PLAN FOR NEW PULP PLANT AT KITIMAAT ARM FLYING BOATS WILL SAIL BETWEEN VANCOUVER AND RUPERT IN SPRING

Another Big Pulp Company Incorporated in Province

Firm headed by former Lieutenant Governor of Manitoba establishes with capitalization of Fifteen Million Dollars

Plant at Kitimaat Arm Is Among Its Projects

Work to be started now on Pulp Mill at Harrison River the first of its plants

VANCOUVER, January 4.—(By Canadian Press)—With a capitalization of \$15,000,000 the Harrison Lumber and Pulp Co. has been granted provincial registration. The company is headed by Lieut.-Col. Sir Douglas C. Cameron, former lieutenant-governor of Manitoba and one of that province's most prominent lumbermen and financiers.

Work will be started on a new pulp mill at Harrison River. It is also proposed to construct a pulp mill and possibly a paper mill on Kitimaat Arm. At the present time surveys are going on at Kitimaat Arm for pulp mill sites and applications are being made for water rights.

Kirk Retires from Mayoralty Contest

In withdrawing says will leave Gale to adjust civic crisis he has caused through inefficiency

VANCOUVER, January 4.—Ex-Alderman Thomas H. Kirk today withdrew from the mayoralty field as an opponent to Mayor R. H. Gale. Mr. Kirk has decided after having announced himself as a candidate to leave Mayor Gale the job of extricating himself and adjusting the civic financial crisis which he alleges the present mayor has created through his own inefficiency.

Ex-Mayor Louis D. Taylor and Mayor Gale appeared to be the only candidates who will be nominated on Thursday for the chief magistracy. Mr. Taylor is conducting an energetic campaign, appealing to the workers through the unemployment conditions.

RUPERT LEAVES DOCK AND ATLAS BEING TAKEN IN

Wrecked G. T. P. Boat Now at Company Wharf—Atlas Will be Surveyed.

The wrecked steamer Prince Rupert proceeded from the Hays Cove dry dock at 1 o'clock this afternoon to the Grand Trunk Pacific wharf where she is now moored. Tomorrow, it is expected, the tenders for her repairs will be opened and the contract let. During her stay on the pontoons the damage as a result of her wreck was surveyed and officers of the company also were engaged in making temporary repairs to her hull and engines to make her more seaworthy.

This afternoon the tanker Atlas is to be lifted onto the pontoons and her damage will also be inspected by Captain Logan, who is representing the underwriters and who has held the vessel here until he can give her orders to proceed or have temporary repairs effected here, his decision resting on the outcome of his inspection today.

TERRIBLE LOSS LIFE IN WRECK SPANISH SHIP

Santa Isabel Driven Ashore in Tremendous Storm and 214 Lives Lost

MADRID, Jan. 4 (Canadian Press).—When the Spanish steamer Santa Isabel wrecked near Villa Garcia on Saturday night 214 persons lost their lives. Fifty-six were saved, but many of them were injured by immersion in the waters of the Atlantic and by being dashed on the shore. Many bodies have been washed ashore. The ship was driven on the rocks in a tremendous storm.

GRAND FORKS RESULT IS IN DISPUTE NOW

Stated Improperly Marked Ballots would Give Conservative Small Majority

GRAND FORKS, Jan. 4 (Canadian Press).—A judicial recount of election ballots in this constituency will commence next Monday. Thirty out of fifty rejected ballots are in dispute, twenty-five of these being marked for John McKie, the Conservative, who was defeated in the final count by E. C. Henniger by a majority of nine. The crosses on these ballots were placed immediately after the name instead of the proper space. If they are declared valid McKie will be elected by a small majority.

Hydroplanes coming to Rupert in Spring

With arrival of hangar material in Vancouver chief obstacle Northern Flights eliminated

VANCOUVER, January 4.—After considerable delay steel has arrived here at the air board station which will be used for new large hangars to house large F-3 flying boats waiting to be rigged for the first long distance flight to Prince Rupert early in the spring.

The chief obstacle to the commencement of flights to the north will be removed with the arrival of the hangar material.

Shockley Gets Contract for Morse Creek Bridge

His Tender for \$16,157 is lowest of six received by City Council—Start within Ten Days

The contract for the construction of the Morse Creek bridge was awarded by the city council last night to E. H. Shockley, his tender, \$16,157, being the lowest of the six bids received. This action was taken by resolution of Aldermen Kerr and Currie after the tender had been examined and found in order. According to the terms of the contract, work will commence inside of ten days or the deposit of \$1,000 accompanying the tender will be forfeited.

As an alternate proposition the latter company offered to do the work on a cost plus 10 per cent basis, any difference under the \$21,645 to be shared evenly between the city and the contractor.

The tender of McKinnon & Strome provided for all fir construction, the others being for fir and hemlock as specified.

