Several Seats Still Seem Doubtful LATE SKEENA RETURNS FAVOR STORK: NOW SURE OF ELECTION

Tremendous Storm Drives Shipping Ashore on Coast of North Atlantic Ocean

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., Dec. 8.—One tug and seventeen schooners were lost and sixteen people are known to have lost their lives, while the death list is growing as the result of an unprecedented storm on the Atlantic coast, which commenced on Monday and continued ever since.

While residents of Capelin in Cove Conception Bay were trying to rescue those aboard a large schooner which was driven ashore, the immense seas destroyed her and all those aboard. It is believed to have been the schooner Passport bearing supplies outports.

Several other vessels have been cast ashore by the gale and taken up. The storm still continues.

AMERICAN SUB SINKS; CREW ALL ESCAPED

S-48 Sunk Last Night off Bridgeport Harbor and Fifty Men Were Down Twelve Hours.

BRIDGEPORT, Conn., Dec. 8.—The United States submarine S-48 sank off this harbor last night and was submerged for twelve hours before the crew of fifty men escaped through the torpedo tubes after the ballast tanks had been lightened.

STRIKE RIOTS IN CHICAGO YARDS

Employees of Packinghouses Fire on Strikebreakers When Leaving Work.

CHICAGO, Dec. 8.—Picketeters in the stockyards used shotguns on the strikebreakers last night and as a result seven were wounded but none seriously. Police reserves broke the fight with batons.

Rioting at quitting time also took place at Omaha according to reports received here.

Legal proceedings to restrain the strikers from picketing in the stockyards of the United States cities have been begun. This will affect the rights of about 40,000 employees of packing houses who are now on strike.

CONSTABULARY WILL DISBAND

Express Consternation at Terms of Irish Agreement As It Affects Them.

DUBLIN, Dec. 8.—Officers and men of the Irish constabulary have requested Lloyd George and the Viceroy of Ireland to arrange for a prompt disbandment of the force, expressing consternation at the terms of the Irish agreement as the terms affect the constabulary.

In an accompanying statement they say they welcome the Irish settlement.

CAPTAIN BLACK LEADS IN YUKON ELECTION

23 Ahead of Congdon With 13 Polls Yet to Hear From.

DAWSON, Dec. 8.—Sixteen polls out of 29 give Captain Black, Conservative, a lead of 23 over F. T. Congdon, Liberal. The figures up to this morning were: Black, 547; Congdon, 391.

VICTORIA WINS HOCKEY GAME

Beats Seattle With Moose Johnson Play in Stellar Role.

SEATTLE, Dec. 8.—Owing to magnificent play of the redoubtable Moose Johnson and the Loughlin brothers the Victoria Aristocrats last night defeated the Seattle Metropolitans by a score of four to one in the first game of the season played here in the Pacific Coast Hockey League season.

Johnson's work was spectacular. He is always clever and has peculiar plays of his own that are very effective. His rushes and those of the Loughlins were the features of the attack of the Victoria team which brought them the victory.

BRITISH ELECTIONS LIKELY IN FEBRUARY

Withdrawal of Irish Members from British Commons Makes New Alignment Necessary.

LONDON, Dec. 8.—Consequent on the alteration of the alignment of seats consequent on the withdrawal of the Irish members from the House of Commons, a general election in Britain is almost certain after a settlement of the Irish treaty. February will probably be the date set.

PREDICTS INFLUX IMMIGRANTS FROM BRITAIN TO CANADA

OTTAWA, Dec. 8.—A great movement of settlers from the British Isles to Canada, limited only by the ability of Canada to absorb them, is predicted by W. J. Black, deputy minister of immigration, who has just returned from a six weeks' trip to Europe.

SINN FEINERS REJOICE AMID MORE DISORDER

BELFAST, Dec. 8.—There were demonstrations of rejoicing and bonfires in the streets of the Sinn Fein districts of Belfast last night. There was also some shooting but no one was injured. At two places the police were attacked by armed men and on one instance returned the fire.

LIBERAL MEMBER OF BRITISH PARLIAMENT EULOGIZES PREMIER

LEEDS, Dec. 8.—Rt. Hon. Charles A. McCurdy, Liberal member of parliament, referring to the Irish settlement, referring to Lloyd George had flung a golden bridge across the storm-lashed waters of the Irish Channel. He had succeeded where many great British bridge builders of old had failed because he had the magic gift of sympathy, understanding, undying patience and courage.

