# British Coal Strike Outlook Is Bad

## FIFESHIRE MINERS HOIST RED FLAG AND ATTACK POLICE; NEGOTIATIONS OFF

Transport Workers Throw in Lot with the British Striking Miners; Negotiations Are Off

LONDON, April 6.—Earl Gurzon informed the House of Lords coal strike compromise was impossible on the basis of giving the industry or state control as demanded by the miners. The House of Lords adopted a resolution providing for emergency powers by which the Government might deal with consequences of the strike.

LONDON, April 5.—(p. m.)—Railway transport workers are still in the question of a sympathetic strike on Wednesday. Alternative suggested is to refuse to transport coal. Many factories are closing and workers generally are incensed at the general reduction of wages. There may be trouble, Government is massing troops at London Gardens, London. J. H. Falconer of Vancouver is also said to be a certainty and no other appointee will be either general Leckie or Colonel Tobin. The announcement is expected soon.

### GRAND TRUNK STOCK DROPS

Absence of Authoritative Information Causes Depression of Securities.

LONDON, April 6.—In the absence of authoritative news regarding the controversy between the Canadian Government and the Grand Trunk Railway Company, depression of the latter's stocks continues. There seems to be a prevailing idea that the Government of Canada may back down on the deal.

### NEER BEER WILL BE UP FOR DISCUSSION

Joint Meeting of Returned Soldiers' Organizations Will Consider It.

VANCOUVER, April 6.—Returned soldiers' organizations intend holding a meeting to discuss jointly the abolition of near beer bars when the control board is named. In the meantime they will take no action to needlessly embarrass the Government.

### TRYING TO PURCHASE BIG FLIN FLON MINE

WINNIPEG, April 6.—Negotiations are under way for the purchase of the Flin Flon mine by a Canadian syndicate, the New York syndicate having allowed their option to expire. The new concern is headed by the Mining Corporation of Canada which owns a quarter interest in the mine.

### Strikers Hoist Red Flag and Attack Police Force at Fifeshire Coal Mines

LONDON, April 6.—(Special)—Serious rioting broke out last night in connection with the coal strike at Cowdenbeath, Fifeshire, according to a Central News despatch from Dumfermline. The police attacked the strikers with batons but the strikers hoisted the red flag and besieged the police in the station. The situation is assuming a critical aspect, the despatch says.

The trouble arose when the strikers captured the under manager of a mine who refused to cease manning the pumps. The police responded to a call for aid and rescued the manager but were surrounded by miners whose forces had by this time been increased to thousands.

### ESMONDE REMAINS IN VANCOUVER JAIL

Minister of Justice will Not Interfere, He Wires Mayor Gale.

LONDON, April 8.—Nine bishops and the heads of the non-conformist churches have joined with the Archbishop of Canterbury in a protest against reprisals in Ireland, and pleading with the Government to make peace.

ESMONDE remains in jail in Vancouver.

VANCOUVER, April 6.—Esmonde is likely to be allowed to go to Ottawa to secure a passport and from there to New York.

### INSURANCE INSPECTOR IS TO BE APPOINTED

SEATTLE, April 6.—Trapped through a letter to his sweet heart in London and through the aid of a Scotland Yard detective, Roy Miller, a marine fireman, was arrested in Tacoma on a charge of complicity in a holdup at the Motor Inn near Auburn on January 26 of this year.

### Subjects to Come Before Imperial Conference at London in Coming Summer

MELBOURNE, April 6.—Premier Hughes states that control of the Pacific, naval co-operation, and relations between Britain and the colonies generally are subjects of discussion to come before the Imperial Conference to be held in London in June.

The decisions of the conference will be subject to ratification by the Dominion parliaments.

Asked regarding the possible return to Australia of Cardinal Mannix, Mr. Hughes said Australia would not prevent his returning.

