Census Taking Has Started Today

REDUCTION AMERICAN RAILWAY WAGES WILL SAVE HUNDREDS OF MILLIONS

Canada Takes Stock Of Population with Much Work to Do

John Flewin, census commissioner for this district, returned to the city on yesterday's train from Terrace and is busy this morning at his office in the Stephens Block going over the final arrangements in connection with the starting out of the enumerators who commence their duties this morning.

The taking of the 1921 census is to be by far the most complete and exact attempt to gather statistics as to the population of this district. It has ever been undertaken and will tax the abilities of both the enumerators and the persons giving the information to the fullest extent. The assembling of this matter which is one of the most important undertakings the government is at present engaged in can be greatly facilitated if the public generally help all they can by giving to the enumerators cheerfully and succinctly, truthful and correct data in answer to the large array of questions put to them.

PROVINCE BOND ISSUE FAILED OF GOOD PRICE

Bidders Likely Called Based on Payment Interest in New York Funds.

VICTORIA, June 1.—Unsatisfactory bids have been submitted for a three million dollar provincial bond issue. Further bids will probably be called for based on the payment of interest in New York funds in the hope that better prices may be obtained. The details of the bids are unavailable as the figures were not disclosed.

MINE WAS SET OFF UNDER PLAYING BAND


Another Atrocious Perpetrated in Ireland—Those Responsible Escaped.

GETS \$3,000 FOR MAKING RAIN FALL IN CANADA.



We used to laugh at the Indian Medicine Men and rain-makers, but—perhaps there was more in it than we knew. Sections around Medicine Hat, Alberta, have been the scenes of many a drought in the summer time.

Tillers of the soil for years tried numerous ways to irrigate their lands. Charles M. Hatfield, known as the "Rainmaker," was heard of and sent for. He immediately set to work and built a tower twenty-four feet in height, supporting a tank fourteen feet square. His operations proved successful, and prairie farmers have asked Hatfield to turn off the moisture for a few days. As a result of a month's labor the "Rainmaker" received \$3,000 from Canadian farmers. The tank is the largest that he has yet built. His process is unknown. Big Drop in Pay Railwaymen Of States Today; Canadian Agreements to Expire Soon

CHICAGO, June 1.—Railway reductions in wages averaging twelve per cent come into effect today involving thirty-one labor organizations and one hundred and four railroads. The early saving of four hundred million dollars is to be effected. The reductions are from five to thirteen cents per hour.

MONTREAL, June 1.—Announcements regarding the opening of activities at the Canadian Railway Shops, Limited, accompanies notices of the Canadian Railway Board that the present wage agreements in Canada will expire with the present contracts. The renewal of the wage scale is to be discussed.

MAY REJECT PROPOSITION

Appears Lloyd George's Settlement of Coal Strike May Fall Through

LONDON, June 1.—General rejection by the miners of the premier's proposal towards settlement of the local coal strike is probable. The owners are also likely to reject the Union offer to drop wages, and consider the pool idea, if they agree to scale of eighty per cent over 1914 wages.

NEW YORK MAN NEW GOVERNOR

Appointment of Scott C. Bone Head Alaskan Government

SEATTLE, June 1.—Scott C. Bone, the New York newspaper man, known from coast to coast, has been appointed governor of Alaska, succeeding Thomas Riggs, who resigned recently.

MEMBERS OF TOWN HALL STAFF TO BE PROTECTED BY ACT

Duncan Municipality First to Take up Government's Superannuation Bill.

VICTORIA, June 1.—The first municipality in the province to come under the B. C. government's Superannuation Act is Duncan. The application was accepted yesterday. All the city hall staff will thus be provided for superannuation, being included under the agreement with the town of Duncan.

LOGGER FOUND DEAD SWANSON BAY WOODS

Men Named Skirven was Missing Since Sunday—Inquest To Be Held.

A logger named Skirven, who was missing in the woods near Swanson Bay since Sunday, was found dead yesterday by a search party that had been despatched to look for him. An inquest into the circumstances surrounding the death has been ordered.

LIBERALS OF OMINECA ASK CONVENTION

Think Federal Member Should be Chosen at Gathering in Smithers.

