Looks for Settlement Marine Strike

ROTSKY SERIOUSLY ILL WHILE SOVIET REGIME IS AGAIN THREATENED

Officially Announced That Government Liquor Control Will Be Effective June 15

Victoria, May 19.—Government control of the liquor business will come into effect on June 15, according to the official announcement of the Liquor Board this morning.

The increase of taxation on liquor import consequent upon recent changes in the tariff announced last week at Ottawa was absorbed partly by the board and partly by the consumers on a fifty-fifty basis. The new tax will mean an additional cost of 65 per bottle.

Secretary of Labor is Empowered to Settle the Big U.S. Seamen's Strike

WASHINGTON, May 19.—Representatives of the seamen and marine engineers have empowered Secretary of Labor Davis to settle the marine strike for them with the ship owners. The Shipping Board understands that the basis of the agreement Mr. Davis will propose is a reduction of fifteen per cent. He also asks for changes in regard to overtime and working conditions which will bring the actual reduction of from ten to twenty per cent.

Cooks and stewards were not represented at the conference with Mr. Davis.

STYLIES CONTINUE IN OLD IRELAND

and Ambushes Still Take Toll of Killed and Wounded.

ICE INSPECTOR WAS ATTACKED IN A CHURCH

EDINBURGH, May 19.—Hostilities between the crown forces and the Irish factions in Ireland are still going on and each day sees its toll of dead and wounded in the struggle.

A person was killed yesterday in a riot which followed a meeting of the Unionists in Belfast.

Police Inspector Walsh, attacked by three men in a local church in that city and seriously wounded. As a result eight men have been arrested.

County Waterford thirteen, surprised by the military, surrendered without a struggle. Dick Bunny, a former soldier, taken from his home and killed. During an attack on a lorry one civilian lost his life.

SASKATCHEWAN JUDGE DIED THIS MORNING

Mr. Justice Elwood Passed Away at Regina After Long Illness

REGINA, May 19.—Mr. Justice E. L. Elwood, of the Saskatchewan court of appeals, died this morning after a long illness.

He was born in Gooderich, Ontario, in 1868.

ADMIRAL WATSON CLEARS FROM SEATTLE BOUND FOR ALASKA

SEATTLE, May 19.—The steamer Admiral Watson, the second steamer to sail from here for Alaska since the marine tie-up, cleared this morning with a crew signed on under the new shipping board wage scale.

ROTARY CLUB GETS CHARTER

Two Visitors at Luncheon Held Today—Message from Victoria.

Capt. Newcombe of D. G. S. Malaspina and Newton F. Pullen of Victoria were guests today at the Rotary Club luncheon held in the St. Regis Cafe club room upstairs.

Capt. Newcombe congratulated the club on its formation and spoke appreciatively of the work of Rotary clubs generally. He felt sure the club would be an influence for good here.

Newton Pullen said he came from the south into whose maw went the money which was paid out here and he came with fear and trembling. He said he was a member of the Gyro Club recently formed in Victoria, he attended the meeting of the Kiwanis Club every week, and he had also attended some of the meetings of the Rotary Club and these were powerful forces in a community.

One stood for "service before self," the motto of another was "We Build" and the third stood for "Friendship." He looked forward to the time when service and not self would be the guiding principle in men's lives and he wished them every success.

At the commencement of the meeting the secretary read a letter from the District Governor stating that the local charter had been granted.

The vote on the budget is expected tonight.

A letter from the secretary of the Victoria Gyro Club was read as follows:

"At its luncheon held on Monday, May 9, the Victoria Gyro Club unanimously passed and instructed Gyro Dick Pullen to personally deliver the following resolution:

"The Gyro Club of Victoria cordially greets the Rotary Club of Prince Rupert. We fully realize that both new organizations have a responsible work in an immense field, that our aims are identical. Gyro is but a child of Rotary, aiding in the unifying of a world to the end that friendliness, in its highest interpretation of mutual assistance, shall become more widespread."

President Duby said the District Governor would be here in the near future to officially install the officers and start the club going. They should put on an entertainment for the occasion so he appointed the committee.

CITY OFFICIALS VISIT POWER BASE

Mayor, Aldermen and Superintendent Have Gone to Thulme River.

Mayor H. B. Rochester, Aldermen S. E. Parker and John Doherty and T. C. Duncan, superintendent of utilities, have gone to Thulme River to inspect the dam site and transmission line on the power project that is now being considered for the city with that river as the base. They will be gone a couple of days.

