Prince Albert Contract Comes Here

ALL AVAILABLE REFRIGERATOR CARS ARE IN USE FOR FISH NOW HERE

EDITORIAL

The Daily News had been on the street only a few minutes yesterday when the telephone rang and exception was taken to an article regarding car shortage on the ground that it was conservative. This man, who is interested in the fishing business, claims that Prince Rupert is the marketing of ten million pounds of fish through lack of refrigerators.

Albert Contract Secured by Local Drydock Company

Before leaving for the south last night A. Wallace, head of the shipbuilding plant that has taken over the local drydock, announced that his firm had secured the contract for the repairs to the G. T. P. steamer Prince Albert, work on which has already commenced.

There is a good deal of work to be done on the vessel. Ten plates have to be renewed and a good deal of other work done which will entail skilled labor.

This is the first job on which the new firm have bid and it is satisfactory to know that they got the contract in competition with outside bidders. Naturally Mr. Allan, the local manager, is particularly pleased with the outcome. He is located here permanently.

DEFICIT ON GOVERNMENT RAILWAYS

is Thirteen Millions Greater Than for Last Year, is Prospect.

OTTAWA, Jan. 26.—It is expected that the annual statement of last year's operations of the government railways will be ready in a few days. It will show a deficit of about \$10,000,000, including the G. T. P. This is in comparison with a deficit of \$47,000,000 for the previous year.

FISH BOAT CAPTAIN DIED LAST EVENING

Captain Patrick McGinnis Was Veteran Master of the North.

The death occurred last night at 10:15 in the General Hospital of Patrick J. McGinnis, a well known coast fish boat captain and pilot. Captain McGinnis was 71 years of age and death was the result of a paralytic stroke. He was a native of Prince Edward Island and came west in 1897 at the time of the Klondike gold rush when he was captain of sailing vessels plying north from Seattle. In 1918 and 1919 he was captain of the Canadian Fish and Gold Storage Company's schooner Sumner. Last year he went to Seattle where he was engaged as watchman on government vessels under construction in Lake Union. He returned here in October and became mate on the schooner Sitka, his last boat. A brother resides in Vancouver.

South African Campaign is Waged Over Secession

General Hertzog, Leader of the Nationalists, Promises to Put Off Question for Five Years; Labor for Constitution

LONDON, January 28.—A Johannesburg dispatch says the election campaign in South Africa is growing more fierce every day and that the issue is doubtful. Despite the statements that General Hertzog be prepared to allow the question of secession to rest in abeyance for five years if returned to power, it is apparent that the rank and file of the Nationalist party regard the severance of Imperial connection as the only issue in the contest. Even if Hertzog is elected, it is believed the majority will force their leader's hands. A fusion of the Unionist party and the South African Party has given General Jan Smuts much strength in the country. The Labor party is admittedly strong and they are pledged to uphold the constitution and they will hold the balance of power.

At a meeting at the national or so-called "imperial" headquarters in Atlanta, Ga., it was decided that Colonel William J. Simmons shall begin in about ninety days a tour of some of the large cities of the North, where small beginnings have been made by local organizers.

Port Simpson Fire Spectacular Blaze

Consuming Conflagration was Visible for Miles; Fire Escapes Saved Loss of Life; To Rebuild

"The iron fire escapes at the Crosby girls' home saved a great loss of life in the recent fire," said Indian Agent G. C. Perry who together with Rev. Arthur Barber, of Calgary, superintendent of Indian Missions, and the five teachers of the school staff, returned last evening on Ernest Dudoward's launch from Port Simpson.

In the sudden early morning blaze the only means of escape from the building was by means of these fire escapes. The fire was indeed a spectacular one and in the hours before the dawn the blaze was visible for miles. Dr. Spencer's mission house

which adjoins the school had a narrow escape and it was only by means of continual blanketing that the red hot embers from the burning school did not ignite it as well.

Everything Destroyed.

