VON GRONAU DELAYED BY ENGINE TROUBLE ON FLIGHT

Phantom Steamer Near Point Barrow Thought To Have Men Aboard

Abandoned Baychimo Has Disappeared and 25 Eskimos Who Went to Board Her Are Also Missing, Probably With Her

POINT BARROW, Aug. 25.—The crew of 25 Eskimos who went out to board the abandoned Hudson Bay steamer Baychimo early in the week are still missing and shifting ice has again carried the vessel out of sight.

Two other parties searching for them sent back word that they had not found the ship. It was last seen Tuesday morning. At that time the Baychimo was 15 miles west of here and was drifting southwest at about three miles an hour.

Funeral of Miss Ethel Gilliland

Sister of High School Principal at Prince Rupert Was Drowned at Shawnigan Lake

With hundreds of sorrowing friends unable to obtain admittance to the edifice, which was packed to the doors, a moving demonstration of the popular sympathy for the bereaved families was in evidence at the double funeral yesterday of Ethel Marjorie Gilliland and Wilfred Irvine Francis, who lost their lives in a speed boat tragedy at Shawnigan Lake on Tuesday, August 9, says the Victoria Times.

The impressive service was held in the Metropolitan United Church at 2 o'clock, Rev. W. J. Sipprell, Rev. Canon A. E. de L. Nunnis and Rev. F. Church officiating.

The two caskets, covered with lovely flowers, lay side by side in the chancel, and were later conveyed to Royal Oak Burial Park, where interment was made. So many were the floral tributes that four additional cars were required for their conveyance, and many sympathizing friends joined the sad cortege out to the cemetery, all anxious to pay their final tribute of respect to the young victims.

Former school friends of the deceased boy and girl acted as pallbearers.

Miss Gilliland was a sister of Harry Gilliland, principal of Prince Rupert High School.

MILL BURNS IN INTERIOR

Fifty Thousand Dollar Fire at Penny Near Prince George Yesterday

PRINCE GEORGE, Aug. 25.—A mill valued at \$50,000 and 9,000,000 feet of lumber in the yards of the Red Mountain Lumber Company at Penny, were totally destroyed by fire yesterday.

Insurance was carried to about sixty percent of the total value.

Prominent Winnipeg Lawyer and Chancellor of Church of England Accused of Taking Varsity Funds

John A. Machray Charged With Theft of \$47,451 From Educational Institution and is Out on \$50,000 Bail—Too Ill to Appear in Court

WINNIPEG, Aug. 25.—John A. Machray, K.C., prominent in religious and educational circles in Western Canada, chairman of the board of governors of the University of Manitoba, was placed under arrest here today and charged with the theft of \$47,451 of the university funds. Arrested at his home Mr. Machray did not appear in court.

His physician told the magistrate, R. M. Noble, that Mr. Machray was seriously ill with ulcerated stomach. The magistrate remanded the case to September 1 and set bail for the appearance of Machray in the amount of \$50,000. The physician said it would be dangerous to move Machray for several days.

Prominent in the legal and business life of Winnipeg, Mr. Machray's head of one of the city's largest law firms. Since 1905 he has been Chancellor of the Church of England Diocese of Rupert's Land.

The University of Manitoba's endowment trust fund officially reported to amount to more than \$1,600,000 a short time ago has been depleted to the extent that it now stands about \$100,000, it was learned today. It is understood that investigations disclose that thefts account for \$840,000 and the fund has been further depleted through bad investments.

Von Gronau Delayed Short Time at Yakutat On Way To Cordova

Spent Yesterday Repairing Engine at Cordova and Were All Ready Last Evening to Start For Dutch Harbor This Morning

CORDOVA, Aug. 25.—Adolph von Gronau and three companions yesterday made engine repairs and made plans to hop off today for Dutch Harbor. They had been forced down at Yakutat early Tuesday afternoon by stormy weather and a leaking radiator on the rear motor. With the help of cannerymen they made repairs and the flight was continued, the remainder of the trip here being made with poor visibility and a ceiling of 200 feet. They followed the Eyak River Canyon from the sea and landed on a lake. Von Gronau hopped off this morning for Dutch Harbor.

BAD TIME FOR TOLMIE

Premier Met Partially Hostile Audience at Victoria Non-Political Gathering

VICTORIA, Aug. 25.—Rounds of "booming," echoing from all parts of the auditorium of the City Temple competed strongly with the applause with which part of the audience of 1,100 men and women sought to welcome Premier Tolmie on his first public appearance since his return from his long sojourn at Ottawa.

