

Ireland Shows Loyalty to the Crown

GREAT BRITAIN TO FORESTALL THE POSSIBILITY OF WAR WITH AMERICA

King George Given Splendid Reception in Belfast Where Northern Parliament is Opened

BELFAST, June 22.—The new parliament of Ulster or North Ireland was opened in state this morning by King George. The day is the tenth anniversary of the coronation of Their Majesties. The King and Queen arrived here at 8 o'clock and came ashore from the royal craft at 11:30. Proceeding to the City Hall in state they presided at the formal opening ceremony of the new parliament.

They were given a vociferous welcome by the thousands who lined the streets to watch the royal procession pass. There were a number of troops also on hand.

After the ceremonies, Their Majesties had luncheon with Sir James Craig, the first premier of Ulster, after which they were driven once more through the streets to the Ulster Hall where they received addresses of loyalty from various organizations.

Crowds began to gather at early daybreak in the rain of the early morning which was followed by sunshine as the King and Queen came ashore.

The King's Speech.

In his speech, formally opening the parliament, the King said, "I speak from the depth of my heart when I pray that my coming to Ireland today may prove to be the first step toward the ending of strife among her people, whatever race or creed they may be. In that hope I appeal to all Irishmen to pause, to stretch out the hand of forbearance and forgiveness, to forgive and forget and to join in making a new era of peace, contentment and good will in the land which they love."

"It is my earnest desire that in southern Ireland, too, there may, ere long, take place a parallel to that which is now passing in this hall and that a similar occasion may present itself and a similar ceremony be performed."

BELFAST, June 22.—King George and Queen Mary departed from Belfast for London this afternoon at 4 o'clock in perfect safety, their complete program being carried out without a hitch. There was not a rebellious hand raised against their Majesties in the course of the entire proceedings of the day.

SINN FEIN HAS SUBMARINES ON AMERICA ROUTE

Official at New York States that De Valera and O'Callaghan Travel Under Sea.

NEW YORK, June 22.—A local official of the Association for the Recognition of the Irish Republic asserts that the Sinn Fein maintains and operates two submarines between Ireland and America. Eamon De Valera, the first president of the supposed Irish republic, travelled both to and from America under the sea when he paid his visit recently, as also did Lord Mayor O'Callaghan of Cork, states the official.

AMERICAN NAVAL TUG IS GIVEN UP BY AUTHORITIES

Names of Crew Listed as Lost Given Out Today by Naval Department.

WASHINGTON, June 21.—The names of the four officers and 19 enlisted men who were lost on the naval tug Conestoga were yesterday made public.

The tug sailed from Mare Island on March 25 for Samoa via Pearl Harbor. No word has since been heard from her, although a thorough search has been made of Pacific waters. The vessel is now given as lost.

DESPATCHES STATE THAT SERBIAN KING IS DEAD

LONDON, June 22.—Despatches state that King Peter of Serbia has been dead for several days. There is no official knowledge of his demise here. It is known that the aged king has been ailing for some time and was recently at death's door.

CONTROVERSIES ARE PROBABLE

Not Expected That All Will Be Smooth Sailing at Conference of Premiers.

LONDON, June 22.—That the conference of Prime Ministers of the British Dominions is not going to arrive at any conclusions without passing through sharp controversies is already evident.

General Jan C. Smuts, premier of the Union of South Africa, made a strong plea for disarmament and advocated a conference with United States and Japan on the problems of the Pacific.

Premier W. M. Hughes, of Australia, who followed General Smuts, leaned heavily towards a renewal of the Anglo-Japanese alliance and advocated a naval expenditure on the per capita basis. He deprecated the need for a constitutional conference.

Premier Massey, of New Zealand, supported the views taken by Premier Hughes. Premier Arthur Meighen, of Canada, is yet to be heard at the conference on these subjects but it is expected that he will support the views of General Smuts.

GOOD SOCKEYE RUN ON NAAS SEEMS LIKELY

J. T. C. Williams, Inspector of Fisheries Returned From There Yesterday.

J. T. C. Williams, inspector of fisheries returned from a visit of inspection to the Naas River division yesterday morning on the Comox and reports that the run of spring salmon up to June 18 did not compare favorably with that of last season, although the same number of boats were operating. The weather was cold and stormy and handicapped the fishermen in their work. However, on June 19, 20 and 21, there was a great improvement in the run of spring. The high boat for 24 hours was 30 with an average of approximately 10.