TELKWA, June 1.—Liberals of the Omineca district are very anxious that the forthcoming convention for the purpose of choosing a candidate to contest the federal riding shall be held at some central point in this valley, preferably at Smithers. They feel that from a political point of view they are being ignored. If the convention is to be held at Prince Rupert, only a few delegates will attend, but should it be held in this district, there would be a representative lot of farmers and businessmen of Omineca present. They claim it is their turn to have such a convention and they are not backward in asserting their rights.

There is nothing sectional in the attitude of the Bulkley Valley Liberals for they have elected a Prince Rupert man to represent them in the B. C. legislature and may do the same in the federal field.

J. C. Dunn of Edmonton is a prairie visitor lately arriving in Prince Rupert. He has nothing but praise to offer for the perfect weather he has been treated to since his arrival. The prairie country is very warm just now and the cool breezes of the Pacific prove most alluring.

May Fish Business This Year Shows Big Increase Over That of Last Year

Halibut arrivals at this port for the month of May just past show a great increase over last year's landings for the same month. The figures are: May, 1921, 2,629,000 pounds; May, 1920, 1,963,000 pounds; May, 1919, 2,193,000 pounds. The shortage was on throughout the entire month and 295,000 pounds of fish left the port after arriving here and finding unsatisfactory market conditions. At no time last month did the price reach 17.1c, the high price for May last year.

Besides the halibut landed here there were 76,700 pounds of salmon brought in and sold.

BREWERS MEET LIQUOR BOARD

Want to Deliver Direct to Consumers—Negotiations Delayed

VICTORIA, June 1.—The brewers of the province are seeking an interview with the Liquor Board to ascertain their standing, asking that the breweries be given the right to deliver direct to the purchasers. Negotiations are delayed on account of the absence of Commissioner Falconer.

OTTAWA WAS BEATEN BY ALL STARS

Governor-General Kicked Off and Distinguished Gathering Attended.

OTTAWA, June 1.—The Scottish all stars defeated the Ottawa select football team 7 to 0. The Duke of Devonshire, Governor-General, kicked off and the premier and many parliamentarians witnessed the game. The grounds were very wet.

GOWAN ACQUITTED AND RETURNED TO PRINCE RUPERT NOW

E. T. Gowan, who was arrested here last December at the instance of the state sheriff of Idaho charged with obtaining money on false pretences, has been acquitted and is back again in town. In connection with this case, the "Capital Evening News," of Boise, Idaho, in its issue of May 26 has the following: "Caldwell, May 25.—An instructed verdict of 'Not Guilty' was returned in the district court late Monday afternoon by the jury trying the case of the state against E. T. Gowan, charged with having obtained money under false pretences. Following the introduction of the evidence of the state, the attorneys for the defendant announced that the defence would not introduce evidence, but moved for an instructed verdict of acquittal, which was granted by the court."

OLD MAN WILL MARCH OTTAWA

Veteran Will Air Grievances with the Department of Re-Establishment.

VANCOUVER, June 1.—W. H. Coulter left here yesterday afternoon on a march to Ottawa. He is an army veteran and joined up at the age of 52 and is going to the capital to air his grievances with the officials. He intends walking the entire distance.

Refitting of Prince Rupert
 By Capt. C. H. Nicholson

The refitting of the steamer Prince Rupert was an undertaking of a major character calling for the greatest artistic taste and the highest class of workmanship.
 It can be readily imagined, particularly by shipping men, what the condition of the vessel was after being submerged for nearly three months in salt water and directly in line of the discharge of waste products of a large industrial plant in which large quantities of acids are used. Suffice it to say that the entire wood work of the ship including passenger accommodation, freight holds and cold storage chambers as well as all laid decks had to be completely torn out so that the bare steel was exposed. This was carefully wire brushed or scaled as conditions warranted and all surfaces well coated with red lead before the process of reconstruction could begin.
Great Hull Damage.
 The hull damage of the ship was more extensive than was first thought. Thirteen plates were renewed and several others faired in place with the attendant work necessary on frames, floors, fore and aft stringer bars, breast hooks, bulkheads and tank margin plates as the result of the vessel's contact with the rocky beach. In addition, resulting from pressure due to her submersion, a serious damage occurred to the tanks. The main deck plating and beams, starboard side, were considerably set down and engine, boiler, and fan room and dynamo air shaft casings were also badly buckled and had to be slackened up, faired and refastened as before.
 The engines and boilers required a vast amount of work. All cylinders, steam chests, pumps, evaporators and filters were opened up, thoroughly cleaned and put in perfect working order, making such renewals as were found necessary. The electric light plant had to be taken down and all put in first class condition. Boilers were opened up, sealed, strained seams electrically welded and new tubes supplied as needed and finally subjected to the rigid tests set by the surveyors.
 All this, however, was straight repair work such as any shipyard is accustomed to. The carpenter and joiner work with the numerous other trades required in the refitting of the vessel was another matter. Carefully selected and thoroughly seasoned materials were required.
Woodwork Renewed.
 Some of the heavy and solid hardwood fittings not too badly damaged were carefully kiln dried, thoroughly reconditioned and after careful inspection, if found perfect, were allowed to be used again. However, almost the entire woodwork of the ship was renewed.
 The electric wiring, water and sewerage systems were renewed as required. The difficulties of these features of the work will be realized when it is known that there are many miles of piping and wiring on a ship of the class of the Prince Rupert.
As Good As New.
 The vessel re-enters the service as complete and as well fitted as it is possible to make her and thoroughly capable of maintaining the high standard of service which characterizes the operation of the vessels of this fleet.