Another Revolution Threatening Soviet Government Russia

RIGA, May 19.—Leon Trotsky is reported to be seriously ill with cancer.

Premier Lenin is seeking permission to proceed to London to continue trade negotiations.

Many strikes have made conditions bad in Moscow where the workers demand increased bread rations. Five hundred people have been arrested in connection with the disturbances but the strikers are demanding their release and are threatening violence.

Omsk, Siberia, is reported captured by revolutionaries numbering 40,000 who are now marching on Tomsk. Part of the Soviet garrisons have joined the revolutionaries.

Not on Trade Mission.

STOCKHOLM, May 19.—The report that Lenin, the Russian Bolshevik premier, intends to go to London to negotiate with the British government regarding trade relations are denied by Leonid Krassin, the Bolshevik minister of trade.

Russia has placed orders in England amounting to five million pounds and British ships are now loading in Petrograd, the minister further declared.

LIVED AT CHILLIWACK SIXTY-THREE YEARS

CHILLIWACK, May 19.—Isaac Kipp, the first white man to locate in the Chilliwack valley, is dead here at the age of 82 years. He was born at Woodstock, Ont., and came here 63 years ago.

INDEPENDENT STATE

LONDON, May 19.—The War correspondents of the London Times suggests an independent state for Upper Silesia as the only solution of the question.

NEW LIGHTHOUSE TENDER EXPECTED TO ARRIVE TODAY

Birnie, Capt. Ormiston, was at Alert Bay Bound North on Saturday.

The auxiliary lighthouse tender Birnie, Captain H. A. Ormiston, is expected to arrive at the Digby Island marine station this afternoon from Victoria to take up her work in the northern waters supplementing the Newington on smaller jobs where it is not necessary for the steamer to go. The Birnie was at Alert Bay last Saturday on her way north. She is a 75-foot gasoline launch.

CHIEF JUSTICE WHITE DIES AT WASHINGTON

WASHINGTON, May 19.—Chief Justice White died here this morning early. He had held the position of chief justice since 1910.

IMITATION HAYSEEDS HAD GAY TIME LAST NIGHT AT BIG DANCE AND TOMBOLA

The big Hayseed Dance given by the Agricultural Association last night in the Exhibition Hall was a great success in every way. Everyone had a great time and there was much mirth and hilarity. As a result of the affair the total gross receipts were over \$1,100 and the net proceeds towards the improvements of the fair building and grounds will be in the neighborhood of \$800 or \$900. The association tenders its thanks to the generous donors and the committees who worked so hard towards making the event the success that it was.

The affair started with the parade of the G.W.V.A. band from down town and soon after its arrival at the hall the celebration commenced and continued till the early hours of the morning. The band provided very creditable music and many took the floor.

GEDDES FAVERS DISARMAMENT

Denies Report that Britain and Japan are Allied Against the United States.

CHICAGO, May 19.—Sir Alexander Geddes denies the rumor that England and Japan are allied against American peace. Geddes favors a reduction of armaments but says that one nation could not disarm alone. He urged the formation of an international agreement between the businessmen of the United States and Great Britain.

POLISH REBELS DEMOBILIZING

Korfanty Orders Men to Surrender Arms and Go Back to Work

LONDON, May 19.—Polish consul Beuthen has notified the interallied commission that Korfanty has declared a cessation of hostilities in the Silesian revolution and has ordered a surrender of arms and resumption of work.

The consul declares ten thousand men have been demobilized already.

JAMES CARRUTHERS LEFT FOR HALIBUT BANKS THIS MORNING

The fishing steamer James Carruthers left this morning for the halibut banks with Captain Parsons and a crew of 31 men including eighteen fishermen.

The Carruthers is one of three fishing steamers operated by the Canadian Fish & Cold Storage Company, each with a capacity of 170,000 lbs. of fish. On one memorable occasion one of them brought in 200,000 lbs. of black cod.

On this trip the boat will catch halibut and black cod, all other fish taken on the banks being thrown back into the water. In taking black cod, it is the custom to fish rather deeper than for halibut.

The Andrew Kelly and the G. E. Foster will leave one next week and the other the week following, the former skippers being in charge.

The cold storage reports a small quantity of salmon coming in but the prices are tending downwards, from 12 to 14 cents being paid for red sprats.

Red Cross is
Carrying On.

