## Dominions Must Defend Themselves ALLEGED MURDERER OF WOMAN WHO WORKED HERE ARRESTED

### EDITORIAL

### Man Is Arrested for Murder of Former Prince Rupert Woman and Says He Was Not There at Time

VANCOUVER, July 29.—A solution to the mysterious and cold-blooded murder of the former Prince Rupert woman, Mrs. Alma Sampson, aged 35 years, in a room of the Castle Hotel, Granville Street, on the early morning of August 17 of last year, seems to have been brought nearer by the arrest of Edward Metzendorf. The victim came here from Prince Rupert, where she worked for one Fred Saunders in the Empress Cabaret.

This morning in the police court Edward G. Metzendorf, a Russian Jew, born in this country and aged about 25 years, stood in the dock charged with the murder. The hearing was formal, and a remand for one week was requested and granted.

Detectives Imiah and Alex, who have been working on the case since the start, located the accused in Seattle. A monkey wrench, found by the police after the murder, was the clue leading to Metzendorf.

Just after the murder, William Coleman was arrested on suspicion and proved an alibi, thus clearing himself. Coleman was arrested as a material witness and also later freed.

The woman was found on a bed huddled up with blood-stained clothes tucked under a bathtub, and with evidence of a struggle having taken place. She was the wife of a Great Northern trainman. Jealousy is said to have been the motive in the crime.

#### Startling Feature.

A startling feature of the latest developments in the case is the police statement that the accused man came here from Seattle a week ago, stayed awhile and returned there and also a week ago there was found in a drawer in the room where the murder was committed, a monkey wrench covered with traces of blood stains and hair, with which the police will claim the murder was committed. Early records of the coroner's inquiry show that undergarments, not belonging to the husband, were found bloodstained under a bath, while the Japanese elevator boy testified that a mysterious man was taken down from the floor where the room is, in the early morning.

#### Says Was in Rupert.

The accused will attempt to prove an alibi. He says he was in Prince Rupert at the time of the murder. The police here are writing the Prince Rupert police to check up the statements.

The accused is six feet tall of fine appearance and his correct age is said to be 28 years. The police will try to prove that he put the wrench in a drawer and talked to his foreign compatriots about it afterwards.

### SMITHERS WILL GET LIQUOR STORE SOON

A. M. Johnson, Chairman of Liquor Control Board, Makes This Announcement.

A government liquor store is to be established in Smithers and a lease has been taken on the N. P. Moran Building at that place. Archie Johnson, chairman of the Liquor Control Board, has made an announcement to this effect, and a permanent site is now being sought. It is understood that the liquor will be on sale within a fortnight, but no vendor has yet been appointed.

### WOULD TRAIN UNIVERSITY MEN IN AIR

Board Submits Draft Plan to College Heads of Canada.

OTTAWA, July 29.—A plan has been drafted for the training of university cadets in the Canadian air force, by that providing a reserve of pilots and mechanics in case of war. The draft has been submitted by the Air Board to the heads of the universities in Canada for their consideration. A three months course for a year for three years is proposed.

### ORTHCLIFFE BADLY SNUBBED

Relations to Stay at Embassy and Attend Formal Dinner Is Withdrawn.

WASHINGTON, July 29.—Lord Northcliffe issued a statement yesterday that the invitation to stay at the British Embassy and also to dine formally there has since been withdrawn. He states that "knowing Lord Northcliffe's methods in India," he regrets Curzon of repeating his words here.

WASHINGTON, July 29.—Viscount Northcliffe publicly states the cancellation of the invitation to the embassy was Lord Northcliffe's doing and adds that he will meet the same people, and attend President Harding's dinner on Friday.

The Embassy has made no explanation but it is believed Sir Robert Giddes, British Ambassador here, could not enter Lord Northcliffe at the embassy while the latter is under ban of the Foreign Office.

### AMER VOLANDA SHORE NEIL'S HARBOR LIKELY TOTAL LOSS

WILSON HARBOR, N.S., July 29.—The steamer Volanda, ashore at Neil's Harbor Point en route from Sydney to Montreal, with a tonnage of coal, is expected to be a total loss.

### FIFTY MILLIONS FROM INCOMES

#### Large Tax Collections Cut Some Escaping Payment and Will Be Rounded Up.

OTTAWA, July 29.—The second installment of the income tax brought in about \$10,000,000 so far as compared with \$39,000,000 from the first installment, the great difference being from the fact that a great many paid the whole sum due at once. In Montreal, 79 per cent of the taxpayers did this. The total amount to be realized is expected will exceed \$50,000,000.

Extensive prosecutions all over the country are about to be instituted by the taxation branch of the Finance Department against those who have failed to make returns of income as provided by the Income Tax Act.