The demonstration against the Premier commenced the instant he entered the hall, accompanied by Rev. Clem Davies, and continued in ruts throughout his progress to the platform. Groups in several sections of the hall took up the noisy chorus and at times their demonstration drowned out the hand-clapping of the majority.

The initial demonstration was only a forerunner of the difficult pathway the Premier was required to tread during his hour of speech-making. Dr. Davies, the chairman, in an effort to provide a lightning rod for the impending storm, in his introduction of the Premier, stressed the fact that the meeting was in no sense a political gathering and that the speaker was the guest of the City Temple and as such entitled to a good hearing in his explanation of the problems before the Imperial Conference.

For some time the interruptions took the form of clearly spoken comments in conversational tone, apparently exchanged between members of the audience. Later the remarks were more pointed and directed specifically to the Premier.

Although the chairman intervened to denounce the interruptions as not in accord with British fair play and also apologized to the Premier on behalf of the City Temple, the interruptions continued with only slightly diminished energy throughout the Premier's address.

Throughout the evening, supplementing the spoken comments and questions, the chorused "boos" arose at intervals, the cry being echoed from group to group around the hall.

The Premier maintained his composure with great aplomb, continuing his speech as though he heard nothing and was accorded an ovation at the conclusion of his remarks. The storm of hand-clapping gave occasion for a final chorus of "booming" as the meeting disbanded.