The sockeye season opened on Monday and the first night high boat was 20 with an average of 10, stated Mr. Williams.

"This I consider very satisfactory for the commencement of the season and the fact that the sockeye are small is another indication of a good run. The Indians have their usual predictions for a good run, such as heavy snow in the interior and good run of Oolichans; but I place more faith in the small fish appearing first, as I have frequently noticed this is a good indication."

"The Naas sockeye is designated by scientists as a five year salmon and if this is correct then we should have a good run, as the spawning grounds were fairly well seeded in the fall of 1916. Also I hear that only a few of the 18 American traps outside the mouth of the Naas River will operate this season, and in passing yesterday, I could see no evidence of floaters off the mouth of the Naas Passage. This will give the Naas sockeye a chance to reach the Naas River and the spawning grounds at Meziaden Lake."

IMMIGRATION ON DECREASE

Tightening of Canadian Regulations is Having Desired Effect.

OTTAWA, June 21.—The tightening of the regulations governing immigration to Canada is having its effect on the influx of new citizens according to officials of the Immigration Department. Steamships coming to Quebec at the present time are bringing only small numbers of immigrants and these are practically all farm and domestic workers.

Police Commissioners Lay Bribery Trap for Chinese And Catch Him Red Handed

VICTORIA, June 22.—The attempt of Charlie Bo, a Chinese tailor, to bribe the police commissioners here has caused a sensation in this city.

Police Commissioners Dr. Ernest A. Hall and Joe North laid a trap for the Chinaman and he fell for it. It was arranged that Bo was to pay \$1,500 and he allowed to run a number of lotteries in Chinatown without interference from the police. Four hundred dollars was paid as the first instalment. A witness to the transaction was concealed in a cupboard and another outside a window taking notes of the conversation. Commissioner North took the money and immediately turned it over to Chief of Police John Fry.

VANCOUVER YOUTHS COMMITTED TRIAL CHARGED MURDER

VANCOUVER, June 22.—Alex Paulsen and Allen Robinson, accused of the murder of W. F. Salisbury, Jr., on the night of April 12 last, were committed for trial here yesterday. The former, on being arrested, made a half confession implicating Robinson in the affair stating that he had done the actual shooting. Robinson remains stubbornly silent.

ENGINEER COMMANDER APPOINTED CHARGE OF ESQUIMALT NAVY YARD

VICTORIA, June 22.—Engineer Lieutenant Commander G. Clark has been appointed to succeed Commander H. E. Homes, R.C.N., in charge of the Esquimalt Navy Yard. His appointment will become effective on July 1.

Likelihood Renewal Treaty with Japan Reported in States

WASHINGTON, June 22.—It is understood that Great Britain will shortly notify Japan of her intention to renew the Anglo-Japanese alliance.

The American state department has been assured that Britain will protect relations with the United States, probably by the introduction of an amendment releasing Britain from participation in a possible war between United States and Japan.

The preserving of the friendly feeling that now exists between the United States and Great Britain is proving England's greatest concern in the question of renewing the Japanese alliance. If it failed of adoption this would be the point that would cause it.

BUCKLEY TALKS TRANSPORTATION

Says These Ports are Suffering Through Lack of Adequate Services.

F. L. Buckley, the well known lumber man, arrived from Vancouver today on the Prince Rupert en route to Buckley Bay. Mr. Buckley, who is accompanied by a party of about thirty men for work in connection with the carrying on of the lumber business of which he is the head, expected to make immediate steamboat connections with the Prince John today. The latter has unfortunately been delayed and will not be on schedule time, not being able to reach here until tomorrow.

Mr. Buckley was very emphatic this morning in his remarks to a News man as to the disadvantages this northern country suffers from through faulty and inadequate transportation facilities. He said it was a tremendous handicap and thwarted the attempts of capitalists and business men endeavoring to open up the country and find a place for the profitable investment of capital.

