Call Up Army and Navy Reserves BRITISH GOVERNMENT TO APPEAL FOR VOLUNTEERS IF BIG STRIKE CALLED

Triple Alliance of Labor Lines Up Against Owners Of Coal Mines in Britain

LONDON, April 8.—(Noon).—In view of the prospective strike a Royal proclamation will call up the army and navy reserves, Premier Lloyd George announced in the House of Commons today. It is the intention of the British Government to issue an appeal for volunteers for transport and other services.

LONDON, April 8.—The leaders of the National Federation of Transport Workers and the Union of Railwaymen have decided to call a strike of the two unions. This brings the entire power of the triple alliance of labor into the greatest industrial controversy for many years.

Representatives of the British miners have refused to accept Lloyd George's offer to meet the owners of the mines on the condition that the return of pump men and engineers to the mines be a matter settled at the conference.

A strike of the railwaymen and transport workers has been called for Tuesday morning, failing the reopening of negotiations settlement of the coal strike.

HOW FREIGHT RATES MIGHT REDUCE

Elimination of Unnecessary
and Reduction of Wages
Way, Says Carvell

VICTORIA, April 8.—Hon. Carvell, chairman of the commission, in addressing the business club yesterday, said the only way that freight rates could be brought down was by dispensing with unnecessary train services and by reducing wages.

ERY MANAGERS RETURN TO NORTH

Johnstone, Inverness, and
Kang, Sunnyside, Came
Back Wednesday

Johnstone, manager of the Cannery, and J. F. Kang, manager of Sunnyside, among the cannery men returning to the north on the Prince Rupert Wednesday. Both went to the train and came back to the city to make arrangements for the reopening of the cannery. Mr. Johnstone was accompanied by his wife and child, who are again established in business.

Anderson, of the Port Edward, also arrived and will be back again soon.

Canadian National Railway and Merchant Marine under Fire at Ottawa Yesterday

OTTAWA, April 8.—Stating that the losses of the National Railway, exclusive of the Grand Trunk, amounts to \$5,000 every mile for a year, Senator Gasgrain said, speaking in the House yesterday. The amount involved more than the total expenditure of the Dominion of Canada on the war. He urged an investigation of the "leakage."

The Canadian Government merchant ships were also under fire in the House of Commons. The opposition charged that the vessels were operated at a deficit.

William Buff, member for Lunenburg, claimed the loss amounted to \$58,669,952. He said the premier did not know what he was talking about when he said the condition of business was satisfactory.

CARPENTIER PUTS UP GUARANTEE TO APPEAR IN RING

NEW YORK, April 8.—Carpentier's \$50,000 forfeit money guaranteeing his appearance in the ring with Dempsey on July 2 has been deposited with a local trust company.

Word has been received that Carpentier will arrive in this country during the first week in May to commence training for the fight.

THIS APPOINTMENT NOT REALLY MADE

Premier Oliver Declares J. P. Cougherty, Vancouver, Not Inspector Insurance

VICTORIA, April 8.—In regard to reports that J. P. Cougherty, Vancouver, has been appointed inspector of insurance for the province, Premier Oliver declared that his name had not yet come before the executive and he knew nothing of the appointment.

NEWSPAPER MAN'S SON EATS POISON, DIES FROM EFFECT

VANCOUVER, April 8.—The four-year-old son of W. C. Findlay, the well known local newspaper man, is dead from eating rat poison. The poison was found in the basement of a neighbor's house.

Legislators Make Free with Wine and Women Says Ministerial Association

VICTORIA, April 8.—The alleged behavior of members of the legislature after the closing of the house last Saturday night and generally during the session at cabarets, hotel rooms and road houses has been taken up by the Victoria Ministerial Association.

The alleged actions of members, especially those from outlying districts in the province, were denounced. The open way in which they are claimed to have carried on with liquor and women, married and unmarried, was mentioned.

A resolution dealing with the alleged actions of the members was passed but was not made public.

Visited Many Big Centres, Met Many Prince Rupert People in Their Travels

Concluding one of the most wonderful tours conceivable, Mr. and Mrs. Ben Self returned home last night after having been at the various United States and Canadian centres since January 13, when they left Prince Rupert. One of their chief aims was to improve their health and this they did, for they are looking wonderfully well and strong compared with when they left.