GOOD NEWS, PRINCE RUPERT

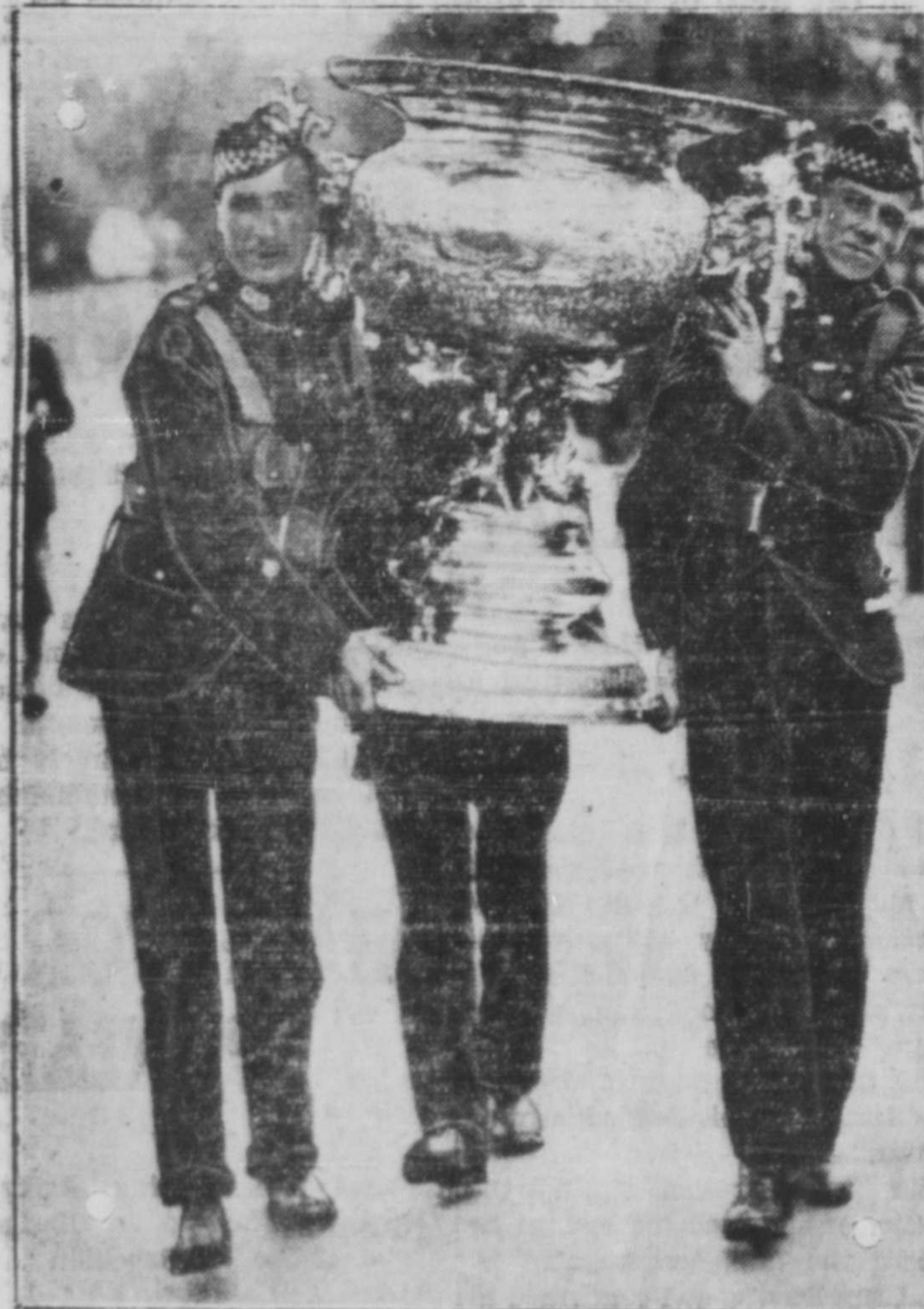

Michael Markoff Is Another Man Without Country

MONTREAL, Aug. 25.—Michael Markoff is just another man without a country.

When he left Russia a decade and a half ago he carried a passport which "by the Grace of God and the will of the Emperor of All the Russians" would take him anywhere. It brought him into Canada but isn't good enough to take him out. He wants to go to England but the British government won't recognize it. The Soviet consul at New York says Markoff is not a Russian citizen; that when he came to Canada, Russia was unborn. "The revolution," says he, "was in '17."

"The only thing I can do is become a Canadian citizen," said Markoff. But the Dominion government wants his birth certificate and he can't get it.

All in all he's a bit tired of passports, consuls and immigration officials.