Where before stood the handsome school there remains now but a mass of burnt out embers and ashes. The destruction of the building was entire as well as all the possessions of the teachers and scholars. All the stores, including two cases of shoes and rubbers that had arrived on the night before, were consumed in the blaze.

The people of the Indian village responded in a noble manner to the aid for distress. At a meeting held in the evening after the fire no less than \$290 was collected and many expressions of sympathy were voiced. At this meeting the five teachers of the school appeared dressed in clothes

that they had borrowed from the Indians.

Teachers Arrive.

The teachers who arrived last night were Miss Philpot, Miss Grafton, Miss Deacon, Miss Nelson and Miss McFadden. Miss McFadden went south on the Prince George and the other teachers will leave in the course of a few days for their respective homes, most of them in the east. On their arrival here last night the staff was entertained by Dr. and Mrs. W. T. Kergin.

Already plans are under consideration by the Methodist Mission Department for the replacing of the destroyed school. The new building will be a large and commodious one, surpassing the one burnt, and will likely be a school for both boys and girls.

Fish Car Situation Critical Again Now

Six Cars Available --- Seven Cars of Halibut Arrived and More Coming Steadily in

The Canadian Fisheries Association, the city, and the Board of Trade are co-operating splendidly in the energetic campaign that is being made for the immediate delivery of express refrigerator cars to this port.

The Fisheries Association has wired to President D. B. Hanna, General Manager E. A. Warren, Hon. Dr. Reid, minister of railways, and John Pullen, president of the Canadian Express Company. The Board of Trade has also wired to the same persons and today the mayor is sending a wire to Frank Carvell, chairman of the railway commission, asking him how the situation really stands in regard to the delivery of these cars.

Today the situation is again becoming critical. There will be six "freezers" available and three of these are being filled this afternoon and the Commonwealth has just arrived with 20,000 pounds requiring four cars. This means one car short right now with fish continuing to arrive.

WOMEN WOULD HANG BANDIT LOT OWNERS OF COMOX AVENUE WILL BE NAMED

Jury at Seattle Find John Schmitt Guilty of Murder in First Degree.

SEATTLE, January 28.—John Schmitt, the alleged bandit, has been found guilty of murder in the first degree with a recommendation that he be hanged for killing detective James O'Brien in a gun battle last Friday.

The jury, which included four women, was out 54 minutes. When the prisoner heard the verdict he smiled and said "Let's go."

WITNESS NOT TO BE FOUND

No Trace of Man Who Was to Give Evidence Against Murderers in Dublin.

DUBLIN, Jan. 28.—No trace is yet found of the principal witness against Frank Teeling, William Conway, Daniel Fealey and Edward Potter, charged with the murder of Lieut. Angliss, known as McMahon, one of the fourteen officers killed here on November 21.

MILNER, Jan. 28.—R. A. Payne, the soldier-farmer candidate in Delta at the general election, it is announced, will not be a candidate at the bye-election, but will support A. D. Paterson, Liberal.

SPECTACULAR FIRE DESTROYED FORUM

TORONTO, Jan. 28.—A spectacular fire last night destroyed the Forum building here, the loss exceeding the sum of \$150,000.

ALLIED COUNCIL IS INTERRUPTED

Divergence of Views Regarding Reparations to Be Paid by Germany.

BELGIUM PROPOSES SIX BILLION MARKS

PARIS, Jan. 28.—Divergence of views of members of the Allied Supreme Council regarding reparations has caused interruption of the conference today and in some quarters it is regarded as in danger of breaking up.

A critical stage was reached this afternoon. The crisis came over the question of finding the total amount of reparations due from Germany and the methods of payment.

A session of the council set for later in the afternoon has been abandoned.

The basis of discussion today was the Belgian proposal that Germany be compelled to make annual reparations of six billion gold marks as the maximum and three billion as the minimum.

MINISTERS IN CAMPAIGN

Premier Remains in Delta Constituency and King and Hart on Mainland.