### RUSH IS ON TO OIL FIELDS OF GREAT NORTH

Hotel Accommodation at Edmonton Taxed to Limit to Provide for Travellers

Hotel accommodation in the city of Edmonton at the present time is practically impossible to secure owing to the number of people who are flocking here from the United States and from eastern Canada, while travellers wiring reservations from outside points find on arrival that their forethought is often of no avail.

The managers of the various hosteries are hard put to it to accommodate their guests and in many instances the sample rooms and half-ways have to be used to take care of the overflow.

The present congestion is ascribable to the interest in the oil-fields, say the local hotel men, and still further contingents are expected, while inquiries are being received from all over the continent respecting the conditions that prevail here and the possibility of getting to the north.

With the going out of the ice in the northwest large numbers of those in temporary residence here will leave for the far north, but their places will undoubtedly be taken by further contingents, and the present condition is expected to hold good throughout the summer.

### INDIANS KILLED AUSTRIAN WHO WAS IN NORTH

PRINCE GEORGE, April 6.—Accused of killing an Austrian, two Indians of the Carrier tribe were brought here by the provincial police. The Austrian fled from Kamloops in 1914 to escape internment and had been trapping in the north.

The Indians say they killed him in self defence.

### SIR THOMAS WHITE OUT OF PARLIAMENT

Was Minister of Finance During War But Resigned at Close.

OTTAWA, April 6.—Sir Thomas White, former minister of finance in the Union Government, has resigned his seat in the House of Commons.

Sir Thomas has for a number of years been an outstanding figure in Canadian political life. He had charge of the finances of the country during the war and was instrumental in floating the huge loans in this country secured by Victory Bonds, which enabled the country to carry on.

Owing to ill health he resigned from Sir Robert Borden's cabinet.

### DIAMONDS TAKEN

Ball Bearings for Bicycles Left in Place of Precious Stones.

AMSTERDAM, April 6.—A diamond broker here recently sent by registered post to his brother in Antwerp, a sealed package containing uncut diamonds worth 120,000 guilder. Upon receipt the brother found the seals intact but, in some mysterious manner, the diamonds had been extracted and in their place were a number of ball bearings for bicycles.

### FREIGHT RATES TO BE ARGUED

British Columbia Case Not Yet Ready—G. G. McGeer to Handle Appeal.

VANCOUVER, April 6.—The complete case for the British Columbia freight rates hearing will not be ready for the railway commission on Thursday. An extension of time is given for submission of arguments against unfair differentials.

G. G. McGeer has been retained by the Government and the Vancouver Board of Trade to present their case. He will attempt to prove that the net operating costs are not higher in the mountain sections than on other parts of the line and will protest the assessment of terminal operation costs against British Columbia.

### RACE MEETING IN ENGLAND ABANDONED

LONDON, April 6.—The Newbury race meeting has been abandoned for the present as a result of the coal strike.

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## DOLLAR A SALMON PRICE IN EDMONTON

Fish Taken Direct from Coast and Sold on Prairies

"One dollar a salmon" was the slogan of the Vancouver Island Fish Co., which opened a two-day sale of choice sea food direct from the fisherman to the consumer, or, in the words of the company, "from the fishing boats to you." The low price of a dollar a fish for one of the finny tribe that looked as big as a suit of clothes tucked under the arm, was the magnet that first drew the crowd and soon made them a common carrier of what looked like a week's family rations.

The experiment is new in Edmonton, but if successful the Vancouver Island Fish Company, Limited, producers of sea foods, intend to bring to this city, starting with next fall, a carload or two of salmon pinks and other fish at least every two weeks for direct distribution to the Edmonton public.

### In the Letter Box

#### PROHIBITION.

Editor Daily News:

The supporters of prohibition are of the impression that their method of dealing with the liquor question is a short-cut to total abstinence, and owing to the misery due to the excessive use thereof, in their view there is only one remedy—to prohibit its use and manufacture. Seemingly, and in theory a reasonable course, but in actual fact a failure because for many reasons it will not stay prohibited. But as the word fascinates, and the remedy seems so certain, the bait is often swallowed.