Will Tariff Bill Benefit United States?
 The passing of the United States emergency tariff bill which took effect last Saturday, placing heavy duties on Canadian wheat, wheat flour, flax seed, cattle, sheep, wool, potatoes and meats, has already led to retaliatory steps by Canada in the placing of similar excises by the Dominion on the same commodities entering from the States. The indications are that there may be a war of embargoes resulting out of the United States' action which will have a serious effect on the commercial exchange and trade relations of the two countries. But the United States will likely be the greater sufferer for it is maintained by even American authorities that the United States is in far greater need of Canada's raw materials than of her markets. The loss of imports to the United States by the new tariff bill may involve a greater injury to consumers in the United States than even the loss of the export trade to Canada which amounts to approximately one billion dollars annually.

Trade Figures Show Canada's Advantage.
 During the debate on the tariff bill at Washington, before its enactment, statistics showing exports and imports between United States and Canada were put into the Congressional records and a study of these reveals clearly how the tides of trade between the two countries are flowing. In 1918 the United States shipped more wheat to Canada than it imported but in the years 1919 and 1920 the importations from Canada exceeded the exportations. As to wheat flour, the figures show that in 1918 the movement was towards Canada, but in 1919 and 1920 Canada exported more flour than she imported from the United States. In cattle, flax seed and potatoes Canada sells more to the United States than she buys there. In wool the United States in 1920 shipped more to Canada than she bought from her, although in 1918 and 1919 she had this trade also in her favor. In beef and mutton the trade balance is in Canada's favor but in fresh pork, bacon and hams she buys more than she sells. Taken as a whole the Canadian exports are greater than the imports to the States and the benefit that the latter country may gain from his new tariff is very doubtful especially in view of the fact that Canada has already started retaliatory measures.

Early Settlement of Coal Strike Possible.
 The coal miners of Great Britain have now been on strike for about two months. How the industry of the homeland has weathered the situation as well as it has seems remarkable but it cannot continue much longer. Of course, industries have been crippled to a certain extent and production and manufacturing has been curtailed to the very minimum. It is fortunate for Britain that there was a reserve stock for it would have been impossible to keep going had there not been. It is reasonable to expect that a settlement may soon be reached for both sides must be weakening. While the mines remain inactive they are day by day becoming in worse condition for reopening and the job of pulling them on a productive basis again will be a tremendous one. Thus the owners must want to see them going once more at as early a date as possible. On the other hand, the miners must be feeling the pinch of two months without income and in thousands of cases there must be great privation. This period of idleness surely has brought about a greater conciliatory spirit on either side and there will doubtless be some compromise reached before many days have passed.

BRINGING UP FATHER



By George McManus

Among the Farmers of Telkwa District,
By the Editor.

TELKWA, June 4.—The country around here looks very fine. Everything is growing and everybody is happy. Among the places we visited was the famous Round Lake district. The farms slope down to the edge of the water and give a wonderful effect of pastoral beauty.

There is a school not far from the lake and one of the features of the landscape is a new community hall being erected by the ladies community association. It is a picturesque one-story building with appropriate rooms in addition to the main hall. When completed it will have cost in the neighborhood of \$3,000.