Senator Stevens of Montana, who visited the Queen Charlotte Islands lately with Mr. Buckley with a view of satisfying himself as to the possibilities of cattle raising in the north and who has unlimited capital behind him for investment, on returning south said that there would have to be indications of a better transportation service before he would be able to entertain any investment proposition. Mr. Buckley thinks the citizens of Prince Rupert and the people of the district generally would do well to make the strongest representation possible to the authorities who have the matter of transportation to deal with to see to it that a better and more expeditious service is brought into effect at the earliest possible opportunity between this city and the many outlying industrial points.

DRASTIC IRISH SYMPATHIZERS WERE DEFEATED

American Federation of Labor, in Convention, Refuses Entertain British Boycott.

DENVER, June 22.—Irish sympathizers, supporting the resolution calling for a boycott of British goods, were overwhelmingly defeated in their attempt to have the convention of the American Federation of Labor overthrow the ruling of President Samuel Gompers which prevented the reconsideration of their proposal.

Later another resolution, trimmed of the most drastic boycott provisions, was passed expressing sympathy with the Irish cause.

COAL MINERS' STRIKE TO GO ON LONG TIME

Secretary of Federation, Speaking in Brighton, Says Will Continue Until Workers Starve.

BRIGHTON, June 22.—Frank Hodges, secretary of the Miners' Federation, publicly stated here last night that the coal miners would continue to strike until starvation forced them to cry for help. He spoke of the government's unhappy part in the strike.

The conference of the British Labor party here today rejected the proposal introduced by the radical wing to allow the Communist party to affiliate with the Labor party.

The delegates voting against communism were represented by 1,115,000 ballots and those for it, 221,000. The majority was thus very decided, 3,891,000. The proposal emanated from a small section of the labor classes.

LITTLE GIRLS WERE BURNED IN BROCKVILLE

Two Daughters of Jcs. F. Elliott Meet Untimely Fate.

BROCKVILLE, June 21.—Dorothy, aged 14, and Phyllis Marion, aged 4, daughters of James F. Elliott, were burned to death in a fire which last night destroyed the family home here.

Tenth Anniversary Of Coronation.

Today is the tenth anniversary of the coronation of King George V. Ten years ago amid great splendor, the Sailor King was crowned in Westminster Abbey and great rejoicing prevailed, while all the Empire wished the new monarch a long, peaceful and happy reign. The first wish is being fulfilled but not the same can be said of the two last mentioned. The first ten years of King George's reign have been anything but peaceful and happy. During them the greatest tragedy of all history has been met, endured and passed through. Happily it has been sustained even though it was at an awful cost. It might be truly said that the reign of the present monarch has been the most eventful and momentous of any reign since history has told of kings. At any rate it has seen more bloodshed, more slaughter and more changes in the continent of Europe both geographically, economically and politically. Such happenings as have been seen since George V became King no one wants to see again. Therefore the wish for long life, peace and happiness for King George may again be made at this time, the tenth anniversary of his coronation, and now it will be made with a deeper sense of what it means than ever was imagined when the same wish was made ten years ago today. It is rather a significant coincidence that on this day the King is opening in state the Parliament of Ulster, thus instituting Home Rule in Ireland, a state that the Emerald Isle has desired for so many decades. This will go down in history as one of the most important events of King George's reign.

A "Made in the British Empire" Campaign.

Prince Rupert may well avail herself of the visit of Ben H. Morgan, the British home trade emissary who will come here some time this summer. Two great objects have inspired the sending of Mr. Morgan to this country by the British Empire Producers' Organization: The first is the stimulation of colonial industry and trade by the investment of British capital in it; the second, the marketing of colonial products in Great Britain or other sections of the Empire. These objects are equally important to Canada as they are to Great Britain. The result to be obtained will be the betterment of trade relations between the five great parts of the Empire and the exchange of products between them as far as possible instead of trading with foreign nations. Campaigns are on to make British Columbia and Canada self-sufficient. These are very worthy but they cannot be made to apply wholly. On the other hand, a campaign to make the British Empire self-sufficient is a possibility and a very desirable one. "Made in B. C." can be made to apply to a certain extent and it should be fostered to the fullest degree; "Made in Canada" can be made to apply in even a greater sense and is also a laudable motto; but "Made in the British Empire" has the widest application of all and should be remembered by all who owe their allegiance to the Union Jack.

Prince Rupert Has Plenty to Show.