#### Concealment.

While the number making returns this year is very much greater than before, and with much less suspicion of fraud and concealment, there are thousands who have not complied with the Act at all, and evidently plan to escape the taxation which applies to all with income in excess of the statutory exemption. The department, having returns from employers, has a good idea of those who are assessable and it is not a difficult proposition to check and see if they have made returns. There are others who are not employed by companies or firms, but rather in business for themselves, or living in ease, and it is not hard to get at this class, either.

The prosecutions for false returns initiated last year have had a salutary effect, and have led to a greater accuracy. This year there are comparatively few cases on this score, but a great number who have ignored the law entirely. The penalty is \$25 for each day of default.

WINNIPEG, July 29.—The Ladysmith soccer team defeated Regina in the first of the series of football games to decide the western competitor for the Connaught Cup. The second game will be played tomorrow, and the team winning the greatest number of points in the aggregate of both games will be entitled to play the champions of the East on August 3 and 6 at Toronto for the Connaught Cup. ### BRITISH WIN YACHT RACES

#### International Race of Much Interest Run off at Isle of Wight Today.

HYDE, Isle of Wight, July 29.—Great Britain today won the International six meter yacht competition for the British-American Cup. The British yachts outscored the Americans in points. Yachting and sailing circles manifested intense interest in the event and preparations had been made for months. The greatest designing skill of both continents had been summoned in the building of the contenders.

### PROMOTER PILLSBURY TRYING TO ARRANGE, WITH JOHNNY KILBANE

NEW ORLEANS, July 29.—Promoter Pillsbury wired Johnny Kilbane, featherweight champion for a decision bout here next fall. Heaman is willing to meet Kilbane and is also prepared to again meet Lynch in a title bout, if the ex-champion so desires.

### Village Wiped Out by Forest Fires near Sydney, Nova Scotia

SYDNEY, N. S., July 29.—An enormous forest fire swept New Haven, a hamlet of 500 people, destroying everything and driving the inhabitants to take refuge in the sea in order to escape the ravages of the flames. Boats and steamers were at once busy picking up the people from the water, and it is believed all were saved. The heat was intense, and many of the people barely escaped with their lives.

### PRESIDENT IS INVITED

#### Consul A. E. Wakefield Commissioned on Behalf Canadian Club.

American Consul E. A. Wakefield who left on the Prince Rupert last night for a two month's holiday trip in the course of which he will visit Washington, D. C. and New York City, was commissioned by Judge Young, president of the Canadian Club to extend to President Harding and his party, an invitation to visit Prince Rupert and address the club in the course of the proposed trip to Alaska this fall.

Mr. Wakefield will deliver this invitation as well as the invitation from the city council personally to the president. It is felt that a visit here would well be worth the president's while as Prince Rupert is a strategic port in connection with Alaskan business.

### Each Dominion to Defend Own Coast Is Imperial Plan

LONDON, July 29.—While no official statement has been issued, it is understood the conference of Imperial Premiers reached an agreement in regard to a naval policy for the Empire. The conference endorsed the present system whereby each Dominion is responsible for the defense of its own coasts.

Australia at present has a small working navy, whereas Canada has none. Before the Laurier Government went out of power, tenders were called for the building of light cruisers and destroyers, but the Conservative Government at once cancelled the policy of its predecessors and proposed a scheme for contribution to the British navy, which was defeated in the Senate. Since then nothing has been done except to purchase two submarines, which have gone out of commission.

### ALL WOMEN WILL VOTE

#### Kissing the Book Gets Its First Joit as Established Institution.

OTTAWA, July 29.—At the next federal election women throughout all the provinces will be entitled to vote on the same basis and qualifications as men. At the last election some women voted but others were not allowed to do so.

Another change that has taken place is in the administration of oaths. Persons who object to kissing the book do not need to do so, but may affirm.

### WELL KNOWN HOCKEY PLAYER IS DIVORCED

#### Mrs. Sprague Cleghorn Gets Freedom and Substantial Alimony.

TORONTO, July 29.—A special dispatch to the Toronto Globe from New York says that Mrs. Evelyn Cleghorn has been granted a divorce and a \$100 a month alimony from her husband Sprague Cleghorn, of Ottawa, one of the best known hockey players of Canada.

### CHARGED THEFT AND ON HUNGER STRIKE IN OKALLA PRISON

KERRISDALE, July 29.—As a result of a hunger strike, Mrs. Patrick Reid, who is in Okalla prison is so weak the prison physician is not prepared to certify that she is able to appear in court to answer to theft charges. Another physician will examine her and report.

### HARVEST HELP TO GET FOUR DOLLARS A DAY

EDMONTON, July 29.—It has been arranged that the wages to be paid harvest hands will be four dollars a day. This was decided at a recent convention at Regina. Alberta farmers wanted to make the rate three dollars a day but they were overruled by the farmers from Saskatchewan and Manitoba, who stood out for the four dollar rate.

It is expected that there will be little difficulty in securing sufficient help at the price offered.