VICTORIA, Jan. 28.—Before the climax of battle in Delta next week voters may see the whole cabinet in battle action with the exception of Hon. E. D. Barrow, minister of agriculture, who is in the capital yesterday morning but did not. Instead he is for his secretary with the halls of waiting business. The action of the ministers is expected here to indicate that Premier will not leave the fray of the voting starts. Hon. Dr. and Hon. John Hart are both in Vancouver and will take part in the campaign, and it is anticipated that Hon. T. D. Pattullo, though still hobbling on a cane, will leave any minute to enter the campaign.

FARMERS SHOT AT BALLINALEE

Were Kidnapped on Saturday Near Belfast; Bodies are Found

LONDON, Jan. 28.—The Daily News says the body of William Carter, one of the two Irish farmers who were kidnapped on Saturday near Belfast, was found Wednesday in Corboach Lake near Ballinalee. He had been suffocated and shot.

The body of William Elliott, the other farmer, who was kidnapped with Carter, was found Sunday in a bog near Ballinalee.

NEWSPAPERMAN OF INTERIOR PASSES

A. Jewett, of Nelson, Formerly of Revelstoke and Winnipeg, Died Last Night

NELSON, Jan. 28.—W. A. Jewett, pioneer newspaper man of this city, died last night at the Stenney Lake General Hospital at the age of 72.

Mr. Jewett came to the district from Revelstoke in 1893 and was previously from Winnipeg.

Keen Interest In Fish Cars.

Keen interest was taken last evening in the articles published in this paper regarding the need of fish cars. It was a general subject of conversation everywhere and the News came in for a round of commendation for the action it was taking in giving publicity to the cause. It is at last coming home to the people here that a sufficiency of cars is necessary to the progress of the city and something on which all efforts will be concentrated. It is to be hoped that the fishermen's organization and the labor organizations in the city will back up the Board of Trade and other organizations in their efforts to secure justice in this regard. It means so much to the city that nothing should be left undone to bring to the attention of the Railway Company and the Government the absolute necessity of providing proper equipment.

Make Purchases In the City.

Word has been received from the acting chairman of the newly-formed purchasing committee of the Dominion Government asking us to notify the people of Prince Rupert that so far as possible all purchases for Dominion Government work in this neighborhood will be made locally. Wherever possible tenders will be called and the co-operation of local merchants is asked in order that the business may be kept here. The Commission takes over the work of the War Purchasing Commission and will provide the supplies for all branches of public work, including the payment for labor. One paragraph of the letter will be sufficient to give the idea:

"To assist in carrying out this policy, in so far as it is possible, I ask your aid. Perhaps you will be good enough to take steps to see that the business interests of your district are informed that their co-operation is essential. They should appreciate the fact that government business is good business and that their endeavors to assist will result to the development of the country and their district in accordance with the services rendered."

Committee on Cov Bay Problem.

It is to be hoped that the committee appointed to make recommendations in regard to the settlement of the Cov Bay problem will be the last. If they complete the work and the matter is settled, there will be no need of another committee. Aldermen Dybhavn, Kerr and Perry ought to be able to make such recommendations as will be acceptable to all parties concerned. If they do this, they will have shown themselves worthy of the trust the people placed in them.

People Looking to Mackenzie Basin.

People here are looking to the Mackenzie basin, watching with interest the developments in regard to a supply of oil for fuel purposes. It is not far away from here and there is a possibility of the big pipe line coming out this way. For that reason they were much surprised at the action of the Dominion Government in closing down prospecting in that district. To what extent they were justified it is difficult to say without a better knowledge of conditions than is available. There is a very general feeling, however, that it may be an effort to shut out the poor prospector and to give the advantage to the big concerns. If this is the case it is wrong. It is expected that the Government will soon make themselves clear in regard to this or that questions will be asked in Parliament so that people may know what to expect.