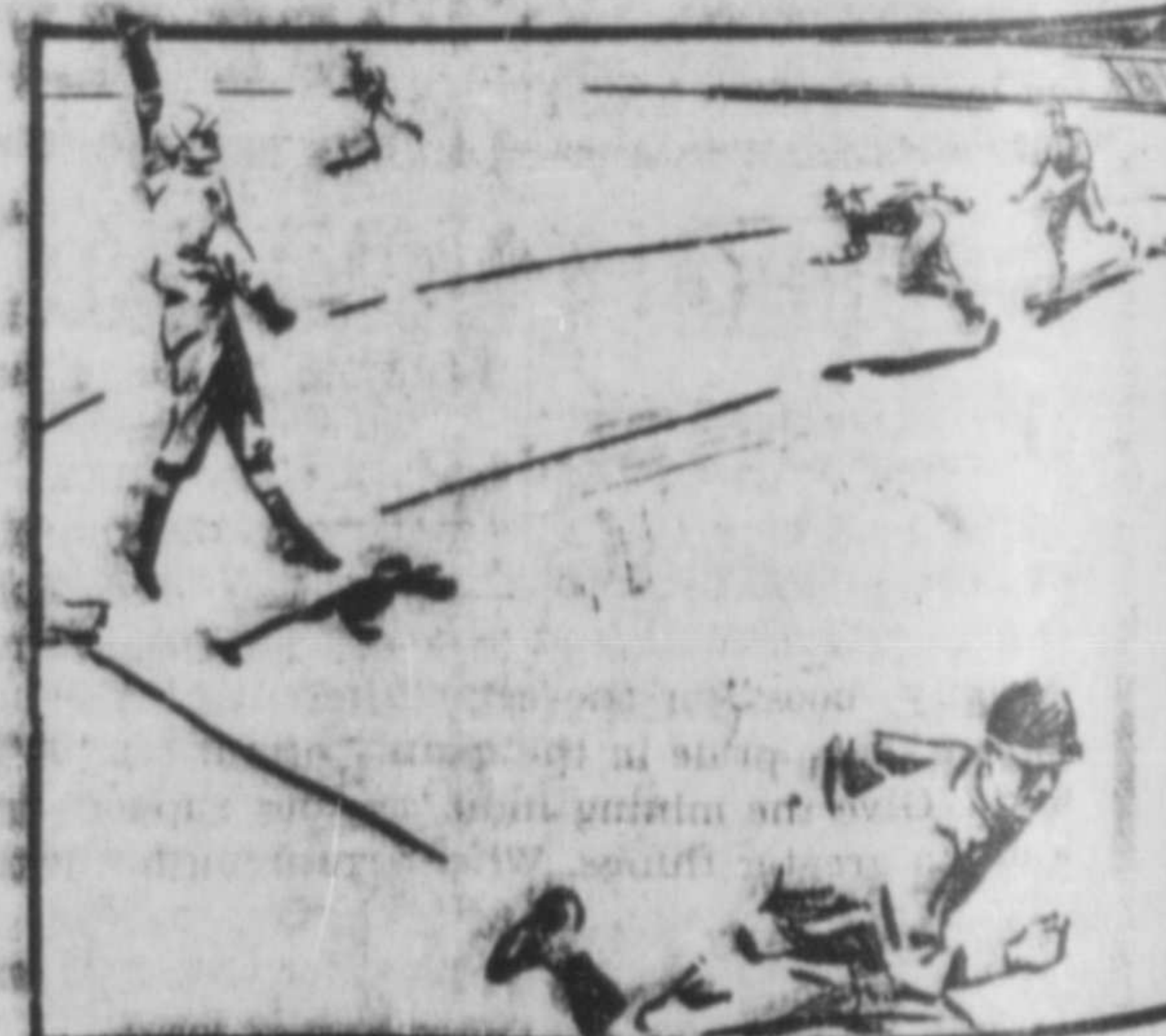

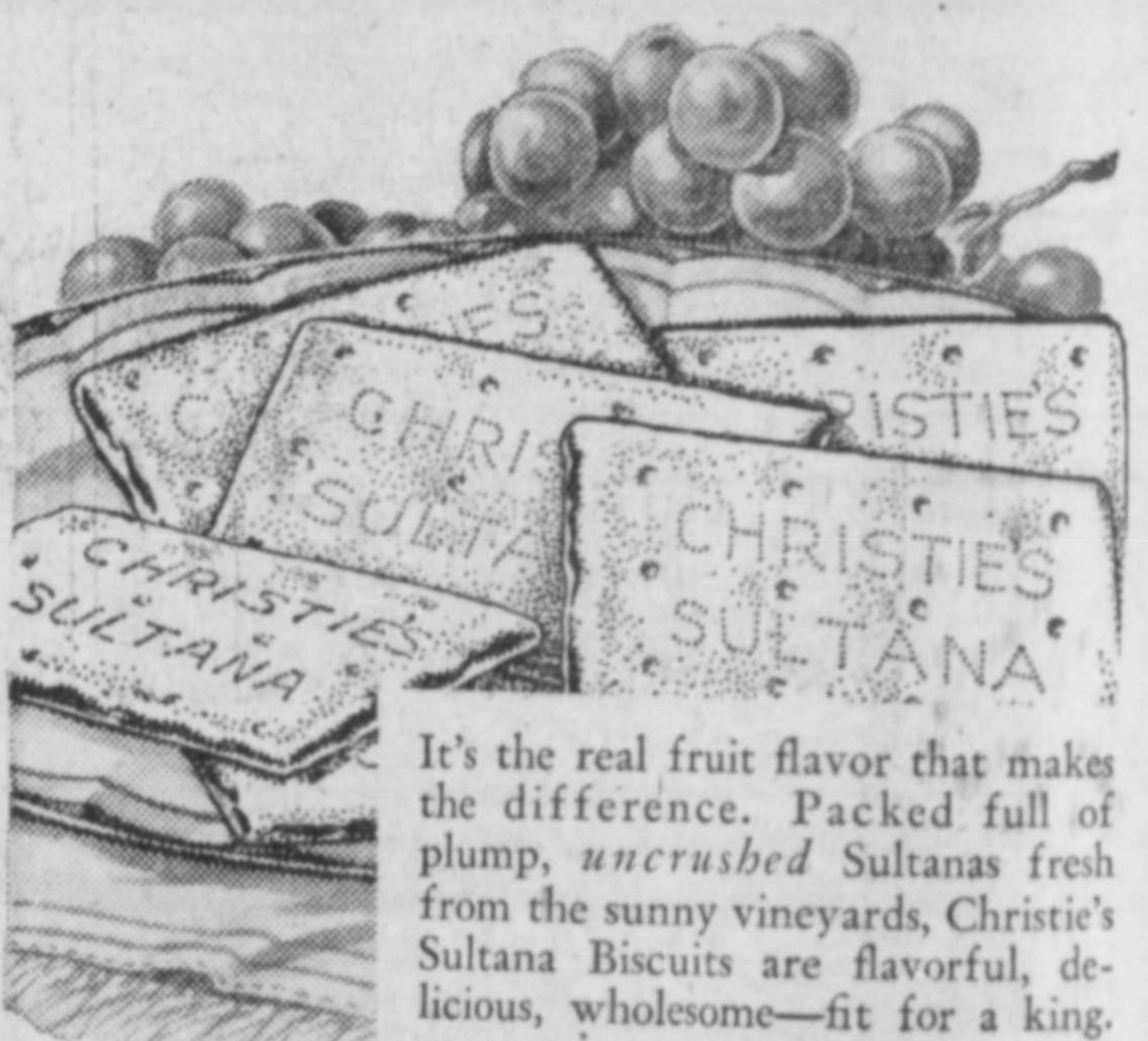

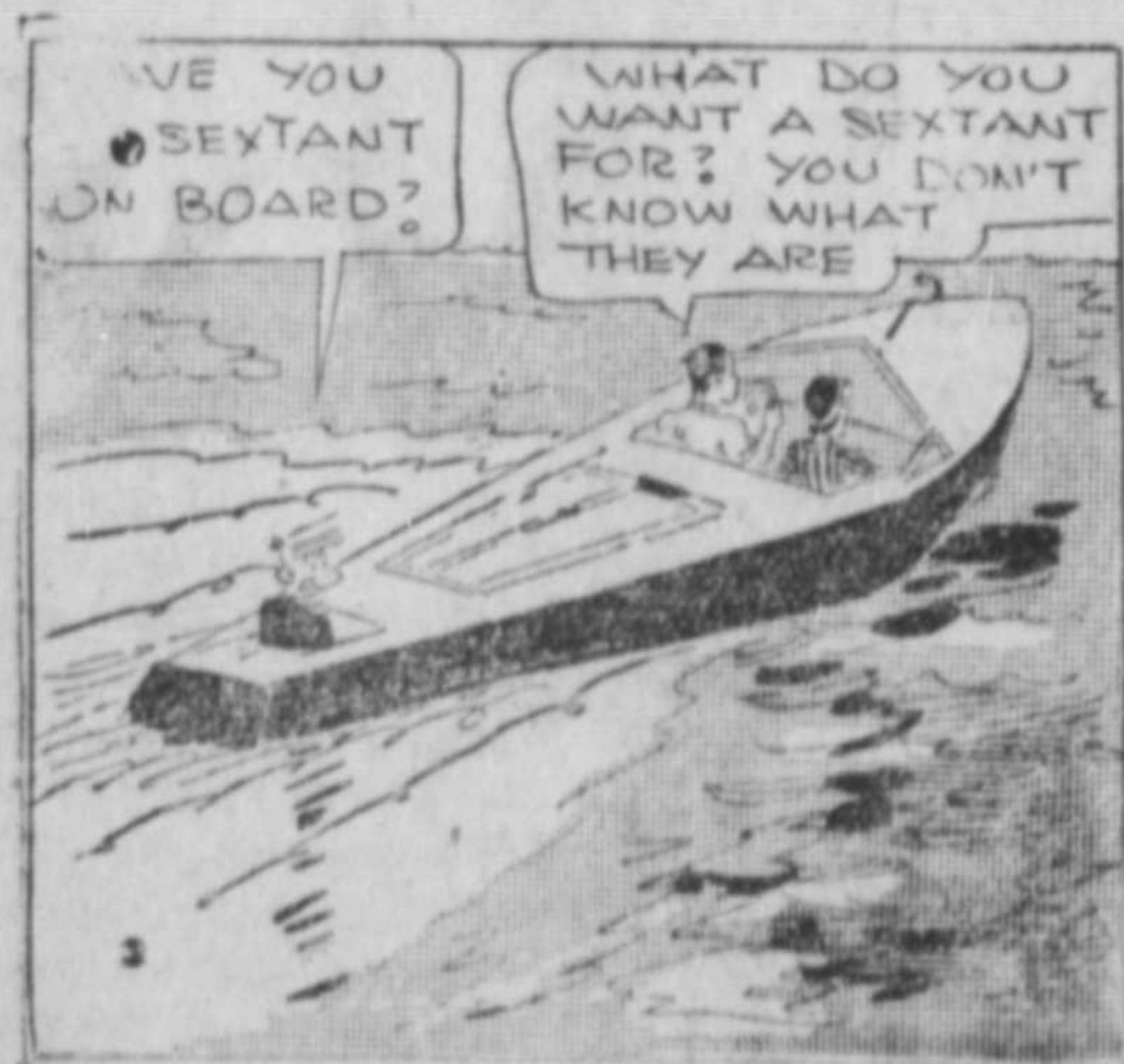
Smithers people are pleased that they are to get daylight train service after the first of the month.