Many people wonder why the Red Cross did not stop its work when the war ended. That was what it did after the South African War and it was expected to do the same after the Great War. But the Red Cross was not to be allowed to stop. It was destined to take on the new obligations of a peace-time program, even before it had completed its war work.

Shocking Facts
Revealed by War.

The war had made vividly clear some things which a quarter of a century of peace might not have revealed with so much impressiveness. The war had given us a revelation, for it may fittingly be called a revelation of the relative worth and ability of the ordinary man and woman. But the war had revealed also the shockingly poor physical condition of a great proportion of the men of the Empire. Think of the significance of this: During the last year of war, from the 1st of November, 1917, to 31st October, 1918, the number of men called up to the army in Great Britain was 2,425,184. A summary of the results of the medical examination of them shows the following facts: Of every nine men, three were fit and healthy, two were in infirm health, three might be described as physical wrecks, and one as a chronic invalid, with a precarious hold on life. Since that was the physical condition of the men at their most vigorous age, what would be the condition of health among the women and children? In other countries the examination of the men called to the colors revealed conditions somewhat similar. In Canada, of the 361,605 draftees under the Military Service Act, the medical examination found 181,229 of them, or about one half, physically unfit for full service in the field. It is not reported that the disabilities were the result of active disease; their condition was the consequence of poor nutrition, neglect of personal hygiene and unsanitary conditions of working and living.

It was inevitable that serious consideration should be given to such an alarming state of affairs in respect to health and that action should be taken for the purpose of remedying it as soon and as far as possible. In consequence soon after the armistice in 1918, with the approval and endorsement of the governments of the five Great Powers (Great Britain, France, Italy, Japan and the United States) a committee of their Red Cross Societies was constituted "to formulate and to propose to the Red Cross Societies of the world an extended program of Red Cross activities in the interest of humanity."

World Authorities
Discuss Health.

That committee of five called a conference of medical and public health experts who met at Cannes, France, in April, 1919. The conference is regarded as one of the most remarkable gatherings of authorities on questions of health ever held. It included many of the foremost men of America, France, England, Italy and Japan. Out of the deliberations of the conference came thirteen highly significant resolutions, which are now embodied in the peace time program of the Red Cross. Principal among these are the movements to promote child welfare, secure public health legislation, establish public health laboratories and supply public health nurses.

Canada Does Part
In Great Work.

Thus it came about that Canada, as one of the signatories of the peace treaty, agreed to encourage and promote the establishment of its Red Cross Society with a peace-time program. An amendment to the act of incorporation was granted by parliament in 1919 and in it the new and additional purpose of the Canadian Red Cross Society is set forth as follows:

"In time of peace or war to carry on and assist in work for the improvement of health, the prevention of disease and the mitigation of suffering throughout the world."

Osborne Scott, C. N. R. General
Passenger Agent, Says Busy
Tourist Season Coming.

A considerable passenger movement north from Washington and Oregon on the Grand Trunk steamers is expected this summer by Osborne Scott, general passenger agent, who passed through the city yesterday en route for Jasper Park.

Mr. Scott stated that the teachers of the northwestern states are now receiving more remuneration than formerly and are, therefore, in a better position to travel. He said that many of them would make the famous "inside passage" trip this season when their vacations are on.

During the years of the war they were too busy to travel. The teachers, Mr. Scott stated, would naturally come up to Prince Rupert and then go east to Edmonton and other prairie cities.

The reopening of the Massett mill and other developments in the north will further aid in swelling the passenger traffic on the G. T. P. boats.

DRILLING OUTFITS
FOR OIL COUNTRY

Machinery Also Going North for
River and Lake Vessels

EDMONTON, May 18.—Several oil drilling outfits are on their way into the north country. An outfit is being installed by the Alcan Oil Corporation on the Athabasca sand belt near McKay a few miles back from the river.

Another outfit is being installed by J. D. Tate for a Montreal syndicate at Pine Point on Great Slave Lake. York boats are being used to carry the machinery and supplies to their destinations.

Machinery is being installed in a number of river and lake boats which will be used to convey passengers and supplies to the various oilfields of the north.




we were to call the claims in his dream?" asked Evindson.

"It was the Dolly Varden," replied one of them. Accordingly all six claims were given the name "Dolly Varden" and the prophecy in the dream was fulfilled.

It is Mr. Evindson himself who has spoiled a good mystery story with a probable explanation.