### DR. ROBINSON MUST LEAVE

#### Council of Public Instruction Declares Former Superintendent of Education Inefficient.

VICTORIA, July 29.—Dr. Alexander Robinson, formerly superintendent of Education for this province, and for the past year principal of the Victoria High School, was today declared by the Council of Public Instruction to be inefficient "owing to his inability and failure to perform efficiently the duties in respect to discipline and administration" in the Victoria High School.

This means that Dr. Robinson will have to leave, in accordance with the notification given him by the board of school trustees. At a recent meeting of the board he defied them and refused to leave.

### FABRICATION SAYS THE KING

LONDON, July 29.—Lloyd George in the House of Commons today read a statement authorized by King George declaring in words attributed to the King concerning the Government's Irish policy in a reported interview in the United States by Lord Northcliffe, who controls the London Times, as a "complete fabrication."

### FORMER RESIDENT QUEEN CHARLOTTES A NEW INVENTION

The current number of the British Columbia Lumber Journal tells about an invention by Capt. W. L. Barton, who formerly operated a small mill at Port Clements, Queen Charlotte Islands, cutting the first bit of aeroplane spruce in British Columbia and later enlisting in the forestry corps in France. The invention is of a high line locking carriage and operating drums. It is said to be almost foolproof and more rapid and economical than the present system. The engineer—who requires only a fraction of the power now in use—tightens and raises his high line, locks it in place and "balances" two lines operating the carriage by the use of only two levers, and controls the locking device of the car running on the high line by touching only one of the levers. The locking is effected by the application of an entirely new principle, so simple that spectators are amazed that it has escaped the attention of experts.

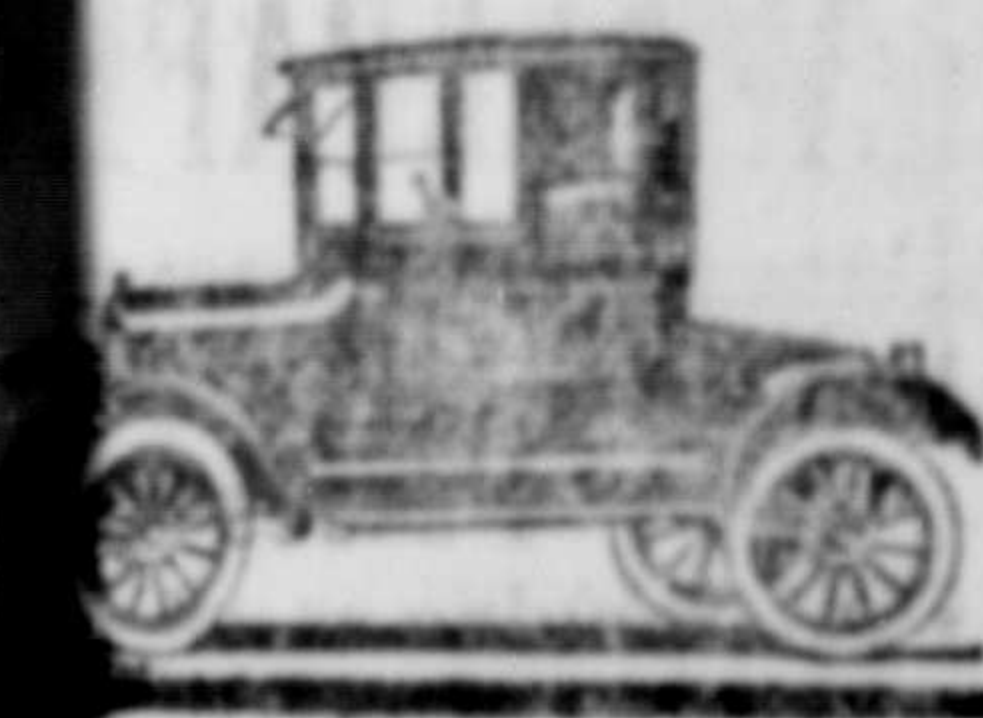

**BOMBS EXPLODE PRINTING SHOPS**

**Many People Fainted From Shock in Streets of Lisbon.**

LISBON, July 28.—The festivities of St. John's Eve were interrupted by the explosion of three dynamite bombs of enormous dimensions, placed by unknown hands in different parts of the city, outside three printing offices of which the printers are on strike.

The first explosion was so terrific that, although Lisbonites are becoming accustomed to bombs, real panic was produced among the merry-makers in the streets of Bairro Alto who, leaving their open air balls and bonfires, fled into the lower part of the town. Although there were no victims, the force of the explosion brought down the ceilings of the houses near which it burst. A dense and suffocating smoke filled the whole street and many people fainted.

Another bomb did less damage in the Rua dos Corrieiros, and the third, which was of the same powerful type as the first, burst near an open air ball, seriously wounding three persons. Some arrests were made of workmen, but no real clue has as yet been discovered.

Another case of attempt against the life of a judge of the Tribunal of Public Safety was also made about the same time, two shots being fired at him in the street without wounding him.