Mr. Self took advantage of the visit to the big centres to make a thorough study of the motion picture business and doubtless the patrons of the local theatres will benefit from what he saw. He says that the only enemies of Prince Rupert were a certain element in Vancouver and those whose business it was to know about the place but who did not.

Canadian National.

Mr. Self tells of his experiences in connection with the Canadian National Railway. He says they have palatial offices at New York on 33rd and Broadway which must cost a lot of money to keep up, but the man in charge there hardly knew where Prince Rupert was.

"Prince Rupert? Let me see, that's in British Columbia isn't it?"

Leek Resigns from Police Force; New Lineup Is Decided

Warden Albert H. Bailey becomes senior sergeant next in command to Chief Vickers on the city police. Constable Hugh McGilinchy becomes sergeant and Special Constable George P. Logan is now a permanent constable, according to the decision of the police commission at its meeting last night. As a result of the recent shooting affair in the city jail the resignation of Constable Leek was received and accepted.

There was a large attendance at the meeting in the council chamber on account of the announcement that the commission would deliver its finding in the Leek affair. The resignation of Constable Leek was the first business dealt with. The officer in his resignation referred to the city jail as a "bull pen" and stated that being an officer for 27 years he had started that work before the main witness in the shooting case had been born. Through this experience he knew more about police work than some of the present officers would ever know.

The acceptance of his resignation was unanimous. Commissioner Myhill Jones and Macdonald being the mover and seconder respectively, the latter stating that he had intended moving for dismissal.

Logan Recommended

The application of Constable Logan was accompanied by a written testimonial from Chief Constable A. C. Minty, of the provincial police and the verbal recommendation at the meeting of Chief Vickers. Commissioner Macdonald moved the acceptance of his application with Commissioner Myhill Jones seconding.

The question of new appointments to the force was brought up by Commissioner Macdonald, moving that Warden Bailey be made senior sergeant in recognition of his ten years as sergeant and that Constable McGilinchy be made sergeant, he being the next man in line of seniority with four and a half years' efficient service to his credit.

Senior Sergeant Bailey will receive same salary as at present and Sergeant McGilinchy will get a raise of \$10 a month effective from April 1.

Shooting Episode

The shooting episode of last Thursday night was brought up by Commissioner Myhill Jones, who moved that the force be censured for allowing Post, an insane man, and Stanley Johnson, a man who apparently aggravated him, being left together in a cell room at the same time. This failed to receive the support of either Commissioner Macdonald or Mayor Rochester and the motion was not put. It was pointed out that, usually, Post was very peaceable and sane and that he had been urged on by annoyance from Johnson in creating the violence that had resulted in his being shot. Post left last night for Essondale Farm where it is felt by the local examining physicians, he will recover with a three months sojourn.

Will be Held in Ottawa Some Time in July by Railway Commission.

VANCOUVER, April 8.—British Columbia's case for lower freight rates will be presented to the Board of Railway Commissioners at a final hearing in Ottawa some time in July, Chief Commissioner Frank Carvell announced yesterday.

WINNIPEG ISOLATED BY STORM YESTERDAY

Tempest of Sleet Swept Across
Manitoba and Western
Ontario.

WINNIPEG, April 8.—A sleet storm yesterday swept across Manitoba and western Ontario, taking down before it telegraph and telephone wires and poles. Winnipeg was virtually isolated as a result and was without telegraphic communication.

"it?" the man inquired. "Yes, you can get there over our line, I think." After twenty minutes' investigation he gave an approximate idea of the cost but could not quote an exact figure.

In the big Winnipeg office there was an immense wall map with a black line leading to Vancouver but the line was not connected with Prince Rupert. The man explained that it was an old map but Mrs. Self was curious to know if paint was expensive there and if it would cost much to connect up with Rupert. As a result a promise was made that by the time of the next visit the offending map would be corrected.

These were a few incidents to show how this city is neglected by the railroad, a neglect which Mr. Self found prevailing everywhere he went.

Cheap Water Haul.
In regard to express refrigerator cars, Mr. Self says there are plenty in California. Owing to the high express rates, the fruit companies have chartered some of the biggest steamers to carry their fruit through the Panama Canal to the Atlantic coast and as a result the railways are idle. The fruit companies save eight million dollars a year by using the water route.