Assessment Roll Is Brought Down

Marks Expiration of G. T. P. Assessment Agreement—37 per cent. Reduction General Taxation

Prince Rupert's assessment roll for the year 1921 has been completed by City Engineer F. S. Clements, assessor, and last night a summary of it was presented to the council by the city clerk. The new roll shows that there is a total of taxable property in the city amounting to \$10,413,912.50, which is an increase over last year's total of \$699,815. The reason for the increased valuation is that four and a half million of railway property is assessed this year, the taxation agreement between the city and the railway company having expired on December 31, 1920. There will be a reduction of 37 per cent in general assessment this year.

Important Assessment.

Ald. Perry inquired if the roll had been signed by the committee of two appointed by the city council to assist the city engineer in bringing it down. He was informed by City Clerk Woods that this had not been done, for when the roll had been completed one of these men had been out of town and the other did not care to sign without him. Ald. Perry stated that he would have liked to have seen the roll signed by this committee for it would be one of the most important ones in the history of the city with the railway company status now changed. Acting Mayor Rochester pointed out that the city assessor was responsible anyway and all this committee could do would be to strengthen his hand. All questions would be brought up at the court of revision and this would be where final adjustments would be made. He had not known, however, that the committee had not acted.

On motion of Alderman Perry, seconded by Alderman Currie, the report is to be received and filed.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 4.—A new policy for the spreading of terror abroad has been decided upon by the Russian soviet government, say official advices from Moscow received today by the government.

Lenine is quoted as saying to commune committees in Europe: "It is absolutely indispensable that the enemy bourgeoisie be kept engaged with internal troubles in order that they cannot injure soviet Russia. Great strokes should be organized throughout the world to keep them busy with their own troubles."

A recommendation by the health committee that the resolution of the Anti-Tubercular Society for better inspection of beef for human consumption be made endorsed was adopted by the city council last evening.

Upon the request of L. W. Palmore representing the six Chinese charged with offences under the drug act in the police court this morning, the cases were adjourned until Friday morning, bail standing at the same amount.

The report of Fire Chief D. H. McDonald for the months of November and December submitted to the city council last evening showed two fire alarms for November and none in December, there being no damage. Hydrants and alarm boxes had been inspected and were in good shape. The salaries for the two months totalled \$2,160.45 and expenses were \$2,446.53.

The funeral of the late Joseph Genoni, who died at Kamloops last Wednesday, took place on Friday at Victoria. The late Mr. Genoni was known in Prince Rupert for he was engaged as breman and oiler on the Grand Trunk steamers for several seasons. Among the pallbearers at the funeral were Frank Balagno and Peter Balagno, brothers of Charles Balagno of Prince George.

At the city council meeting last evening Alderman Perry called to the attention of the health committee the dirty condition of some of the city's sidewalks. The matter is to be looked into and the proper officials apprised by the city engineer. It appears that some of the storekeepers are not living up to the rule of keeping the sidewalks in front of their places cleaned off.

Several representatives of the Vancouver creditors of the Prince Rupert Dry Dock and Engineering Co. are expected to arrive in the city on the Prince George tomorrow, to attend a creditors' meeting on Thursday, in accordance with legal procedure upon the company going into liquidation. Considerable importance will attach to it. The principal local creditors are represented by L. W. Patmore, of Patmore & Fulton.

UNEMPLOYMENT QUESTION UP

Central Labor Council Asked the City Council for Relief Measures.

A delegation from the Central Labor Council consisting of C. M. Smith, James Caskie, W. E. Dickson and W. Grant appeared at the city council meeting last night to lay before that body the condition of unemployment in the city and solicit aid towards giving relief for needy cases. The result is that thirty men are to be given employment at once for two days a week on street repairs on Sixth Avenue and the pipe line sidewalk and the council expressed the hope that with the Section 2 bridge under construction and the street surfacing scheme being carried out there may be further employment. A list of names of those especially in need is to be submitted by the council to the city engineer.

Between 200 and 400. The delegation told the council that there were anywhere between two hundred and four hundred unemployed in the city and of this number there were at least fifty who were in straitened circumstances. Many of these did not like to apply to the police and it would be of great assistance if the city could offer some work. If something was not forthcoming for some of these men the city would find itself up against sending some of them south in charge of constables for they would have to help themselves. As the winter advances the condition would not improve.

Alderman Kerr, of the Board of Works, explained that about ten men could be handled by the city and at the rate of two days a week this would give employment to thirty men. This would be on street repair work. The water-works department was filled up but with the work of the Section 2 bridge and the street surfacing under way there would be further employment.

Tarvia Surfacing.
In regard to the tarvia scheme Ald. Perry was told that a bylaw would be brought in by the council next week. As yet no reply had been received from the provincial government in regard to the advance of \$50,000 for public works that has been requested from the government's relief fund.

"SCOTTY" MORRISON HERE FROM CARCROSS