Among the people we called on was Roy Williams, whose beautiful home right on the lake shore is well known. He is an enthusiastic booster for the country and says most of the farmers are doing well. Another rancher in the neighborhood, James Thompson, was seen. He has a fine house, a good farm, good looking cows, and is a man of many activities. He is able to turn his hand to anything from blacksmithing or butchering to running a thrashing outfit. All the farmers in this neighborhood are growing wheat and say they prefer growing it to barley, even though barley may be a surer crop.

Sheep Farming.

Seven farmers of the neighborhood keep sheep and one of the foremost of these is F. M. Dockrill. He keeps about fifty ewes, Suffolk grades, and is well satisfied with sheep raising as a business. He also has about forty head of Shorthorn cattle but is intending to go into dairying instead of raising beef cattle. Like most of the farmers we met, he believes dairying is the industry of the future for the Bulkley valley.

Mr. Dockrill was the first farmer we met who mentioned taxes. He is of opinion that it is very unfair to levy a personal property tax on farmers. He admitted that few farmers paid Dominion income tax owing to the large number of exemptions allowed, but objected to a man who happened to be progressive being taxed for being so.

Experimental Farm.

Mr. Dockrill was very strongly in favor of the establishment of an experimental farm in this district. He says it would be a distinct advantage to have various grains, fruits and other farm products tried out at the government farm, especially when it is so evident that everything is different here from any other part of the country. The valley is fertile, the climate is good, but it is necessary to farm in a manner suited to the particular soil and climate. The difficulties can be overcome by experience, but experiments are costly and an expert is better able to overcome difficulties than an ordinary farmer. He should discover the reason for his failures.

Loyal to District.

All the farmers in the district, with whom we talked, expressed the opinion that if they were starting over again they would still do so in the Bulkley Valley. They like the life and are keen and progressive. They claim there is no better place in British Columbia and many of them are willing to stake the district against anything in Canada.

Many of the people in and around Telkwa and Smithers own

automobiles and in the summer time drive to town or to see their neighbors, the car lessening the long distances and adding zest to life. What is needed is better roads. Some few of the roads are good, but many are poor and some are even dangerous. They are gradually being improved, thanks to the efforts of the local member of the legislature, and in a few years should be as good as anywhere.

Long Distances.

One of the difficulties in regard to the making of roads and the building of schools is the large extent of land held by one man. It is not fair to build miles of road to convenience one or two farmers such as is necessary when men own almost a thousand acres of land. The extent of their holdings militate against their getting the conveniences of modern civilization.

POPULAR CLERGYMAN LEAVES ON FRIDAY

Rev. T. H. Nuttall has Year's Leave of Absence, but is Undecided as to Future

Rev. T. H. Nuttall leaves on the business Mary on Friday for the south and after visiting in Vancouver and Victoria for a few weeks will proceed with Mrs. Nuttall and family to England.

Mr. Nuttall has a year's leave of absence from the duties of the Methodist Church here, but is, as yet, undecided what he will do when that year is up. He may take charge of a public school in the Old Country, may enter the ministry again there or may possibly return to Western Canada.

Mr. and Mrs. Nuttall, during their residence in Prince Rupert and Ansox have become exceedingly popular and their many friends hope that the call of Western Canada will prove too strong for resistance and that they will be back again at the end of the year. In any event best wishes will follow them whatever they decide to do.

TELKWA PEOPLE TRYING TO ARRANGE EXCURSION TRAIN

TELKWA, June 4.—The management of the Telkwa Barbecue are trying to arrange for a special excursion train from Prince Rupert for that occasion on Labor Day and they look for a big delegation to visit them. They think it might be possible to hold the Board of Trade excursion at the same time, so that the members of the board would meet all the farmers and businessmen of the district while they are gathered here.

The coming summer will witness a great number of international sport contests, in several of which Canadian sportsmen will take a prominent part. Rivalry of nations will be fostered in half a dozen lines of sport and the greatest season of international competition ever recorded is looked forward to. Canadians will be especially interested in the tennis, bowling, football, golf, rowing and polo in which they will take part in international contests.

In the Davis Cup tennis championship tournaments, Canada has been drawn against Australia in the opening round. The matches between the two Dominions are scheduled to take place on the courts of the Toronto Lawn Tennis Club on July 23, 25 and 26. The Australian team includes the veteran players, Anderson, Hawkes, Peach and Todd.

Scottish, Irish and English bowlers will visit Canada during August. The team will be composed of twenty-four players and will be the first of its kind to visit this country since 1910.