#### Creates Opposition.

The principal cause for its failure is due to the fact that it creates too much opposition. It shows an utter disregard for the rights of the individual and ride rough-shod over the natural laws and lands nowhere. It has the greatest faith in the efficacy of the law to make its scheme a success, and adds vindictive enforcement clauses and unreasonable penalties to its act in order to assure such.

But this method has an entirely different effect than that expected, in that only degenerate stool-pigeons and paid minions volunteer evidence and the consequence is that on the whole there are not five per cent of the violations dealt with, hence its inevitable failure.

When so many persons are found that will pay such exorbitant prices for liquor that are paid today there is shown a deep-seated habit which is beyond the ability of the individual to control, and this coupled with the inherent inclination to possess things forbidden, creates a situation that is worthy of the most serious and intelligent consideration to cope with. Yet prohibition aims to destroy this with one fell blow, and as should be expected fails.

The only successful plan in dealing with such requires a weaning process by well thought-out temperance methods. It believes in amending its act and tightening the law in order to secure its enforcement, but overlooks the fact that those who wish to defeat it are not slow in perfecting methods of successful evasion.

#### Illicit Manufacture.

#### Californian FROSTS INJURE RAISIN CROP

### WILL ARRANGE SUMMER RUNS

Superintendent Beaumont and Mr. McNicholl Going to Confer with Captain Nicholson

Reginald Beaumont, superintendent of G.T.P. steamers, and G.A. McNicholl, assistant general freight and passenger agent, are leaving by the Prince George tomorrow night for Vancouver to go into conference with Capt. G.H. Nicholson, manager of the fleet, and other officials for the purpose of arranging this summer's services of the company's steamers.

Mr. Beaumont hopes that all the five vessels, Prince Rupert, Prince George, Prince Albert, Prince John and Lorne, will again be operating before long and it is expected that a service for each vessel will be announced as a result of the conference. The Prince Rupert will be back in service next month while the George undergoes a brief overhaul. The Prince Albert is overhauled and is running again and as soon as a service is found for her the John will be painted at the dry dock here and also released for service. The Lorne is tied up at the local dock.

#### Pulp Shipments

The pulp shipments between here and Swanson Bay during the past winter have been very intermittent and at the present time only about four shipments a month are passing through this port. The Whalen company is attending to the towing of the ear barge with its own tug now, but as soon as the plant is in full operation again and the shipments to the United States in the Eastern market increase it will be necessary to find another tug exclusively for this work. The Grand Trunk Pacific is ready at any time to handle the increased shipping. The running of the Dollar boats to Swanson Bay will not have any effect on the shipment of pulp through here for the Eastern market.

#### California FROSTS INJURE RAISIN CROP

FRESNO, April 6.—There have been severe frosts in this part of California. Raisin growers may lose ten million dollars as a result of damage to the crop this year from the drop-in temperature.

At the regular monthly meeting of the Independent Association held last night the proposal for the division of B.C. into two provinces at the 52nd parallel was endorsed. The association also endorsed the proposal to have a survey made of Cameron Gove with a view to its dredging by the Dominion Government.

## LABOR WILL BE AT LEAGUE OF NATIONS

Albert Thomas, Director of International Labor Office, to S.L.

NEW YORK, April 6.—The International Labor Office will hereafter be represented at all meetings of the Council of the League of Nations, the League's news bureau announces. Albert Thomas, former French minister of munitions, and new director of the International Labor Office, will represent that body at sittings of the Council.

The news bureau said negotiations for establishment of closer relations between the two bodies had been under way for some time, and that before the labor organization had made any definite request the council informed M. Thomas that any proposal for labor representation on the Council would be welcomed.

M. Thomas will be the first representative of labor within the central authority of the League.
