONED

LONDON, April 6.—The Newbury race meeting has been abandoned for the present as a result of the coal strike.

WAYS ARE BEFORE HOUSE

Much Disturbed Over the Situation and Senate Will Discuss It.

MORE EXTENSIONS OF ARBITRATION TIME

Committee of Inquiry to be Appointed Subject to Limitations As to Its Scope.

OTTAWA, April 6.—Members of the House of Commons and Senate are much disturbed over the railway situation. The committee will discuss it tomorrow. There is to be no more delay in the arbitration proceedings, but for more time having refused by the Government, Mr. Meighen informed the House yesterday.

A. K. McLean's motion for a committee to inquire into the railway situation was withdrawn after an hour's discussion and Premier's promise that a committee would be named subject to limitations as to the scope of the inquiry.

EXIT CHARLES.

OTTAWA, April 5.—Former Emperor Charles is due to cross the border on Wednesday at The Swiss Government receive him but expressly no newspaper interviews.

Railways Only
Subject Discussed.

The Financial Post Ottawa correspondent says: Practically the only subject for reflection and discussion here at present is the railway situation, and the more it is considered, the more serious it grows. During the past two or three days it has taken up a good deal of the time of the cabinet councils also, overshadowing even the budget as a subject of discussion.

Although the official estimates of the deficit, as given in the speech of the minister of railways, was put at around \$70,000,000 which was an increase of \$21,000,000 over that of last year, the critics had not been long at work before they found that the country was paying far higher than that for its railway whistle. There are reservations of accountancy which make it difficult to arrive at an exact and final figure; but it is not exaggerating to put it down at \$100,000,000, and one critic, whose long experience in the statistical department of the Department of Railways entitles his views to consideration, estimates the actual tax on the people of Canada for public ownership of 32 per cent. of its railway lines as being nearly \$140,000,000.

More Important
Than the Tariff.

Whatever estimate is taken, there is general agreement that the problem has reached a point where it must be tackled seriously and immediately. There is nothing to justify optimism as to the immediate future, and the country simply cannot shoulder a \$100,000,000 railway deficit on top of the other enormous liabilities which the war has imposed. There is a growing belief that, for the present, the energies of parliament and the Government would be better devoted to a serious and non-partisan attempt to solve the railway problem rather than to become involved in a discussion on the tariff, and it is, therefore, not improbable that a general revision may be further deferred. There is an element in the cabinet which considers Canada should defer revision until it can be seen what course the United States is going to pursue. If there should be any radical changes in the tariff there affecting us, put through while parliament is in session, tariff revision here might again assume importance this session.

There will probably be no decided action regarding the railway situation until after the Grand Trunk arbitration is concluded. The statutory limit set for the duration of the proceedings and the making of an award is April 9. The arbitrators representing the company contend that the case cannot be properly completed within the time named and are asking the Government for an extension, which it is not disposed to grant. The Government is anxious, in fact, to have the Grand Trunk matter settled as soon as possible, so that it may be able to sum up what action it will take with regard to the whole matter.

Feeling Against
Government Operation.

It is understood that there is a growing desire to get out of government ownership and operation; but, so long as the problem is on its hands, there is also a feeling that an attempt should be made to handle it so as to produce better results than have been attained hitherto. It may be taken for granted that, as soon as the Grand Trunk is taken over, and a survey of the whole situation obtained, some very radical announcements will be made with regard to management. It must be admitted that those who are dissatisfied with the present management have no very special criticism to offer, only pointing to results, which, roughly, are summed up in appalling deficits.

It is probable that, within a few months, the whole Railway Board, including President Hanna, will be asked to hand in their resignations. What course will be followed thereafter is problematical. There may be a new board appointed. It is understood that, for some time past, attempts have been made to secure a railway executive of outstanding ability to come to Canada and tackle the railway problem. Any salary in reason would be paid to the right man, and \$50,000 has been suggested to some of those approached; but the big men in the United States are shy of tackling the problem. They all express the belief that politics are inextricably mixed up with the railway question in Canada, and do not desire to attempt its solution under such circumstances. They remember the experience of Gutelius with the Intercolonial.

FAMOUS STREET FIGHT
WAS TEN YEARS AGO

Battle of Kelly's Cut Fought
Afternoon April 6, 1911

Ten years ago this afternoon strikers and police met in a pitched battle in Kelly's cut on First Avenue in this city and a pitched battle was fought.

Five hundred men made a fierce attack with rocks and guns on a few strikebreakers and were pluckily fought off by Chief Vickers, Sergeant Phillipson and Constables, Mansell, Morrison, McArthur and Leek, who were assistants generally. Forty-four strikers were arrested and a "hull pen" hastily run up in the Government Square for their accommodation.

Sergeant Phillipson got in a tight corner for a moment or so and had a bullet wound across the temple from a striker's revolver. It was in the push up the hill to the sergeant's assistance that the fiercest passage of the tussle was fought. It seemed for a moment that the mass of the mob would force the defending police and citizens back at once. Hardly a word of good, clean English was heard from the ranks of the strikers.

The wounded were: Nick Pavlich, serious; Biago Molayevich and Mike Sekovitch, strikers; Sergeant Phillipson, W. A. Casey, Geo. Leek, S. H. Watson and Wm. Watson, special officers and citizens.

NEW YORK, April 6.—The International Labor Office will hereafter be represented at all meetings of the Council of the League of Nations, the League's news bureau announces.