MOORS SURRENDER TO SPANIARDS IN MOROCCO, AFRICA

MELILLA, Morocco, Dec. 8.—The Uled Setut tribe of Moors surrendered to the Spanish forces. Another tribe will surrender today, it is expected.

TORONTO, Dec. 8.—With four seats, including the Yukon and West Calgary, gone to the doubtful column, the standing of the parties up to last night gave Liberals 117, Conservatives 48, Progressives 63, Independent 1, Labor 2, doubtful 4. Manion's election in Fort William now appears doubtful.

GALGARY, Dec. 8.—The Albertan claims the final count in the West Calgary contest gives Shaw, the independent candidate, a majority of 16 over R. B. Bennet, minister of justice in the Meighen cabinet.

WINNIPEG, Dec. 8.—Hon. A. T. Green, leader of the Progressives, who is here, declines to make any comment on the publication of the election results or on his own course in the new parliament.

The Progressives appear to have carried Moose Jaw by the defeat of W. E. Knowles, Liberal. West Edmonton is still in doubt this morning. The Journal claims that Kennedy, the Progressive, is now leading over the Liberal by 176 with more than 100 polls yet to hear from.

LONDON, Dec. 8.—None of the London morning papers seem surprised at the nature of the defeat suffered by the Conservatives in the General elections in Canada on Tuesday. Certainly none expected the Liberals would secure such a definite mandate.

RELEASED PRISONERS SATISFIED OVER THE TERMS IRISH PEACE

DUBLIN, Dec. 8.—King George's proclamation declaring amnesty for Irishmen who had been interned resulted in the release of many prisoners. Expressions of satisfaction over the peace terms are numerous among the men thus set free.

IRISHMEN WISHING TO RETURN TO ERIN

NEW YORK, Dec. 8.—The Knights of Columbus headquarters report that many requests have been received from Irishmen wishing to return to Ireland now that nationhood has been promised.

The Knights are replying that they cannot do anything to secure employment for intending emigrants.

FRED STORK IS ELECTED

With 19 Polls to Hear From and Majority of 177 His Return Conceded.

With nineteen polls yet to hear from, Alfred Stork, Liberal candidate in Skeena riding, has a majority of 177 and his election over Lt. Col. G. W. Peck, Independent candidate, is conceded. Instead of lowering the Liberal majority, as was generally predicted, the late returns yesterday strengthened it considerably and several points brought in substantial majorities for Stork. Palling and Premier were instances.

The polls which had not reported up to two o'clock this afternoon were: Atlin, Arrandale, Bella Bella, Copper City, Colleymount, Discovery, Namu, Ruby, Surf Inlet, Surf Inlet Beach, Tow Hill, Telegraph Creek, Wadhams and Wistaria. It is not thought that the total of these will have a very great effect on the present margin which divides the candidates.

Shows Value of Team Work.

We have in this city a Board of Trade simply because a group is stronger than an individual. If this group is united and determined and has in it lots of vigor it can often accomplish much.

Political parties are organized because in a group they are stronger than as a collection of individuals. Organization is a great thing, but organization without individual effort is valueless.

Just now we have reached a period in the history of Prince Rupert when some organization and team work will be of great benefit. We have had our political fight and it is over, and we are thankful to say it was fought without bitterness. One side had to win and the other to lose, and vigorous efforts were made by each. That is as it should be. In sports we like to see a well-contested game, and in politics it is good to see citizens self-sufficiently interested to put themselves with all their might into the contest. But that is all past. We are now looking forward as a unit to something happening in Prince Rupert. It will take time and it will take effort on behalf of the people here. Winning an election is not everything. We must now let the people in the east and south know that we are here.

Why Not Cabinet Position for Stark?

There cannot be more than three Liberal members go to Ottawa from this province unless we add Neil of Comox-Alberni to the group and make it four. One of these is likely to have a position in the Mackenzie King cabinet. Why should it not be the representative of this young and vigorous community? It would add much prestige to him and his representations if he were given a portfolio and would place the constituency on the map at Ottawa. It is worth considering whether as a community we can get together and recommend that he be chosen, backed by all parties and classes in the community.

Team Work to Get Road Out of City.

Some team work is necessary to get the road out of the city to Galloway Rapids commenced this winter. There is some unemployment in the neighborhood. In order to keep the men working throughout the dead part of the winter, and at the same time to give us a much needed improvement, this seems a suitable time to commence the road.