The object of interesting British capital in trade and industry will appeal greatly to the people of Prince Rupert and northern B. C. for there are great opportunities for it being used to good advantage in this northern country. Its natural resources are practically untouched as yet. Its mines, its timber limits, its agricultural areas and its fishing grounds, with all the tributary industries that associate themselves with them, are awaiting the leaven of capital. At the present time it is doubtful whether British capital or American capital is most interested in the exploitation of the resources of the immense industrial areas adjacent to Prince Rupert. Certainly the latter is taking the cream of them but there are plenty of opportunities left. It will be the duty of the Board of Trade and other public organizations interested in the development of northern British Columbia to point these out to Mr. Morgan when he comes and too much consideration cannot be given to the matter in the meantime in preparing to demonstrate to him that in this section of Canada the greatest opportunities for successful investment of British capital present themselves. Prince Rupert and district should have any number of propositions to interest this important representative of British industry and trade.

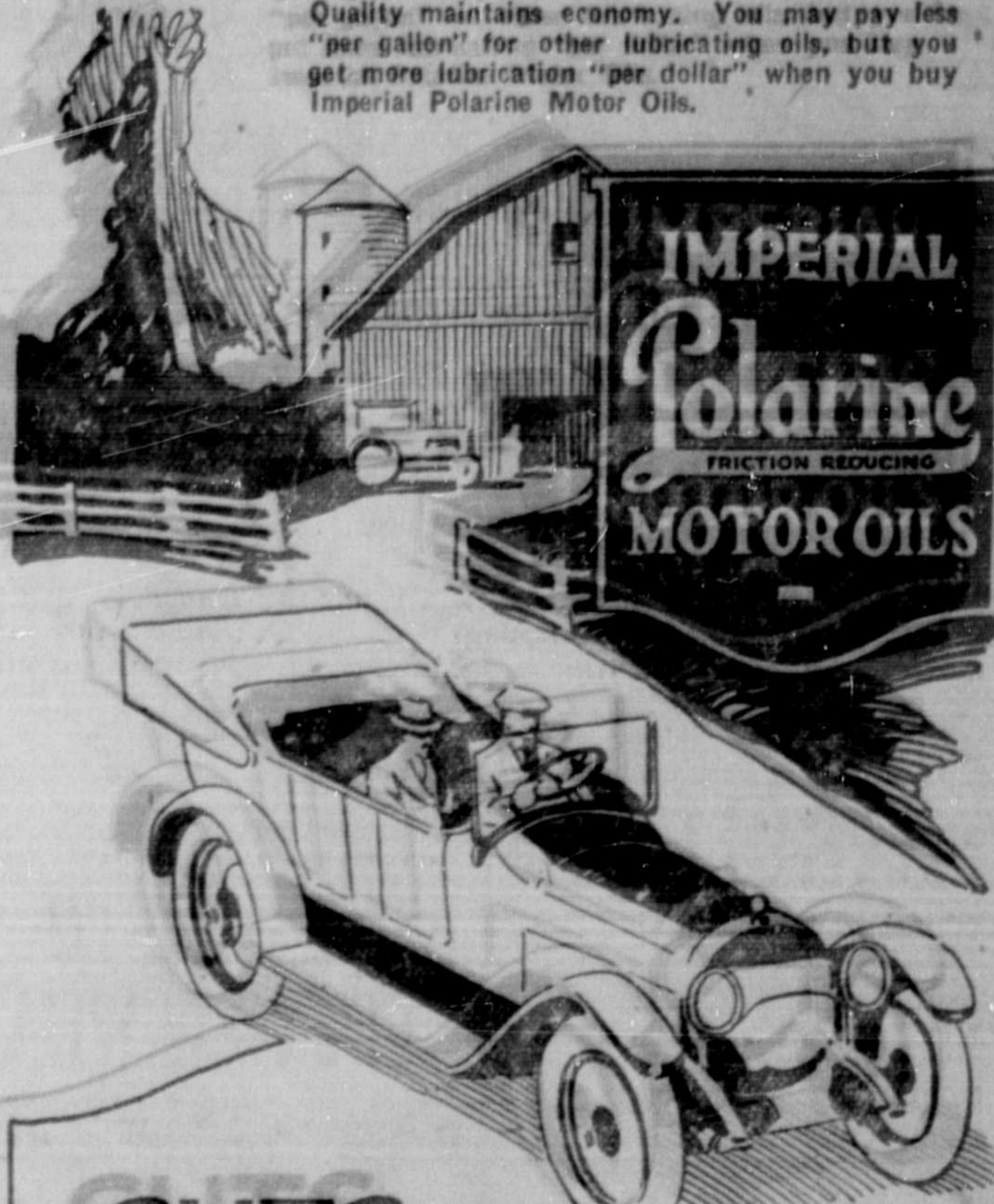

ALICE ARM TO GET NEW WHARF

Dominion Government is Calling For Tenders for Badly Needed Facility.

ALICE ARM, June 22.—Plans and specifications were received last Monday, and are on view at the Postoffice. The wharf will be 100 feet in length and 50 feet wide. A derrick capable of lifting two tons will be placed on the wharf, and a warehouse 24 feet by 50 feet will also be built. Rock will be blasted out to make footings for piles. The two other rows of piles to have their footings below water level. The wharf will be supported by cross-ties, spaced to feet centre to centre in two directions. The superstructure will consist of caps, stringers, joist, planking, and guard rails, together with fender piles, bracing and the cables anchored to the solid rock by means of anchor bolts.

The announcement that the new wharf is to be built here is received with a good deal of satisfaction by the local residents. They have pressed for it a long time and it is needed badly now especially when the Dolly Varden wharf is in use by the company. In the past the latter wharf has been used for the general freight and steamer business of the port and with the mine in operation becomes almost too congested for the business. The provincial government road which is now, nearing completion, will join the new wharf to the town, about three quarters of a mile up the Arm.