MINES IN B. C. HAD INCREASE IN PRODUCTION

Despite the Unsettled Market Conditions, Gold was the Only Metal that Fell

Despite serious drops in the price of metals during the year 1920, the metalliferous mines of British Columbia made a total output of \$20,442,155, or an increase in production over 1919 of \$105,157, according to the preliminary estimate and review of mineral production just published by the provincial government.

The gold production of the province for the year 1920 amounted in value to \$2,707,698, a decrease from the preceding year of \$729,447. With an assured promise of lower cost of supplies and mining it seems that gold mining will again become profitable and an increased production may be looked for. In 1919 Cassiar district was the largest gold producer.

The collieries of the province have more than held their own, having made a net production of 2,712,228 tons, valued at \$13,561,410 and 68,190 tons of coke valued at \$477,330. The net coal production for 1920 exceeds that of the previous year by 444,687 tons and as a matter of fact was only exceeded one previous year, 1919, when it was but slightly greater.

The quantity of silver produced is estimated to have been about 1,404,926 ounces worth \$3,265,324, an increase in production from 1919 of 1,807 ounces, but owing to the lower market value of silver, a decrease in value of \$327,349. The Skeena district was second to Sicoma in silver production.

Copper and Lead

The amount of copper estimated to have been produced in 1920 shows as compared with the previous year a slight increase in quantity, but, owing to the lower market selling price, a decrease in value. The production is estimated at 42,773,660 pounds, which is 314,321 pounds more than the 1919 output. The value for the year was \$7,485,390, which compared with \$7,939,896 made in 1919 shows a decrease of \$454,506. Skeena produced more copper than any other division in the province.

The total amount of lead produced in 1920 is estimated to have been 21,545,047 pounds, valued at \$1,546,474. This represents, as compared with the previous year, a decrease of 7,930,924 pounds in quantity, but on account of higher prices, an increase in value of \$13,616. This was the only metal that had a higher price in 1920 than in 1919. The North produced practically no lead.

Northern Coal

The quantity of zinc estimated to have been produced in 1920 amounted to 70,765,268 pounds, which shows an increase of 20,027,647 pounds over 1919. The value, \$5,143,272, was \$1,602,813 greater than the preceding year. Omineca was a large producer of zinc in the year.

The Telkwa Collieries Co. was the only northern coal producer. About 1,279 tons was mined and shipped to Prince Rupert in 1920, and continued production is expected.

DASHED TO DEATH AGAINST THE ROCKS

Thirty-six Lost Their Lives in Wreck of Schooner Felicidad

MANILA, Jan. 27.—Women with babes in arms leaped overboard and were drowned or dashed to death against the rocks on the orders of the captain of the wrecked schooner Felicidad at the mouth of the Algo River, according to statements made here. Thirty-six lives were lost. Among the survivors were the captain and four members of the crew.

BURNS CONCERT AT TELKWA THIS WEEK

TELKWA, Jan. 28.—The Burns concert held here this week was one of the most successful affairs held in Telkwa for some time. Miss Sangster proved a favorite and other performers who pleased the audience much were Mr. Wheeler, Miss Deans and the two Maeks—McBean and McBurns. Local talent was very good.