We are not overlooking the work which is being done by the Provincial Government at Cow Bay or the splendid edifice the Government is erecting at Market Square. These are needed. There is, however, one thing on which the people have set their hearts, and that is the building of a road leading out of the city as the first section of the trunk road to the Interior. At a time when trunk roads are being built in the south, we have a claim to the commencement of a trunk road here. Our member is fully in sympathy with the movement, but it is difficult to get money. We must make a beginning, and the present winter seems to be a suitable time. If we had this work going on here we should stop much of the annual flow southward to Vancouver to recruit the ranks of the unemployed there. As a relief measure alone it is worthy of consideration.

Team Work to Get Bunkers Erected.

It will take team work to get bunkers erected here. For a little while the new government will be busy organizing the departments and looking into matters of general policy. It seems likely that there will be changes in the railroad management, or at any rate in the policy of the management. The big things have to be attended to first. It is useless for Prince Rupert to make any move just at present looking to improvements here now except through the management of the railroad. Possibly it might be wise to take the matter up soon through our Ottawa representative and direct with the railway. We have not been heard in the east for some time. If we all get together we can undoubtedly put over a good deal in the way of improvements. One thing at a time and the most important thing first is the best policy.

VICTORIA WARMING UP FOR ELECTION IN CIVIC CAMPAIGN

VICTORIA, Dec. 8.—This city is warming up with regard to the civic campaign. There are a number of candidates already in the field for alderman and William Marchant is to oppose Mayor Porter for the chief position. In announcing his policy to the people Mr. Marchant published the following letter:

"Will you permit me as a candidate for the office of mayor to state to the citizens through your columns some of my reasons for entering the contest. It is unfortunate that a Federal election overshadows municipal issues, otherwise the interest in local questions would by this time have reached the indignation stage.

What can be more appalling than to know that the civic administration under the leadership of Mayor Porter has directed \$168,978.00, according to the auditors' report, from the local improvement sinking funds to the current expenditure.

"What can be more alarming than the knowledge that there are thousands of unemployed men in the city vainly seeking for work, and that the civic administration under Mayor Porter has made no preparation for coping with the situation?"

"What can be a greater declaration of incapacity than to see on every hand civic work needing laborers, improvements required in every section of the city, and no provision has been made to deal with these things?"

"High taxation has come through reckless borrowings; enormous interest charges are paid in every branch of the city's financial management, yet helpless children must suffer and mothers stand by looking for means to supply food and clothing, because the mayor and council refuse to recognize the awful blundering of the past, and adequately provide for the present."

"I propose if elected as mayor to demand that provision shall be made in the civic budget for employment in the winter months and that the sins of the city fathers in the boom period shall not be visited upon the children of this generation."

Hon. Speaker Manson Reviews Session of Legislature which Has Just Completed its Session

"The session of the Legislature, which closed on Saturday and which lasted for only six weeks, was the first and only short session there has been since the Liberals took office in British Columbia," said Hon. A. M. Manson, speaker and member for Omineca, who returned yesterday from Victoria.

"The House was called together this fall with a view to finding some solution for the financial difficulties of certain of the southern municipalities, some of which during recent years have found themselves in very embarrassing circumstances. It would hardly be accurate to say that these municipalities were satisfied entirely with the increased revenue provided for them by the legislature, but it was apparent from representations made by a great many business tax payers that they were anxious to see some check put on the municipal authorities to prevent too liberal and extravagant expenditure. On the whole it would appear that the legislature met the wishes of the majority fairly well by turning over to the municipalities half of the increased auto taxes and the new taxes imposed on racetracks.

Atmosphere Tense.
 "The atmosphere of the legislature this session at times was somewhat tense and the fact that a Federal campaign was being conducted to keep the political feelings of the members on edge. The opening bomb was fired by the Leader of the Opposition in the way of charges but it proved to be a "dud" when he failed to respond to the Premier's amendment demanding the particulars of his charges upon the promise of an immediate inquiry.

"The Baker incident provided some excitement but the government's appointment of a prominent Conservative in the person of H. C. Shaw, who has been police magistrate for many years in Vancouver and who is highly esteemed and respected in Southern British Columbia, as a Royal Commission to investigate the charges seemed to provide the necessary means of cleaning up the situation. Mr. Pooley, member for Esquimalt, made formal charges in the house but, being refused a committee of the house to inquire into them, took the stand not to assist the commission in any way in getting at the truth.