Los Angeles the travellers found was the only city that was not suffering business depression. In that city business was better than during the war. The sum of \$150,000,000 was spent there by tourists last year. Mr. Self is of opinion that there would be a good tourist trade in Prince Rupert if it was properly fostered.

Met Former Residents.
At Los Angeles Mr. Self stayed at the Hotel Cordova owned by Harvey Peck, formerly owner of what is now the Family Shoe Store in this city. He is doing well there. He also met V.D. Casley, formerly of the Empress Hotel in this city who is running a big apartment there. Mr. and Mrs. Self also renewed acquaintances with Mr. and Mrs. Chel-

Nell and as each of these former Prince Rupert residents had big cars, the visitors were taken to see everything and enjoyed their visit immensely.

In New York Mr. Self met James B. F. Melville, formerly chief clerk for the G.T.P. in this city under Superintendent Meighen. He holds a responsible position with an investment concern on the nineteenth floor at 75 Vanderville Ave. He is doing well but says he has a hankering to be back in old Rupert.

An effort was made to see Lieut. Frank Evans formerly of the Prince Rupert Fish Market. He is in business there and doing well. His war work has been mentioned often in the Daily News.

Many Places Visited.

Other places visited were Vancouver, Seattle, San Francisco, New Mexico, Oklahoma, Memphis, Washington, Baltimore, Philadelphia, Buffalo, Niagara and Canadian cities. The travellers took treatment at the hot springs at Los Angeles with good results and visited Mr. Self's father at Oklahoma. While away he was kept well informed of Prince Rupert through the Daily News which his father takes and which was forwarded to him.

Mr. and Mrs. Self were heartily welcomed on their return. They attended the E.K.s. dance last night and spent most of their time receiving congratulations and answering questions.

Mr. Dooper stated that he would not care to prosecute unless this were followed out.

Commissioner Macdonald explained that he would prefer to prosecute the owner rather than the unfortunate woman but the solicitor pointed out that the commission would be placed in a rather bad position if it did not prosecute the woman when it was cognizant of the fact that she was a prostitute.

The awarding of the contract for the tailoring of uniforms for the police force has been left over for a few days on account of an irregularity in the calling for tenders.

Sidney Du Hamel, H. Barr and T. Campbell were listed on the drunk charge sheet in the police court this morning. The first paid \$10 for drunkenness and also \$10 for damage, the second \$20 bail and the last mentioned paid \$10 fine.

The destruction of fifty are lights in the city by youthful culprits was reported last night at the police commission meeting. The mayor explained that rewards were being offered by the city for the arrest and conviction of the lads doing the damage and the police were already investigating. The depredations have occurred mainly east of Concord Street on Eighth and Eleventh Avenues.

Synopsis of Land Act Amendments

Minimum price of first-class land reduced to \$5 an acre; second-class to \$2.50 an acre.

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.
Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land.
Partnership pre-emptions abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emptions with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.

Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$15 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres, before receiving Crown Grant.

Where pre-emptor in occupation not less than 2 years, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, because of ill-health, or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence may be issued, provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$100 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained in less than 5 years, and improvements of \$10.00 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years are required.

Pre-emptor holding Crown grant may recede another pre-emption, if he requires land in conjunction with his farm, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesteads; title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes areas exceeding 40 acres may be leased by one person or company.

Mill, factory or industrial sites on timber land not exceeding 40 acres may be purchased; conditions include payment of stumpage.

Natural hay meadows inaccessible by existing roads may be purchased conditional upon construction of a road to them. Rebate of one-half of cost of road, not exceeding half of purchase price, is made.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT.

The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retroactive.

No fees relating to pre-emptions are due or payable by soldiers on pre-emptions recorded after June 26, 1918. Taxes are remitted for five years.

Provision for return of moneys accrued, due and been paid since August 4, 1914, on account of payments, fees or taxes on soldiers' pre-emptions.

Interest on agreements to purchase town or city lots held by members of Allied Forces, or dependents, acquired direct or indirect, remitted from settlement to March 31, 1920.