SMITHERS STORAGE PLANT DESTROYED BY FIRE ON SUNDAY

Wm. Doodson and J. C. K. Sealey Lose Property in Afternoon Blaze.

SMITHERS, June 22.—The Sealey & Doodson cold storage plant, valued at \$45,000, was destroyed by fire which broke out on Sunday afternoon. The fire was confined to the one building and there was no damage to adjoining property. William Doodson and J. C. K. Sealey were the owners. The plant was operated for the storage of Bulkley Valley beef in connection with their meat market. It had been established but a year.

CANADIAN BANK HAS BRANCH MEXICO

WASHINGTON, June 21.—(By Canadian Press).—A report received from the U. S. consul at Puerto Plata, states that the Bank of Nova Scotia has opened a branch at Santiago. REMAINS OF VICTIM OF DROWNING ACCIDENT BROUGHT TO THE CITY

The remains of the late Edward Alexander Gerster, who was drowned on May 28 off Porcher Island, were brought to the city on the "23" yesterday by Frank Morris, of the B.C. Undertakers, and Russell McIlraith, who is acting for the family of the deceased. The body was picked up by Japanese fishermen between Lawyer Island and Holland Rock about ten miles north of the scene of the drowning. It was in an unrecognizable condition and identity was only established by the papers in the clothing. It was brought to the city from Dominion Cannery.

Interment will take place on Friday afternoon in Fairview Cemetery, funeral arrangements being in the hands of the B.C. Undertakers. Rev. Canon G. A. Rix will officiate.

CLEAN UP OF LIQUOR TRADE IN KETCHIKAN

Loud - Smelling Scandal is Un-
corked by Special Agents of
Attorney-General.

KETCHIKAN, June 21.—Indictment of alleged dealers in liquor and the suspension of Walter Sharpe as deputy U. S. marshal results from an investigation said to have been conducted by special agents of the government, followed by grand jury indictments. It is said the federal investigation came as the result of a petition sent the attorney-general of the United States by a civic league of this city.

It has been charged for months that certain parties had been receiving protection in their occupation of handling liquors, and that Ketchikan was becoming a wholesale point for both Canadian whisky and moonshine. Thousands of cases of Canadian Scotch were handled at this port. A good deal of it is said to have come from Prince Rupert.

U. S. Marshal Tanner was summoned from Juneau by other federal officials, and after a conference it was announced that Deputy Sharpe had been suspended.

The local paper has charged repeatedly that liquor and gambling was being openly carried on in Ketchikan. A porter in a local hotel is said to have boasted he cleaned up \$100,000 in two years in the liquor traffic.