Beer Amendment.
 "The proposed beer amendment provided the closing excitement of the session. The members were apparently divided into three groups, first, those who were entirely opposed to beer, second, those who believed that the house should have passed a beer clause immediately, and third, those who were of the opinion that a referendum in respect to beer should be taken. The attitude of the opposition was to take no part in the discussion and it walked out of the House. It will be for the country to say whether the refusal of a group of members to accept their responsibility was warranted or not.

"The Premier wanted a full and frank discussion on the question and he suggested to the House that it should be an absolutely non-partisan one. Beyond a doubt, the fact that it did not come to a decisive vote means that the day when the question must be dealt with has only been postponed.

Pacific Great Eastern.
 "The Pacific Great Eastern Railway still hangs over the country like a pall," said Mr. Manson in touching on railway matters. "As the railway problem is to Canada so is it to the Province of British Columbia;

the most perplexing situation it has to face. Premier Oliver, Minister of Railways, discussed the situation with the utmost frankness in the House and very plainly told the members that the solution did not appear at hand. He did, however, before the House closed, make the statement that he proposed to ask assistance of the best experts that he could find as to the course which should be pursued. On order to find these experts he proposed to ask the patriotic assistance of the big railwaymen of Canada of the stamp of President Beatty, of the Canadian Pacific.

"The statement seemed not only to meet with the favor of the House but also with that of the business interests of the south generally and the Premier showed his business by stating that he proposed to consult with Hon. W. J. Bowser, leader of the Opposition, in regard to the matter.

Mr. Manson also said that a very considerable amount of amending legislation had been put through, the biggest item being the Vancouver Consolidation Charter, which had been laid over from last session but which was not completed. The House may sit again next fall and possibly not until the spring of 1923.

VICTORIA PIONEER ARRIVED YESTERDAY

Mrs. S. M. Bailey Went to B. C. Capital in 1860, Says Times.

Victoria is shortly to lose one of its oldest and most highly esteemed pioneers in the person of Mrs. S. M. Bailey, 1142 Caledonia Avenue, says the Victoria Times. A surprise party was given at the residence of Mrs. Bailey, at which a host of friends gathered to bid farewell to the departing pioneer. Mrs. Bailey came to Victoria in the year 1860, landing at Esquimalt. 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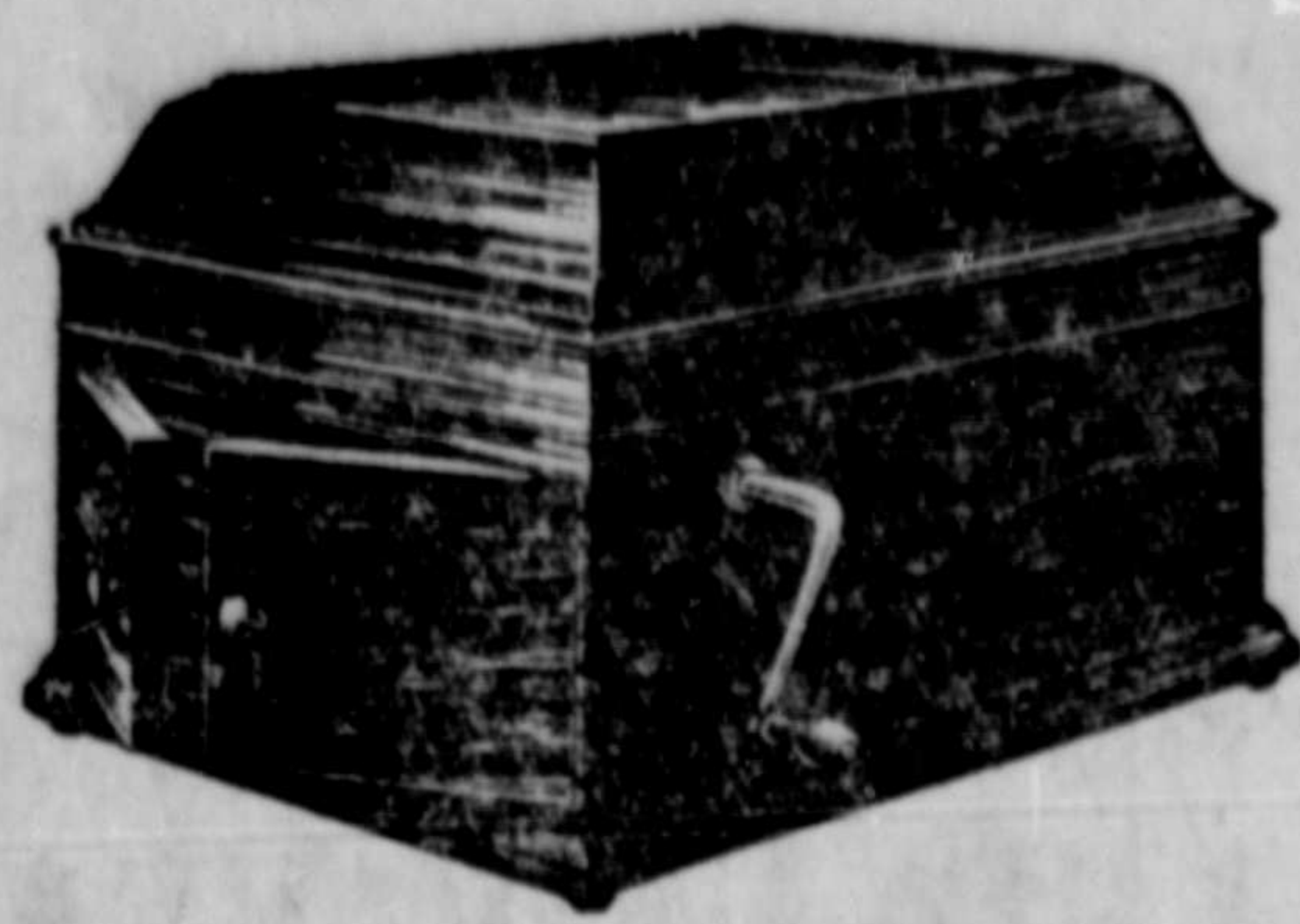