SUB-PURCHASERS OF CROWN LANDS.

Provision made for issuance of Crown grants to sub-purchasers of Crown lands, acquiring rights from purchasers who failed to complete purchase, involving forfeiture, on fulfillment of conditions of purchase, interest and taxes. Where sub-purchasers do not claim whole of original parcel, purchase price due and taxes may be distributed proportionately over whole area. Applications must be made by May 1, 1920.

GRAZING.

Grazing Act, 1912, for systematic development of livestock industry provides for grazing districts and range administration under Commissioner. Annual grazing permits issued based on numbers ranged; priority for established owners. Stock-owners may form Associations for range management. Free, or partially free, permits for settlers, campers or travellers, up to 100 head.

UNIVERSITY FIRST YEAR AT HIGH SCHOOL

Fee of \$200 a Year to be Charged
for Pupils Taking Advanced
Work.

At the school board meeting last night it was decided by resolution to employ an extra teacher at the high school to take up Senior Matriculation work and that a charge of \$200 a year payable \$100 at the commencement of each term should be made for pupils attending that class.

Trustee Patmore in moving the resolution said he was not in favor of appointing the extra teacher unless the fee was charged. The education department set out a free course for the public and high schools of the province. Only a few would take advantage of this and the cost would have to be paid by the ratepayers. If there were large classes it might be different. The fee proposed would be about one third of the cost.

Would Rather Pay.
Mr. Patmore pointed out further that if a pupil was sent to Vancouver the cost to the parents would be about \$600. When he had children old enough to take the course he would rather pay the full six hundred dollars and send them away.

Principal Brady asked if they did not think the fee might work a hardship on some who could not afford to pay it.

Mr. Patmore said they had to draw a line somewhere.

Trustee McLennan said he was in favor of employing the teacher but did not favor the fee.

Trustee McMeekin agreed with Mr. Patmore. If parents paid something for the tuition they would value it more highly. Had there been a big class he would have favored giving it free.

Trustee Ling was in favor of the move. She too thought anything that was paid for was valued more highly than what was obtained free.

Might Be Criticized.

Dr. Kerwin was decidedly in favor of establishing the class but thought the fee might be considered separately. Personally he would rather pay more for it than send his boys to Vancouver. In Ontario the High Schools furnished the course free, but they might be criticized here for undertaking to spend \$3,000 to educate five pupils. Later, when the class was larger, he thought they might cut out the fee.

Trustee McLennan moved an amendment that the question of fee be determined later. He did not think it good advertising for the city to start in the way proposed. If it was impossible to establish the class without a fee he would favor levying it.

There was no seconder to the amendment so the fee of \$200 stands.

ASK MACHINERY FOR MANUAL TRAINING

R. H. Shockley, manual training instructor, asked the school board at their meeting last night that they install band saw and lathes in the manual training room at the new school. He recommended one band saw, three lathes and motor, and a grinder for sharpening tools.

Mr. Shockley was asked to make a definite recommendation in regard to the needs with the cost of installing.

The vacancy caused by the return to England of the Rev. A. E. Price is to be filled by the Rev. Arthur Garlick, Archbishop Du Vernet has arranged for Mr. and Mrs. Garlick to remove from Burns Lake to Metlakatla on May 11. During the summer season they will live in the Church Rooms at Inverness and minister to both native and white people at the various churches as Mr. Price did in the summer time. Rev. Wm. Sweetman will temporarily take charge of St. John's Church, Burns Lake, until the archbishop secures another clergyman for this mission.

NAAS MISSIONARY

The Upper Naas Valley where Rev. J. B. McGillich, now ill in the hospital here, labored as a missionary for over thirty-seven years, is not to be neglected from a Church point of view. Archbishop Du Vernet has secured the Rev. Oliver Thorne to fill the vacancy caused by Mr. McGillich's resignation.

Mr. Thorne and his wife and two children are expected to arrive here about the middle of May, and will proceed up the Naas River before the high water hinders navigation. He is an expert gardener and has a practical knowledge of farming and so will be able to give instruction to the native boys along this line.

The Aiyansh valley is very fertile, because not too far from the moisture of the sea, although behind the Cascade Range of mountains.

SCHOOL PLAYROOMS IN NEW BUILDING