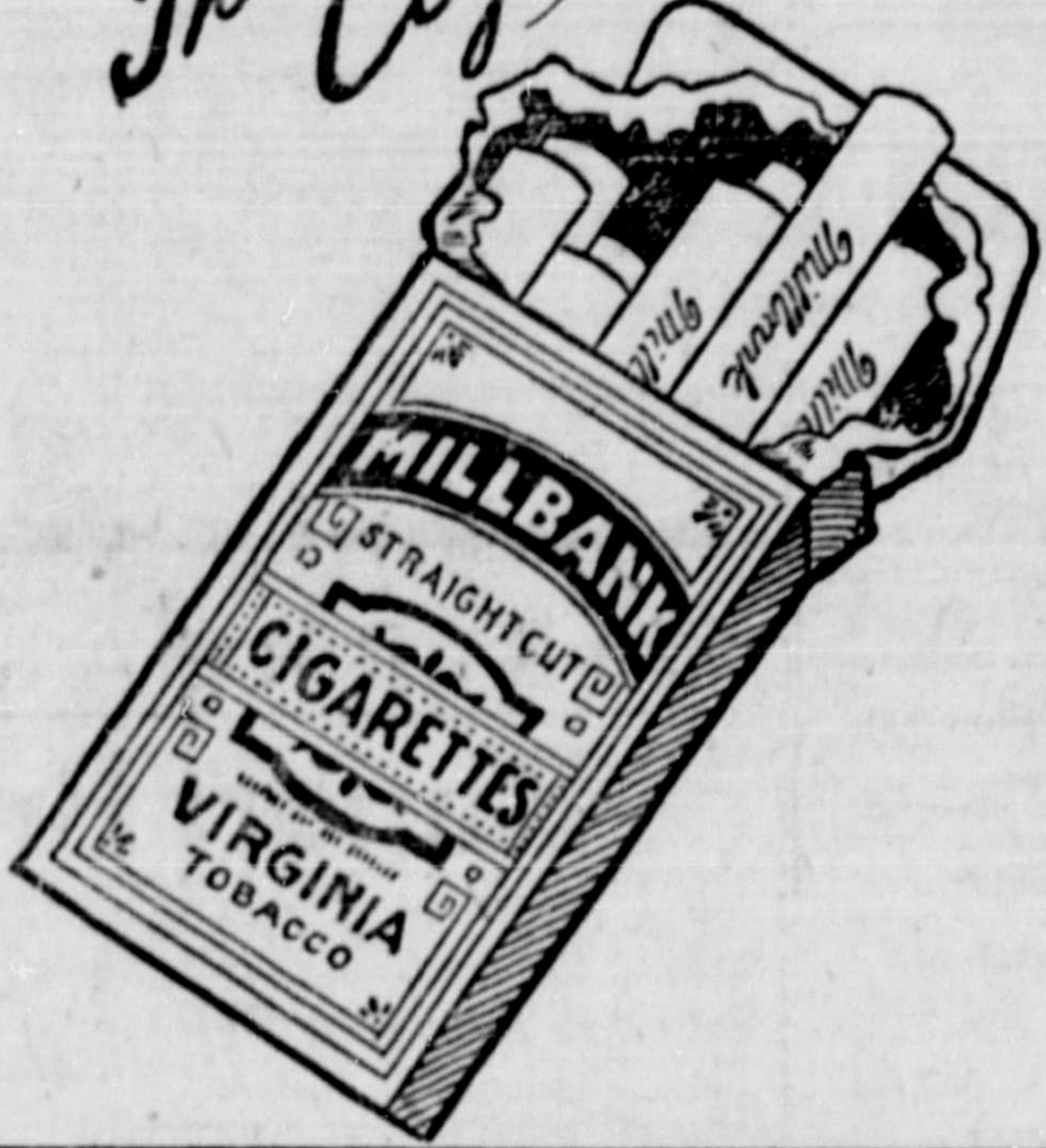

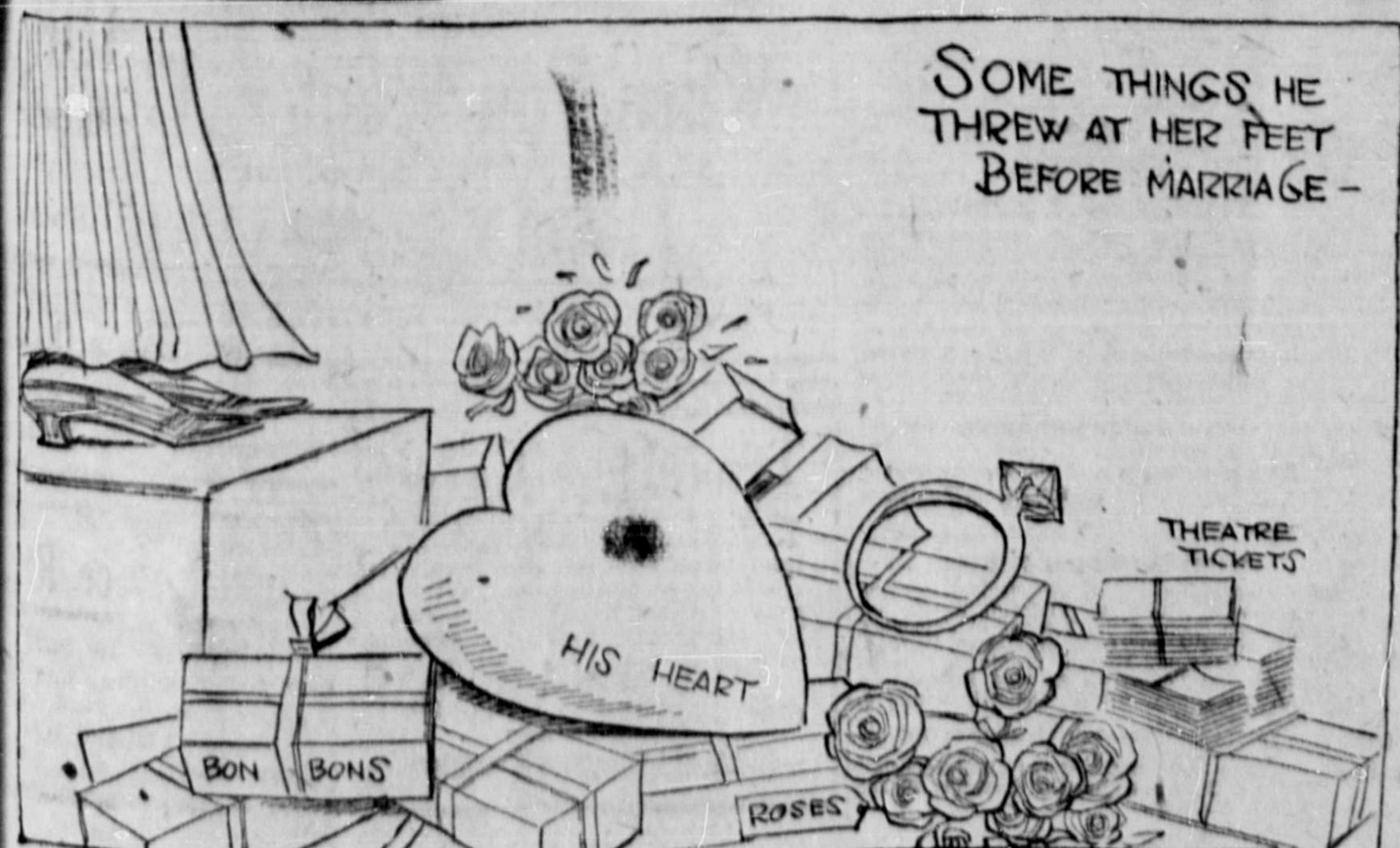

SOUTH CHINA VERSUS NORTH

Sun Yat Sen May Yet be President of Great Country

PEKING, Jan. 28.—Sun Yat-sen, Dr. Wu Ting-fang, Tang Shao-yi and others, leaders of what is called the "Constitutionalist" faction, until recently entrenched in Shanghai, have gone to Canton and are busy with the organization of a new government to supersede or rejuvenate the defunct Canton Military Government.

They propose, it is understood here, to call their an "extraordinary" government, and its purpose is to call an "extraordinary" parliament and elect an "extraordinary" president in the person of Sun Yat-sen. After union with the North has been effected they propose to drop the term "extraordinary" and become the government for all of China.

Dr. Sun is said to have issued a call to each of the 96 districts in the province of Kwangtung to contribute \$30,000, to be employed in the organization of the new government and in the training of troops, including 30,000 for a special bodyguard. He is further alleged to have in mind a union of the southern and south-western provinces into a "constitution preserving league" with the object of presenting a united front against the north.