VICTORIA, Dec. 8.—The saw-mill industry of British Columbia has been hit by a famine in logs, and it is reported there are only 97,000,000 feet of all kinds of logs in the water.

The scarcity of cedar is giving the shingle mills of the province no small amount of worry, and an investigation is being conducted by various interests to ascertain the quantity that is going to Japan in large cant form and in logs.

The demand for red cedar is expected to increase. Fir logs advanced \$1 a thousand this week. The run of the camp is quoted at \$11.50, while cedar has also climbed to \$22 for ordinary boom.

INVADE GERMAN MARKET AFTER CHEAP GOODS

COBLENZ, Germany, Dec. 8.—German newspapers for weeks have been waging a campaign of protest against what is termed the "selling out of Germany" to foreigners who have invaded the country to purchase goods since the mark began its sharp decline early in October.

The mark has fallen in value much faster than the prices advanced and, as a consequence, thousands of speculators have been attracted to Germany to take advantage of the situation.

Prohibition Order. The president of the Rhineland province, acting under direction of the Inter-Allied Rhineland High Commission, issued a decree prohibiting purchase of merchandise by foreigners not actually residing within the territory of occupation.

Officials deemed that this step toward trade regulations was necessary to prevent retailers from selling their stocks to foreigners taking advantage of the low rate of exchange on foreign currencies at a time when the price on goods in the German stores had not advanced, or at least not marked up in comparison with the depreciation of the German mark.

Poured into Rhineland. For days, buyers poured into the Rhineland on every train, and by automobile from Holland, Belgium, Luxembourg, France and other nearby countries and businesses in the stores of Coblenz, Cologne, Aix-la-Chapelle flourished as if never had before.

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KING NOT BOUND BY RECENT MEIGHEN ACTS

Contracts and Appointments Made in Dynastic Hours of Administration Will Be Cancelled.

OTTAWA, Dec. 8.—Some weeks or so before election day Hon. Arthur Meighen received the following letter of protest from W. L. Mackenzie King, Liberal leader.

"Dear Mr. Meighen—From the Ottawa press despatches it would appear that since the day of nomination, your government, by order-in-council has been making new appointments, and in one direction or another, committing the country to vast expenditures in no way contemplated by any existing appropriations or other legislation of the Parliament of Canada.

FINAL STAGES PRINCE'S VISIT

Will Investigate Northwestern Defences of India and See Displays.

LONDON, Dec. 8.—(By Canadian Press).—The tour of the Prince of Wales in India, in its final phases, in February and the first half of March, 1922, includes a busy week in Delhi, the seat of the supreme government under the British Crown, and from there he will proceed to the premier state of the Punjab—Patiala—in the latter part of February. In connection with the visit of the heir apparent to Patiala, it is of interest to note that on the day he embarked on the battle cruiser Renown for his Indian tour the ruler of Patiala unveiled at Brighton, England, the memorial gateway given to that town by Indian subscribers in recognition of the care some thousands of Indian wounded soldiers had received in the hospital there. In the Great War some 28,000 subjects of the Maharaja of Patiala enlisted in the British forces, and the Patiala Imperial Service troops fought with great distinction on many battle fronts, doing particularly good service in Palestine and Mesopotamia.

On his way to Lahore, which will be reached on February 25, the Prince will stop at Jullundur to see the pensioners and ex-soldiers of the districts round that town, and to lay the foundation stone of the Indian Military School for the sons of soldiers. In the Punjab capital the Prince will receive an address of welcome from the members of the Punjab Legislature. A great feature of his sojourn in Lahore will be a review of Pensioned Indian officers at the Minto Park, to be followed by sports and illuminations.

Stopping en route at Sialkot to see the garrison there, His Royal Highness on March 2 will reach Jammu, the winter headquarters of the Maharaja of Kashmir and Jammu. From this state west forth many thousands of its subjects to fight for the Allies in the war, and the state maintained at full strength on various fronts an admirably efficient force of Imperial Service troops. At Jammu the Prince will come the nearest in his tour to the civilizations under his northern Buddhism, and will see interesting spectacles such as no other centre of his journeyings can offer. These will include an exhibition of the game of Baltistan polo, a parade of the different races and communities of the state in their national dress, a dance of llamas, and an exhibition of the crafts at Kashmir.

In his way to the northwest frontier the Prince will stop at Jhelum, where he will lay the foundation stone of King George's Royal Indian Military School and will inspect a large number of war pensioners belonging to the Western Punjab.

PROTECT BIRDS IN ENGLAND

Sanctuaries Are Formed Where No Enemies of Feathered Kind Allowed.

LONDON, Dec. 8.—(By Canadian Press).—Public interest in bird sanctuaries has been considerably freshened as a result of a recent dinner held in this city by the Selborne Society in celebration of the purchase of the Becht Valley Bird Sanctuary—one of the most remarkable refuges of wild life in the world's greatest city. This refuge is a small oak wood near Greenford, Middlesex and there the nightingale, cuckoo, blackcap and many other birds which would otherwise surely have been banished by the spread of Greater London may live in peace and security and propagate their kind.

Earl Grey of Falloden, who presided at the Selborne Society dinner, is one of Great Britain's most conspicuous bird lovers. He and the late Lord Lucas and a few other bird loving friends bought an estate in the "broad" district of Norfolk before the war and turned it into a sanctuary for rare local birds with appreciable success. One feature of this refuge was the return of brooding bitterns to Norfolk and their steady increase is regarded as one of the most heartening chapters in recent bird history.

Sanctuaries of wild life require a vigilant eye and often a controlling mind. The worst of all enemies of rare British birds is the collector of their eggs. When the last half-dozen British lites were preserved from extinction in Mid-Wales, the nest-trees had literally to be watched day and night. Bird and animal pests may be only less destructive than human raiders; a bird sanctuary, if uncontrolled may simply become a happy hunting ground of jays, crows, stoats, weasels, rats, sparrows, starlings, mongooses or whatever species may be artificially introduced in the ascendant. These sanctuaries need not only be formed, but maintained.

Marsh birds are chiefly extinguished by drainage, and many wood birds are banished by scientific forestry, which eliminates old rotten trees. In England today there are few such entirely primitive tracts of woodland as Naddle Forest, on the shore of Hawes Water, which Manchester is to wipe out.

LANDED PROPRIETORS RISE IN ENGLAND

LONDON, Dec. 8.—The advent of a new "landed gentry" in England since the war is made plain by "Burke's," an annual work of reference on that subject which has reappeared after a break of seven years.

Over 100 names of old landowners have disappeared since the last edition, and their places have been taken by double that number of newcomers. In the preface the editor remarks: "Much as the passing of old families from the land, or the diminution of their holdings is to be regretted, the rise of a new class of landed gentry, possessed of means enabling them to develop estates which had become impoverished through the misfortunes of their previous owners, cannot be without benefit to the country."
